was referred a communication from his Honor the Mayor, relative to the ordinances relating to pawnbrokers, together with a proposed amend-ment to the said ordinances, have given full con-sideration to the subject, and beg leave to report That it appears, there is no provision which at-taches a penalty for carrying on the business of a pawnbroker without a license, and that it is the only business, the conducting of which is pro-vided for by the ordinances of the Common Coun-cil, which is not subject to such restrictions. Your Committee favor the proposed amend-ment, and offer for adoption the following : Resolved, That this Board concur in the action of the Board of Aldermen amending section 2, chapter 42 of Revised Ordinances, as embraced in the amendment hereto attached. Revised Ordinances of 1866. CHAPTER 42.

CHAFTER 42. Section 2. Amend to read as follows : "Every person receiving such license shall pay therefor the sum of fifty dollars for the use of the city; and no person shall exercise or carry on the business of Pawnbroker, without
