PROCLAMATION.

MAYOR'S OFFICE.

By virtue of the authority vested in me by the following ordinance passed by the Common Council on the 27th day of May, 1874, I, Wm. F. HAVEMEYER, Mayor of the City of New York, do hereby give notice, that the said ordinance will be enforced on and after Thursday, the 11th day of June, 1874.

The Pound is located in West Thirty-seventh street, between the Tenth and the Eleventh avenues, and will be open between the hours of 8 A. M. and 5 P. M., every day except Sundays.

AN ORDINANCE to provide for the killing of Dogs in the City of New York.

The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. Hereafter it shall not be lawful to permit any dog to go abroad loose, or at large, in any of the streets, lanes, alleys, where not enclosed, highways, parks, piers or public places within the corporate limits of the City of New York, unless the head of every such dog shall be encased in a wire muzzle sufficiently large to cover the head entirely, but so constructed as to admit of the dog opening its mouth to the fullest extent, and in no case to permit the nose of the dog to protrude; the muzzle to be securely fastened around the throat and behind the ears of every such dog, under a penalty of three dollars for each offence, to be recovered against the owner, possessor, or person who harbored such dog within three days previous to the time of such dog being so found going abroad loose or at large.

SEC. 2. The Mayor of the City of New York is hereby authorized and empowered to take such measures as he may deem most efficient to carry into effect the provisions of section 1 of this ordinance; and for that purpose is further authorized and empowered to appoint persons, or direct any person now attached to his office, to capture all such dogs found running abroad, loose or at large, paying for every such dog so captured and delivered at a place to be provided and designated by the Mayor, the sum of fifty cents, and a like sum shall be paid at the place so designated to any person, whether appointed by the Mayor or not, for the capture and delivery of any and every such dog. Such dogs, when so captured and delivered as aforesaid, if not claimed by the owner thereof, or any other person, within a period of forty-eight hours thereafter, shall, within six hours after the expiration of the time, be killed and destroyed in such manner as may be determined upon by the Mayor. Any owner or other person who may claim such dog shall, before being placed in possession thereof, pay therefor the sum of three dollars.

SEC. 3. The person authorized to pay for the capture of such dogs shall render, under oath, semi-monthly, a statement of all dogs so captured and killed, and the amount paid therefor, to the Mayor of the city, who shall thereupon certify the same to the Comptroller, when a warrant for the amount shall be drawn in favor of the said Mayor for the sum thus expended, which shall be paid, until otherwise ordered, from the appropriation for "City Contingencies."

SEC. 4. All money paid for fines for violation of section 1 of this ordinance, and for redemption of dogs as provided in section 2, shall be retained by the Mayor and applied to the payment of the expenses of enforcing the provisions of this ordinance, but a statement showing the aggregate amount thus received shall be submitted quarterly to the Comptroller of the City of New York.

SEC. 5. The provisions of this ordinance shall apply only to dogs owned or claimed by residents of this city, and any person who shall present any such dog and claim payment for the capture thereof which shall not be owned or captured within the corporate limits of this city, shall thereby incur a penalty of ten dollars. This ordinance shall apply only to any such dogs of the age of six months and upwards.

SEC. 6. Chapter XLIV. of the Revised Ordinances of 1866, and all other ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

SEC. 7. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

POLICE DEPARTMENT.

At a meeting of Messrs. Hugh Gardner, Oliver Charlick, Abram Duryee, and Abraham Disbecker, Police Commissioners of the City of New York, held at the Central Department of Police, No. 300 Mulberry street, on the 7th day of July, 1874, at 3 o'clock P. M., for the purpose of organizing the Board of Police, and for the transaction of Police business, on motion of Commissioner Duryee Commissioner Disbecker was appointed Chairman of the meeting of Commissioners.

Commissioner Duryee introduced the following preamble and resolution:

Whereas, The offices of Police Commissioner held by Oliver Charlick and Hugh Gardner respectively, and to which they were appointed on the day of May, 1873, became lawfully vacant; and

Whereas, On the 1st day of July, 1874, hi Honor William F. Havemeyer, Mayor of New York, appointed Hugh Gardner to be Police Commissioner in place of Oliver Charlick, and at the same time appointed Oliver Charlick to be Police Commissioner in place of Hugh Gardner; and on the 2d day of July inst., the said Oliver Charlick and Hugh Gardner respectively took the oath of office in pursuance of the statute in such case made and provided; and

Whereas, There being no President of the Board of Police nor Treasurer of Police, for the purpose of organizing the Board, it is

Resolved, That the Commissioners of Police now proceed to choose one of their number to be President of the Board of Police, and immediately thereafter that they proceed to choose one of their number to be Treasurer of Police.

Adopted—all the Commissioners voting aye.

Commissioner Duryee offered the following:

Resolved, That Commissioner Disbecker be and is hereby elected President of the Board.

Lost—Commissioners Duryee and Disbecker voting aye, Commissioners Gardner and Charlick voting no.

Commissioner Disbecker offered the following:

Resolved, That Commissioner Duryee be and is hereby elected Treasurer of Police.

Commissioner Gardner moved that a recess of ten minutes be taken.

Lost—Commissioners Gardner and Charlick voting aye, Commissioners Duryee and Disbecker voting no.

Commissioner Charlick offered the following:

Resolved, That Hugh Gardner be elected President of the Board, and Abram Duryee be elected Treasurer for the ensuing year.

Lost—Commissioners Gardner and Charlick voting aye, Commissioners Duryee and Disbecker voting no.

Commissioner Disbecker moved that the question be taken on the election of Commissioner Duryee as Treasurer.

Lost—Commissioners Duryee and Disbecker voting aye, Commissioners Gardner and Charlick voting no.

On motion of Commissioner Gardner, a recess of fifteen minutes was taken.

After recess—

Commissioner Duryee moved that Commissioner

Disbecker be elected temporary President of the Board.

Lost—Commissioners Duryee and Disbecker voting aye, Commissioners Gardner and Charlick voting no.

Commissioner Charlick desired the following to be entered in the minutes.

"I decline being a candidate for either President or Treasurer of the Board."

Commissioner Duryee offered the following:

Resolved, That the Chairman of this meeting be authorized to perform the duties of President of this Board until a permanent President shall have been chosen.

Lost—Commissioners Duryee and Disbecker voting aye, Commissioners Gardner and Charlick voting no.

Commissioner Disbecker offered the following:

Resolved, That Commissioner Duryee be and is hereby elected Treasurer of Police.

Commissioner Charlick moved to amend by prefixing the following to the resolution: "That Commissioner Gardner be and is hereby elected President of the Board."

Lost—Commissioners Gardner and Charlick voting aye, Commissioners Duryee and Disbecker voting no.

Commissioner Charlick moved to lay the resolution on the table.

Lost—Commissioners Gardner and Charlick voting aye, Commissioners Duryee and Disbecker voting no.

The question being then taken on the original resolution, was lost, Commissioners Duryee and Disbecker voting aye, Commissioners Gardner and Charlick voting no.

Commissioner Charlick moved that Hugh Gardner be elected President of the Board and Abram Duryee be elected Treasurer of Police.

Lost—Commissioners Gardner and Charlick voting aye, Commissioners Duryee and Disbecker voting no.

Commissioner Gardner moved that the Commission do now adjourn until Wednesday, at 3 P. M.

Lost—Commissioner Duryee voting aye, Commissioners Gardner, Charlick and Disbecker voting no.

Commissioner Gardner moved that the Commission adjourn.

Commissioner Disbecker moved to amend that the Commission adjourn to Wednesday, 8th inst., at 2:30 P. M.

Lost—Commissioners Duryee and Disbecker voting aye, and Commissioners Gardner and Charlick voting no.

The question was then taken on Commissioner Gardner's motion and lost, Commissioners Gardner and Charlick voting aye, Commissioners Duryee and Disbecker voting no.

On motion of Commissioner Gardner, the Commission adjourned, all voting aye.

BOARD OF EDUCATION.

JULY 1, 1874.

A stated session of the Board of Education was held on Wednesday, July 1, at the hall of the Board, corner of Grand and Elm streets.

Present—Wm. H. Neilson, Esq., President, and Commissioners Baker, Beardslee, Brown, Dowd, Farr, Halsted, Jenkins, Kelly, Klamroth, Lewis, Man, Mathewson, Townsend, Traud, Vermilye, West, and Wetmore—18.

Absent—Commissioners Hoe, Patterson, and Seligman—3.

The minutes of the preceding stated session were amended and approved.

The minutes of the special meeting of July 1, were approved.

A communication was received from Commissioner Vermilye asking to be excused during his absence from the city. Granted.

COMMUNICATIONS FROM TRUSTEES.

The President laid before the Board communications from the Trustees of several wards, as follows:

From the Tenth and Eighteenth Wards, to excuse absence of teachers.

Referred to Committee on Teachers.

From the Nineteenth, Twenty-third, and Twenty-fourth Wards, awarding contracts for repairing, etc. Referred to the Finance Committee.

From the Fifteenth Ward, nominating teachers for the Evening High Schools. Referred to the Committee on Evening Schools.

From the Twenty-first Ward, nominating teachers for the Evening Schools. Referred to the Committee on Evening Schools.

From the Twenty-first Ward, relative to the pay of Mr. Arnold Selisberg, while on special duty. Referred to the Committee on Teachers.

From the Twenty-fourth Ward, transmitting bills against school officers of said ward, under the Annexation Act. Referred to the Committee on By-Laws, etc.

From the Nineteenth Ward, relative to hiring additional premises for Primary Schools.

Report from the City Superintendent.

The President laid before the Board the monthly report of the City Superintendent, as follows:

CITY SUPERINTENDENT'S OFFICE,

NEW YORK, July 1, 1874.

To the Honorable the Board of Education:

GENTLEMEN—As required by law, I have the honor to report that, since the 1st of May last, examinations have been held in all the schools of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, constituting the recently annexed School District.

In these schools 105 classes were examined, in 30 of which the instruction was found to have been excellent; in 62, good; in 12, fair; and in 1, indifferent. These schools include eight Grammar Departments, eight Primary Departments, and six Primary Schools; and the general management, including order, discipline, classification, and supervision, was found to be commendable in all except Primary Departments Nos. 65 and 66, and Primary School No. 46.

In addition to the above, some of the schools in the First, Second, Eleventh, Twelfth, Fourteenth, Seventeenth, and Nineteenth Wards have been visited, and of 183 classes examined, the instruction appeared to be efficient in all except 14.

The undersigned has also caused to be re-examined all the classes from which unsatisfactory returns have been received since the 1st of November last; and is happy to report that, of 164 classes thus examined, all are reported as having made quite commendable progress, except 29 returned as fair, and 3 as indifferent.

Under the direction of the undersigned, Assistant Superintendent Schem has visited twenty schools belonging to the Eleventh, Seventeenth, Nineteenth, Twenty-second, and Twenty-third Wards, and has made a careful inspection of the classes instructed in German and French in these schools. Of 103 classes examined in German, he reports the instruction in 37 as excellent; in 52, good; and in 14, fair or indifferent.

Of the nineteen teachers engaged in giving instruction in the German language in these twenty schools, five are reported as showing an excellent degree of efficiency, eleven as good, two as only fair, and one as quite inefficient.

In some of the schools visited, this branch of study is not pursued according to the method prescribed by the regulations of the Board.

Thus, in M. D. No. 22, German is taught in only the four lower classes, while the By-Laws require that where this branch is introduced, it shall be taught in all the grades. In the Grammar Schools of the Twenty-second Ward, it is taught in only the higher classes, and by a special teacher employed in contravention of section 77 of the By-Laws.

The whole number of pupils on the registers of the several schools, on the 1st of June, was 104,319, and the average attendance during the preceding month, 94,171, which is nearly 5,000 in excess of the average attendance for May, 1873.

As required by the By-Laws, I submit herewith a list of the names of all teachers in whose classes the absenteeism was in excess of twenty per cent. during the month of May last.

To the Honorable the Board of Education:

GENTLEMEN—You have submitted to me an inquiry whether the Board of Education had legal authority to establish what is known as the Evening High School in this city, and whether they have now the power to establish similar High Schools.

While the matter itself has many bearings, the questions which I am to consider is one purely of law, and my opinion will be given, as all my opinions are given, uninfluenced by any consideration whatever but the desire to reach a correct result upon the law as it stands. I am making a thorough investigation of all the statutes upon which the authority of your Board rests, and all the judicial decisions which can in any way bear upon the question. This must of necessity take time. No person has any authority whatever to predict what my opinion will be, nor will any judgment whatever be formed by me with any reference to my views as to what the law, as a matter of expediency, ought to be. Indeed, I have no impressions upon the subject which can possibly influence my judgment as a lawyer.

UNITED STATES SENATE CHAMBER, 1
WASHINGTON, June 26, 1874.

AN ACT to encourage the establishment of public Marine Schools.

Be it enacted, etc., That the Secretary of the Navy, to promote nautical education, is hereby authorized and empowered to furnish, upon the application in writing of a Governor of a State, a suitable vessel of the navy, with all her apparel, charts, books, and instruments of navigation, provided the same can be spared without detriment to the naval service, to be used for the benefit of any nautical school, or school or college having a nautical branch, established at each or any of the ports of New York, Boston, Philadelphia, Baltimore, and San Francisco, upon the condition that there shall be maintained at such port a school or branch of a school for the instruction of youths in navigation, seamanship, marine engineering, and all matters pertaining to the proper construction, equipment, and sailing of vessels, or any particular branch thereof; and the President of the United States is hereby authorized, when in his opinion the same can be done without detriment to the public service, to detail proper officers of the navy as superintendents of, or instructors in, such schools:

Provided, That if any such school shall be discontinued, or the good of the naval service shall require, such vessel shall be immediately restored to the Secretary of the Navy, and the officers so detailed recalled; And provided further, That no person shall be sentenced to or received at such schools as a punishment or commutation of punishment for crime.

By unanimous consent Commissioner Wetmore offered the following preamble and resolution, and asked for their consideration:

Whereas, By a recent law of Congress the Secretary of the U. S. Navy has been empowered to furnish, upon the application of the Governor of a State, a suitable vessel of the navy, with all her apparel, charts, books, and instruments of navigation, etc., to be used for the benefit of any nautical school established at this port; and

Whereas, The establishment of such nautical school has been expressly provided for by an Act of the Legislature of the State of New York, passed April 24, 1873, and an Executive Committee appointed by the President of this Board on the 30th day of April, 1873, to supervise the organization of the same; therefore, be it

Resolved, That the President of this Board be requested to communicate with his Excellency John A. Dix, Governor, and solicit him to apply, upon the conditions of the United States law above quoted, to the Secretary of the Navy for a suitable vessel of the navy, with all her apparel, charts, books, and instruments of navigation, to be used for the benefit of the said nautical school to be established pursuant to the provisions of the said Act of the State Legislature.

Adopted.

Referred to the Committee on By-Laws, Elections, and Qualifications, with instructions to print such portions as relate to the Board of Education.

Commissioner Klamroth offered the following:

Resolved, That the By-Laws of this Board be amended as follows:

Amend sec. 74, page 175, of the Manual by adding thereto the following:—Except that annually there shall be held, from the 30th day of April to the 5th day of May, in the Normal College Building, under the direction of the Committee on the Course of Study and School Books, an exhibition of Drawing, Painting, Needle-work, Penmanship, and other productions, of all the Grammar Schools. At such exhibition nothing shall be exhibited except such articles as shall be the product of the unassisted industry of the pupils in the several Grammar Schools during the twelve months preceding such annual exhibition.

Referred to the Committee on By-Laws, Elections, and Qualifications.

FINANCE.

Commissioner Vermilye presented reports from the Finance Committee, as follows:

To appropriate \$1,000 for expenses of Normal Schools. Adopted.

Also, denying the application of Ninth Ward Trustees for extra appropriation of \$90.90 for repairs to roofs—said expense not being "extra." Adopted.

Also, to appropriate \$1,200 for repairs, &c., to Colored School premises. Adopted.

Also, to pay J. H. Myer's salary as Clerk of the Trustees of the Sixteenth Ward, and to authorize his appointment. Adopted.

Also, to rescind award of contract for carpenter work on new Primary School building No. 9, in First street, made to N. W. Smith, he being unable to carry on the work, and authorizing a readvertisement of new proposals. Adopted.

Commissioner Vermilye presented a report from the Finance Committee, to whom was referred the communications from the Trustees of the respective wards, in relation to the awards made by them from the several proposals received for furnishing the materials and labor required for repairing the school buildings, furniture, and heating apparatus in their immediate care, and accompanied with the following resolutions:

But no part of said money to be paid until the Trustees of the respective wards named shall have duly filed the contracts to be entered into by them for the purposes named therein, together with such security as shall be satisfactory to the Finance Committee for the faithful performance of said contracts and against the Lien Law, nor until said contracts shall have been approved by said Committee as to the form thereof, and the amount and time of payment of the installments; the work to be done under the direction of the Superintendent of School Buildings and the Trustees of the ward, and no payment to be made except upon the certificate of said Superintendent that the work has been done in satisfactory manner. Adopted.

Motions and Resolutions.

Commissioner Dowd moved that the report of the Committee on Buildings, exhibiting the capacity and number of sittings of each school building, be referred to the Committee on By-Laws, Elections, and Qualifications. Adopted.
