Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and is hereby respectfully requested to transfer the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars from the appropriation made to the Police Department for the year 1892, entitled "Election Expenses, Compensation of Inspectors, Poll-clerks and Ballot-clerks," which is in excess of the amount required for the purposes and objects thereof, to the appropriation made to the same Department for the year 1892, entitled "Police Station-houses, Alterations, Fitting-up, Additions to, etc.," which is insufficient to enable the Board of Police to remove the old building, formerly a station-house, from the land and premises now in the possession of the Police Department, known as No. 220 East Fifty-ninth street, and erect thereon a suitable building for the storage of election material, and also for the uses of Patrol Wagon service.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and is hereby respectfully requested to transfer the sum of six thousand dollars from the appropriation made to the Police Department for the year 1892, entitled "Election Expenses, Printing Official Ballots," which is in excess of the amount required for the purposes and objects thereof, to the appropriation made to the same Department for the year 1892, entitled "Contingent Expenses of the Central Department, and Station-houses, etc.," which is insufficient to enable the Department to provide for the Detective Bureau, and at each police station-house, additional cabinets and criminal record books for the Rogues' Galleries.

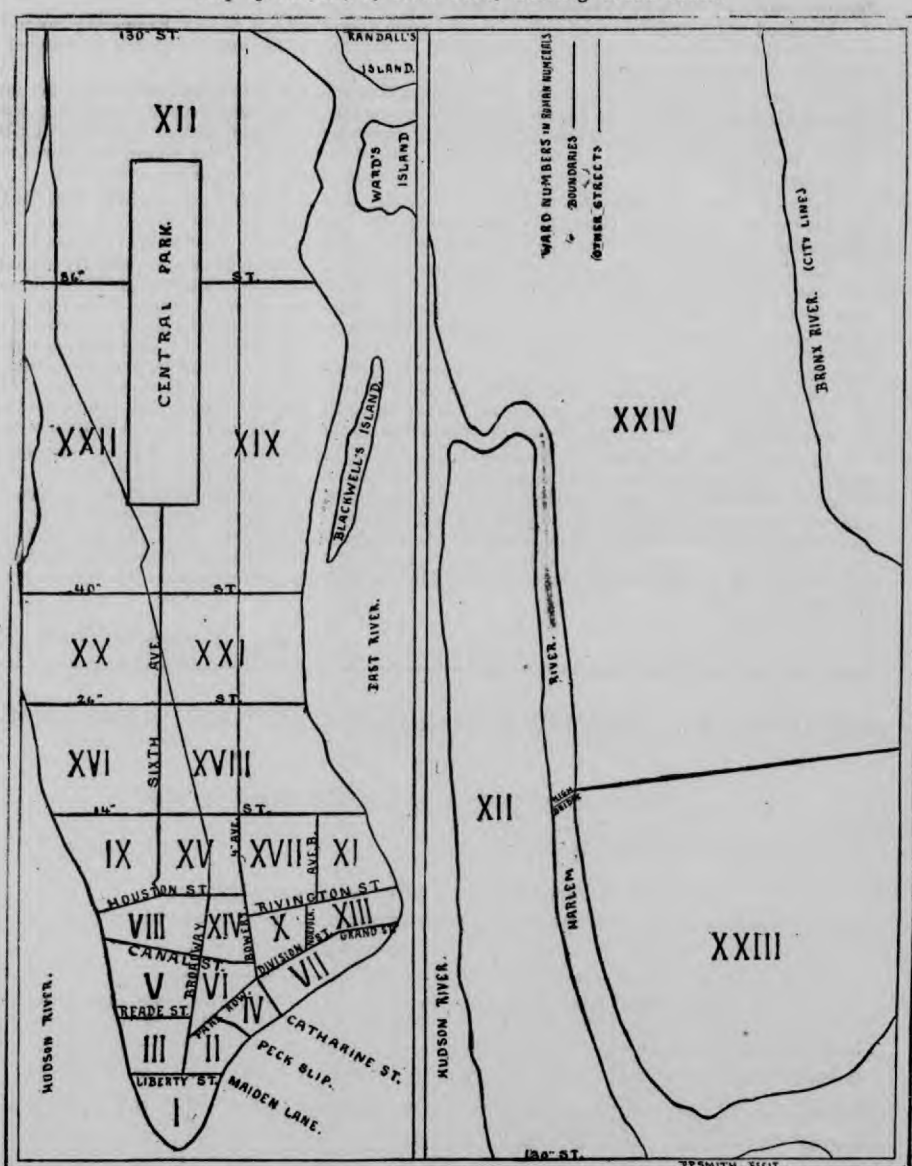

The 695 deaths represent a death-rate of 19.54, against 20.68 for the previous week and 22.48 for the corresponding week of 1891.

Contagious and infectious diseases show a very marked decrease, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever, typhus fever and small-pox being respectively 76, 78, 79, 11, 3 and 0, against 110, 77, 110, 16, 2 and 4 for the previous week, a total of 247 against 319. There was an increase of diphtheria in the Sixth, Ninth, Tenth, Twelfth and Twenty-third Wards, the decrease being especially marked in the Eleventh, Nineteenth, Twentieth and Twenty-second Wards. Measles increased slightly in the Fourth, Seventh, Eleventh, Twelfth, Fourteenth, Fifteenth, Seventeenth and Twenty-second Wards, with quite a marked increase in the Twentieth Ward and a very marked decrease in the Nineteenth Ward. Scarlet fever increased slightly in the Fifth, Sixth, Seventh, Eighth, Thirteenth, Sixteenth and Twenty-third Wards, and markedly in the Ninth Ward, while there was a very pronounced decrease in the Twelfth, Nineteenth, Twentieth and Twenty-second Wards; 8 of the 11 cases of typhoid fever were above Fourth street, and the remainder were below Fourteenth street.

MEMORANDA.

The work of the removal of underground wires and the placing and operation of them underground have resulted in the removal by the Bureau of Encumbrances, under orders from the Board of Electrical Control, of 15,630 poles and 21,759 miles of wire.

This has been done with little, if any, interference with the operations of the companies required by law to transform their systems from overhead to underground.

There have been constructed and are now in use in the city, for the accommodation of the telephone and telegraph companies, 730 miles of subways; for the accommodation of the low-tension electric-light companies, 141 miles, and for the accommodation of the high-tension electric-light companies, 575 miles.

Into these subways have been placed by the telephone and telegraph companies 31,767 miles of conductor; and by the electric-lighting companies, 1,005 miles of conductor.

The operations of the Board of Electrical Control have resulted in the discovery of violations of its rules and regulations to the number of 15,403, all of which, except 91, which are under consideration, have been attended to and remedied.

The Board thereupon adjourned sine die.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act:

When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.

WE, JACOB LORILLARD, VERNON H.
