AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, Held at Their Office, No. 280 Broadway, New York City, on Tuesday, October 18, 1904, at 2 o'clock P. M.

Present—The Comptroller, Commissioners Ten Eyck (President), Ryan and Windolph, and Chief Engineer Smith.

In the absence of the Secretary, Frank H. Warder was designated Acting Secretary. Progress reports of the Chief Engineer for the weeks ending September 29 and October 6, 1904, were referred to the Construction Committee.

Report No. 1073 of the Chief Engineer, dated October 10, 1904, stating that Joseph O'Connell, Eugene F. Clayton and William A. Evalenko, who were appointed Rodmen on October 4, 1904, had declined to accept the positions, and recommending that their appointments be rescinded and that Norbert Lyons, George Wintner and Jacob G. Rubenstein be appointed Rodmen in their places, at a salary of \$75 per month, was received, approved and ordered filed, and the following resolutions were offered:

Resolved, That, upon the recommendation of the Chief Engineer, contained in Report No. 1073, dated October 10, 1904, that part of the resolution adopted October 4, 1904, appointing Joseph O'Connell, Eugene F. Clayton and William A. Evalenko as Rodmen at a salary of seventy-five dollars per month, be and hereby is rescinded, said persons having declined to accept the positions.

Resolved, That, upon the recommendation of the Chief Engineer contained in Report No. 1073, dated October 10, 1904, Norbert Lyons, George Wintner and Jacob G. Rubenstein be and hereby are appointed Rodmen, at a salary of seventy-five dollars per month, to take effect when assigned to duty, they having been certified by the Municipal Civil Service Commission as eligible for appointment.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

You will note that the same question seems to have come up in the case of the Johnson avenue sewer, and that Mr. Delany sees no objection to action by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment which is requested by the President of the Borough.

Hon. JOHN C. BRACKENRIDGE, Acting President of the Borough of Brooklyn:

SIR—I have received your letter dated April 13, 1904, as to the reconstruction of the Johnson avenue sewer.

It appears that on March 31, 1904, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted a resolution that, pursuant to the provisions of sections 169 and 176 of the Charter, the Comptroller be authorized to issue Corporate Stock to an amount not exceeding \$150,000 to provide the necessary means for the payment of the expenses incurred or to be incurred by reason of the construction of the Johnson avenue sewer, in the Borough of Brooklyn. It is stated in your letter that this resolution was adopted in order to allow the President of the Borough to reconstruct an old sewer which had become broken, clogged and useless, and had been abandoned by the City for some years, so that relief might be afforded to a large section of the Borough of Brooklyn which had suffered greatly from floods due to the lack of adequate sewerage.

It is also stated that the sewer is upon the official sewer map required by the provisions of the Charter, and you therefore ask if, under sections 397 and 398 of the Charter, and such other sections as may apply, the President of the Borough is not authorized to proceed immediately to make such contracts as may be necessary for the reconstruction of the Johnson avenue sewer without further proceedings by the Local Board or the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

It is also stated in your letter in effect that no assessment upon the property deemed to be benefited is to be levied in this particular case.

Ordinarily the expense of the construction and reconstruction of sewers is paid for through local assessments, and the authority of the Local Board is a prerequisite to the making of the improvement. It was held, however, by my predecessor, in an opinion dated December 16, 1903, to the Comptroller, in regard to certain relief sewers in Fourth and Fifth avenues, in the Borough of Brooklyn, that while the cost of the relief sewers could not be charged to the Street Improvement Fund, the Board of Estimate and Assessment could lawfully authorize the issue and sale of Corporate Stock for the specific purpose, thus making the entire expense a charge upon the City at large, and not payable through local assessment. That course has apparently been adopted in the present case, and it follows that no action by the Local Board, approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, is necessary.

I know of no reason why the Borough President should not at once proceed to advertise for bids for the doing of this work, and to let the contract in the usual way without any further authority. The money having been provided with which to pay for the cost of the work, the Comptroller can indorse the usual certificate upon the contract that he has funds with which to pay for the same, and thus comply with the provisions of section 149 of the Charter.

To the Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment, City of New York:

DEAR SIRS—The accidental and dangerous break in the sewer in Sutter avenue, between Euclid avenue and Fountain avenue, makes it necessary for me to request from your Board a special appropriation of \$8,800 for the work of reconstruction. The sewer, which is a 72-inch brick sewer, has been broken in such a manner that 40 feet of the side of it has been blown out and the arch of the sewer itself, extending for a length of some 300 feet, has been cracked. The sewage is now flowing into the lowlands of the neighborhood, causing an odor which is intensely disagreeable to the residents of the surrounding territory, as well as extremely dangerous to their health. The break occurs, unfortunately, at a point near the City Water Works, and this is an additional cause for haste in the matter of making the necessary repairs. I have no money in the Maintenance Fund of the Sewer Bureau to be applied to this matter, and therefore I am compelled to appeal to the Board for a special appropriation.

The Superintendent of Sewers forwards to me a report made to him on September 19, by Henry R. Asserson, Chief Engineer, who says: "I respectfully report that during a severe storm in the latter part of August the 72-inch brick sewer in

Sutter avenue, between Euclid avenue and Fountain avenue, was disrupted in such a manner that 40 feet of the side of said sewer was blown out, and that the arch of the same, extending a length of some 300 feet, has been cracked. It is necessary that this sewer be immediately repaired. I estimate the cost of said repair at \$8,800. The disruption of this sewer was, no doubt, due to its insufficient covering, said sewer having been built in low ground and covered with an embankment."

FOR CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

All such appropriations being made subject to the following conditions:

1. The accounts of all charitable institutions receiving public moneys shall be so kept as to show receipts and disbursements in such form as shall be satisfactory to the Comptroller, showing the addresses of the parents, guardians, or nearest relatives of inmates, and other information designed to facilitate inquiry into their financial inability to provide for such inmates.

2. Moneys received from the City Treasury shall be used by such institutions only for recurring expenses of "care, support and maintenance."

3. All institutions receiving public moneys shall be at all reasonable times open to the visitation and inspection of duly authorized representatives of the Department of Public Charities and the Department of Finance.

4. Upon it appearing to the satisfaction of the Comptroller that it would be to the public interests to withhold payments to any charitable institution for which an appropriation has been made, he shall give written notice to such institution of his intention to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to so withhold such payments, and upon the determination of said Board that such payments should terminate, the right of any such institution to receive payment for services rendered thereafter shall thereupon cease.

5. Except where appropriations are made in bulk and not upon a per capita basis, no payment shall be made for inmates of private charitable institutions unless the same shall have been accepted by the proper Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities as a proper charge against the City, and, except in emergency cases, Commissioner of Charities shall not accept as proper charges against the City inmates capable of paying for their own support or for whose care adequate provision can be made in public institutions. The City shall not become liable for any payment to a charitable institution in excess of the appropriation which may have been made to such institution, notwithstanding any per capita rates of payment that may have been fixed for the inmates thereof.

6. All institutions receiving money from the City are required to state specifically the amount so received, as from the City Treasury, in their printed annual reports.

7. "That no money be paid to any private charitable institution which pays any salary to or gives any consideration, financial or of any kind, for services to, or that has any business dealing with, or secures goods or merchandise, directly or indirectly, from any officer or trustee or member of its Board of Managers."

8. The rates of payments to private charitable institutions, unless otherwise specially provided for, are fixed for the various classes of inmates as follows:

For infants under two (2) years of age, and in infants' hospitals also between the ages of two and five, per day	\$0 38
For dependent children, from two (2) to sixteen (16) years of age, per week	2 00
For delinquent children, per annum	110 00
For adult inmates of reformatories, committed by the Courts, per annum	110 00
For inmates in homes for fallen and friendless women, per annum	110 00

*For homeless mothers, nursing infant, per month	12 00
To hospitals for medical treatment, per day	60
To hospitals for surgical treatment, per day	80

That charitable institutions for children now carried in the Budget and not sending their inmates to the Public Schools, and not sharing in the Corporate School Fund, and not receiving Teachers and school supplies from the Board of Education, but giving in their own buildings secular education to the children resident in the institutions, shall be paid a per capita of 35 cents per week for each child receiving such instruction of four years of age and over during ten months in the year. This money to be paid under the authorization of section 230 of the Charter, but under the general conditions relating to institutions receiving Corporate School money, as provided in section 154.

* Institutions shall be paid \$18 for the care of the mother and child during fifteen days of her confinement, and for every day thereafter shall be paid at the rate of 38 cents per day for the support of the child, and also \$12 per month for the maintenance of the mother, if she remain in the institution nursing her own infant after the expiration of the fifteen days.

SIR—The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, at a meeting held September 16, 1904, adopted a resolution authorizing the institution of condemnation proceedings for the acquisition of a strip of land 50 feet in width by 204 feet 4 inches in depth, extending from East Seventy-seventh to East Seventy-eighth street, in the rear of the lands of Public School No. 158.

The original price asked by the owner of the property was \$30,000, and because it was so excessive condemnation proceedings were authorized. The owner has now reduced his price to \$24,000, and, this price being reasonable, I would respectfully recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment rescind so much of the resolution adopted September 16, 1904, which authorized the institution of condemnation proceedings and adopt a resolution which would authorize the Comptroller to acquire the property at private sale, and which, when so adopted, will read as follows:

In addition to the above amount for stenographic and typewriting work there is the sum of \$14.60 included in the bill of Mr. McReynolds for expenses and fees in subpoenaing witnesses for which vouchers are attached, said vouchers having been received as paid by William E. Murphy, who, according to the statement of William P. Burr, Assistant Corporation Counsel, is an employee of the Law Department as a Process Server.

Alderman Reginald S. Doull stated to a representative of this Department that at the time the aldermanic investigation was ordered into the newspaper charges in connection with the New York and Port Chester Railroad matter, he, as Chairman of the Special Committee, conferred with his Honor the Mayor regarding the expenses of the Committee, and he informed the Mayor of the fact that there were no funds available at the disposal of the Board of Aldermen for the purpose, and that the Mayor assured him the money would be provided. Alderman Doull further stated that the Committee then proceeded with the investigation, procuring the services of William E. McReynolds as Stenographer. McGlade, requesting that her name be restored to the eligible list for Telephone Switchboard Operator, and making affidavit to the fact that she had never declined appointment in the office of the Commissioner of Licenses, but on the contrary had been willing to accept such employment.

On motion, the request was granted, and the matter was referred to the President for investigation.

The Secretary presented a report of the Chief Examiner on the application of Chester A. Cruise for the position of Clerk, calling the attention of the Commission to the fact that the handwriting on the application was not similar to the handwriting of the candidate as it appears on the examination papers. A letter was presented from the Chief Examiner, recommending that the name of H. H. THE FOLLOWING REGULATIONS FOR STANDPIPE (FIRE LINE) WORK IN BUILDINGS OF CERTAIN CLASSES, REQUIRED UNDER THE PROVISIONS OF SECTION 762, CHAPTER 378, OF THE LAWS OF 1897, AS AMENDED BY CHAPTER 466 OF THE LAWS OF 1901; AND SECTIONS 102 AND 100 OF THE BUILDING CODE, ARE HEREBY APPROVED AND ESTABLISHED, TO TAKE EFFECT IMMEDIATELY.

REGULATIONS FOR INSTALLATION OF STANDPIPES (FIRE LINES).

STANDPIPES WILL BE REQUIRED IN all buildings exceeding 100 feet in height, erected prior to December 25, 1899, and in all buildings exceeding 85 feet in height erected since same date.

Such buildings as come within above classification, and which do not exceed 150 feet in height in which standpipes (fire lines) now installed are less than three inches in diameter, must be provided with lines four inches in diameter, and in such buildings as exceed 150 feet in height the fire line must be six inches in diameter, unless the lines already installed are considered satisfactory and approved by the Fire Department.

These standpipes must be of wrought iron or steel of sufficient strength to withstand the necessary pressure (in no case less than 300 pounds to the square inch) to force adequate streams of water to any of the floors of the building, or to the roof, and must extend from cellar to roof and be connected with outside two-way three-inch standard Fire Department connections, with clapper valves and proper caps, placed on street front of buildings, above curb level, in a position accessible for use of Fire Department and arranged so that the clapper valves will hang properly. These standpipes must be provided with proper valves (gate valves preferred) and 2½-inch outlets of the regular Fire Department pattern and thread on each floor level, with sufficient standard 2½-inch hose and nozzles attached thereto to properly cover entire floor area, arranged on proper and approved racks or reels, with approved open or controlling nozzles.

Proper check valves shall be placed in top and bottom of such lines as are required to use tank or pump supply, or both. The hose outlets and hose must be located within stairway inclosures, except where impracticable to do so for reasons satisfactory to the department.

Where more than one standpipe is installed, cross connections, preferably in basement, of same size as main risers, with proper gate and check valves, must be provided.

In all buildings over 150 feet in height and in such buildings as come within these regulations

as to height and are occupied for living purposes, such as hotels, hospitals, asylums, etc., also in theatres, the standpipe line must have approved tank or pump supply, or both.

Tanks—Bottom of gravity tanks must be elevated at least 20 feet above highest hose outlet, provided with separate feed supply, and such tanks shall be of not less than 3,500 gallons capacity. If used for domestic purposes, feed lines must be properly arranged to insure constant supply.

Pressure tank supply system or direct supply from street mains will be permitted in some cases if circumstances warrant and pressures are adequate.

All wrought iron and steel pipes must be equal in quality to standard.

All joints must be screwed joints, made up with red lead, and be thoroughly water tight.

All standpipes must rest on brick pier foundations or on heavy iron hangers suspended from floor beams at the discretion of officer in charge of bureau.

Horizontal supply lines must be supported by heavy iron hangers from floor beams at intervals of not more than ten feet, and vertical main lines, properly stayed, at each floor level; all to be securely braced to withstand vibration.

The arrangement of lines must be straight and as direct as possible. Offsets will be permitted only when unavoidable and bends must be of a radius not less than five diameters of pipe.

All pipes and connections must be readily accessible for inspection and repairing.

Drawings, showing location, sizes and connections, with duplicate descriptions, must be furnished to the Bureau of Violations and Auxiliary Fire Appliances for all fire line, or standpipe work.

These drawings must be to scale, and shall consist of such floor plans and sections as may be necessary to show clearly all such work to be done, and must show all partitions, stairway inclosures and elevator shafts.

Prints will be accepted.

The said fire line, or standpipe work, shall not be commenced, or proceeded with, until said drawings and descriptions, in detail, shall have been filed and approved by the officer in charge of the Bureau. No modifications of the approved drawings and descriptions will be permitted unless amended drawings and duplicate descriptions covering the proposed change or changes are filed, and approved by the officer in charge of the Bureau.

Written notice must be given the officer in charge of said Bureau by the contractor when any new work is begun, or when any change or alteration is proposed, and from time to time when any work is ready for inspection.

When conditions exist making it impracticable to follow these regulations, the same may be modified to meet such existing conditions only by the Fire Commissioner on recommendation of the officer in charge of the Bureau.

Any doubt as to the meaning of these regulations, or any obscurity as to the wording of them, will be explained by the officer in charge of the Bureau, on application in writing, and all directions and explanations requisite, proper or necessary to complete or make more definite any of the provisions of said regulations and give them the effect will be given by the officer in charge of the Bureau and his decision, unless modified, changed or disapproved by the Fire Commissioner, in writing, will be considered final in any dispute that may arise concerning the meaning of any clause of these regulations, or the detail of any plan.

EXTRACTS FROM THE LAW.

Chapter 583, Laws of 1888, title 7, section 10, as amended by chapter 888, Laws of 1895, and section 937, chapter 378, Laws of 1897, and section 937, chapter 406, Laws of 1901.

On all * * * assessments which shall be paid to the Collector of Assessments and Arrears, before the expiration of thirty days from the time the same shall become due and payable, an allowance shall be made to the person or persons making such payments at the rate of seven and three-tenths per centum per annum for the unpaid portion thereof. Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him herein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits, thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.
