The minutes of the meeting held October 20, 1876, were read and approved.

The Chairman offered for adoption the following resolution:

Resolved, That the sum of three thousand dollars be and the same is hereby transferred from the appropriation "Contingencies—Mayor's Office," 1875, the same being in excess of the amount required for the purposes and objects thereof, to the appropriation "Contingencies—Law Department," 1876, the amount of said appropriation being insufficient.

—and put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor of the City of New York (Chairman), the Comptroller of the City of New York, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—3.

The Comptroller moved that when the Board adjourn, it do so to meet on Wednesday, October 25, 1876, at 11 o'clock A. M.

BOARD OF EDUCATION.

WEDNESDAY, October 18, 1876.

The Board of Education held a stated session at the Hall of the Board, corner of Grand and Elm streets, on Wednesday afternoon, 18th inst., at 4 o'clock P. M.

Present—Wm. Wood, Esq., President, and Commissioners Baker, Beardslee, Dowd, Fuller, Goulding, Halsted, Hazeltine, Kane, Klamroth, Mathewson, Place, Traud, Walker, West, Wetmore, and Wilkins—17.

Absent—Commissioners Caylus, Kelly, Schell, and Vermilye—4.

The minutes of the session held on the 4th inst. were approved.

The President laid before the Board communications from the Trustees of the several wards, as follows:

From the Sixth, Eleventh, and Twenty-second Wards, asking to excuse the absence of teachers; and from the Thirteenth and Twenty-third Wards, relative to appointment of teachers. Referred to the Committee on Teachers.

From the Sixteenth Ward, asking for the payment of sundry bills, amount, \$714.07. Referred to the Finance Committee.

From the Nineteenth Ward, to appoint two additional Evening School Teachers. Referred to the Committee on Evening Schools.

From the Tenth, Nineteenth, and Twenty-third Wards, relative to furniture for several class rooms, etc. Referred to the Committee on School Furniture.

From the Nineteenth Ward, asking that answers be returned to certain applications from the Ward Trustees. Referred to the Committee on By-Laws, etc.

The President laid before the Board the report of the City Superintendent for the month of September. Entered in the minutes.

The President laid before the Board the following communications:

FOLGER, J.

It is not alleged by the appellant, either upon the papers in the appeal book, or in argument before us, that the claim of the relator was not for some necessary incidental expense of the Board of Education, or some such other expense as might be necessarily incurred by the Board in pursuance of certain statutes.

Before the year 1873 that Board was authorized to draw from the moneys which should be raised for the purposes of public education such sums as should be required for the purpose of defraying the incidental or other expenses above spoken of.

Laws of 1851, chap. 386, § 2, sub. 5.

" 1854, " 101, pp. 235-239.

The mode in which such sums should be drawn is not specified in these acts, though as to the drawing of sums for certain other expenditures, it is particularly directed that the drafts be made by the President of the Board, and countersigned by the Clerk of the Board, and addressed to the Chamberlain.

Laws of 1851, *supra*, §§ 15, 16. We may infer that it was the practice of the Board to draw all drafts in this way. We see no reason, therefore, why the appellant ought not to have met the draft in this case with prompt payment, unless there is some subsequent provision of law which forbids him to do so. There are pointed out to us certain provisions which it is claimed do this. In chap. 757 of Laws of 1873, p. 1123, § 8, it is enacted that wages and salaries, including payment for the Board of Education, may be made upon pay-rolls, upon which each person named thereon shall separately receipt for the amount paid to such person, and in every case of payment upon a pay-roll, the warrant for the aggregate amount of wages and salaries included therein may be made payable to the superintendent, principal, teacher, foreman, or other officer designated for the purpose. The utmost that can be claimed for this clause of that statute, with any show of reason, is that payment of "wages and salaries" for the Board of Education may be thus made. It seems to be not a clause of compulsion, regarding payments to be made thus, but a clause of ease, permitting payment to be made to many, by the means of a single pay-roll, and one warrant to the head one of the number, for the aggregate dues to all. The scope of the language takes in nothing but payments of that kind, to wit, wages and salaries, and the phraseology is not applicable to payments of a sum to one individual or firm for one kind of indebtedness having no relation in time or amount with many or any other. Obviously, it is not applicable to a case like that in hand. Under section 112 of the New York City Charter of 1873 (Laws of that year, p. 517), as amended the same year (Laws of that year, p. 1126, § 20), the Board of Education is required to send

to a Board of Estimate and Apportionment an estimate of the expenditure it will need to make for the then ensuing year. The Board of Estimate and Apportionment from this makes up a statement, which it sends to the Board of Supervisors, which latter Board must raise the amount by tax. This does not vary the power and duties of the Board of Education very materially. Before 1873 it sent its estimate directly to the Board of Supervisors. It now sends through another Board, subject to the revision of the latter as to amount, and incidentally as to object. When the sum at last decided upon is raised by tax and collected, it goes into the City Treasury, to be paid thence for the purpose for which it was raised, and by the officer proper to make payment, viz., the Chamberlain. And though as fact the money for any year is not raised by tax in that year, but is provided for by anticipatory borrowing, the result is the same so far as the obtaining the amount for the purposes of the Board of Education is concerned. It finally gets into the control of some official or officials, for the use of the Board. There are other provisions, however, which touch the question at issue more closely. It is the aggregate amount reported by the Board of Estimate to the Board of Supervisors, which is raised by the latter body by taxation (Laws of 1873, p. 538), and of course this aggregate includes the sum for the Board of Education undistinguished from that for any Department of the city government, or for all of them. This aggregate is received as one amount by the Receiver of Taxes, without distinction of sums for one Department or Board from those for another. After that the Chamberlain receives them, not as the moneys for this or that Department or Board, but as the moneys of the city. For though the objects of taxation are many, there is but one primary recipient for the moneys raised thereby, and that is the city, and the city treasury is the place of primary deposit. The actual materialized city treasury is such banks or trust company as the Chamberlain or Mayor shall elect; and into these the Chamberlain is required by law to deposit all moneys which come into his hands on account of the city; nor shall they lawfully come out thence save in one way, and that is by payment by the Chamberlain of warrants drawn on the treasury by the Comptroller, and countersigned by the Mayor (Laws of 1873, p. 494). We see no way of avoiding this plain and imperative mandate. Plainly the act of 1873 provides the one only way of receipt into the city treasury of moneys raised by taxation, and the one only way of payment therefrom. And so it is with money raised by borrowing. There is no other lawful way of replenishing the treasury, nor is there any other lawful way of depleting it. It may be said that this law applies only to moneys coming to the hands of the Chamberlain "on account of the city," and that the money which the relators demand of him is money reaching him on account of the Board of Education. But we have seen that all the money that reaches him from taxation reaches him on account of the city. Hence it is all liable to this restriction upon his power of disbursement of it. It is also claimed that the Board of Education is a public corporation, and entirely distinct from the city, clothed with separate and independent powers, and recognized as such by legislation *pari passu* with the act of 1873. It is no more distinct from the city than an individual, or a partnership, or a private corporation, each of whom are subject to the provisions of the law for the payment of money out of the city treasury. The money that this Board is to use must be raised in the mode provided for in the act, and though ultimately to be applied to the purpose of the Board, it must first be obtained by the city, and received into its treasury as its money on its account. When there it is subject to the law, which directs but one way by which it may be got from there, though it has been put there for the purposes alone of this Board. It is not the money of the Board of Education, so that that Board could sue for its conversion, or so that that Board would suffer by the loss of it by robbery or embezzlement. It is the money of the city, but held by the city mixed with other moneys to answer the demands for it, made in lawful manner by that Board.

Now, the relators do not show that they have tendered to the appellant a warrant drawn upon the treasury by the Comptroller, and countersigned by the Mayor; they have not brought the Chamberlain within the exigencies of the law, and he may not be compelled to honor and pay the draft drawn upon him in behalf of the Board of Education.

The order appealed from should be reversed, and the motion of the relators for a mandamus should be denied.

FOLGER, J.

The views expressed in the kindred case of *The People vs. Tappan* are decisive of this. No moneys can be taken from the city treasury save by the check of the Chamberlain, upon the warrant of the Comptroller, countersigned by the Mayor. No such warrant can be so signed and countersigned save upon vouchers for the expenditure of the amount named therein. The papers do not show that any vouchers of that sort were presented to the Comptroller. He was not therefore compellable to draw and sign a warrant.

The order appealed from should be reversed.
