On recommendation of the Committee on Repairs and Supplies, it was Resolved, That the Chief Clerk be and is hereby directed to prepare a form of proposal and contract, as required by law, for supplying gas to the Police Department, and that the same be duly advertised.

The Committee on Repairs and Supplies reported that the necessary steps have been taken to place the flagging in front of the Twenty-second Precinct Station-house in a safe and proper condition.

The Committee also reported that the necessary steps have been taken to have the water-closets of the Thirty-first Precinct Station-house placed in proper condition. Whereupon, it was ordered that the Board of Health be notified accordingly.

On recommendation of the Committee on Rules and Discipline, it was Resolved, That Patrolman Joseph Cottrell, Twenty-second Precinct, be allowed to receive \$25 as a reward for the recovery of a stolen buggy, subject to the usual deduction.

Resolved, That Rule 24 be and is hereby adopted, and shall read as follows:  
RULE 24. Whenever any allegation or complaint shall be made or published by any reputable person or authority, which imputes to any member of the force conduct or acts calling for discipline or punishment, it shall be the duty of the Superintendent, Inspectors, and Captains, or other officers in command of such member of the force, to report the same in writing to the Chief Clerk, who, upon such report, shall request the person or authority making any such allegation or complaint to appear at the Central Office and verify the same by affidavit. Upon such affidavit, it shall be the duty of the Chief Clerk to cause changes and specifications to be framed, which shall be signed by the Superintendent and filed in the Chief Clerk's Office, and proceedings shall be taken thereon in the same manner as other charges, in conformity to the rules and regulations of the Department.

Resolved, That the Superintendent promulgate the above rule to the Force by General Order.  
Resolved, That the application of Patrolman Joseph Pickett, Mounted Squad, for two months' sick leave of absence, be granted.

Resolved, That the application of Patrolman J. W. Pearsall, to be transferred from the Fifth to the Twenty-third Precinct, be granted.

Resolved, That the application of Patrolman Samuel Pabor, Twelfth Precinct, to be detailed, be ordered on file, and that the Superintendent be directed to assign him to detailed duty.

Resolved, That the application of Sergeant George F. Westing, Mounted Squad, for sixty days' sick leave of absence, be granted.

Resolved, That the application of Patrolman William Strauss, Thirteenth Precinct, to be detailed, be denied.

**IN RELATION TO JURORS FOR STATE COURTS.**

OFFICE OF THE COMMISSIONER OF JURORS,

**APPLICATIONS FOR EXEMPTIONS WILL BE** heard here, from 9 to 4 daily, from all persons hitherto liable or recently serving who have become exempt, and all needed information will be given.

Those who have not answered as to their liability, or proved permanent exemption, will receive a "jury enrollment notice," requiring them to appear before me this year. Whether liable or not, such notices must be answered (in person, if possible, and at this office only) under severe penalties. If exempt, the party must bring proof of exemption; if liable, he must also answer in person, giving full and correct name, residence, etc., etc. No attention paid to letters.

When possible and legal, serving jurors will be allowed to select a convenient season—if application be made in time.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called or pay their fines. No mere excuse will be allowed or interference permitted. The fines, received from those who, for business or other reasons, are unable to serve at the time selected, pay the expenses of this office, and if unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquents.

The Commissioner will receive applications for relief from those jurors who have served continuously and promptly for several years, or have done excessive jury service in the State Courts.

All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable jurors, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States and District Court jurors are not exempt.

Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted. No fees of any kind exist or are allowed in regard to jury notices, and any one asking, receiving, or giving any such "fee" or "present" will be arrested, and, if possible, punished to the full extent of the law.
