DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS.

Abstract of Proceedings for the Week ending May 30, 1885.

MONDAY, MAY 25, 1885.—ADJOURNED MEETING—9.30 A. M.

Present—Commissioners Crimmins (President), Powers, Beekman, and Borden.

The following communications were received:

From the Clerk of the Board of Aldermen, transmitting a copy of an ordinance for regulating, grading, etc., One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street, from North Third avenue to St. Ann's avenue. Referred to the Engineer of Construction.

From the Secretary of the Board of Health, transmitting a copy of a report upon the sanitary condition of the old channel of Mill brook, between One Hundred and Forty-fifth and One Hundred and Forty-sixth streets, with the request that drains be constructed in Mill brook, between Westchester avenue and One Hundred and Fortieth street, with as little delay as possible. On motion, the Secretary was directed to communicate with the Board of Health in the matter.

From the Secretary of the Civil Service Examining Board, transmitting a list of persons eligible for appointment as Parkkeepers. Ordered filed.

From the Engineer of Construction, reporting upon the extra work and the contract for regulating, grading One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street, between Boston road and Union avenue, amounting to \$44.32, for which the Comptroller declined to pay. Referred to the President.

From J. Alden Weir, recommending David Powers for employment in this Department. Ordered filed.

Commissioner Borden made a verbal report in the matter of the granite to be used in the erection of the granite steps, platforms, etc., at the bays and entrances on Morningside Park, and recommending that the granite known as "Hurricane Island granite" be selected and used for that work. On motion, said report was accepted.

A contract for erecting granite steps, platforms, brick arches, iron beams, etc., at four octagonal bays and two entrances on Morningside Park, was awarded to Michael McGrath at \$73,500.

There being an appeal now pending before the General Term of the Supreme Court in the matter of opening Rider avenue, and the sanitary requirements of the district in the vicinity of said avenue imperatively demanding that a sewer should be constructed along said avenue as soon as possible, which cannot be done until the avenue is opened, the Justices of the General Term were respectfully urged to advance the hearing of said appeal to the earliest moment practicable.

This Department having acquired the title to the land necessary for the construction of a bridge over the Harlem river at a point about one thousand five hundred feet north of High Bridge, having expended over \$5,000 in soundings, surveys, and other preliminary work, and having recently approved of the plans for such a structure, the Governor of this State was requested not to approve of Senate bill No. 426, which takes from this Department the right to construct said bridge, vests such right in a new commission to be appointed for the purpose, and appropriates the land so acquired by this Department to the use of such commission.

The Commissioner of Public Works was respectfully requested to furnish water sufficient to keep the fountain basins in the city parks full at all times.

The Commissioners of the Fire Department were requested to repair and paint the bell tower in Mount Morris Square.

Arrangements were ordered made with Eben's 71st Regiment band, for furnishing the music required for the concerts to be given in East River Park during the coming season.

All the works and employees heretofore under the control and direction of the Architect were transferred to the control and direction of the Engineer of Construction.

The clerks employed in the preparation of pay-rolls under the Property Clerk were transferred for duty to the Arsenal Building.

The President reported that he had restored Edward Burns to duty as laborer on Central Park, and that he had employed an additional monitor for sprinkling Riverside Drive.

On motion the action of the President was approved.

Richard Rooney, laborer, was restored and transferred for duty as watchman at Riverside Park; one of the men now employed as watchman at Claremont was transferred for duty as laborer under the Engineer of Construction; and the watchmen at Riverside Park were ordered transferred for duty under the Engineer of Construction and paid from the Riverside Park appropriation.

John J. Hawkins was allowed pay for fifteen days' services rendered as Skilled Laborer, at \$3 per day, under the Superintendent Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards.

The pay of George Healy, Carpenter in Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, was fixed at \$3.50 per day.

The following communications were received:

From the Secretary of the New York Turn Verein, expressing approval of the action of this Department in continuing Sunday concerts in the Park, and in recommending the opening of the Metropolitan Museum of Art and American Museum of Natural History on Sundays. Ordered filed.

From William Reiss, Caspar Schellhamer, Jr., and others, petitioning for the construction of a wooden drain in One Hundred and Fifty-first street, between Courtland and Railroad avenues. Referred to Superintendent Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards to report.

From Daniel Campbell, Assistant, asking for an increase of pay. Ordered filed.

From the Topographical Engineer and Engineer of Construction, reporting, in accordance with an order of the Board, upon the remonstrance of H. R. Burnett and others against the construction of sewers in Franklin avenue and One Hundred and Sixty-eighth street, and recommending, in view of the remonstrance being signed by a majority of the property-owners, that the construction of the sewers be postponed until the streets are widened. Ordered filed.

From the Engineer of Construction, recommending the employment of two Assistants competent to make calculations and use instruments on the field.

On motion, requisition was ordered made upon the Civil Service Examining Board for the names of persons eligible for appointment as Assistants.

From B. R. Guion, Assistant Engineer, asking to be allowed pay for time lost on account of sickness, from 7th to 15th instant. Allowed.

From Joseph F. Barry, applying for employment in this Department. Ordered filed.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to confer with the Secretary of the Civil Service Examining Board for the purpose of ascertaining whether this Department is at liberty to employ such persons who may present, in the absence of the formal notice of the Secretary of the Civil Service Board, a certificate showing that they have passed the required examination and are eligible for appointment.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment was requested to transfer the sum of \$8,000 from the appropriation made for the bridge over Mott Haven Canal, at One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, 1885, for which it is not required, to the appropriation for Labor, Maintenance, Supplies, Construction and Repairs—Parks and Places, 1885, which is insufficient.

A plan and specifications for a sewer in One Hundred and Forty-seventh street, between North Third and Brook avenues, were approved and the further consideration of the subject laid over.

A plan and specifications for a sewer in One Hundred and Sixty-ninth street, with branch in Fulton avenue, were approved and the work ordered advertised.

The President was authorized to confer with the Mayor in relation to the methods of paying the employees of this Department.

The President called the attention of the Board to the present condition of the appropriations made for the use of the Department, and, on motion, the matter was referred to the President to report upon.

The Treasurer was requested to procure estimates for placing blue-stone sills under the foot entrances at Stuyvesant Square.

The President was authorized to employ Chas. B. Gore for duty as Leveler, if eligible for appointment.

It was ordered that seven carpenters and one skilled carpenter be employed for work on McComb's Dam Bridge, the skilled carpenter to be paid \$3.50.

The pay of Timothy Mahoney, Blacksmith, was fixed at \$2.50 per day.

APPLICATIONS FOR EXEMPTIONS WILL BE heard here, from 10 to 3 daily, from all persons hitherto liable or recently serving who have become exempt, and all needed information will be given.

Those who have not answered as to their liability, or proved permanent exemption, will receive a "jury enrollment notice," requiring them to appear before me this year. Whether liable or not, such notices must be answered (in person, if possible, and at this office only) under severe penalties. If exempt, the party must bring proof of exemption; if liable, he must also answer in person, giving full and correct name, residence, etc., etc. No attention paid to letters.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called or pay their fines. No mere excuse will be allowed or interference permitted. The fines if unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquents.

All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States and District Court jurors are not exempt.

Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted.
