

## DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS

At an executive meeting of the Board of Docks, held January 31, 1889.

Present-Commissioners Post and Silliman ; absent, Commissioner Matthews. The application of James V. Mack for use of the dump foot West Forty-seventh street, North river, was,

On motion, denied.

The communication from the Engineer-in-Chief recommending that Patrick Barrett, Ship Carpenter, be appointed Foreman of Ship Carpenters with the pay now fixed for that grade of employees in the Department, was,

On motion, ordered to be placed on file and recommendation adopted, the said appointment to take effect February 1, 1889.

The report of the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 8409, that he had directed and superintended the driving of piles and the erection of an office thereon, north of Ninety-seventh street, North river, by the National Transit Company and also stating that the said company are using two platforms thereat, for which no permit has been issued, was,

On motion, ordered to be placed on file and the Secretary directed to notify the National Transit Company to show cause why penalty should not be imposed for violation of Rule I of the Rules and Regulations of the Department.

On motion, the following preamble and resolutions were adopted :

Whereas, Section 3, chapter 191 of the Laws of 1880, and section 797 of chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, enacts that, "The docks, piers and bulkheads on the Hudson river, from Gansevoort street to Little West Twelfth street, shall be set apart by the Department of Docks, or such Department as shall have control thereof, and kept for the use of boats, barges, and other vessels engaged in the business of transporting farm and garden produce, at such rates of wharfage as have been, or shall be lawfully established."

Be it Resolved, That the docks, piers and bulkheads on the Hudson river, from the northerly side of Gansevoort street to the southerly side of Little West Twelfth street, be and are hereby designated and set apart for the special purposes required and designated by said law ; and

Be it further Resolved, That all leases, permits, licenses and privileges whatsoever, given or granted by this Department, with reference to above-described water-front, between the northerly side of Gansevoort street and the southerly side of Little West Twelfth street, be and are hereby canceled, annulled and revoked, and that the Secretary be and is hereby directed to have a personal notice of this, the above preamble and resolutions, served upon each and every person occupying or using said described property under and by virtue of any lease, permit, license or privilege from this Department.

The appointment of George E. Rodgers, Hydrographer, was, in accordance with Rule 36 of the Civil Service Regulations, made permanent.

H. P. Jennings was appointed Laborer. On motion, the Board adjourned.

The Board met for the purpose of receiving estimates for removing the existing pier known as Pier 7, at the foot of Coenties Slip, East river, and for preparing for and building a new wooden pier and approach on the site of said pier, to be known as Pier 6, East river, under Contract No. 293, and for dredging at Pier 48, East river, west side, under Contract No. 294.

# REGULATIONS ESTABLISHING A SCALE OF WATER RENTS AND RULES GOVERNING THE USE OF WATER, FOR THE CITY OF NEW YORK, BY ORDER OF JOHN NEWTON, COM-MISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS.

UNDER CHAPTER 410, LAWS 1882, SECTIONS 350, 351, 352 and 353, and as amended by chapter 559, Laws 1887, as follows :

UNDER CHAPTER 410, LAWS 1882, SECTIONS 350, 351, 352 and 353, and as amended by chapter 559, Laws 1887, as follows: "The commissioner of public works shall, from time to time, establish scales of rents for the supplying of water, which rents shall be collected in the manner now provided by law, and which shall be apportioned to different classes of buildings in said city in reference to their dimensions, values, exposure to fires, ordnary uses for dwellings, stores, shops, private stables and other common purposes, number of families or occupants, or modify, alter, amend and increase such scale from time to time, and extend it to other descriptions of buildings and establishments. All extra charges for water shall be deemed to be included in the regular rents, and shall become a charge and lien upon, the buildings upon which they are restectively imposed, and, if not paid, shall be returned as arrears to the clerk of arrears. Such regular rents, including the extra charges above mentioned, shall be collected from the owners or occu-pants of all such buildings respectively, which shall be sutated upon lots adjoining any street or avenue in said city in which the distributing water-pipes are or may be laid, and from which they can be supplied with water. METERS will be placed on all houses where waste of water is found, and theywill be charged at rates fixed by the Department for all the water passing through them. HYDRANTS, HOSE, TROUGHS, FOUNTAINS, ETC., ETC.

No owner or tenant will be allowed to supply water to another person or persons. All persons taking water from the City must keep their own service-pipes, street tap, and all fixtures connected therewith, in good repair, protected from frost, at their own risk and expense, and shall *prevent all waste* of *water*. of water. The use of hose to wash coaches, omnibuses, wagons, railway cars or other vehicles or horses, cannot be per-

The use of hose to wash coaches, omnibuses, wagons, rallway cars or other vehicles or horses, cannot pe per-mitted. No horse-troughs o norse-watering fixtures will be permitted in the street or on the sidewalk, except upon a license or permit taken out for that purpose. All licenses or permits must be annually renewed on the first of May. Such fixtures must be kept in good order and the water not allowed to drip or waste by overrunning the sidewalk or street, or to become dangerous in winter by freezing in and about such troughs or fixtures No hydrant will be permitted on the sidewalk or in the front area, and any hydrant standing in a yard or alley, attached to any dwelling or building, must not be left running when not in actual use, and if the drip or waste from such hydrant freezes and becomes dangerous in winter, the supply will be shut off in addition to the penalty of five dollars imposed. Taps at wash-basms, water-closets, baths and urinals for each offense, which will be strictly enforced. Fountanns or jets in hotels, porter-houses, eating-saloons, confectioneries or other buildings are strictly prohibited.

saloons, confectioneries or other buildings are strictly prohibited. The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas, house-fronts, yards, court-yards, gardens, and about stables, is prohibited. Where premises are provided with wells, special permits will be issued for the use of hose, in order that the police or inspectors of this depart-ment may understand that the permission is not for the use of Croton water. Opening fire-hydrants to fill hand sprinklers or other vessels will not be allowed. The penalty for a violation of any of the preceding, rules and regulations will be five dollars for each offense, and if not paid when imposed will become a lien on the premises in like nanner as all other charges for unpaid water rates. The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and un-warrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this ob-ject can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted. Under the law all charges for water supplied througn meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises re-sponsible for the amount of water used or wasted. Notice is therefore invent to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of water device pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water breants or occu-pants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings. House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to reman vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will he allowed for any portion of one year.

GRANTS OF LANDS UNDER WATER.

THE OWNERS OF LANDS IN THE CITY OF The own York, which were formerly under water, and which were granted by the City of New York, are noti-fied that nearly all of the grants of such lands contain covenants, on the part of the grants of such lands contain covenants, on the part of the grantees, and their succes-sors and assigns, to maintain and keep in repair the adjacent streets. The condition of many of these streets is such as to make it necessary that they should be re-paired and repaved, and that the obligation resting upon the present owners of adjacent lots to do this work should now be enforced. Many of such owners have requested that such covenants be commuted, and wholly released, upon the payment by them of a certain sum per lot. The matter will shortly be presented to the Commis-sioners of the Sinking Fund for their consideration, and the adjustment of the basis of commutation, and applica-tion for releases should therefore be made at once.
