AN ORDINANCE regulating the Installation and Maintenance in Buildings of Plumbing, Water Supply, Gas and other Systems of Piping.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Rules: The plumbing and drainage systems, water supply pipes, gas piping, steam or hot water heating or power systems, refrigerating systems and other systems of pipes or apparatus for holding or conveying gases, vapors or fluids hereafter installed and maintained in or upon any building in the City of New York shall conform to such rules as may be provided for by law or may be found necessary for the protection of life, health or property, and adopted by the superintendent of buildings; and it shall be unlawful to use or permit the use of any such systems, piping or apparatus installed or maintained in violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance or the rules adopted hereunder.

Said rules, hereafter adopted, and any changes thereof, shall be published in the City Record on eight successive Mondays before they shall become operative.

Nothing herein contained or in the rules adopted hereunder shall require the alteration or reconstruction of any existing work that was lawfully installed, nor prevent repairs or the addition of new fixtures to existing work in conformity with the practice followed in the original installation, provided, however, that when such repairs involve the removal or alteration of more than one-half of the existing work affected by the repairs the rules in force at the time of such repairs shall apply.

Section 2. Shut-off Valves: Every building hereafter erected and also every existing building other than residence buildings occupied exclusively by one or two families and having not more than fifteen sleeping rooms, which may be supplied from some outside source with gas, vapor or fluid shall have a conveniently accessible valve or other suitable device fixed to the supply pipes leading into the building at a place outside of the building, so arranged as to allow the supply to be shut off. Such valve or other device shall be so marked as to indicate the contents and purposes of the supply pipe to which it is attached.

Section 3. Tests of Plumbing: It shall be unlawful to use or permit the use of any new system of plumbing and drainage hereafter installed in any building before the same has been tested under the supervision of the Bureau of Buildings and in accordance with its rules, to insure the tightness of the system, and until a proper and adequate water supply has been provided.

The superintendent of buildings shall, within a reasonable time after being requested to do so, cause to be inspected and tested any system of plumbing and drainage that is ready for such inspection and test, and if the work is found satisfactory and the test requirements are complied with shall issue a certificate to that effect. Nothing herein contained shall prevent the inspection and test of part of a system or the issuance of a partial certificate, nor prevent the use of such part of a larger system provided that such part constitutes by itself a complete system properly tested and supplied with water.

Section 4. Tests of Gas Piping: It shall be unlawful to use or permit the use of any new system or an extension of an old system of gas piping in any building before the same has been inspected and tested under the supervision of the Bureau of Buildings and in accordance with its rules, to insure the tightness of the system. The superintendent of buildings shall, within a reasonable time after being requested to do so, cause to be inspected and tested any system of gas piping that is ready for such inspection and test, and if the work is found satisfactory and the test requirements are complied with, shall issue a certificate to that effect. Nothing herein contained shall prevent the use of existing systems of gas piping without further inspection or test unless said superintendent of buildings has reason to believe that defects exist which make the system dangerous to life or property.

Section 5. Registration of Plumbers: Once in each year every employing or master plumber carrying on his trade, business or calling in the City of New York shall register his name and address at the office of the Bureau of Buildings in the Borough of the said City in which he performs work, under such rules as the said Bureau may prescribe.

No person, corporation or copartnership shall engage in or carry on the trade, business or calling of employing or master plumber in the City of New York unless the name and address of such person and the president, secretary or treasurer of such corporation and each and every member of such copartnership shall have been registered as above provided.

Section 6. Enforcement; Penalties: This ordinance shall be deemed a part of the Building Code, and each superintendent of buildings shall, in his own borough, enforce its provisions and the rules adopted thereunder. Any and every violation of the provisions of this ordinance or of the rules adopted thereunder shall subject the owner, lessee or agent of the building or premises where such violation has been committed or shall exist, and the architect, builder, contractor, or any other person who has assisted in the commission of such violation, to the same legal procedure and the same penalties as are prescribed for violations of the Building Code; and such violation shall be subject to the same legal remedies and prosecuted in the manner prescribed in said Building Code.

Section 7. Existing Provisions Repealed: Section 141 and that portion of Section 89 of the Building Code of the City of New York reading:

"Every building other than a dwelling house hereafter erected, and all factories, hotels, churches, theatres, school-houses and other buildings of a public character now erected in which gas or steam is used for lighting or heating shall have the supply pipes leading from the street mains provided each with a stop-cock placed in the sidewalk at or near the curb, and so arranged as to allow of shutting off at that point,"

—and all rules relating to plumbing or parts thereof in conflict with or so far as inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section 8. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

The following extracts from the sanitary law of Brazil are here quoted in order to show that in the matter of the regulation of the manufacture and sale of secret nostrums, the Government of Brazil is far more careful than is the Government of the United States or any local sanitary authority in this country.

The regulations quoted below are applicable not only to Brazilian products, but to imported remedies. They apply, therefore, to proprietary medicines manufactured in the United States. It would be interesting to ascertain how many of the widely advertised preparations which are used in this country are able to satisfy the Brazilian authorities concerning their legitimacy. An effort to obtain this information is now being made, and we hope to be able to publish the facts later.

Extracts from the Sanitary Regulations of Brazil.

"The advertisement and sale of secret remedies, as well as the sale of drugs and medical preparations in establishments which are not duly licensed or upon the streets or sidewalks, are expressly prohibited. Those preparations are considered secret remedies which are laboratory preparations made according to a

formula not included in pharmacopoeias of general acceptance and those not licensed by the Department of Public Health.

"Remedies of ordinary and inoffensive use, to be found in lists approved by the Government, and laboratory preparations licensed by the Public Health Department, are excepted; and no other medicine or preparation can be sold by a pharmacist or furnished to any one whosoever without a prescription from a duly authorized physician.

"Every pharmacist who wishes to sell laboratory preparations invented by others, under a special name, must indicate on the respective labels the pharmacopoeia in which the formulas of such preparations are to be found after obtaining the necessary authorization from the Department of Public Health, which will pass upon all statements which are to be made or can be made in the respective labels or advertisements; all preparations whose labels do not contain the express authorization referred to are considered secret remedies, subjecting the pharmacists to the penalties fixed in these regulations.

"The inventor of any antiseptic preparation, remedy or perfume, wishing to offer it for sale, shall make application for a license from the Department of Public Health, presenting therein a report in which he declares the composition of the product, the manner of manufacturing and applying it, and the circumstances under which its use can be beneficial. This report can be placed in a sealed envelope which will be opened by the director general of the Department, who will report

upon it to the pharmacist, after which it will again be sealed and deposited in the archives of the Department.

"With the application the inventor will present a certain quantity of the product, which shall be forwarded to the National Laboratory of Analyses for the purpose of securing the report of the latter respecting it, the director general being authorized, if it is deemed advisable, to order experiments to be made in public hospital or school establishments, after the chemical composition of the product is known.

"The director general shall give confidentially to the chief of the laboratory the formula of the composition, when it is to be analyzed.

"When the license has been obtained, the inventor can place the product upon sale, with the declaration that such sale has been authorized by the Department of Public Health; but it is absolutely prohibited to advertise in newspapers, or otherwise, qualities of a therapeutic nature which have not been established or admitted by the Department."

CHRISTMAS APPEAL FOR MILK STATION BABIES.

The work of the Department milk stations has increased to such an extent that there are now approximately sixteen thousand mothers with their babies enrolled. As they are all of families of very moderate means, some actually very poor, it has occurred to the Bureau of Child Hygiene that when the Christmas spirit becomes active this year that there must be a number of our citizens who would like to make gifts of Christmas dinners and toys to these families.

Accordingly, announcement is made that the Bureau of Child Hygiene stands ready to act as a distributing agency. Orders for baskets, containing Christmas dinners, or any toys to be so donated, can be sent, in any one of the Boroughs, to the local Borough Chief at one of the Department offices.

The milk stations reach children from birth to five years, and afford an excellent opportunity for bringing the spirit of Christmas into many thousands of homes that would otherwise be without it.

SPOILED COFFEE DESTROYED.

On or about October 15th, the United Fruit Company's steamship "Matapan," as the result of an accident sunk in the Ambrose Channel. This steamer was loaded with coffee, bananas, and tanning materials and was under water for approximately two weeks, after which she was raised and towed to dock at Stapleton, Staten Island.

Between October 21st and October 29th, 100 tons of loose damaged coffee and 50 tons of damaged bananas were removed from the hold of the ship, loaded on a scow and taken to sea and dumped. Two barges were also loaded with approximately 600,000 pounds of bulk coffee. This bulk coffee was gummy, water soaked, offensive and absolutely unfit for human food. Upon application made by insurance brokers, it was permitted to be removed to Brooklyn with the intention of having the caffeine extracted and with the understanding that it was not to be offered for food. The insurance brokers disposed of the coffee to a firm of large wholesale coffee dealers, who have a warehouse in Brooklyn.

Subsequently, the coffee on one of these barges was unloaded at the storage warehouse of the coffee merchants. Upon inspection made on October 31st it was found that the coffee was undergoing a drying process, and the inspector was informed by a member of the concern that they intended exporting it after the drying process had been completed. An embargo was then immediately placed and the coffee was kept under continual observation up to the time of its destruction.

A number of samples of the coffee were taken, examined and found to be unfit for human consumption. Several samples were also submitted to a coffee expert, who confirmed the belief that the coffee was unfit for human use.

On November 6th a summons was obtained against the coffee concern for violation of Section 42 of the Sanitary Code, charging it with having, keeping and offering for sale 300,000 pounds of coffee which was unfit for human food; and they were notified to immediately have it removed from their premises and destroyed. As a result, on November 12th, the work of removing the coffee from their warehouse to a barge was commenced, and on November 17th the coffee was taken to sea and dumped.

DISINFECTION OF PREMISES BY FUMIGATION.

Program for 1915.

Of late years the value of routine fumigation as a means of disinfection of premises where cases of infectious disease have occurred, has been seriously questioned. At present most authorities hold that it can be dispensed with as ineffective and unnecessary. It is ineffective in that as usually performed it does not destroy the disease germs. It is unnecessary for the reason that in recovered cases all contagion has disappeared from the premises by the time the patient has recovered. These views were recognized and approved by Dr. Hermann M. Biggs, the former Medical Officer of this Department, who on December 14, 1911, submitted a report to the then Commissioner of Health recommending the discontinuance of terminal disinfection of premises in cases of diphtheria and measles. This recommendation was adopted. During 1913 terminal disinfection was also omitted in cases of scarlet fever.

On September 15, 1914, the following instructions were received from the Commissioner of Health:

"The Department appears to occupy middle ground in its fumigation policy. We are spending large sums for this work, without any strong conviction concerning its value. As a basis for the future work of the Department, studies should be made showing the effect and value of fumigation. This work might be discontinued for a period in one borough, the other boroughs serving as controls.

"Prepare a plan for a series of studies in this field. New York, with its large opportunities for study and observation, should make some distinct contribution to this phase of the theory of public health administration."

It was decided, as a preliminary step, to discontinue fumigation of premises after all cases of infectious disease, with the exception of smallpox, in the Boroughs of The Bronx, Richmond and Queens. This was done October 8, 1914. District nurses were instructed, on termination of any such case by recovery, removal or death, to visit the premises and give all necessary instructions regarding cleansing and disinfection of the same by the occupants. Should the premises be vacant and disinfection be necessary, the nurse to recommend that the owner or agent carry out the necessary renovation, just as is done in cases of tuberculosis, where the owners or agents are informed in writing as to what renovation is necessary, and are requested to have the same performed. Should they decline, formal notices are issued and enforced by the Department of Health. The nurses are instructed not to remove the Departmental placards from the door of the premises until satisfied that the necessary cleaning and disinfection has been carried out. Nearly all authorities agree that such renovation, comprising repapering or repainting of walls, repainting of woodwork, and thorough cleaning of the floors, constitutes the most efficient means of disinfection of an apartment. The results have been entirely satisfactory.

The attached table shows the total fumigations performed and the renovations ordered for contagious diseases and for tuberculosis in the five Boroughs of the City for the two four-weekly periods ending October 10 and November 7, 1914. As above stated, fumigation of premises was discontinued in the Boroughs of The Bronx, Queens and Richmond on October 8, 1914.

Almost five hundred fewer fumigations for contagious diseases were performed during the second period, and the premises were renovated as the result of the District Nurses' recommendation in one hundred and seventy-nine instances. So far not a single complaint has reached the Department regarding the discontinuance of fumigation, nor has there been any increased prevalence of infectious disease in the three boroughs in question.

Encouraged by these satisfactory results, it was determined still further to limit the disinfection of premises by fumigation, during the coming year, and the Budget for the Bureau of Infectious Diseases for 1915 dispenses with the services of one disinfectant at \$1,050 per annum, sixteen at \$900 per annum and seven at \$750 per annum.

The program for 1915 is as follows:

It is proposed to discontinue routine fumigation for infectious diseases in the Borough of Manhattan, as well as in The Bronx, Queens and Richmond. It is felt that much better results in the way of testing the efficiency and value of fumigation can be obtained by omitting fumigation after all diseases in all boroughs but one, than by attempting to continue tuberculosis fumigations throughout the City and discontinuing all other forms.

A comparison of the 1915 morbidity rates in Brooklyn with those of former years, will enable us to determine whether any rise or fall in the morbidity in the other boroughs is due to discontinuance of fumigation, or would have occurred under any circumstances.

The eighteen remaining disinfectors of the Bureau of Infectious Diseases will be assigned to duty as follows:

A corps of 7 disinfectors, the same number as formerly, will be on duty in the Borough of Brooklyn, and fumigation of premises will be carried on as at present: i. e. in cases of diphtheria, scarlet fever and measles terminated at the height of the illness by death or removal to hospital; in scarlet fever, cerebro-spinal meningitis and acute poliomyelitis, on recovery; and in tuberculosis on removal from the premises.

In each of the other Boroughs a disinfectant will be detailed to duty in the Borough Office, whose duty it will be to perform special fumigations for smallpox, typhus fever, and other similar diseases.

One disinfectant in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond, and one in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, will be assigned to the disinfection of stables where cases of glanders have occurred.

Finally, a corps of five disinfectors will be detailed to the Division of Tuberculosis, each one being responsible for the cleaning and disinfection of a number of the Tuberculosis Clinics of the Department of Health. These latter men will be called upon for emergency disinfection work in any borough, should occasion arise.

No change will be made in any of the Boroughs in the present system of disinfection of library and school books.

NEW STABLE WORK AND THE FLY NUISANCE.

The Department has for some time appreciated the need for a greater supervision of the stables in the city with a view of improving their general sanitary condition, of reducing the nuisance that may exist on their account and particularly in order to prevent the breeding of house flies.

Heretofore the limited number of sanitary inspectors restricted all regular inspection of stables to those maintained in cellars. Inasmuch as these are most likely to violate sanitary principles, they were visited at least annually, preliminary to a renewal of the yearly permit issued by the Department of Health. Stables other than these had not been visited by the Department's men, other than on complaint, when, of course, any departure from the requirements of the Sanitary Code were rectified, either through personal effort of the inspector, or through prosecution. In general the requirements of the Sanitary Code provide that all stables be kept in a clean and sanitary condition, be properly ventilated, water-supplied, sewer-connected, and, in case the manure is not removed daily, that it be pressed into either bales, boxes or barrels, securely screened from flies, and removed from premises at least twice weekly.

In order better to control the fly nuisance, the Director of the Bureau of Infectious Diseases suggested early last spring that the permit requirement be extended to all the stables of the city. With this object in view, the Department requested the Bureau of Municipal Research to make a study of stable conditions in New York City and submit a report, embodying recommendations. In accordance with this request, and after making a survey, the Bureau submitted the following:

1. That a complete census of all stables in the city be taken at once, either by Police Department or by sanitary policemen attached to the Health Department and special men detailed for this work.
2. That a thorough inspection be made twice a year.
3. That each inspector be required to inspect ten stables a day on original inspection.
4. That the city be divided into small districts after the census is taken, and that a large force of regular or special inspectors be assigned to the work so that it may be completed during the present summer.
5. That the Health Department require all manure to be sprayed with iron sulphate solution when collected from stalls and that disinfectants be used in stalls.
6. That manure be kept covered and removed at least every other day.
7. That boxes, barrels or other receptacles for manure be disinfected with lime or other effective disinfectant when emptied.
8. That stables not complying with these rules be refused a license.

As far as practicable these recommendations were acted on by the Department of Health. In accordance with recommendation 1, a census was taken of the stables throughout the city. The sanitary conditions disclosed are conveniently presented in the following table:

Recommendations 2, 3 and 4 are being acted upon and reinspection work will begin April 1st next. As to recommendation 5, green vitriol is thought to be so corrosive as to make sodium colemanite or borax or lime a better agent. Recommendations 6 and 7 are covered by the new rules adopted, and recommendation 8, by the extension of the permit system to all stables, as originally recommended by the Director of the Bureau of Infectious Diseases.

As a consequence of this work and that to be performed in sequence next spring, the Department confidently looks forward to a great reduction in the number of house flies and hopes that this will favorably influence the infant mortality of next summer, as well as the prevalence of typhoid fever and infectious diseases generally.

TUBERCULOSIS, THIRD QUARTER, YEAR 1914.

In the following table are given statistics covering tuberculosis in this city during the third quarter, 1914:

*468 stables were found at census taking to be stables, but were vacated before inspection.

Comparing the statistical report for the third quarter of 1914 with that for the corresponding quarter of 1913, the following points may be noted: 4,092 tuberculosis individuals were admitted to various Tuberculosis Hospitals through the Hospital Admission Bureau this year, as against 3,404 last year. The completion of Sea View Hospital has probably made it possible to offer hospital treatment to a greater number of these unfortunate sufferers than ever before in the history of this municipality.

The Day Camps continue to be taxed to their utmost capacity, there being little change in the attendance from year to year. Evidently the Day Camps serve a purpose that consumptives have been quick to appreciate, so that an extension of day camp facilities to larger groups is greatly to be desired.

It is significant that with the lessened incidence of contagious diseases and the consequent relaxation from the heavy burdens laid upon them by this work, the nurses during the third quarter of this as of last year found opportunity to devote themselves more diligently to the investigation of registered tuberculosis cases. In consequence of this a very decided increase took place in the number of new cases applying at the clinics for treatment. Thus, while during the months of October, November and December of 1913, there were 3,038 new patients examined at the clinics, and only 2,887 in the first three months of 1914, as soon as the nurses turned their attention to this work in the quarter just passed, 3,831 new patients applied at the clinics for examination. In the total number of visits of patients to clinics (23,591 in the first quarter of this year, as against 27,315 for the quarter just passed), the same striking results are evident.

PREVENTIVE MEDICINE.

"Another significant result of the introduction of the scientific method and its universal activities lies in the fact that the emphasis on preventive medicine becomes greater. Modern medicine realizes that it is not enough to cure those already ill; it is not enough to build hospitals for the sick; it is not enough for the surgeon to relieve the pain of those actually suffering. All this is a part of the work of modern medicine, but a still greater part lies in the prevention of illness, in creating conditions favorable for health, in so dealing with the problem of the public health that there shall be a minimum of disease, a minimum of ill health, a minimum of suffering. It is the rise of preventive medicine, based on the science of chemistry, biology and physics, which has brought home to the state the realization of its own supreme duty in safeguarding the physical well-being of all its people. The state has long accepted the problem of caring for the helpless sick. To-day it faces the duty of preventing the helpless from falling into unnecessary illness."—Pritchett.

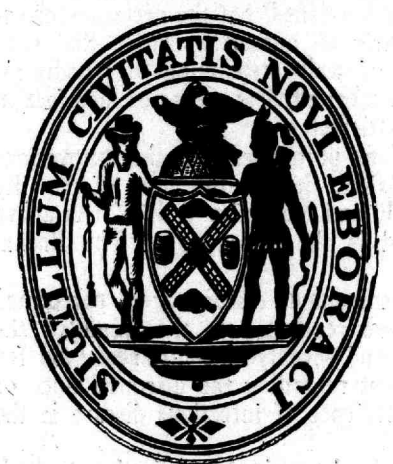

Amendments to Sanitary Code.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF Health of the Department of Health, held November 24, 1914, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That Section 182 of the Sanitary Code be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 182. No opium, morphine, chloral, or cannabis indica, or any other substance giving a physiological reaction similar to that of opium; or any salts, alkaloids, or derivatives, of any of the said drugs or substances; or any preparation, compound, or mixture, containing any of the said drugs or substances or their salts, alkaloids, or derivatives; shall be sold at retail or given away in the City of New York except upon the written prescription of a duly licensed physician, veterinarian, or dentist.

The foregoing provisions shall not, however, apply to preparations, compounds, or mixtures, containing any of the aforesaid drugs or substances or their salts, alkaloids, or derivatives, prepared for external use only, in the form of liniments, ointments, omelets, or plasters.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof.
