BELLEVUE AND ALLIED HOSPITALS.

QUARTERLY REPORT FOR THE THREE MONTHS ENDING DECEMBER 31, 1913.

New York, January 1, 1914.

Hon. JOHN PURROY MITCHEL, Mayor:

Sir—In behalf of the Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, I have the honor to make the following report for the three months ending December 31, 1913:

The Department as a Whole.

A few matters of great general interest affecting the Department as a whole have come up for consideration during the past three months.

The Trustees had prepared to take up with the Federal authorities in Washington the question of the maintenance of the indigent aliens that come to the hospitals of the Department. It was the opinion of the Commissioners of Accounts that the maintenance of these aliens was entirely chargeable upon the Federal authorities, but investigation showed that the Government could be charged only for those held pending deportation after the service of a warrant, and even then only on deportation. The Trustees have been receiving payment for this comparatively small number from the Federal Government. Since the investigation the Trustees have been notified by a circular letter from the Department of Labor that the Government will no longer pay for the care of aliens who become public charges from causes existing prior to landing.

The Trustees have included an estimate in their 1914 Budget for funds with which to purchase and install mattresses in all the hospitals of the Department. The new pavilions in Bellevue are now equipped with mattresses. It has been the policy of the Trustees to supply them gradually, to supersede the old system of springs covered with blankets.

The Trustees have protested energetically against a cut of \$68,000 in the departmental estimate for food supplies; there are already complaints among the employees of Bellevue about the quality of the food furnished them, and it would be impossible to supply good food with the new appropriation without a radical change of dietary. Whether or not other foods can be found to take the place of those hitherto relied upon is a question which time alone can decide.

A special issue of revenue bonds in the amount of \$45,400 was authorized by the Board of Aldermen on October 28 to replenish food, fuel and medical supply accounts for the year 1913. This represented a reduction of \$23,263.50 from the amount requested to make up the deficit. Other Departments of the City Government have been asked to consent to the transfer of any available balance in their accounts. If such cannot be had, it will be necessary to ask for additional revenue bonds.

Plans have been prepared by Messrs. McKim, Mead & White for a new hospital at Seaside Park, Rockaway, which is being erected for the City by the Association for Improving the Condition of the Poor. To facilitate the construction of the hospital building, it will be necessary to erect a temporary dock at Rockaway Point, and this the Department of Docks and Ferries has consented to, provided the necessary funds shall be found in the Budget of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals. A plan submitted by the Chief Engineer of the Department of Docks and Ferries estimates the cost of such a pier to be \$7,000.

In view of the increased cost of living, the Trustees have decided to allow the ambulance drivers rubber coats, caps, cap covers and boots required in the performance of their duties. This was formerly the custom of the Department, but was abandoned several years ago.

The Trustees have instructed the General Medical Superintendent to render them a monthly report on the attendance of physicians at the several Out Patient Departments under their charge, such report to include the time of the arrival and departure of each physician.

The Medical Board of each Hospital in the Department has been instructed to make provision for the establishment of a pre-natal clinic in each of the several Out Patient Departments. The necessary steps and equipment for this class will be arranged for, as it is expected to add very materially to the success of the obstetrical service of the Hospitals.

It has been decided to purchase a new electric ambulance from the General Motor Truck Company at a cost of \$2,918.

Bellevue Hospital.

PAVILIONS L AND M.

The Trustees were notified on December 5 that Pavilions L and M were completed and ready to be turned over to the City. Inspection of the new buildings was made on December 11. Arrangements were made for the appointment of a Watchman to care for the building and for the installation of permanent electric current. The building was then formally accepted by the Trustees on behalf of the City.

In response to a request of Messrs. John T. Brady & Co., the contractors, for permission to turn steam from the boiler house mains into the lines in the new pavilions, to provide heating until the City should take charge, the Trustees replied that they would sell steam to the contractors at the rate of 36 cents per 1,000 pounds, provided the entire water of condensation should be returned to the boiler house and that the contractors should install a 2-inch steam meter and make monthly payments.

Negotiations with the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, with a view to obtaining the early approval of plans for the lighting fixtures in these pavilions, were taken up late in October. Answer was received on December 9, stating that the preliminary type sheets for the fixtures would be approved in about a week or ten days.

An estimate from Messrs. John T. Brady & Co., amounting to \$18,288, for enclosing two of the open bays on the north and south balconies of the new buildings, was declined by the Trustees on account of the expense.

PAVILIONS I AND K.

The architects report as follows upon the progress of construction of Pavilions I and K:

All the exterior mason work, including the tile roof on these pavilions, as well as the loggias connecting them with Pavilions L and M, and the boiler house are finished. The interior partitions throughout the building are practically all erected, and the concrete fill for the tile and composition flooring is finished throughout the building.

The balconies, large as well as small, are completed, with the exception of the wire screens. All the remaining structural steel and ornamental iron work, including the stairs around the elevators and fire escapes have been erected; and about three-quarters of the iron corner guards are installed.

Over eighty per cent. of the plastering work is done throughout the building, and in only a few places does this work remain to be finished.

All the granite work is installed with the exception of the entrance steps on the east elevation and the copings on the south side of Pavilion I, and the west side of the circular operating amphitheatre of that building. About half the marble work is finished and the tile wainscoting is completed in all floors in the first and second sections from the first to the sixth floor, as well as a number of the clinical laboratories and the preparation and sterilizing rooms. All the tile flooring in the main corridors of sections one and two, as well as the flooring of the loggias, are laid. The cohesive tile arches of ceilings of the loggias are completed with the exception of the one on the sixth floor between Pavilions K and L and M.

About three-quarters of the plumbing fixtures have been delivered and are being put in place. The drainage lines along the floors are installed and about seventy-five per cent. of the total amount of the plumbing work is finished.

The steam mains and returns and high pressure exhaust lines are completed throughout the building. All the radiators and heating coils are erected and connected and are furnishing temporary heat in the building.

The conduit work for the electrical service, the mains and circuits are completed and all the outlet boxes for the lighting of the signals are completed throughout the building.

The Trustees considered the replacing of the coal burning equipment in the kitchens of Pavilions I and K with an outfit for gas cooking. In view, however, of the great expense involved, it was decided to make no change at present.

Estimates have been received from the John H. Parker Company for erecting two flights of stairs in the amphitheatre of the new pavilions. Before taking action upon the estimates, the opinion of a number of medical men has been sought regarding the desirability of providing these stairways.

The Trustees are furnishing steam to the contractors for this building on the same terms as those accorded the contractors for Pavilions L and M.

OTHER BUILDING MATTERS.

The Trustees were notified late in October that the National Surety Company, surety for Daniel J. Ryan, contractor for the roof wards on Pavilions A and B, had undertaken the completion of Ryan's contract. They further asked an extension of time, amounting to 120 working days from October 20th. Action upon their request was deferred pending the receipt of advice from the Corporation Counsel.

An estimate of \$987 for extending the dumbwaiter to the roof of Pavilions A and B was accepted by the Trustees upon the recommendation of the Building Committee and the architects.

Regarding the contract of J. M. Knopp, for the construction of additional balconies on Pavilions A and B, the Building Committee reports that their investigation into the cause of the delay in the completion of the contract convinced them that acts of omission on the part of the City were accountable for 69 days, and that the excess overtime, for which liquidated damages should be charged, amounted to 12 days. Action based upon this report was accordingly taken.

The estimates the Trustees obtained for the delivery of top soil, to be used in the sodding of the courtyards of Pavilions A and B, were so high that it was decided to take no action in the matter for the present.

THE MEDICAL SERVICE.

The question of designating certain wards for the exclusive use of patients suffering from typhoid fever was discussed with a Committee from the Medical Board.

The difficulties in the way of carrying out the proposed purpose were so numerous, and the advantages from a medical standpoint so problematical, that the plan was finally abandoned. Permission was granted to Dr. Bailey to install a calorimeter in Ward B6. The only expense to the hospital involved was the installation of water in the room in which the apparatus is used, all expense for equipment and nursing being met by private funds.

Certain statements affecting the medical, and more particularly the surgical, service at Bellevue Hospital, were made in the report of a committee representing the Board of Estimate, headed by Mr. Henry C. Wright. The Medical Board requested a conference with Mr. Wright upon these matters and were able to show that many of the statements included in his report were erroneous.

THE NEW MORGUE.

The Trustees regret to report the continued disregard of the facilities provided by the City in the new morgue, occupying the lower floors of the Pathological Building. They had hoped that long before the present time the unsightly edifice of the present morgue, situated directly in front of the new medical wards at Bellevue Hospital, would have been removed. They have ascertained that no provision has been made in the Budget of the Department of Public Charities for 1914 to equip and man the new morgue. Until steps in this direction are taken, the present unfortunate situation, so far as the public is concerned, will be likely to continue.

THE SCHOOL FOR MIDWIVES.

Action has been taken by the Board of Health, compelling all applicants for permission to practice midwifery to present a diploma from a school registered by the Department of Health. Information regarding the character, course of instruction and requirements of the Bellevue School was supplied the Department of Health. The school is a great success in the work of instructing candidates for the Board of Health certificate.

NURSING SERVICE.

With the increasing number of probationers resident in the Nurses' home at Bellevue, that building is becoming crowded to its capacity. It will be necessary very shortly to secure an appropriation for extending the building. In the meanwhile, it has been resolved to request the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to obtain the lease of a floor in Osborn Hall, the adjoining building.

MISCELLANEOUS.

It has been decided to establish a new position in the information office at Bellevue, the appointee to be a Hospital Clerk at a salary of \$60 per month. The qualities required in this position include tact and sympathy, as well as experience and responsibility, this being the point at which the hospital first comes in contact with the prospective patient and his friends.

A slight restriction in the visiting hours has been adopted, the time having been limited to the hours from 2 to 4 p. m. on three afternoons of the week instead of 1 to 4, as previously allowed.

The two new electric ambulances ordered some time ago from the Lansden Company were finally delivered on November 24th.

The Trustees have continued their negotiations with the Commissioner of Public Works for the improvement of the sewerage facilities at 29th st. and 1st ave. These negotiations are in charge of the Building Committee of the Board.

A report dated December 10th has been received from Mr. H. F. J. Porter, the expert employed by the Trustees to report upon the means of providing resistance against the fire hazard in the old building at Bellevue. This has been referred to the Building Committee for their consideration.

MEDICAL REORGANIZATION.

Dr. Abraham Flexner, the well-known educator and expert on the management of medical institutions, has been invited by the Trustees to undertake the study of the medical administration at Bellevue Hospital, with a view to submitting suggestions and plans for its reorganization. Before accepting the appointment, Dr. Flexner stipulated that his service should be rendered without compensation and in co-operation with the Hospital Committee of the Board of Estimate. This latter was at once promised by President McAneny, the Chairman of that Committee. In accordance with the recommendations of the Board of Estimate Committee, funds were included in the departmental Budget of 1914 for a salaried visiting Physician and Surgeon on each division at Bellevue Hospital, together with the creation of the position of a salaried resident on each division. According to the terms of the recommendation, one-half of the salaries of the three collegiate divisions was to be paid by the medical colleges. The Trustees have taken steps to learn the attitude of the responsible officers of the three medical colleges concerned toward this proposal, but it seems probable that they will decide to await the report of Dr. Flexner upon the whole situation before endeavoring to put into effect any portion of the proposed plan of reorganization.

MEDICAL APPOINTMENTS.

During the quarter the following medical appointments and changes were made in Bellevue Hospital: October 6th, 1913: Dr. Edward J. May, appointed Assistant Physician to Out Patients on the tuberculosis service of the First Division, appointment to date from September 1st; Dr. Robert Sloan, Interne, Third Division, resignation accepted as of September 18th. October 28th, 1913: Dr. Charles L. Dana resigned as Visiting Physician to the Second Division and was appointed Consulting Physician to Bellevue Hospital; Dr. Charles E. Gaupin, appointed Interne on Third Division, to serve from October 1st, 1913, to December 31st, 1914, in place of Dr. Sloan, resigned. November 11th, 1913: Dr. Edward Hand, Physician to Out Patients, children's service, Second Division, resigned. November 25th, 1913: Dr. Frank Sherman Meara, promoted to Visiting Physician, Second Division; Dr. J. S. Ferguson appointed Physician to Out Patients, children's service, Second Division. December 9th, 1913: Dr. Dudley S. Conley appointed Assistant Surgeon to Out Patients, First Division; Dr. Edward M. Cole, Jr., Assistant Surgeon to Out Patients, Fourth Division, resignation accepted, to take effect December 31st, 1913. December 16th, 1913: Dr. Francisco R. deJesus, appointed Interne on obstetrical service for six months, beginning January 1st, 1914; Dr. Catherine R. Kelley appointed Assistant Physician to Out Patients, tuberculosis service, First Division; Dr. Joel M. Chasis appointed Assistant Genito-urinary Surgeon to Out Patients, Fourth Division; Dr. Mercer Blanchard, Interne, Second Division, resignation accepted as of November 30th; Dr. John B. Voor appointed Interne on Second Division to serve from December 1st, 1913, to December 31st, 1914. December 30th, 1913: Dr. James D. Benjamin, Interne, Third Division, resignation accepted as of December 12th; Dr. Robert C. Williams and Dr. E. A. Sherrill appointed Internes on the Third Division for six months, beginning January 1st, 1914; Dr. Anthony C. Freeman, Assistant Physician to Out Patients, tuberculosis service, Fourth Division, resignation accepted as of December 31st.

Dental Service—October 6th, 1913: Dr. August E. Kraft appointed Dental Interne for one year, beginning October 1st, 1913.

Gouverneur Hospital.

A great deal of consideration has been given by the Trustees during the past quarter to the plans for the new Out Patient Department building in connection with Gouverneur Hospital. At first it was planned to combine with the dispensary a nurses' home, and possible quarters for employees, but it has been deemed wiser, especially in view of the fact that only \$200,000 is available for the purpose, to confine the building to the uses of a dispensary, but to make the walls of sufficient thickness to provide, should it be found necessary, three additional floors to be used later in providing accommodation for nurses. At first it was proposed to arrange for a day camp for tuberculous patients on the roof of the new building, and to have a separate staircase leading to it. This plan was later abandoned. The original plans, prepared by Messrs. McKim, Mead & White, with the co-operation of Dr. Goldwater, the Department's expert in hospital construction, called for an expenditure considerably in excess of the appropriation, and it was suggested by the architects that permission be obtained from the Board of Estimate to complete the exterior construction with the present appropriation and then to apply for more funds before the contracts for plumbing and heating should be let. The architects also intimated that they cannot prepare new plans for the smaller building without reimbursement. It was finally decided to reduce the size of the building about 20 per cent., adhering to all the principal features of the architect's plans, but to provide for its construction within the cost of the appropriation for the purpose. The architects were instructed to plan for the installation of exhaust ventilation of ample capacity for the needs of the building.

In the meantime, the crowded conditions continue in the dispensary. The additional salaried positions asked for by the Trustees in their Budget for the coming year were denied by the Board of Estimate. The Trustees have had to warn the physicians and surgeons attending this dispensary of the necessity of prompt attendance at their

several classes. They are in a position to insist upon this where salaries are paid, but in the numerous positions which are still unsalaried, it is difficult, in view of the scarcity of competent men willing to undertake this work, to exact a strict standard of attendance.

The installation of an independent X-Ray laboratory and also a Pathological laboratory, in charge of a resident Pathologist, have been requested by the Medical Board of the Hospital.

MEDICAL APPOINTMENTS.

October 6, 1913: Appointment of Dr. Hubbard T. Buckner as Interne for two years, beginning January 1, 1914, cancelled; Dr. W. D. McLelland, appointed Interne for two years, beginning January 1, 1914. October 28, 1913: Dr. John J. Davis, appointed Assistant Physician to Out Patients (gynaecology). November 11, 1913: Dr. Walter H. Mytinger, Interne, resignation accepted as of October 11; Dr. Bernard Frankel, Assistant Physician to Out Patients, dropped for non-attendance; Dr. William H. W. Knipe promoted to Visiting Obstetrician. November 25, 1913: Dr. Samuel S. Arluck, appointed Assistant Surgeon to Out Patients; Dr. Samuel Blumenfeld, appointed Assistant Physician to Out Patients (children); Dr. James M. Kent, appointed Assistant Physician to Out Patients (tuberculosis). December 16, 1913: Dr. W. D. McLelland and Dr. Clarence S. Gardner, Internes, resignations accepted as of November 7 and 13, respectively. December 30, 1913: Dr. Frederick W. Bancraft and Dr. Samuel J. Scadron, appointed first and second Assistant Visiting Obstetricians; Dr. James M. Kent, Assistant Physician to Out Patients, resigned.

Harlem Hospital.

Progress of work on the new wing at Harlem Hospital is reported on by the architects as follows:

Excavation was begun on October 6th and completed by the 15th of November. In the meantime, all the concrete walls and piers were started and are now finished to the ground level.

The contractor erected a derrick and is ready for the steel construction.

The preliminary plans and specifications of Mr. J. H. Freedlander, architect, for the alterations to the power house and ambulance station at Harlem Hospital, were approved by the Board of Trustees at their meeting on December 9th. The complete set of final working drawings and specifications were submitted later, and, after acceptance by the Trustees, transmitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for their approval.

The new Nurses' residence, on the grounds of Harlem Hospital, received its final inspection at the hands of the Board of Trustees early in December. The Trustees voted to accept the building on behalf of the City, but withhold a part of the final payment pending the completion of the electrical connection between it and the power house. A watchman was then appointed to take the place of the contractor's representative in charge of the building.

Request had previously been made of the Board of Estimate for permission to use the Corporate Stock Appropriation for equipment and furnishing, as well as construction of this building. Permission to do so was accorded on November 25th, and it is expected that the building will shortly be ready for occupancy.

Drawings and specifications from the architect, R. F. Almirall, for the lighting fixtures of this building were received in a letter dated November 26th, the estimated cost of such fixtures being \$8,000. The Trustees immediately voted to reject these plans, owing to the very high cost, and to require of the architect submission of designs calling for a lower expenditure. In the meanwhile, an investigation into the cost of providing lighting fixtures for the several buildings recently erected by the Department was ordered and undertaken.

The Trustees are considering the continuation of the high fence now enclosing the hospital in a straight line in front of the Nurses' residence, with a provision for grass plots between the wall of the building and this fence. Estimates upon the cost of effecting this change are being prepared.

A proposal to furnish a wooden slat roof with canopy and iron railing on the present Nurses' residence at a cost estimated at \$12,437, was declined on the advice of the Building Committee on account of the expense.

The proposal to erect a separate Out Patient Department building in connection with Harlem Hospital has been abandoned for the present, owing to the improbability of the City being able to make financial provision at the present time for such purpose.

An advertisement for bids for the rewiring of Harlem Hospital has been authorized, in order that this work may be taken up in connection with the extension of the present hospital. The Trustees' request for a special appropriation for this purpose was denied, but it is hoped to be able to take funds for it from the annual appropriation. The architects have been advised to arrange for the installation of gas ranges for cooking purposes on the top floor of the hospital. It is anticipated that no further delay will occur in the plans for the hospital extension and alterations.

The Trustees are much indebted to Mr. Charles E. Knox for his report on the cost of producing electric current at Harlem Hospital. Mr. Knox was especially engaged by the Trustees to report upon this subject. His findings justified completely the Trustees in their policy of providing a separate electric plant here and at the new Bellevue Hospital in preference to the plan of relying upon the Edison Company for supply of this current. A comparison of the relative cost of the two methods at Harlem Hospital shows the following:

"If current were purchased from the Edison Company instead of generating current by means of your own plant, their wholesale rate would apply in the case of the Harlem Hospital. Their wholesale rate is as follows: First, 100,000 K. W. H. yearly consumption at 5 cents; next 100,000 K. W. H. yearly consumption at 4 cents; over 200,000 K. W. H. yearly consumption at 3 cents. Assuming the annual current consumption is \$240,000 kilowatt hours, the annual cost of current if purchased from the Edison Company would be: First, 100,000 K. W. H. at 5 cents, \$5,000; second 100,000 K. W. H. at 4 cents, \$4,000; balance, 40,000 K. W. H. at 3 cents, \$1,200. Total annual cost of current if purchased from Edison Company, \$10,200.

Summary.

"The total cost of producing electricity, including fixed charges (interest and depreciation) on the investment, and the various operating charges, as given hereinabove, are as follows:

"The total annual cost, as stated hereinabove, for purchasing current from the Edison Company would be \$10,200. The estimated cost of generating electricity with your own plant is \$8,736.02, or an annual saving of \$1,463.98."

The Trustees have decided to approve of the regular appointment of twelve members of the house staff for a two-year service instead of ten Internes for twenty months' service, as at present arranged.

Arrangements have been made for the opening, in the evening, of a genito-urinary clinic in the Out Patient Department of this Hospital. This will be conducted largely as an experiment to learn whether there is need for a clinic of this description at a time of day when it should prove more accessible to those whose occupations debar them from attending a class during the day time hours.

Permission to erect a bronze tablet in the Hospital in memory of Dr. Richard Van Santvoord was asked of the Trustees by the Medical Board. The Trustees were most happy to grant the permission required, but were obliged to state that the City had no funds available for erecting such a memorial of its own initiative.

Fordham Hospital.

In view of the very serious overcrowding of the Nurses' residence at Fordham Hospital, the Trustees lately intended to procure a portable house for the accom-

modation of some of the Nurses, but a house has been found immediately adjoining the grounds of the hospital, and it has been decided to rent this for a period of three years at an annual rental of \$660. This will afford immediate relief to a situation which was becoming intolerable.

The estimates of the contractors for furnishing a plate-warmer and gas-toaster instead of a combination steam table on the new roof ward was accepted after careful inquiry into the cost of the various items. The ward has now been opened for patients. A proposal to enclose it with screens at a cost of approximately \$2,000, was rejected.

Negotiations have been entered into with the Department of Public Charities, the Board of Coroners and the Police Department in an effort to arrive at a definite understanding with regard to the care and transfer of bodies of unknown and unclaimed persons found at the Fordham Hospital Morgue.

The practice of admitting substitutes to the list of successful candidates for appointment on the Interne Staff without examination has been discontinued by order of the Board of Trustees. Hereafter the substitutes must be examined with the rest of the candidates.

Defective histories and bedside charts in the wards of this hospital have been the subject of criticism by the Trustees, and directions have been issued that ways must be found by the Medical Board to secure accurate and complete records.

The request of the Medical Board for the appointment of two additional Internes

on the house staff was denied, as in the opinion of the Trustees the number now on the house staff is large enough to care properly for the service.

The position of Social Service Nurse to attend the children's clinic at this hospital has been established by the Board of Estimate at an annual salary of \$900.

Considerable correspondence has been had with the Corporation Counsel on the subject of the claim of the L. J. Wadsworth Construction Company that the Trustees were in error in charging liquidated damages against the contract of this firm. Nothing has been done by the Trustees in the absence of clear instructions from Corporation Counsel.

Plans for the installation of a Pathological Department in the proposed northerly extension of Fordham Hospital have been placed on file pending the receipt of funds for such an enlargement of the hospital building.

Work Done by the Department During the Quarter.

NEW CONSTRUCTION WORK BY DEPARTMENT FORCE.

The work of extending the North River piers out to the recently modified pier-head line has been in progress at Pier No. 25, N. R., foot of North Moore st.; Pier No. 28, N. R., foot of Lighthouse st.; Pier No. 36, N. R., foot of Charlton st.; Pier No. 38, N. R., foot of King st., and preparations are being made for the work of extending Pier No. 33, N. R., foot of Canal st.

The work of constructing the new W. 46th st. pier is in progress, dredging having been done in the vicinity and the contract for a portion of the work has been awarded.

On the East River, work has been in progress in connection with the bulkhead wall at Old slip section, Corlears section, E. 16th st. section, Yorkville section, E. 90th st. section and E. 123rd st. section.

Pier at the foot of W. 55th st., North River, is being rebuilt, and a new pier, to be known as Pier New No. 45, East River, has also been constructed.

In the Borough of Brooklyn a temporary platform structure has been erected at the Brooklyn tower of the Manhattan Bridge. The approach to 33rd st. pier has been widened, and work has been done to widen the approach to 39th st. ferry. The old ferry structure at Main st., Brooklyn, has been removed.

In order to advance the efficiency of the force working at Pier "A," alterations and changes have been made in the main offices of the Department.

NEW CONSTRUCTION WORK BY CONTRACT.

On the North River the construction of the new W. 46th st. pier has been begun under Contract 1401, Class 2, the dredging having been done under Contract 1383.

The ferry terminal structures at 39th st., Brooklyn, are in course of erection under Contract 1294, and steel awning along the rear of the ferry building, over the trolley platforms, at St. George, S. I., is being erected under Contract 1393.

GENERAL REPAIRS BY DEPARTMENTAL LABOR.

General repairs by departmental labor have been made to 43 structures.

Minor repairs have been made during the quarter to all of the recreation buildings located at Barrow st., N. R.; W. 50th st., N. R.; W. 129th st., N. R.; E. 3rd st., E. R.; E. 24th st., E. R.; E. 122nd st., E. R.

The temporary pavement has been repaired on both rivers, where necessary.

GENERAL REPAIRS UNDER CONTRACT.

The work of repairing the asphalt pavement on the marginal street along the North River has been in progress under Contract 1411.

At Pier No. 51, between Rivington and Stanton sts., East River, repairs have been made under Contract 1391.

SUPERVISION OF PERMIT WORK.

Work done by private parties, lessees and others during the quarter under permit from the Commissioner of Docks has been supervised under: 79 permit orders in the Borough of Manhattan, 44 permit orders in the Borough of The Bronx, 123 permit orders in the Borough of Brooklyn, 22 permit orders in the Borough of Queens, 62 permit orders in the Borough of Richmond; total, 336, in all Boroughs.

DEPARTMENT YARDS.

Work is in progress whereby the Department yards are being rearranged, so that the pier at W. 57th st., North River, may be entirely eliminated from yard purposes, repaired and made available for leasing as a steamship pier.

NEW WHARFAGE ROOM AND PIER AREA.

The wharfage room made by the City and by private parties during the quarter, involving the destruction of old wharfage room as well, is as follows: Wharfage room destroyed by work done by the City, 768 linear feet; new wharfage room made by the City, 754 linear feet; net wharfage room destroyed by work done by the City, 14 linear feet; wharfage room made by private parties, 1,559 linear feet; wharfage room destroyed by private parties, 427 linear feet.

The superficial area of the City's piers has been increased during the quarter by work done by lessees, 18,515 square feet, and by work done by the Department force, 22,658 square feet; total increase of area, 41,175 square feet.

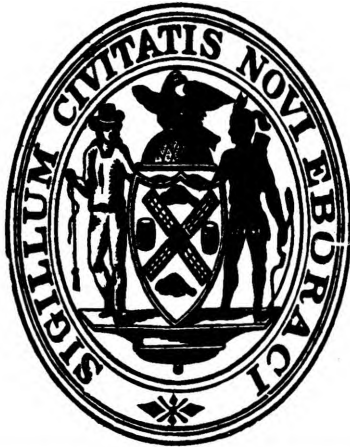

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary therefor, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night to the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against any or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beamed, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the Contractor.

The Comptroller of The City of New York serves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids; and it is further

Resolved, That, while the said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

PROPOSALS FOR BIDS AND ESTIMATES FOR THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS, GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 421 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money shall not be in closed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department in which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there
