To the Board of Education:

Gentlemen—The Special Committee on Methods, etc., of the Board of Examiners respectfully report that at a conference held yesterday, at which Messrs. Man, Harrison, Winthrop and Field were present on behalf of the committee, and Messrs. Byrnes, Smith and O'Connell were present on behalf of the Board of Examiners, several modifications of the resolutions presented by this committee in its report of November 21, 1905, were agreed upon and a general understanding arrived at as to the disposition of all the resolutions contained in that report. This understanding is set forth in the following memorandum, which presents the action of the conference on each of the resolutions:

The Resolutions Proposed by the Committee in its Report Dated November 21, 1905 (See Journal, pages 2368-69), as Modified in Consultation Between the Members of the Committee who Signed the Report and the Members of the Board of Examiners.

(1) Resolved, That it is the sense of this Board that the proper construction of the portion of section 1089 of the Charter relating to the appointment of assistants to the Board of Examiners is that the names of the persons suggested for such appointment shall be presented to this Board for the consent or approval required by the statute, whether such persons are intended to serve with or without compensation; and

Resolved, That this committee recommends, after conference with the Board of Examiners, that the City Superintendent shall at the first meeting of the Board of Education in January and at such other times as may be necessary present to the Board for its approval a list of persons who may be employed temporarily as assistants to the Board of Examiners at any time during the remainder of the calendar year and until the list for the next ensuing year shall have been approved.

(2) Assented to and not changed (see page 2368).

(3) Assented to and not changed (see page 2368).

(4) Assented to as modified in the supplemental report (see page 2481).

(5) Resolved, That it is the sense of this Board that rejected applicants for licenses should be informed by letter, circular or special form for the purpose, of the subjects in which they have failed, including the several special tests, with the percentage attained in each, and in cases where the formal examination has been passed, of the reason of rejection, and that such letter or form should state that full information of the exact grounds of rejection will be freely given to any such applicant, upon request made in person or by letter.

(6) Resolved, That it is the sense of this Board that all notices of examination should contain a concise statement of the academic, professional and other qualifications necessary for eligibility, and should contain a notice to those intending to apply that the Board of Examiners will inform all persons who submit by mail or otherwise, in advance of the formal examinations, a statement of the credentials they intend to offer as evidence of their eligibility, whether or not they are eligible to take the examinations.

(7) Resolved, That it is the sense of this Board that in the case of examination for license No. 1 there should be no discrimination by way of marks or counts for previous record or experience in the case of candidates who have just graduated from institutions for the training of teachers.

The second resolution under this head is to be laid over with a view to further consultation between the committee and the Board of Examiners and to presenting practical suggestions on this topic which will meet with mutual approval.

(8) Resolved, That it is the sense of this Board that in the case of applicants for license as principal or assistant to principal a greater proportion than heretofore of the marks or counts established standing upon the eligible lists should be given for the previous teaching or supervising experience of the applicant, and that the Board of Examiners be and they hereby are requested to report to the Board of Education at an early date a plan to carry this resolution into effect.

The committee therefore recommends the adoption of the resolutions as above set forth, and that the second resolution appearing in the committee's report under the numeral 7 be laid over until the further report of this committee.

BOARD OF REVISION OF ASSESSMENTS.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
