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### EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT.

To the People of The City of New York:

On the second of February, 1653, Governor Peter Stuyvesant, of the Province of New Netherland, issued a proclamation granting the privileges of city government to the then City of New Amsterdam. Two centuries and a half have been added to the world's story since then, and the little City of New Amsterdam, later known for a season as New Orange, and now become the proud City of New York, still dominates the noble bay and the stately rivers that marked it for the site of a great city even at that early day. The handful of population—about one thousand in number—who greeted with acclaim the proclamation of Governor Stuyvesant, establishing municipal government here, has grown to be a vast multitude of more than three and a half millions of souls.

Many vicissitudes have befallen Manhattan Island and our country in this long interval; but The City of New York greets this anniversary year as a city that is inspired alike by the stirring memories of its past, and by its confident anticipations of a still more glorious future.

In no spirit of unworthy pride, but with grateful recognition of the Divine blessings that have made our beloved city what it is, I call upon the people of New York to make the week beginning May 24 and ending May 30, which has been designated by the Board of Aldermen for this purpose, a gala week in this city, in celebration of this interesting event. During the whole of this week, the citizens are requested to fly their flags from dwellings and buildings of every description; the newspaper press of the city is asked to bring home to the people a sense of New York's long history; and the ministers of religion are requested, at their usual places of worship, to remind their hearers of the event that is being celebrated, and to invoke the Divine blessing upon the municipality.

It is hereby ordered that flags shall be displayed upon the school houses, and upon every city building, during this entire week; and the Board of Education is requested to provide for special exercises, in every school in the City, on the 26th day of May; the day upon which the granting of the first City Charter will be celebrated in the Aldermanic Chamber, so that the children of the City may have a realizing sense of the long history of New York, and be filled with the public-spirited desire to be worthy citizens of such a City.

### BELLEVUE AND ALLIED HOSPITALS.

Hon. SETH LOW, Mayor, City of New York:

New York, January 1, 1903.

Sir—The Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals have the honor to submit herewith their report for the three months ending December 31, 1902:

#### THE DEPARTMENT AS A WHOLE.

The most important change affecting this Department as a whole, during the past quarter, has been that in the superintendency. Early in November Dr. George T. Stewart, Superintendent, applied for permission to take a trip to Europe for the benefit of his health, and, upon his return, an application having been made by the Board of Health for his transfer to that Department, the Board of Trustees, at

his own request, granted this application, and he ceased to be in the employ of this Board. In filling the vacancy thus created the aim of the Board of Trustees was to find a man of the highest professional attainments, fitted alike by nature and training to the arduous duties and exacting requirements attaching to the position of Superintendent of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals. Such a man the Board believes it has been fortunate enough to secure in the person of Dr. William Mabon, Superintendent of the St. Lawrence State Hospital for the Insane, at Ogdensburg, N. Y.

Dr. Mabon is a graduate of the Bellevue Hospital Medical College of the class of 1881. His first State appointment was to the position of Assistant Physician at the Utica State Hospital for the Insane. Here he remained until 1895, when he was appointed Medical Superintendent of the Willard State Hospital, then badly in need of reorganization. A single year sufficed him to put this institution upon a firm basis, and in 1896 he accepted the call of the managers of the St. Lawrence State Hospital at Ogdensburg, where his predecessor had been Dr. Wise, just then appointed President of the State Commission in Lunacy. The reputation of this institution for enlightened treatment of the insane was fully maintained under Dr. Mabon's management, and he demonstrated anew the administrative capacity of which he had already given proof elsewhere.

As he was already in the service of the State, Dr. Mabon's appointment was easily effected under the Civil Service rules, by the consent of the State and Municipal Civil Service Boards to his transfer. In addition to his position as Superintendent of Bellevue and its Allied Hospitals, he will act as consulting physician in the Pavilion for the Alleged Insane. He will assume office at the beginning of the coming year.

During the period of Dr. Stewart's absence in Europe the duties of Superintendent were performed in an efficient and acceptable manner by Mr. Michael J. Rickard, Assistant Superintendent, and the Board of Trustees put on record in a resolution its sense of the long and valued services to the institution of this faithful official, who will continue in his present position under the new Superintendent.

Another change of some importance in the personnel of the administration during the past quarter has been brought about by the employment of a special Bookkeeper and an additional Stenographer for the Department of Supplies. These appointments, together with the inauguration of an improved system of accounts, have resulted in a better organization of the departmental store room and its complete separation from that of Bellevue Hospital. An extra Clerk, to be stationed in the office of the Supervising Engineer, has also been employed.

#### MEDICAL, AMBULANCE AND TRANSFER SERVICES.

The changes in the method of admitting patients, described in the last report, as well as those arranging the distribution of ambulance service, to the end that both these important services might be in the hands of the more experienced doctors of the staff, have worked well in practice, and have been accepted as permanent by all concerned in carrying them out.

Another improvement in the medical service may be expected to result from a decision of the Board, taken at its last meeting of the year, to appoint anaesthetists for each of the hospitals under its charge. These appointments will be honorary, and will be held by specialists of reputation, who will give instruction to the incoming members of the House Staff in the art of administering anaesthetics in accordance with the best modern methods. Two such instructors will be appointed to Bellevue Hospital and one apiece to the several dependencies, and arrangements will be made by which one hospital may call upon the services of the anaesthetist attached to another in case of the temporary absence of its instructor.

A matter affecting the discipline of the house staffs of the various hospitals was dealt with by the Board of Trustees in a resolution forbidding the collection of fees for the signing of insurance blanks or any other papers for patients or their relatives. This was found to be a practice of long standing in the Department, which had been interrupted by the order of the last Commissioner of Public Charities, but had grown up again since his retirement. It seemed unwise to the Board to leave a door open to possible abuse by permitting such a privilege, and beside adopting this rule it required the return of a fee which had already been collected.

Complaints being frequent of delay in getting ambulance calls to Gouverneur, Harlem and Fordham Hospitals, the Board of Trustees decided to request the Police Department to erect separate and distinct telephone lines to these hospitals. This has been done by order of the Police Commissioner, Hon. John N. Partridge, and is certain to result in a very great improvement in the City's ambulance service.

A resolution adopted by the Board of Trustees early in October provides that in all accident cases a record shall be made in the patient's history, of the time, place and circumstances in which the injury occurred, and that a statement of these facts shall be required of private hospitals transferring to the hospitals under care of this Board. This, it is expected, will have a tendency to facilitate the treatment of such cases, and at the same time will serve as a protection to the hospital authorities against fraudulent claims, holding them responsible for the infliction of these injuries.

With the consent of the Commissioner of Public Charities, ex-officio a member of this Board, the Chemist of the Department of Public Charities was made Consulting Chemist of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, without salary, his duties being to make chemical analysis of food, drugs, etc., when so requested by the Superintendent, and to inspect, every quarter, the drug stores and places where drugs are distributed in this Department, submitting a report upon the same to the Board of Trustees.

#### MEDICAL LIBRARIES.

The Board of Trustees, at its first meeting in October, appropriated \$250 from the supplies account for the purpose of establishing medical libraries in the four hospitals under its care. This sum has been invested in standard medical works, to form the nucleus of a library for each hospital in the Department. Messrs. William Wood & Co. presented the Department with 44 volumes, and Messrs. Lea Brothers & Co. of Philadelphia co-operated in the formation of the medical libraries by presenting each hospital with the *Medical News*, weekly, and the *American Journal of Medical Sciences*, monthly. The *Medical Record* and the *American Journal of Obstetrics* have also been provided for the library of each of the four hospitals. All these journals are to be preserved for binding and thus become a permanent part of the library equipment. Book plates and call slips have been provided, and it is intended to administer the libraries in accordance with the best principles of library economy.

#### BELLEVUE HOSPITAL.

An important change in the medical service was made in October last, when, in order to relieve the attending physicians and surgeons, who had difficulty in completing their rounds, a supplementary visitation of the outlying wards was assigned to the assistant attending physicians and surgeons. The regular physicians and surgeons still visit these wards when their duties permit, but provision is now made for their absence. Under this plan the assistants become part of the active staff of the hospital, while continuing to act as substitutes in the other wards whenever the regular attending physicians or surgeons are absent. The change has resulted in a greatly improved pavilion service, these wards being no longer left to the end of a physician's hurried visit.

On suggestion of a committee of the House Staff, a plan for the better regulation of the ambulance and admission service at Bellevue was put into effect on the first of November. This had for its purpose the equalization of the duties among the doctors concerned, and did not in any way interfere with the principle of seniority service established by the Board of Trustees. It has worked reform in the old system, under which one or two men had the bulk of the work for a period long enough to tire them out, while the others had too little to do.

The question of admitting well children to the wards of Bellevue Hospital on recommendation of the Superintendent of Outdoor Poor, until they could otherwise



be cared for by him, came up for settlement and was the subject of a resolution directing this course in the case of infants under two years of age. These children are sometimes received at the Superintendent's office after the departure of the last boat for the Island, and there is no place other than Bellevue available for their reception. Their accommodation in a sick ward, however, cannot be to their advantage, even for a stay of one night, and a better arrangement ought soon to be devised.

While dealing with matters affecting the medical administration and active staff, both attending and house, the Board of Trustees desires to congratulate all concerned in the treatment of the emergency of Election Night, when as many as fifty victims of the explosion in Madison square were brought to the hospital, thirty-one being sent to the wards and nineteen having their injuries dressed before they returned to their homes. The circumstances were such that a number of dangerous and difficult operations had to be conducted simultaneously, in different parts of the building, demanding the services of all doctors in the hospital, including those in charge of the Pavilion for the Insane, as well as the visiting surgeons.

The principal changes of an administrative character affecting the hospital as a whole during the past quarter have been the removal of the Steward on charges of incompetency, the placing of graduate nurses in charge of reception and dressing rooms, and the dismissal of the Housekeeper at the close of her three months' probationary period by reason of unsatisfactory service.

#### ALCOHOLIC WARDS.

The Board of Trustees has instituted efforts to deal with the matter of "repeaters" in the alcoholic ward for men, and has sought the co-operation of the police magistrates to this end. This ward is frequently so crowded that mattresses have to be used upon the floor, and this condition is brought about, to a great degree, by the practice on the part of a certain number of individuals of using it as a place in which to "sober up" after periodical debauches. To stop this evil, the Board of Trustees has invited the magistrates to commit to the workhouse such as shall be complained against by an officer of the hospital, and to this request certain magistrates have made favorable reply.

The plan mentioned in the last quarterly report of using the women's alcoholic ward for the reception of women prisoners as well, in order to admit of the transfer of men prisoners to the former women's prison ward, has worked well, the number of women prisoners received having been extremely small. In the meanwhile the men prisoners are much better cared for than could be the case under the old conditions.

#### LAUNDRY.

The manager of the laundry resigned late in November and a successor was appointed from the Civil Service list, to take office on December 1. The new linen room (formerly the men's prison ward) is now in use, and the sorting of clean clothes is done here instead of in the ironing room, as formerly. New flooring had to be laid and the room was supplied with shelves, tables and sewing machines.

#### ALTERATIONS AND REPAIRS.

The most important of the many alterations and repairs undertaken at Bellevue Hospital during the quarter just closed are the beginning of work upon the old Cornell Medical College building, with a view to its conversion into a dormitory for the women employees of the hospital; the completion of the stairway in the main building and the extension of the elevator shaft to the roof; the acceptance of a proposal early in December for the extension and repairing of the electric lighting system of the hospital, at a cost of \$9,586, and the general painting and repairing of all the wards in the hospital. In addition to this a thorough examination of all the plumbing has been made by an expert sanitary engineer and specifications for the necessary repairs have been prepared under his direction in such manner that the work may be done in part as the money becomes available.

Work on the new dormitory building was long delayed by the failure of the Trustees to receive a bid for its construction within the appropriation allowed, and it was finally necessary to secure from the City an additional sum of \$14,000. A proposal of \$47,657 was accepted by the Board on December 24, and work was begun shortly after.

Beside undertaking repair work upon the electric light wiring to bring it up to the standard exacted by the Fire Department, the Board decided to improve the interior telephone system by giving to every ward a separate telephone connection, for which purpose a new switchboard will be provided at the earliest date possible.

Among other repairs have been the interior painting and the placing of entirely new plumbing in the Sturgis Pavilion; a tin roof in place of the glass one in Ward 31; shoring up, painting and improving the laundry building; repairs to roof and gutter of gate house, Catholic chapel, butcher's shop and Marquand Pavilion; erection of five storm doors for the winter; new bath tubs and basins in the apartments of the Assistant Superintendent; new showers in Wards 38 and 39; a new hot water tank for medical baths; installation of steam heat in the new dormitory in the former laundry building; cutting of an additional door between the Superintendent's office and the corridor, and improvement in the arrangement of the iron passage-way between the kitchen and the main building.

#### NURSING SERVICE.

The changes contemplated in the nursing service have been completely carried out since the issuance of the last report by the organization of the Committee on Nursing, which is now holding regular meetings, and by the appointment of an Assistant Superintendent. The resignation of Mrs. Ada S. Willard, Superintendent of the Male Training School, was received by the Board of Trustees on October 16, dated to take effect on the 31st, and was followed by the appointment of Miss Lucy A. Bannister as First Assistant Superintendent under Miss Jane A. Delano, Superintendent of the Training School for Women Nurses, in general charge of the nursing system of the hospital. Later, another First Assistant, Miss Carrie Brink, and two Second Assistants were appointed. The work of procuring women head nurses for the men's wards has advanced slowly by reason of the small sum available for salaries to be paid. The same reason has prevented the employment of more male nurses, whose services are urgently needed.

#### PAVILION FOR THE INSANE.

The plan adopted by the Board of Trustees for the admission of patients to the Pavilion for the Alleged Insane, as described in the last report, has worked excellently in practice, Dr. Packer and his two assistants being present at every hour of the day to examine those exhibiting symptoms of disturbed mental conditions. There has also been a marked improvement in the management of the Pavilion, partly to be accounted for by the changes made in the building, permitting considerably greater seclusion and quiet to inmates, and partly by the application of new methods of treatment now in use among the insane. Among the more notable improvements has been the covering over the steam pipes, thus removing an opportunity for suicide by hanging. The radiators are protected by light wire screens, but these become hot and undoubtedly some indirect system of heating would be preferable.

#### EMERGENCY HOSPITAL.

Numerous improvements and repairs have been made at the Emergency Hospital. Fire escapes have been provided at the front and rear of the main building, and a steel bridge has replaced the wooden one connecting the hospital with the annex in the rear. A steel fence now incloses the hospital, and the flagging in the rear yard has been relaid.

The entire interior of the hospital has been repainted. The lying-in ward has been furnished with ten new beds and glass bed stands, and new linen closets have been provided. A new desk telephone and medicine cabinet have been added to the office. The operating room has been refurnished with a new sterilizer, instru-

ment cabinet, two glass tables, a glass instrument table, new operating table, aseptic wash bowl and other necessary articles of equipment. The lower floors have been relaid with linoleum. New ice boxes, tables, tubs and clothes boxes have been provided, and minor improvements and repairs have been made throughout the hospital.

#### GOVERNEUR HOSPITAL.

The principal fact of interest in connection with Gouverneur Hospital during the past quarter was the establishment on December 16 of a dispensary for the treatment of trachoma in the old hospital building. This was done at the urgent request of President Lederle of the Department of Health, whose Inspectors had been excluding from the public schools hundreds of children suffering from trachoma. These children were not permitted to return until treated or cured, yet no hospital controlled by the City offered treatment for trachoma and the private dispensaries were unable to meet the demand. As the City excluded these children from the schools, it seemed only fair that it should provide treatment for them. The work developed into something more than a dispensary pure and simple, inasmuch as many of the cases required an operation, and this in turn required the keeping of the little patients over night in wards especially provided for them.

The need of such a dispensary is shown by the fact that 1,412 old and 976 new cases, a total of 2,388, were treated between December 16 and December 31, 1902, and 127 operations were performed in the same period. The Board of Health supplies the Physicians at this clinic, but all else—beds, instruments, drugs, nursing, attendance, etc.—is furnished by the Board of Trustees.

The Gouverneur Hospital Medical Board petitioned the Board of Trustees early in the quarter for the appointment of a special dispensary staff to deal with the large number of cases applying for treatment at the dispensary. The project was made the subject of very careful inquiry by the Board of Trustees, with the result of deferring action for the present, the handling of these patients by the members of the house staff appearing to the Board to meet with all requirements, while affording a valuable supplement to the experience gained by them as internes.

The most important improvements at this hospital during the quarter just closed have been the fitting up of a clinical laboratory on the first floor; the repairing of the interior telephone service; the formation of two new dormitories for women helpers in the old hospital building; the tiling of the doctors' showers and the thorough repairing of the ice machine. In connection with the telephone repairing a telephone booth has been constructed in the office.

#### HARLEM HOSPITAL.

The great overcrowding of Harlem Hospital, as well as the unsanitary and uncomfortable condition of the miserably inadequate dispensary building, determined the Trustees to take radical action without waiting for the completion of the new hospital building. A resolution was accordingly passed at the Board's meeting of November 13, requesting the Sinking Fund Commission to conclude a lease of the large three-story wooden building, at No. 521 East One Hundred and Twentieth street, immediately adjoining the present hospital building on the west. It is the intention of the Board to repair and refit this building at a cost of about \$3,000, to make it available for hospital and dispensary purposes; the first floor being converted into a dispensary of comfortable proportions and the floor above being divided into wards to be used principally for maternity cases. These cases have had to be delivered in the past in the common female medical ward surrounded by patients afflicted with a variety of diseases and sometimes overcrowded as well. The old dispensary building is a wooden structure, in part movable, and having formerly served as a dispensary at Gouverneur, whence it was removed upon the completion of the new hospital there. It is so near the river bank in its present position that during the cold weather the tide has forced the ice against its flooring, with the result of tearing it open. The Sinking Fund Commission, it is pleasant to report, has approved the Board's plan for the lease of the adjoining house, and it will be possible in our next statement to report a great improvement in the condition of affairs at this hospital.

In the meanwhile minor improvements accomplished during the past quarter have been as follows: the dispensary roof has been repaired; the doors to the elevator shaft tin lined, and the fire-alarm system repaired; the boxing in of the shed adjoining the ambulance stable completed, making a stall for one horse, and a storage room for hay, straw and feed; hot water furnace overhauled and provided with new ash pit, smoke box and smokestack; new porch replacing the old one in front and on the east side of the hospital; a new Remington typewriter, large double desk and letter press purchased; new laundry stove with double coils for hot water connected with the hot water boiler; shed adjoining the ambulance stable moved in order to make a wagon road to the new morgue building now being erected.

#### FORDHAM HOSPITAL.

The establishment of a fire brigade among the employees of the hospital has lately been effected, Mr. Philip Smith, the efficient head of the Bellevue brigade, having been sent to this hospital to organize a similar company.

Complaint has been made to the Board by the Supervising Nurse of the practice of the courts in summoning as many as five employees at one time to testify in accident cases, which are frequent in this neighborhood. This has resulted at times in a very serious interruption of the work of the hospital, but the authorities have agreed to use greater caution in the future.

Among the improvements of the quarter may be mentioned the following: a new operating table and wicker removal baskets have been provided and a crematory has been built for burning soiled dressings. The waste pipes on the first and second floors have been enlarged from two to three and four inches. All have been connected with the main sewer. New linings, grates and smoke pipes for the furnace have been supplied. The dining room has been provided with a metal ceiling, and the fire alarm and interior telephone services have been put in repair. Painting has been done in the dormitory for the men employees and in the linen closets, which have been provided with new shelves.

## ART COMMISSION.

Minutes of Meeting of Art Commission Held in the Governor's Room, City Hall, on Tuesday, April 28, 1903, at 4.30 o'clock p. m.

Present—President Warner, presiding; Commissioners Healy, Dielman, Rhinelander, Proctor, Coombs and Farragut.

Minutes of meeting of April 14 were read and approved.

The President reported the appointment of the following committees on matters submitted to the Commission since the last meeting, April 14:

## Submission 107.

Lamp-posts for Public Comfort Stations, Brooklyn—Commissioners Coombs (Chairman), Farragut and Proctor. Appointed April 23, 1903.

## Submission 108.

Ericsson Statue; Location—Commissioners Proctor (Chairman), Dielman and Farragut. Appointed April 25, 1903.

## Submission 109.

Hall of Records Sculptures—Commissioners Proctor (Chairman), Dielman and Farragut. Appointed April 28, 1903.

## Submission 110.

Letter Boxes—Commissioners Farragut (Chairman), Coombs and Proctor. Appointed April 23, 1903.

Intervale Avenue Fountain—Commissioners Proctor (Chairman), Rhinelander and Marshall. Appointed April 21, 1903.

The Committee on Mayor's letter in re Hall of Records reported, through Commissioner Dielman, Chairman, recommending that the following letter be sent the Mayor:

Hon. SETH LOW, Mayor, and Chairman of Special Committee on Decoration of the Hall of Records:

Dear Sir—Referring to our letter of April 16, and now answering the fourth question of your communication of March 24, viz:

"If the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is to make any appropriation for mural decoration, how much, in the judgment of the Municipal Art Commission, should be appropriated for the purpose, and upon what conditions?"

The Commission calls attention to the communications addressed to you by the National Society of Mural Painters and the National Sculpture Society in this regard, of which, from copies forwarded the Commission, it assumes the originals to be before you.

The Commission finds that the estimates of cost of the proposed decorations for the Hall of Records, contained in the communications above referred to, were prepared by committees of experts of the National Society of Mural Painters and the National Sculpture Society respectively, who, studying the plans of the building furnished by the architects and deciding from these what surfaces should be decoratively treated in painting or in mosaic and where stained glass should be introduced, have estimated the cost, based on that of similar work, such as in the Congressional Library, Washington, and in the Appellate Court Building in this City, at \$240,000. This amount includes \$20,000 for the sculptural features recommended as a part of a general plan for interior decoration, of which the main items were mural painting, stained glass and mosaic. This Commission therefore recommends that this amount of \$240,000 be considered as the maximum which should now be appropriated—this amount being liberal in view of the saving of expense in other directions, should these plans be adopted.

As to the second part of this question, "and upon what conditions?": If it is asked under what conditions payments should be made for the decorations, the Commission recommends that a plan of payment be agreed upon as fair and practicable by a body composed of representatives of the City Government and the professional societies named. A plan of this nature, it is understood, was made and carried out in the case of the decorations of the Appellate Court Building, properly guaranteeing the City's interests and satisfactory to the painters concerned.

If the question refers to the manner of assigning the various parts of the decorative scheme to individual artists, the Commission is of the opinion that the method adopted should be such as to insure a final result worthily representing the present advanced state of mural painting and the best ability of our artists. The Commission approves the recommendations of the National Society of Mural Painters and the National Sculpture Society that a certain proportion of the work be directly assigned by a competent body of connoisseurs to artists of recognized rank in their respective departments; and believes that the remainder of the work may well be assigned by competition in some form, as to which, however, the Commission makes no specific recommendation.

On motion, the report was adopted and the Assistant Secretary directed to communicate the action of the Commission to his Honor the Mayor.

Dear Sir—I herewith respectfully transmit a quarterly report of work done by paid and unpaid labor for the quarter ending March 31, 1903, to wit:

CARPENTER'S WORK.

At Fifth District Prison, by unpaid labor—Putting in 8 new wire sash cords in windows of male prison, also three lights of glass, size 15 by 17 inches, in windows of female prison; repairing 6 kitchen chairs; making new knife-box and placing in position new altar in chapel.

PLUMBING AND STEAMFITTING AND TINSMITHING.

At Second District Prison, by paid labor—Repairs to water main, connecting from street to prison. Material used: 5 pounds lead pipe; 5 pounds solder; 2 flanges; 6 bolts. Work done by staff—Repairing and overhauling steam plant. Material used: 3 5/8-inch compression cocks; 2 1/2-inch tees; 2 1 1/2-inch unions, and 50 rubber washers.

At Third District Prison, by paid labor—Repairing faucets on washtubs in kitchen; repairing faucets in the following cells: Nos. 1, 13, 17, 21, 41 and 52; adjusting two joints on hot and cold water pipe in kitchen; two new washers put on faucets and 1 new 5/8-inch brass faucet put on sink in kitchen; soldering soup boiler, 1/2-pound solder; repairing gate leading to yard, and putting on new bolt on same, repairing leaks of Croton pipe in cells Nos. 5, 11, 15, 23, 48 and 52. Putting in new grates on a "Monica" stove No. 17.

At Fourth District Prison, by paid labor—Construction of a new lock on door of office; taking off old plates and replacing same with new ones and furnishing and making three new keys for same. Putting in a new set of bricks on a "Duparquet" range 2 feet; by unpaid labor, put on sink in prison kitchen one new 5/8-inch brass faucet; put on in cells on second tier two 1/2-inch brass faucets.

At Seventh District Prison, by paid labor—Running line of gas pipe and changing gas light at office desk, capping two broken gas jets in yard, clearing obstruction in Croton pipe, repairing water faucet, repairing leak of Croton pipe, removing waste of basin and repairing steam valves in Matron's room and ten-day house, also repairing wash trays. Material used to make these repairs: Four 5/8-inch compression wash tray cocks, one 5/8-inch compression sink faucet; repairs to unique basin waste, sixteen compression washers, four pounds lead pipe, two pounds solder, charcoal and lampwick, repairing all the open seams of roof of prison and clearing out water tank thereat.

PAINTER AND KALSOMINER'S WORK.

At Third District Prison, by prison labor—Painting all the necessary parts of prison to wit: Four iron platforms, eight flights of iron stairs and landing on male and female side of prison, iron railings, tier and door casings and gates of all cells on second tier. Material used: Ten gallons of asphaltum varnish.

At Fourth District Prison, by prison labor—Renovating and retouching all the necessary parts of prison, to wit: Ceiling of male prison given two coats of paint, entire female prison painted, prison kitchen, office, hall, storm house and fence in yard, the ceilings of twenty-six cells given two coats of whitewash. Material used: 300 pounds of white lead, 15 gallons raw oil, 15 gallons turpentine, 1 gallon liquid driers, 3 pounds burnt sienna, 1 pound raw sienna, 2 pounds ultramarine blue, 5 pounds burnt umber, 15 pounds chrome green, 5 pounds yellow ochre and one-half barrel whitewash lime.

Fifth District Prison, by prison labor—The following painting was done: 24 cells in male prison, iron railings, stairway and ceilings, closet in dormitory; 16 cells in female prison, stairway and ceiling, whitewashing laundry and hall in basement, painting ceiling and side walls in kitchen, also renovating and painting office and varnishing all office furniture; painting and graining 24 benches for church service, also appropriately enameling the altar in chapel. Material used: 10 pounds chrome green, 5 pounds yellow ochre, 10 pounds lamp black, 5 pounds burnt umber, 5 pounds raw sienna, 10 gallons raw oil, 10 gallons turpentine, 2 gallons driers, 1 gallon varnish, 4 pounds white enamel, 150 pounds white lead, 25 pounds whitewash lime and 1 pound ultramarine blue.

At Seventh District Prison, by prison labor—Renovating and retouching all the necessary parts of the prison, to wit: The vestibule and iron railing at entrance has been painted two coats; the office, female prison, halls, staircases to top of prison have each received three coats of paint. Material used: 700 pounds white lead, 35 gallons raw oil, 20 gallons turpentine and 10 gallons liquid driers.

The usual amount of cleaning, cooking, laundrying and other general work done in all prisons by unpaid prison help.

Laid and connected 20 feet of waste pipe with sewer; attached 7 new faucets in prison kitchen; laid and connected 100 feet galvanized iron pipe in prison kitchen building.

Painters—  
Painted prison kitchen inside and outside; painted Keeper's dining room and kitchen inside and outside (two coats); painted 42 iron window guards; 8 wardrobes; 1 sign painted and lettered (size 6 by 7 feet); painted 64 iron frames on tables in mess hall.

Carpenters—  
Built one wooden horse cart; made 2 double doors and frames; made 14 window frames and sashes; made 5 stone boats; made one sign 6 by 7 feet; 1 seed box 4 by 3 by 2 feet; built 8 wardrobes with drawers; 1 kitchen closet; 1 large kitchen table; built one large tower for bell; removed the old windmill and water tower.

Blacksmiths—  
Made 4 sledges; 49 new drills; 200 new plugs and feathers; 12 chain hooks; iron mountings for new cart; made 40 new horse shoes; 4 new cart bolts; made 42 iron guards for 14 windows; 35 ex plugs and feathers; 44 shoes reset and sharpened for horses; 800 drills resharpened and tempered; 12 picks steeled and resharpened; 3 dozen No. 8 shoes put on horses.

## MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

New York, April 3, 1903.

A meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of The City of New York was held at the Commission's offices, No. 61 Elm street, on Friday, April 3, 1903. There were present President Ogden and Commissioners Mason, Banta, Perrine and Spencer.

The minutes of the meeting held March 27 were approved.

The Chief Examiner appeared, in compliance with the direction of the Commission, "to present an explanation of his failure to comply with the provisions of Rule 39," in holding examinations for promotion. After making a statement he retired; and, on motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That, in holding examinations for promotion, the Chief Examiner be and is hereby directed to follow the provisions of Rule 39, and, as far as practicable, the instructions of the Corporation Counsel, contained in the opinion dated February 20, 1903, as follows:

"I think, however, that the practical result of securing the promotions of persons especially skilled in the duties of the position in which the vacancy exists can be easily accomplished by a proper examination conducted by your Commission.

"The great importance of experience in the special duties of the positions to which promotion is sought is, of course, very evident, and this result can be secured by giving to the actual experience in some of the duties of the candidates a percentage large enough to give thereto proper weight."

Commissioner Mason, Chairman of the Law Committee, reported that he had conferred with the Corporation Counsel with reference to the eligibility of employees of the City who had passed examinations wherein the grade of possible appointment was not specified, for increases in salary without examination, and recommended that the Secretary be instructed to request the official opinion of the Corporation Counsel in the matter. He presented a letter addressed to the Corporation Counsel, and drawn by him (Commissioner Mason). On motion, duly seconded, the recommendation of Commissioner Mason was adopted, and the Secretary was instructed to forward to the Corporation Counsel the letter presented by Mr. Mason.

On motion of Commissioner Spencer, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the action of the Commission taken at the last meeting, in establishing a scale for the marking of seniority in examinations for promotion in the uniformed forces of the Police and Fire Departments, be and the same is hereby rescinded, and that the matter of establishing such a scale be laid over.

The Secretary, referring to the fact that at the last meeting the Commission had ordered an examination for the position of Superintendent of Dam Construction, called the attention of the Commission to the fact that the title was not included in the classification, and on motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That for purposes of examination, the position of Superintendent of Dam Construction be deemed to be included in Schedule E.

The Secretary reported that he had requested postmasters throughout The City of New York to permit the posting of advertisements of examinations in their respective offices, and that he had received affirmative replies from nearly all of them. He stated, however, that up to the present date he had been unsuccessful in securing permission to post the advertisements in the stations of the General Postoffice of New York, but that he would make further effort to secure the necessary permission.

The Secretary called to the attention of the Commission the case of James V. Pettit, a candidate for the position of Inspector of Buildings, whose application had been rejected by the Board of Examiners, under Rule 11. Mr. Pettit then appealed to the Commission, and the action of the Board of Examiners was sustained. He then secured a writ of mandamus from the Supreme Court, directing the Commission to accept his application and to place his name upon the eligible list in case he passed the examination. The Secretary further stated that the Corporation Counsel was not in favor of appealing the case, and had recommended that the order of the Court be obeyed, and reminded the Commission that at the last meeting the application of Mr. Pettit for the position of Inspector of Regulating, Grading and Paving, rejected by the Board of Examiners on the same ground, had been accepted by the Commission upon the recommendation of the Law Committee. On motion, duly seconded, the Secretary was instructed to act in compliance with the terms of the writ.

The report of the Chief Examiner upon uncompleted examinations was received and ordered filed.

The statistical report of the Chief Examiner for the month of March was received and ordered filed.

A letter was presented from the Chief Examiner with further reference to the application of Rule 39 to examinations for promotion. On motion, duly seconded, the letter was ordered filed; and it was

Resolved, That the Chief Examiner be directed to omit the personal questioning of persons named for promotion, but that the provisions of Rule 39 be otherwise followed in promotion examinations, and as far as practicable that candidates be examined in writing in such manner as to show their fitness for the position to be filled by promotion as indicated by their knowledge of its duties, their experience and otherwise.

The report of the Labor Clerk for the month of March was received and ordered filed.

The Secretary called the attention of the Commission to the fact that the Governor had signed the bill creating the Children's Court in the Borough of Brooklyn, and stated that he had been informed that as the positions of Clerk and Deputy Clerk in the corresponding court in the Borough of Manhattan had been included in the exempt class, an application would be made to have these positions in the newly-created court included in that class also. On motion, duly seconded, the Secretary was instructed to make arrangements for a public hearing on the matter at the next meeting.

A letter was presented from the Commissioner of Police requesting that the examination recently held for promotion to the grade of Sergeant in the Department of Police be canceled, the Court of Appeals having restored to the position of Detective Sergeant 170 members of the force who had been reduced to the position of Patrolman, and it being necessary to detail a number of these persons to act as Sergeants. On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That, in compliance with the request of the Police Commissioner, the examination for promotion from the grade of Roundsman to that of Sergeant in the Police Department (physical held February 14, and mental held March 4) be and the same is hereby canceled.

A letter was presented from the Commissioner of Public Works, Borough of Richmond, requesting the Commission to pass the payroll of Samuel R. Hurlbut under the title of Chief Draughtsman, a title not included in the classification but attached to the position held by him, in the budget approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. Mr. Hurlbut was appointed from the eligible list for Topographical Draughtsman, and the Commission had formerly passed his payroll under the title of Chief Topographical Draughtsman, but the Department of Finance had declined to recognize any title than that attached to his position by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. On motion, duly seconded, the request was granted.

A letter was presented from the Supervisor of the City Record with reference to the printing of the annual report of the Commission, and suggesting that the matter be taken up with the Mail and Express Company, who had printed the reports. On motion, duly seconded, the matter was referred to the President and Secretary, with power.

A communication was presented from John D. Herlihy demanding that the Commission certify to his payroll as Captain of Police for the months of January, February and March, 1903. On motion, duly seconded, the communication was ordered filed.

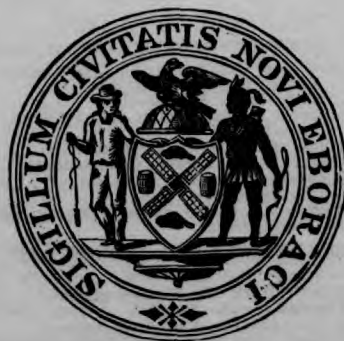

**BOARD OF ALDERMEN.**

**AN ORDINANCE GRANTING TO THE**  
New York and Long Island Traction Company the right or franchise to construct and operate a street surface railway in, upon and along certain streets and highways and bridges in The City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen of The City of New York hereby grants to the New York and Long Island Traction Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth,

the right and privilege to construct and operate a double-track surface railway, with all connections, turnouts, switches, crossovers and suitable stands necessary for the accommodation and operation of said railway, by the overhead system of electricity, or any other motive power which may be lawfully employed upon the same, in, upon and along the following named streets and highways and bridges, all situated in the boroughs of Queens and Brooklyn, City and State of New York, set forth in the following description of routes:

First—Beginning at a point on Fulton street (otherwise known as the Hempstead and Jamaica turnpike), at the easterly line of the Borough of Queens, in The City of New York; running thence northwesterly on and along said Fulton street to the intersection of said Fulton street and the Jerico turnpike at or near Queens, in the Borough of Queens; with a branch line from the intersection of said Hempstead and Jamaica turnpike and Sherwood avenue; running thence southerly on and along said Sherwood avenue to Old Country road, all in the Borough of Queens.

Second—Beginning at a point at the intersection of said Fulton street and Springfield road (at or near Queens, in the Borough of Queens); running thence southwesterly on and along said Springfield road to a road known as Old Country road; thence generally westerly on and along said Old Country road past the intersection of said Old Country road and South street, to a point on said Old Country road about opposite Bryan avenue in Hollis Park; thence generally westerly on and along private property to Bryan avenue in Hollis Park at its intersection with Farmer avenue; thence westerly on and along said Bryan avenue to its intersection with South street; thence westerly on and along South street to Punline street in Jamaica; thence northwesterly on and along Punline street to Linden street; thence westerly on and along Linden street to New York avenue; thence southerly on and along New York avenue to South street; thence westerly on and along South street to Prospect street; thence northerly on and along Prospect street to and across the bridge over the tracks of the Long Island Railroad to Fleet street; thence westerly on and along Fleet street to Twombly place; thence westerly on and along Twombly place to Church street; thence northerly on and along Church street to Fulton street in Jamaica; with a branch line from the intersection of said New York avenue and Linden street in Jamaica; thence northerly on and along New York avenue to a point on New York avenue, south of the tracks of the Long Island Railroad; thence westerly on and along private property crossing Union Hall street and Washington street to a point on Prospect street, south of the tracks of the Long Island Railroad in Jamaica; also on and along Centre street, from Union Hall street to Washington street, all in the Borough of Queens.

Third—Beginning at a point at the boundary line between The City of New York and the Town of Hempstead, Nassau County, New York, on private property contiguous to and lying north of the conduit of the Brooklyn City Water Works in the Borough of Queens; running thence westerly on and along private property contiguous to and adjoining the property of the Brooklyn City Water Works on the northerly side thereof; crossing Ocean avenue (otherwise known as the road to Wright's mill), Rosedale avenue, Foster's Meadow road, the property of the Brooklyn City Water Works, known as conduit branch, Springfield road, Farmers avenue, New York avenue, Rockaway turnpike, to the junction of the Three-Mile road and Old South road; thence westerly on and along said Old South road to the road to Bergen's Landing; thence westerly on and along private property contiguous to and adjacent to the right of way of the Brooklyn City Water Works and on the northerly side thereof crossing Old South road, Hawtree Creek road, road to Remsen's landing, Centreville avenue at the southerly end thereof, road to landing or Woodhaven road at the southerly end thereof, and Cedar lane, to the right of way of the Cross Country Railroad Company; thence northerly and westerly on and along private property crossing Old South road to a point on Eldert lane about 500 feet south of Liberty avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn; thence northerly on and along Eldert lane to Liberty avenue.

Fourth—Beginning at a point on the Jerico turnpike at the extreme easterly boundary line of The City of New York and the Town of North Hempstead, Nassau County, New York, and running thence westerly on and along said Jerico turnpike to a point at the intersection of said Jerico turnpike and the Hempstead and Jamaica turnpike (otherwise known as Fulton street), all in the Borough of Queens.

And with the right or franchise to cross such other streets and highways and bridges (named and unnamed), as may be encountered in said routes.

Section 2. The grant of this franchise is subject to the following conditions:

First—The consent in writing of the owners of half in value of the property bounded on said streets and highways and bridges, to the con-



struction and operation of said railway shall be obtained by the grantee, or in the event that such consent cannot be obtained, the grantee shall obtain the favorable determination, confirmed by the Court, of three Commissioners, appointed by the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, in the manner provided by the Railroad Law, before said railway is built or operated.

Second—The said right, privilege and franchise to construct and operate said railway shall be held and enjoyed by said railway company, its lessee or successors, for the term of twenty-five years from the date when this ordinance is signed by the Mayor, with the privilege of renewal of said grant for a further period of twenty-five years upon a fair revaluation of said right, privilege and franchise, but such renewal shall not provide for any further renewal. Such revaluation shall be of the right, privilege and franchise to maintain and operate said railway by itself, and shall not include any valuation derived from the ownership, operation or control of any other railroad by the grantee, its successors or assigns. It shall be made in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment or its successors in authority; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the railway company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder; and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluations aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six months prior to the expiration of the grant, and their report shall be filed with the comptroller or his successor in authority within three months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience, and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine the books of the railway company. The valuations so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but shall not in any event be less than the minimum amount fixed as the sum to be paid annually for the last five years of the original franchise.

Third—Upon the termination of the said franchise, right or privilege, whether original or renewal, if the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the City of New York, or its successors in authority shall so desire, there shall be a fair valuation of the plant and property of the grantee necessary for traction purposes upon the said streets and highways and bridges, and of the land in private ownership upon which the said railway shall be operated or the easements of right-of-way or other necessary easements in such lands, as the case may be, including power-house, equipment, tracks and appurtenances, which plant and property shall be and become the property of the City of New York at the option of the said Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority, on the termination of this grant and the payment to the grantee of such valuation. The valuation shall be based upon a fair appraisal of the property, excluding any value derived from the franchise, and such value shall be determined by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority; provided that in the valuation of the land in private ownership, on which such railroad is constructed, or the easements affecting such land, as the case may be, their value shall not be fixed at an amount in excess of the original cost thereof, to the grantee of said franchise, its successors or assigns. A sworn statement of such cost executed by such grantee and verified by the affidavit of one of its officers, shall be filed with the Comptroller of the City of New York, before any act is done by the grantee or its successors or assigns in the construction or operation of the railway upon any route hereinbefore mentioned, which includes private property.

Fourth—The New York and Long Island Traction Company, its successors or assigns, shall pay for this franchise to the City of New York, the following sums of money: During the first term of five years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than \$1,000, and which shall be equal to three per cent. of its gross annual receipts derived from passenger and freight traffic, within the limits of the City of New York, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of \$1,000; during the remaining twenty years of the term, an annual sum which shall not be less than \$2,000, and which shall be equal to five per cent. of its gross annual receipts as above, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of \$2,000.

In computing the amount of the gross receipts derived from passenger traffic and above referred to, the routes hereinafter mentioned shall be considered, and the persons who are upon the cars of the company at any point upon such routes shall be deemed to have paid the fare provided to be paid by the ordinance granting the franchise aforesaid, whether they enter or leave the car upon such route or upon any other route upon which the grantee or its successors or assigns operates its cars.

Such sums shall be paid into the treasury of the City of New York on November 1, in each year; provided, however, that the first payment shall only be for that proportion of the above sums as the time from the signing of this ordinance by the Mayor to September 30 next preceding said date of payment, and the provisions of the Railroad Law as it existed at the time of the adoption of this ordinance relating to the manner of payments and statements of percentages of gross receipts of street railway companies shall, as to said railway, be strictly followed. The intention of this paragraph is to fix an annual charge to be paid by the grantee, its successors or assigns, to the City of New York for the rights and franchise hereby granted, and it shall not be construed as providing for the payment by the grantee, its successors or assigns, for said franchise, of a percentage of gross receipts within the meaning of any general or special statute.

Fifth—The said annual charge or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of the franchise hereby granted, whether original or renewal, notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other railway company providing for payments for street railway rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or franchises hereby granted, whether original or renewal, or of any part thereof, or of any of the routes mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this grant, and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said condition as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives, so far as this franchise is concerned, any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof, or otherwise, exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this grant.

Sixth—The rights and franchises granted hereby shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the New York and Long Island Traction Company,

its successors or assigns, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of the City of New York, acting by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Seventh—The said railway may be operated by overhead electrical power, substantially similar to the system of overhead electrical traction now in use by the New York and North Shore Railway Company, or by the underground electric system now in use by the Interurban Street Railway Company in the Borough of Manhattan, and by any other motive power, except locomotive steam power or horse power, which may be approved by the Board of Railroad Commissioners, and consented to by the owners of property, in accordance with the provisions of the Railroad Law.

Provided that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority, upon giving to the grantee, its successors or assigns, one year's notice, in writing, may require it or them to operate its railway upon the whole or upon any portion of its route by underground electrical power substantially according to the system now in use on the railways in the Borough of Manhattan above referred to, and thereupon to discontinue the use of the overhead trolley system, and to remove its poles, wires and other structures used by it for that purpose from the streets and highways and bridges of the City of New York.

Eighth—The said railway shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City of New York, who have jurisdiction in such matters under the Charter of the City.

Ninth—Said railway shall be constructed and operated in the latest improved manner of street railway construction and operation, and the railway and property of said company shall be maintained in good condition throughout the term of this grant.

Tenth—The rate of fare for any passenger upon said railway shall not exceed five cents within the limits of the City of New York; the said company shall not charge any passenger more than said sum for one continuous ride from any point on said railway, or a line or branch operated in connection therewith to any point thereof, or of any connecting line or branch thereof within the limits of the City of New York. The rates for the carrying of property upon the cars of the grantee shall in all cases be reasonable in amount, and shall be subject to the control of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority, and may be fixed by such Board after notice and hearing to the grantee, and when so fixed such rate shall be binding upon said grantee, its successors or assigns, and no greater sums shall be charged for such services than provided for by it.

Eleventh—The cars on the said lines as proposed shall run at intervals of not more than one hour, both day and night, and as much often as the reasonable convenience of the public may require or as may be directed by the city ordinances; provided, however, that said railway company during the first five years of this franchise shall not be required to operate its cars on any of its lines within the City of New York between the hours of twelve o'clock midnight and four o'clock a. m. each day, unless the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said city shall determine after a hearing had thereon that public convenience requires the operation of its cars during said hours.

Twelfth—The said railway company shall apply to each car run over said railway a proper fender and wheelguard in conformity to such laws and ordinances as are now in force or may hereafter be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities.

Thirteenth—All cars on said railway shall be heated through the cold weather in conformity to such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, and each car shall be well lighted either by the Pintsch gas system or by electricity, or by some system of lighting equally efficient.

Fourteenth—The said company shall at all times keep the street between its tracks, and for a distance of two feet beyond the rails upon either side of said streets, free and clear from ice and snow.

Fifteenth—The said railway company, as long as it shall continue to use any of the tracks upon said streets and highways and bridges, shall have and keep in permanent repair that portion of the surface of said streets and highways and bridges, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and two feet in width outside of its tracks, under the supervision of the proper local authorities, and whenever required by them to do so, and in such manner as they may prescribe. And the City of New York shall have the right to change the material or character of the pavement of any street and highway and bridge, and in that event the grantee, its successors or assigns, shall be bound to replace such pavement in the manner directed by the proper city officer at its own expense, and the provision as to repairs herein contained shall apply to such renewed or altered pavement.

Sixteenth—The said railway company, its successors and assigns, so long as it shall continue to use any of the tracks upon the streets and highways and bridges hereby granted, shall cause the entire roadway of each of the same to be watered at least three times in every twenty-four hours when the thermometer is above 45 degrees Fahrenheit, except that when the width of any roadway between curb lines shall exceed 60 feet, then a roadway of but 60 feet shall be watered as above.

Seventeenth—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained this grant may be forfeited and avoided by the City of New York, by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel on notice of ten days to the said railway company.

Eighteenth—If any of the streets and highways and bridges above referred to, or described, shall not now be open or in use as public highways, no right or franchise therein shall vest in the grantee by virtue of this ordinance until after such streets and highways and bridges shall be legally opened as a public highway, and such right or franchise shall expire at the end of the term created by this ordinance as above set forth. Nothing in this ordinance contained shall be construed as an obligation on the City of New York in respect to the opening of such streets and highways and bridges, nor as in any manner granting property or rights of any kind in or upon its lands now owned or occupied by it under any title, except only the public streets and highways and bridges in the usual acceptance of such terms, which are specifically referred to above.

Section 3. This grant is also upon the further and express condition that the provisions of article 4 of the Railroad Law, as it existed at the time of the adoption of this ordinance applicable thereto, and all laws or ordinances now in force or which may be adopted hereafter affecting the surface railways operating in the City of New York shall be strictly complied with.

Section 4. This grant is also upon the further

and express condition that at any time after five years from the commencement of the operation of any portion of the railway hereby granted, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority, if it deems it necessary in the public interest so to do, may require the grantee, its successors or assigns, in case the railway upon any portion of the routes above described shall consist of a single track, to construct and operate a second track upon any or all of the routes hereby granted, whether on streets, highways and bridges or upon any private property or right-of-way included in any of such routes so as to make a double-track railway.

Section 5. Said grantee shall commence construction within three months from the date when it has obtained complete legal authority to begin construction, including necessary permits from the city officials and departments and shall complete the construction of at least ten miles of single track railway on or before July 1, 1904, otherwise this grant shall be thereupon forfeited and immediately forfeited, without judicial or other proceedings. If upon any of the routes above described, or upon any portion thereof, there shall not be constructed and in actual operation by July 1, 1905, a railway properly equipped and operated as provided by this ordinance, the said route or portion thereof shall be conclusively taken to have been abandoned by the company, and so much of the rights and franchises hereby granted as pertain to such routes, or parts of routes, not then constructed from and after July 1, 1905, shall be thereupon forfeited and immediately forfeited, without judicial or other proceedings. Provided that such time may be extended upon the same conditions as to forfeiture under and for causes specified in section 9 of the Railroad Law, as it now exists, and by a properly executed instrument in writing; and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may similarly extend such time for a period or periods not exceeding one year, if, in their discretion, it seems best so to do, and that the city officials or departments who or which shall at the time of such construction have authority over the said streets and highways and bridges, may similarly extend, by properly executed instrument in writing, such time for a period or periods not exceeding one year further, if reasonable, in their judgment, by reason of requirements as to the manner of construction imposed by the city officials.

Section 6. If for any reason the right or franchise of the grantee in any of the streets, highways and bridges above described shall cease, or if for a period of six successive months the railway tracks upon any of such streets, highways and bridges shall not be operated as provided for in this ordinance, the Comptroller of the City of New York may require the grantee, its successors or assigns, to remove its tracks and other structures upon such streets, highways and bridges within thirty days after notice, and in default of their removal pursuant to such notice, the proper local authorities having jurisdiction may cause them to be removed and the City of New York may recover the cost and expenses of such removal, either by deducting them from the fund deposited as required in section 7 hereof, or by action; and the rights and franchises of the grantee, its successors or assigns, in such portions of the streets, highways and bridges, in case any such exist, shall forthwith and immediately cease upon the removal of such tracks, or structures and without judicial or other proceedings.

Section 7. This grant is upon the express condition that the New York and Long Island Traction Company, within thirty days after the said company has been duly authorized to operate its railway and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred thereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City of New York the sum of three thousand dollars, either in money or in securities to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by such company of the terms and conditions of this grant, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charge for the franchise, the repairs of the street pavement and the removal of snow and ice, and the quality of construction of the railway and, in case of default in the performance by said company of such terms and conditions, the City of New York shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings, or after default in the payment of the annual charges shall collect the same with interest from such fund after ten days' notice in writing to the said company. Or in case of failure to keep the said terms and conditions of this grant relating to the headways of cars, fenders and wheel guards and the heating of the cars and the watering of the streets, the said company shall pay a penalty of \$50 a day for each day of violation, and the further sum of \$10 a day for each car which shall not properly be heated or supplied with fenders and wheel guards in case of the violation of the provisions relating to those matters. In case of any drafts so made upon this security fund, the said company shall, upon thirty days' notice, in writing, pay to the Comptroller of the City of New York a sum of money sufficient to restore the said fund to the original amount of three thousand dollars, and in default thereof the grant hereby made may be cancelled and annulled at the option of the Comptroller of the City of New York, acting on behalf of said city. No action or proceeding or rights under the provisions of this section shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to the City of New York.

Section 8. This grant shall not become operative until said railway company shall duly execute, under its corporate seal, an instrument in writing wherein said company shall promise, covenant and agree on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms and conditions and requirements in this ordinance fixed and contained, and file the same in the office of the Comptroller of the City of New York within ten days after the adoption of this ordinance.

Section 9. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

##### GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy clerk, or clerk thereof, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be included in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City or New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
