Doctor William Mabon, Superintendent of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, reported as follows:

Bellevue Hospital, Repairs, etc.—A metal ceiling has been put up in the new dining room.

The repairs to the range and oven in the main kitchen have been completed, and the new tubs have been set up and properly connected in the vegetable room of the main kitchen.

All of the boxes ordered from the Hawley Box Company for the Dormitory Building have now been delivered, and the gates and locks on the metal lockers have been completed.

The new cast iron front for the garbage destructor has been placed on it, but is not entirely satisfactory. It does not in any way, however, affect the working of the apparatus.

The defects in the construction of the portable tent have been corrected.

Harlem Hospital—The wishes of the Department of Health in regard to the plumbing and ventilation of Harlem Hospital have been carried out.

Fordham Hospital—The metal ceilings in the wards and pantry have been finished and painted.

There has been some delay in obtaining the tank and hot water heater, but it is expected that the work for supplying hot water to the Administration Building will soon be completed.

Emergency Hospital—The Supervising Engineer reported that water was coming through the foundation wall on the east side of the building, and that he would take up the matter at once and try to remedy it.

Communications.

Neff, Secretary of the Medical Board of Harlem Hospital, inclosing minutes of the meeting of March 29, and application and credentials of Doctor Henry Alexander Rogers, of No. 1443 Lexington avenue, recommended as Director of the Clinical Laboratory.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.
