## REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES.

## Report of Committee on Finance—

No. 1239.

The Committee on Finance, to whom was referred on November 9, 1906 (Minutes, page 1031), the annexed Budget for 1907, respectfully

## REPORTS:

That your Committee has given great consideration to this matter and has held continuous sessions since the proposed Budget was referred to it on November 10. According to instructions it has held over half a dozen public hearings, to which the heads of departments and bureaus, together with the general public, were invited and attended. Owing to the fact that although careful consideration of the Budget items by the Board of Aldermen is prescribed by the Charter, the Committee was unable to find any precedent established by any preceding Board which it could use as a guide for its method of procedure. Your Committee therefore based its plan of action simply upon the proposition that the Board of Aldermen is the direct representative of the people of the City, with the duty to carefully inquire, on behalf of the people, into the propriety and reasonableness of the allowances of the amounts of the people's money proposed to be made.

At the hearings the questions asked were not so much for the purpose of learning (as at the earlier Board of Estimate and Apportionment hearings) what the money was wanted for, but of ascertaining the specific purposes to which the department heads intended to put the allowance made. The department and bureau heads attended before the Committee and explained their purposes, and in most cases thoroughly co-operated with the Committee, and upon request in many cases submitted itemized statements which will be kept on file.

Of the \$13,500,000 increase of this Budget over the 1906 Budget, \$9,000,000 is made mandatory by statute (\$6,000,000 being advances in the salaries of certain Policemen, Firemen and School Teachers, courts, etc., \$3,000,000 for tax deficiencies), and the remaining \$4,500,000 being deemed necessary by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the proper administration of the City's business.

In going over the Budget, as proposed, the Committee is more than ever convinced that the suggestion made by it to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment with reference to a segregation of items, showing which are granted and which are denied, is absolutely necessary, not only for a proper and economical administration of departments, but also for any adequate consideration by this Board or any inquiring taxpayer. The Committee believes that with this improvement, as provided for the 1908 Budget, a great step towards a readable Budget may be made.

After going over the proposed Budget in its present form, your Committee feels that in most cases no reduction should be recommended by it, because intelligent cuts cannot be made as the Budget is at present, and your Committee does not wish to hamper departmental workings, but it feels that all of the Departments should get along on the appropriations allowed, and only apply for Special Revenue Bonds in cases of emergency. Your Committee's policy has been to get a full and intelligent understanding of the proposed expenditures, rather than for arbitrary Budget paring purposes, and it feels greatly encouraged by the result of its investigations and expects to put the information so gathered to good future use in the City's behalf.

As a general recommendation, the Committee believes that the time has come for large salaries to be sparingly raised, and then only after very careful consideration of the facts, and most of the following reductions are recommended for the reason that your Committee does not believe that the salary raises proposed to be made are justified. As a general proposition, the Committee unanimously believes that if the City's financial condition warrants salary raises, that the \$600 a year Clerks' and the \$2 a day Laborers' claims be first inquired into and adjusted.

The Committee's further recommendations are made in detail in the following:

## The Mayoralty.

The Mayor proposes to increase the salaries of his two Secretaries to \$6,000 each, one from \$4,000 and the other from \$5,000. He has written the following explanatory letter, and, in view of this and because he as Mayor assumes the responsibility for the increases, your Committee believes same should be allowed as he desires:

City of New York—Office of the Mayor, }  
November 26, 1906.

Hon. JOHN R. DAVIES, Chairman, Finance Committee of the Board of Aldermen:

Dear Mr. Davies—In connection with the resolution now pending before the Board of Aldermen, increasing the salaries in the Executive Department, it seems to me proper that you and your colleagues should know something of the duties of those affected.

The functions of the Secretary and the Executive Secretary to the Mayor are interchangeable, their duties being almost exactly similar. These duties are necessarily of a confidential nature, and it is impossible to give an entirely adequate idea of them. The relation of these Secretaries to me is much the same as that of the assistants to the head of a railroad or other large corporation. I have asked that their compensation be fixed at \$6,000 a year, because of my conviction that any less amount would be out of proportion to the work performed.

The Chief Clerk of the Executive Department combines the duties of Chief Clerk and Bond and Warrant Clerk. Under earlier administrations the Executive Department had one Chief Clerk at \$3,200 and one Bond and Warrant Clerk at \$2,200, making a total for the two places of \$5,400. The consolidation of these places at a salary of \$3,000 has been a great saving to the City, and the business of the office has increased to such an extent that this additional salary should in fairness be granted.

I have asked for an increase of \$700 in the salary of my Stenographer, because during many years of service in the Executive Department he has become so familiar with the routine of the Mayor's office as to be invaluable. At my earnest solicitation he has repeatedly turned aside advancement to more lucrative places, and remained in this office.

## Rents.

This provision of \$409,752.89 is for rent for property leased to the City for public offices, etc., for which no provision is made in the separate departmental estimates. The complete list has been submitted to the Committee, and it includes, among others, offices in the

## Law Department.

This Department receives \$685,000, as requested, which represents practically no increase over 1906. The titles, however, are changed, as the Corporation Counsel plans a reorganization on better business lines. The Committee approves of this.

## Borough Presidents.

As the Borough Presidents apportioned their own allowances, the Committee feels, after careful investigation into their budgets, that, barring emergencies, they should be able, with their increased allowances, to get through 1907 without Special Revenue Bonds. Owing to the present unitemized accounts, intelligent reductions could not be made, with the exception of the Queens budget, which was partially itemized, but the Committee feels that as this is a growing borough of great needs, the allowances should be permitted to stand. Each President furnished further itemized estimates to the Committee.

The Bureaus of Incumbrances for Manhattan and Brooklyn cost about \$55,000 per year, and as the Street Cleaning Department claims parallel jurisdiction, the Com-

mittee believes that proper investigation and provision in the future should be made, so that the City will not pay twice for the same work.

## Department of Water Supply.

This is another Department which, owing to unitemized allowances totalling \$5,409,549.25, intelligent reductions cannot be made, and although the Committee does not feel satisfied with the allowances, it does not wish to risk hampering the lighting and water supply maintenance. Two items, however, those of salaries and maintenance of high pressure fire service, Manhattan, \$10,000 and \$5,700 should be stricken from the Budget, as the Commissioner does not expect these to be ready until about August 1, 1907, and some believe not until 1908. If they are ready for maintenance in 1907, Special Revenue Bonds should then be supplied.

## Parks.

Appropriations for all boroughs, \$2,657,863.93. The Commissioners all claim that these allowances are less than for 1906, but your Committee trust that the amounts will be sufficient, as the Board of Estimate and Apportionment evidently intended they should be.

## Charities and Hospitals Department.

Appropriations ..... \$2,218,844 59

The small increases in these Departments will be used for providing a better class of helper, and for maintenance of the new hospitals of Gouverneur, Harlem and Fordham.

## Correction.

Practically no increases.

## Health.

The appropriation of \$1,847,819.66 granted to this Department represents no increase, but proposes to do away with the heretofore large Revenue Bond allowance, which move the Committee commends. Owing to the improved style of estimate used intelligent criticism could be made, but the Committee would recommend no reductions.

## Police.

Your Committee has given very careful consideration to the Police allowances and feel compelled to recommend the following reductions.

Under heading "Police Fund, Salaries of Commissioners, Etc.," \$28,500 is proposed to be allowed with which the Commissioner intends to raise the salaries of three Deputies from \$4,000 to \$6,000 each and to pay the Chaplains at \$1,000 each.

Your Committee believes that inasmuch as several administrations have gone along well upon the present salaries that a change should be carefully made. None of these three Deputies has been engaged in police work for a year and the third Deputy only since April of this year, and a raise of 33 1/3 per cent. is excessive. The Committee believes, however, that owing to the onerous work and responsibility resting upon the Deputy for Brooklyn and Queens that there should be some raise, and it therefore recommends that \$5,000 be allowed to the first and second Deputies and \$4,000 to the third, and would recommend that the first Deputy be designated for Brooklyn and Queens, and when this is done the Committee would recommend a salary of \$6,000 for the first Deputy.

With reference to the proposed allowance of \$1,000 for each of the four Chaplains (no salary now), your Committee does not feel that it has been shown the necessity for paid Chaplains to this Department and would therefore recommend a reduction for that. This fund should therefore read:

- 1 Police Commissioner, \$7,500.
- 2 Deputies at \$5,000 each, \$10,000.
- 1 Deputy at \$4,000.
- 4 Chaplains (no salary).

## Police Fund, Salaries of Inspectors, Surgeons and Uniformed Force.

"Inspectors"—The Budget allows for seventeen Inspectors at \$3,500 each, an increase of three Inspectors over 1906.

Provision was made by the Board last May for these three only upon the Commissioner's statement that the demand for them was urgent. Since there has been no appointment to these offices, and it seems to do as well without them, your Committee therefore recommends a reduction to fourteen, the same as last year; reduction, \$10,500.

"Surgeons"—Allowance for twenty-five Surgeons at \$3,500, instead of twenty-three for 1906. This position is reckoned to be a good place, and the Commissioner has not shown good reason for the increase, and the Committee recommends the same as last year; reduction, \$7,000.

"Uniformed Force"—Budget allows for about 800 additional Patrolmen, and as the Commissioner claims to have restored over 1,000 more detailed men to sidewalk duty, he will now have nearly 2,000 more than his predecessors had, and with which increased force the City should be well policed, and which also will probably allow for an improved system with hours more satisfactory to the men.

"Detective Sergeants"—Budget allows 350 at \$2,000 instead of 251 for 1906. The Commissioner wishes these additional because he cannot get satisfactory service out of the present lot. As Police Commissioner he should get proper service from the City's paid detectives or get rid of them, and your Committee cannot see how a mere increase is going to do anything else than increase the City's expenses. It agrees that the force may not be satisfactory but does not see how an increase will better matters, and therefore recommends reduction of 99 Detective Sergeants at \$2,000; \$198,000 off.

## "Police Department, Salaries for Clerical Force and Employees."

The Budget allows for 1 Private Secretary to the Police Commissioner, \$5,000, a raise of \$2,000 over 1906. This gentleman has only been in the Department since January 1, 1906, and the Committee has not been shown why such a large increase should be made. It recommends that \$3,500, a raise of \$500, be allowed.

The Budget allows for 1 Executive Clerk to the Commissioner at \$3,000, a raise of \$900 over 1906. This gentleman has also only been in the Department since January 1, 1906, and for the same reason as above, the Committee recommends that it be fixed at \$2,500 instead. This should therefore read:

The Committee feels that so long as the Commissioner felt so generous toward the high salaried men, he might have given some little consideration to the 9 Laborers at \$2 per day for whom no request for an increase was made.

#### Street Cleaning.

##### General Administrations.

Allowance for 2 Deputies, one for Brooklyn at \$5,000 and one for The Bronx at \$5,000; two positions.

The Committee has no objection to the Brooklyn allowance but feels that a reasonable allowance for The Bronx Deputy would be \$4,000. Queens pays \$3,000 and Richmond \$2,500, and although The Bronx is a live, growing borough, it is not yet as large or as difficult as Brooklyn.

Allowance should therefore be general. \$47,750 00  
Less off for one Deputy (The Bronx), \$5,000—\$4,000. 1,000 00

#### Uniformed Force.

Budget allowance for 20 District Superintendents at \$2,100 each, a raise from \$1,800 each in 1906; 20 Stable Foremen at \$1,500 each, a raise from \$1,300 each in 1906.

The Committee has not been satisfactorily shown why these substantial raises should be made to the high-salaried men in preference to the low paid and hard-worked Drivers and Sweepers, etc., for whom no raise was requested or allowed, and they therefore recommend that no increase be allowed. It should therefore read:

20 District Superintendents, from \$2,100 to \$1,800. \$6,000 00  
20 Stable Foremen, from \$1,500 to \$1,300. 4,000 00

Allowance \$270,400 00

As long as scows will probably be used for many years to come, it seems to the Committee that it might be good business to consider buying them instead of a large rental, about \$50,000, annually.

With reference to hire of harbor scows, costing the City about \$15,000 annually, it seems that the City should not have to pay for this removal of ashes, etc., from vessels in the harbor, as the scow owners not only receive payment from the City, but also are able to sell the cinders collected at a good price. The Commissioner should look into this.

#### Fire Department.

##### Bureau of Chief of Department Payroll.

Budget allows for 8 Chaplains at \$1,000, an increase of 4 Chaplains over 1906. The Commissioner explained that these Chaplains attended large fires and administered to the injured. The Committee commends the attendance and services of the clergy at such, but believes, as the Commissioner agreed, that at all serious fires the neighboring clergy and priests are always available and agreeable and cheerfully volunteer. This is as it should be, and therefore the Committee feels that there is no necessity for a paid Chaplain service in the departments. The two gentlemen who started it did so as volunteers, and because of their great interest in this fine department, and it would seem to encourage an expensive and needless innovation, and one which we do not believe either the general clergy or the men desire. The Committee would therefore recommend the reduction in this account of 8 Chaplains at \$1,000 each to its present amount, 4 Chaplains at \$1,000 each, \$4,000.

#### Engine and Hook and Ladder Companies Payrolls, \$5,193,590.36.

This contemplates an increase in the number of Firemen which is necessary for the proper and increased fire protection. The Committee approves of this full allowance, and takes this occasion of refuting one erroneous newspaper statement that the Committee or its Chairman is opposed to the Firemen's time-off allowance. This allowance should be sufficient answer to this.

#### Board of Assessors.

Budget allows:

Salaries of 3 Assessors at \$5,000 each, \$15,000, an increase of \$2,000 over 1906.

The Committee has made investigation, but has not been shown why this increase should be made, as the three incumbents are able to attend to their outside business affairs, and a \$5,000 Secretary is allowed to take care of the management. The Committee therefore recommends that the allowance be the same as 1906.

#### County Offices.

The county offices, including courts, national guard, etc., increases are mainly statutory and mandatory.

##### Comptroller.

The allowance of \$1,135,450 to this office represents an increase which the Comptroller intends to use for reorganizing and rearranging his staff, and the Committee feels that he should be allowed this leeway.

##### Department of Education.

This Department was allowed. \$24,915,928 16  
Of which General Fund for Teachers, etc. 19,845,870 58

And balance of \$5,070,057 58

—for administrative and office purposes.

The Committee have endeavored to inquire into the details of this allowance, but were not as successful (perhaps through misunderstanding) as they would wish. The Board does not meet to apportion until December, and until then official information cannot be obtained. Most of the allowance is mandatory, but the Committee believes that with reference to its office force, etc., the Department should act the same as other City departments receiving City money. Under present circumstances the Committee cannot make intelligent reduction.

The Committee feel that with more time allowed them better results could have been obtained.

They recommend the adoption of the annexed resolution.

Resolved, That the Budget for 1907, as submitted to the Board of Aldermen by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, be and the same is hereby amended as follows:

By striking out under heading "Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity," words and figures "\$10,000, High Pressure Fire Service," making total for salaries Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, \$403,233.

## THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

## FOR CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

All such appropriations being made subject to the following conditions:

1. The accounts of all charitable institutions receiving public moneys shall be so kept as to show receipts and disbursements in such form as shall be satisfactory to the Comptroller, showing the addresses of the parents, guardians, or nearest relatives of inmates, and other information designed to facilitate inquiry into their financial inability to provide for such inmates.
2. Moneys received from the City Treasury shall be used by such institutions only for recurring expenses of "care, support, education and maintenance."
3. All institutions receiving public moneys shall be at all reasonable times open to the visitation and inspection of duly authorized representatives of the Department of Public Charities and the Department of Finance.
4. Upon it appearing to the satisfaction of the Comptroller that it would be to the public interests to withhold payments to any charitable institution for which an appropriation has been made, he shall give written notice to such institution of his intention to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to so withhold such payments, and upon the determination of said Board that such payment should terminate, the right of any such institution to receive payment for services rendered thereafter shall thereupon cease.
5. Except where appropriations are made in bulk and not upon a per capita basis, no payment shall be made for inmates of private charitable institutions unless the same shall have been accepted by the Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities as a proper charge against the City, and except in emergency cases, Commissioner of Charities shall not accept as proper charges against the City inmates capable of paying for their own support or for whose care adequate provision can be made in public institutions. The City shall not become liable for any payment to a charitable institution in excess of the appropriation which may have been made to such institution, notwithstanding any per capita rates of payment that may have been fixed for the inmates thereof.
6. All institutions receiving money from the City are required to state specifically the amount so received, as from the City Treasury, in their printed annual reports.
7. "That no money be paid to any private charitable institution which pays any salary to or gives any consideration, financial or of any kind, for services to, or that has any business dealing with, or secures goods or merchandise, directly or indirectly, from any officer or trustee or member of its Board of Managers."
8. Where the City is paying 5 per cent. and upward of the cost of maintenance of an institution the Board of Estimate and Apportionment requires representation in the board meetings of that institution, with the right of taking part in all business transactions. This representation shall be through the Comptroller, who may attend any meeting, either in person or through a representative appointed by him, of which appointment the Comptroller will give written notice to the board of the institution.
9. The Board of Estimate and Apportionment will not pay for the maintenance of dependent and delinquent children in the same institution.
10. The rates of payments to private charitable institutions, unless otherwise specially provided for, are fixed for the various classes of inmates as follows:

That charitable institutions for children now carried in the Budget and not sending their inmates to the Public Schools, and not sharing in the Corporate School Fund, and not receiving Teachers and school supplies from the Board of Education, but giving in their own buildings secular education to the children residing in the institutions, shall be paid a per capita of 7 cents per day, five school days in the week, for each child receiving such instruction of four years of age and over during ten months in the year. This money to be paid under the authorization of section 230 of the Charter, but under the general conditions relating to institutions receiving Corporate School money, as provided in section 1154.

It is the judgment of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that all children should be fully surrendered by their parents or guardians to the institutions to which they may be committed and the Commissioner of Charities is requested to secure such surrenders as far as possible.

Magistrates are requested to transfer dependent, and when judicious, no proper guardianship in children, and all cases coming to their attention in the courts where no crime is proven against the child to the Commissioner of Charities, who can commit to institutions. Magistrates are earnestly requested not to commit a dependent child to an institution on a Court commitment.

The Commissioner of Charities is instructed to take such steps, either by appeal to the national authorities or by proper bills to the Legislature, as to provide that the children of emigrants abandoned within one year after arrival in this City be returned to the country whence they came.

Quotations from Communications Received by the Merchants' Association of New York Favoring the Adoption of an Ordinance Requiring the Proper Numbering of Buildings and Residences.

R. H. Macy & Co.—We are unequivocally in favor of it, as it would greatly alleviate the difficulties we now experience in delivering our merchandise. We see no reason why, if the ordinance be good for the Borough of Manhattan, it should not be equally beneficial to the other boroughs.

C. D. Austin, Superintendent, National Express Company—There certainly should be numbers on all houses, properly displayed so that they could be seen in the day time. As to being seen at night, I think it would be a hardship to compel a man to keep a light burning all night in order to have the number of his house visible at all times.

H. C. F. Koch & Co.—We are suffering a great deal of inconvenience in our delivery department by not having the residences plainly numbered. We feel that this measure ought to become a law, as it is certainly a great inconvenience not to be able to distinguish the house numbers, and we are in favor to have it apply to all the boroughs as well as Manhattan Borough.

H. L. Julier, Vice-President and General Manager, American Express Company—We think this is a move in the right direction, and in our opinion it should go still further and be made applicable to the Boroughs of The Bronx, Brooklyn and Queens.

Donald Wilson, Superintendent, the Long Island Express—From our standpoint such an ordinance would be very desirable not only in Manhattan, but in all of Greater New York. As it is, we are subjected to inconvenience through the absence of proper street numbers on houses.

Sir—Hon. Louis F. Haffen, President of the Borough of The Bronx, in communication under date of November 1, 1906, calls attention to the necessity for the construction of a temporary bridge over the tracks of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad at Mott avenue, Borough of The Bronx, and requests that provision be made by the Board for the expenses attendant upon the construction of the temporary bridge during the construction of the permanent bridge at this locality. I would report:

By agreement dated October 8, 1906, between the City and the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, prepared, pursuant to a resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on December 29, 1905, the railroad company agrees to construct a bridge over its right of way at Mott avenue, Borough of The Bronx, in accordance with a map or plan, dated December 28, 1905, prepared by the railroad company, the City to bear one-quarter (¼) of the cost thereof, not including the cost of excavation and back filling for abutments, and the railroad company to bear the remainder of the cost thereof, including the entire cost of excavation and back filling for abutments. The question is raised by President Haffen that the cost of erecting the temporary bridge is not provided for in the resolution or in the agreement for the construction of a bridge over the right of way at Mott avenue.

While it is not definitely stated that the construction of a temporary bridge is included in the agreement, it is my opinion that it is fair to assume, since it is necessary to provide for traffic during the construction of the new permanent bridge, that the construction of a temporary bridge might and should be considered a part of the necessary apparatus of the work contiguous to the construction of the permanent bridge, and as such I would suggest that you recommend to the Board that President Haffen's communication be returned with a statement that the Board considers it unnecessary to adopt an additional resolution and is its opinion that the agreement, dated October 8, 1906, and prepared pursuant to a resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on December 29, 1905, for the construction of a bridge over the right of way of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad at Mott avenue is broad enough to permit of the construction of a temporary bridge during the construction of a permanent bridge, upon the terms and conditions as set forth in said agreement, and the cost of which will be divided in the same ratio, to wit, one-quarter (¼) of said expense to be borne by the City, and the remainder, three-quarters (¾), to be borne by the railroad company, and that a certified copy of said action of the Board be attached to the aforesaid agreement.

I would further call to your attention that no appropriation has been made to provide for the City's share of the expense of the construction of this bridge; the estimated cost of the improvement in which the City is to pay one-quarter (¼) is about \$80,800.

In order to meet all contingencies, I would suggest that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, pursuant to section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, authorize the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock to the amount of \$25,000 to provide for the City's share in the construction of a bridge over the right of way of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad at Mott avenue, as per agreement, dated October 8, 1906, prepared in pursuance to a resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on December 29, 1905.

AN ORDINANCE providing for an issue of Corporate Stock in the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000), to provide means for the City's share of the cost of constructing a bridge over the right-of-way of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad at Mott avenue in the Borough of The Bronx.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen hereby approves of and concurs in the following resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment November 23, 1906, and authorizes the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount and for the purposes therein specified:

Sir—On November 17, 1906, you forwarded to me the following resolution of the Board of Aldermen, adopted November 13, 1906:

"Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel of The City of New York be and he is hereby requested to inform this Board as to the obligation of the builders of the subway to restore the surface of Broadway to its original condition, and, if such builders of the subway are liable under their contract for construction of the road, why action has not been taken against the said builders and contractors to enforce the restoration to the original condition of this important thoroughfare."

The obligation of the builders of the subway is dependent upon the provisions of the Rapid Transit Act, chapter 4 of the Laws of 1891, and amendments, and upon the stipulations contained in the contract between the City, acting through the Rapid Transit Commissioners, and John B. McDonald.

Section 4 of the Rapid Transit Act, as amended, authorizes the Rapid Transit Commissioners to locate a route of the subway under public parks, lands, places and streets, with certain exceptions not material to this case.

Section 24 of the same act authorizes the corporation to construct its roads under such streets or avenues as may have been designated by the Rapid Transit Commissioners, and Broadway is such a street. The same section, subdivision 5, provides that in all cases where the surface of the streets has been necessarily disturbed by the construction of the road, it shall be restored to the condition in which it was before excavations were made, as near as may be.

On page 70 of the contract between the City and the contractor for the construction of the subway, it is provided that reasonable precautions must be taken to protect from injury all trees, shrubs, other plants and grass plots, as may be called for by the authorities specially charged with the care of the public parks, and that such trees as are found along the line of the route and between the necessary side lines of excavation are to be supported in place and saved, if possible, and that for every tree removed or killed, the contractor shall set out a new, thrifty tree of similar kind.

The duty imposed upon the contractor by the statute and by his contract with the City to restore the surface of Broadway, both in the roadway and parkway, still continues.

I have been informed by the Secretary and the Chief Engineer of the Rapid Transit Commission, that the contractor has made several efforts to replace the trees removed, but that those planted have died, and that he is now engaged in planting new ones.

The Board of Aldermen probably can be informed why action has not been taken against the builders of the subway to enforce the restoration of Broadway by the administrative departments of the City government having control, namely, the Park Department and the President of the Borough of Manhattan.

The Committee held a public hearing, at which the residents of that locality, led by Alderman Schloss, appeared and greatly condemned the present state of affairs and demanded improvement. It seems that these were very pretty grass plots, with trees, until the subway construction, which destroyed them. The building contract provided that the constructors were to properly restore these plots to their former good state under a penalty, but same has not been done and the plots will have to be completely cleaned, and good earth, fertilizer and sod placed there. The Committee believe that steps should be taken immediately by the Park Commissioners to either obtain an appropriation for this or to have the Corporation Counsel recover from the Subway Company for replacing these plots or advise that it cannot be done. It believes that at this time there is no reason for this appropriation for railings, as these would be more of a nuisance than a benefit, and therefore recommends a rejection of this ordinance.

The Police Department is hereby empowered to issue, upon application therefor, a permit for such right of way to any duly registered physician, which permit shall not be transferable.

"Whereas, The system is at variance with metropolitan ideas and advancement and would not be tolerated even in a fourth rate town in some remote district half a century behind the age; and

"Whereas, All modern facilities and comforts of transportation are absent conspicuously from this system, the cars in use being lacking in carrying capacity and proper means of heating and lighting; and

"Whereas, The number of cars kept in service is incapable of meeting the public need, and these cars are usually in a filthy condition, foul smelling, disease-breeding, and a constant menace to health; and

"Whereas, The thousands of workers of the densely inhabited district below Fourteenth street, which is traversed by the horse car lines, are unable to secure conveyance to and from their places of employment because of the continuance of this system, or do secure transportation only under abominable and intolerable conditions; and

"Whereas, These conditions are of such a character that persons with even only a remnant of a sense of decency or self-preservation left prefer to walk rather than to subject themselves to these horrors; and

"Whereas, Women and girls who by force of circumstances—a desire to escape from rain and mud in the street—venture to avail themselves of the shelter of these cars, have inflicted upon them tortures that put to shame our civilization and our manhood; and

"Whereas, This horse car system, unspeakable as it is and unworthy of our city—a subject for the ridicule of the country and of visitors from all the world—and without a place in our civic economy, has been condemned and ordered abolished by the State Railroad Commission; and

"Whereas, The New York City Railroad Company, commonly known as the Metropolitan Street Railway, has ignored the orders of the railroad commissioners and utterly failed to carry out or attempt to carry out their recommendations, not deigning even to communicate with them as to their intentions, although requested so to do; and

"Whereas, In view of these facts and feeling that relief would only come to them under compulsion, the people of the East Side have petitioned the Mayor and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to the end that such relief might be afforded them by the city authorities; and

"Whereas, Such petition has been taken under consideration and referred to the Bureau of Franchises, so that the validity of the franchises under which the condemned horse car lines are operated may be investigated; and

"Whereas, This Board directly represents the people and is the conservator of their rights, interests and privileges; therefore be it

Resolved, That we hereby join in condemning this horse car system of transportation as unsuited to our time, a disgrace to our city and a danger to its inhabitants, and call for its immediate abolition.

"That we hereby demand of the operating railroad company that it forthwith comply with the orders and recommendations of the Railroad Commissioners and substitute electric for horse power and modern cars for those out-of-date, unserviceable vehicles now in use on all lines indicated by said Railroad Commissioners.

"That we desire to commend the people of the East Side for their extraordinary patience in submitting so long to this vile car service, and direct the Committee on Railroads to fix a time for a public hearing on the question at a day as early as practicable, when the citizens who are affected shall have opportunity to come forward and state the grievances from which they suffer and put this Board in full possession of all the facts of the case.

"That the deplorable transportation conditions existing on the East Side are of such a character that we hereby urge upon the Mayor and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to take such action as the needs of the situation require to the end that the prayer of the thousands of our fellow citizens may be answered and the relief therein sought granted; and be it further

"Resolved, That the City Clerk be and is hereby instructed to transmit forthwith a copy hereof to his Honor the Mayor."

In the matter of the application of the Long Island Railroad Company, as lessee of the Nassau Electric Railroad Company, and said Nassau Electric Railroad Company, for the construction of an electric railroad on portions of Atlantic avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

The petition of the undersigned respectfully shows:

First—By chapter 256 of the Laws of 1832, the Brooklyn and Jamaica Railroad Company was organized and empowered to construct a railroad, "with such appendages as may be deemed necessary for the convenient use of the same," between Brooklyn and Jamaica.

In addition to the general powers given by law, the corporation was authorized to prescribe the manner in which the railroad should be used, and by what force the carriages to be used thereon may be propelled.

Second—That thereafter it constructed a steam surface railroad upon a right of way which it acquired by purchase or condemnation proceedings, portions of which line were included within the limits of what is now Atlantic avenue.

Third—By chapter 178 of the Laws of 1834 the Long Island Railroad Company was organized and empowered to construct a railroad from Greenport to a point on the waters adjacent to Brooklyn, "with such appendages as may be deemed necessary for the convenient use of the same," with power to prescribe the manner in which its road shall be used, and by what force the carriages to be used thereon may be propelled.

Fourth—By chapter 94 of the Laws of 1836 the Brooklyn and Jamaica Railroad Company was authorized to lease its railroad from Brooklyn to Jamaica to the Long Island Railroad Company, and it was provided that the use of the said Brooklyn and Jamaica Railroad, under such lease, should be taken as a performance of the obligations on the part of the Long Island Railroad Company to construct its road from Greenport to Brooklyn.

Fifth—This lease was made of all the corporate rights and franchises of the said Brooklyn and Jamaica Railroad Company, and has been extended from time to time, and now has seventy (70) years to run. The Long Island Railroad Company under it and under its own charter has been for many years operating a double-track steam railroad over the right of way formerly of the Brooklyn and Jamaica Railroad Company, situated in the centre of what is now Atlantic avenue, from the junction of Atlantic and Flatbush avenues, in the Borough of Brooklyn to Jamaica and points eastward thereof.

Sixth—The Brooklyn and Jamaica Railroad Company was foreclosed and its property conveyed to the Atlantic Avenue Railroad Company or Brooklyn, and said Atlantic Avenue Railroad Company of Brooklyn was, on or about January 26, 1899, merged with the Nassau Electric Railroad Company, and the Nassau Electric Railroad Company is now possessed of all its property and franchises.

Seventh—By chapter 499 of the Laws of 1897, for the improvement of Atlantic avenue and for the removal of the steam railroad of the Long Island Railroad Company from the surface, it was provided that the railroad of the Atlantic Avenue Railroad Company of Brooklyn, "now leased and operated by the Long Island Railroad Company," between Flatbush avenue and Atkins avenue, should be changed by said companies "by depressing the same from Flatbush avenue to near the easterly side of Bedford avenue, so as to leave the surface free from the steam railroad tracks, fences and gates of the steam railroad of the Long Island Railroad Company then existing thereon." From this point the right of way of the railroad should be operated in an open cut, to a point between Bedford and Nostrand avenues. From there running east the tracks should be raised and run on an elevated structure to the easterly side of Ralph avenue. From Ralph avenue the tracks were to descend to the grade of Atlantic avenue, at a point between Ralph and Howard avenues. From there they were to be operated in an open cut to the west side of Cooper place. From there they were to be placed below the surface of the street to a point near the east side of Stone avenue. From there the right of way should be through an open cut to a point near the westerly side of Jardine place, where it should coincide with the grade of Atlantic avenue. From there eastward it should be operated on a surface grade to near the easterly side of Snediker avenue. At this point the tracks were to be elevated, passing over Williams avenue at a height of eight feet, and over Alabama avenue at a height of twelve feet, and from the easterly side of Alabama avenue the tracks should be operated over an elevated structure to a point near Linwood avenue. From there they should descend to the grade of Atlantic avenue, near Atkins avenue, and from that point eastward should be operated on the existing grade.

Eighth—Said act also provided that when completed the Long Island Railroad Company, as lessee of the Atlantic Avenue Railroad Company of Brooklyn, was authorized and directed to run its trains "over such improvement and the road of such railroad as constructed and authorized by law," and no cars of other companies, without permission of the said the Long Island Railroad Company, shall be run thereon or thereunder.

Ninth—By chapter 497 of the Laws of 1899 it is provided that whenever any right of way, grade or tracks of any steam railroad in any street, in any city of the first class, are required by law to be changed or altered by elevating or depressing the same for the purpose of discontinuing the use of steam power upon the surface of said highway or street, such alteration or change of grade shall not be deemed to curtail or affect any right which such company, or its lessees or assigns, may have to maintain and operate a surface passenger railroad within the limits of the right of way so depressed or elevated, and over or under the railroad tracks so depressed or elevated, with all turnouts, sidings or tracks necessary to secure the continuous connection of portions of such surface railroad. In the event that any such turnouts, sidings or tracks shall extend beyond the lines of the right of way of such railroad corporation whose tracks have been so depressed or elevated in or upon any of the streets or highways aforesaid, such turnouts, sidings or tracks so extending beyond the lines of such right of way shall only be constructed upon condition that the consent of the owners of one-half in value of the property bounded, and the consent also of the local authorities having the control of that portion of such street or highway upon which it is proposed to construct such turnout, siding or tracks, shall be first obtained. No such railroad shall be operated by steam locomotives, and shall not be used except for passenger traffic.

Tenth—That the change of grade provided in and by the aforesaid acts for the improvement of Atlantic avenue has been duly made, such portions of the aforesaid track required by said act to be depressed below the surface of the street have been so depressed, and such portions as were required to be elevated have been elevated, that the connections between the same have been constructed, and the trains of the



Long Island Railroad Company are now being operated thereon by electricity.

Eleventh—That the tracks for an electrical railroad have been laid upon the aforesaid right of way of the said railroad, over or under the said improvement, with the exception of the following portions thereof, viz.:

1. From the westerly side of Bedford avenue to a point midway between Nostrand avenue and New York avenue.

2. From a point opposite Columbus place to a point near Louis place.

3. From a point opposite Olive place to a point nearly opposite Alabama avenue, with the exception of the portion of the south side of Atlantic avenue, between Snediker and Georgia avenues, occupied by the tracks of the Brooklyn and Rockaway Beach Railroad Company, over which the Long Island Railroad Company has the right to operate.

At these points, where either the cuts are located (being the portions of said right of way by which the trains from the depressed subway reach the surface), or the inclined portion of the elevated structure extends from the grade of the avenue to a place where there is sufficient headroom for the cars to pass thereunder. At these points the existence of these obstacles make it impossible to operate a continuous railroad upon the surface of said right of way.

Twelfth—That in order to secure a continuous connection and operation of said surface railroad, it is necessary that a turnout or siding, consisting of a single track on each side of said right of way, should be constructed in the various portions of Atlantic avenue lying between the points aforesaid, and also that the same should be connected with the tracks of the street surface railroads intersecting the same. That such sidings and connections have been duly located, and that the portions of the streets proposed to be occupied thereby are, and the general line of the improvement is designated on the blue print hereto annexed, marked "A." Drawing No. R-4. Maps showing each one of such sidings in detail are also hereto annexed, marked "B," "C," "D," "E" and "F" show the location of the poles carrying the electric wires.

Thirteenth—That your petitioners are advised and believe that under the statutes aforesaid, and under the provisions of law relative to the subject, your petitioners are authorized to construct said turnouts and sidings and to operate an electric railroad over the same in connection with the line constructed upon the surface of the aforesaid right of way as aforesaid, upon obtaining the consent of the local authorities of the City of New York, and the consent of the majority of the owners of the property abutting on said sidings, or, in lieu of the latter, the consent of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court.

Fourteenth—That your petitioners have used diligent efforts to obtain the consent of the majority of said abutting owners, but have been unable so to do, and are now about to apply to the Appellate Division for its consent in lieu thereof.

Fifteenth—That the portions of Atlantic avenue over which the petitioners desire to obtain the consent of the City to operate is only a very small portion of the entire route of the proposed railroad, the remainder being upon the property of your petitioners.

That this proposed railroad will be a trolley railroad of the most modern character, and its construction and operation will be a great public convenience, and will, as your petitioners are informed and believe, largely enhance the value of the property abutting on Atlantic avenue and of that in the vicinity. That your petitioners believe that a rental of one hundred dollars (\$100) a year for a franchise to operate each of four turnouts, or the aggregate annual rent of four hundred dollars (\$400) (which represents a capitalization of four per centum of \$10,000), would be a reasonable rent to pay for such privileges, and your petitioners hereby offer to pay the same to the City for its consent to such construction.

Wherefore, your petitioners respectfully pray that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment will grant to the Nassau Electric Railroad Company and the Long Island Railroad Company, as lessee of the Nassau Electric Railroad Company, the consent of the City of New York for the construction of a double track electrical railroad to be laid on the surface of Atlantic avenue in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, one track thereof to be laid on each side of said avenue in the portions thereof adjoining the places where the right of way of the Long Island Railroad Company above mentioned is obstructed by the elevated and depressed tracks, to wit:

1. Leaving the said right of way at a point forty (40) feet westerly from the westerly side of Bedford avenue, and thence running with a single track on each side of the line of the said right of way and the inner rail of said tracks to be about four (4) feet distant therefrom, to a point about one hundred and fifty (150) feet easterly from the easterly line of Nostrand avenue, and thence curving inward, intersecting the said right of way and connecting with the tracks thereon.

2. Leaving the said right of way at a point about opposite the easterly line (if extended) of Columbus place, and running with a single track on each side of the line of the said right of way and the inner rail of said tracks to be about four (4) feet distant therefrom, to a point about opposite to the easterly side of Cooper place (if extended), and thence curving inward, intersecting the said right of way, and connecting with the tracks thereon.

3. Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.

## OFFICIAL JOURNAL OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

There shall be published daily, Sundays and legal holidays excepted, under a contract to be made as hereinafter provided, a paper to be known as the CITY RECORD. And said CITY RECORD, and the newspapers now by law designated as corporation newspapers in the present City of Brooklyn, shall be the only papers to be included within the term corporation newspapers, as the same is used anywhere in this act; . . . . There shall be inserted in said CITY RECORD nothing aside from such official matters as are expressly authorized. . . . . All advertising required to be done for the City, except as in this act otherwise specially provided, and all notices required by law or ordinance to be published in corporation papers, shall be inserted at the public expense only in the CITY RECORD, and the publication therein shall be a sufficient compliance with any law or ordinance requiring publication of such matters or notices. . . . . The Comptroller shall cause a continuous series of the CITY RECORD to be bound as completed, quarterly, and to be deposited with his certificate thereon in the office of the Register of Deeds of the County of New York in the County Clerk's office of said County, and in the office of the City Clerk, and copies of the contents of any of the same, certified by such Register, County Clerk or City Clerk, shall be received in judicial proceedings as prima facie evidence of the truth of the contents thereof.—§1526, *Greater New York Charter*.
