Dr. W. H. Smith, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

From February 20 to February 26, inclusive, the following operations were performed, at all of which the attending surgeons or their assistants were present: Bellevue Hospital, 54; Gouverneur Hospital, 13; Harlem Hospital, 20; Fordham Hospital, 8.

In accordance with the rules, a fire drill was held at Harlem Hospital on February 25, and at Gouverneur and Bellevue Hospitals on February 26.

Six Special Nurses have been authorized since the last meeting of the Board. These were needed to care for patients critically ill, post-operative cases and for isolation. Two are still on duty, and four were on duty one day only. Approval is asked for.

Mrs. Fowler, a member of the Board of Managers of the Bellevue Training School, desires to provide a kindergarten for the benefit of the children going to the dental clinic. The other half of Ward 5, which is not in use at present, would be used for the kindergarten for the waiting children. Authority was given to start this work. It is recommended that the same be continued if it proves successful.

In investigating the financial condition of applicants for admission to the hospital and their ability to pay for their board and care, it is found that many are willing to pay, but feel that they can afford to pay \$1, but not \$1.50 a day. It is recommended that \$1.50 a day be charged all non-residents and all residents who are able to pay, and

that \$1 a day be charged residents of New York who are willing to pay the same, but are unable to pay \$1.50 a day.

A letter has been received from Wells & Newton, contractors for completing the steamfitting repairs in the Mills' Training School Building. They ask for an extension of time from February 21 to April 1. The work is practically complete now and is in use. There are certain air lines not quite finished, and the request is made on account of the strike of the steamfitters. It is recommended that this extension be allowed.

It is recommended that the Secretary to the President be made a notary public.

A letter has been received from the Presbyterian Hospital, asking that arrangements be made in the printing of the revised nomenclature of Bellevue Hospital whereby the Presbyterian Hospital may obtain 150 copies. It is recommended that the Presbyterian Hospital be given permission to arrange with the printer for 150 copies of the revised nomenclature, the expense of same to be borne by that hospital.

It is recommended that Dr. William H. Stewart be appointed X-Ray Photographer for Harlem and Gouverneur hospitals at a salary of \$1,800 a year, his name appearing first on the Civil Service list.

A requisition for articles purchased during the latter part of 1908, as samples, to be used in connection with specifications for furnishings has been received. Instructions to sign this requisition are desired. The amount involved is \$115.14.

It is recommended that the Committee on Supplies be empowered to award the contract for blankets for the Nurses' residence.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the appointment of Special Nurses reported by the General Medical Superintendent was approved.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the establishment of a kindergarten, either in the children's medical wards or in connection with the dental service, as may be recommended by the General Medical Superintendent, was approved.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, it was

Resolved, That \$1.50 a day be charged to non-resident patients, and that resident patients who are willing to pay part, but not able to pay the regular charge of \$1.50 a day, be charged \$1 a day.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, it was

Resolved, To allow Wells & Newton a further extension of time on their contract for steamfitting and repairs in the Mills' Training School until April 1, 1910.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the recommendation that the Secretary to the President be made a notary public was approved.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, it was

Resolved, To permit the Presbyterian Hospital to arrange with the printer for 150 copies of the revised Bellevue nomenclature, as recommended.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, Dr. William H. Stewart was appointed X-Ray Photographer for Harlem and Gouverneur hospitals at a salary of \$1,800 a year.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the General Medical Superintendent was authorized to sign a requisition amounting to \$115.14 for the samples used in connection with the specifications for the furnishings for the new training school.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the Committee on Supplies was empowered to award a contract for blankets for the Nurses' residence.

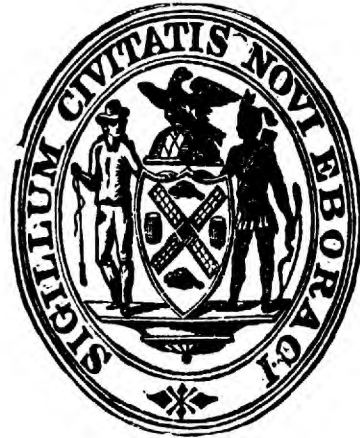

All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. Second—That the undersigned Commissioner of Assessment has completed his estimate of benefit and that all persons interested in this proceeding, or in any of the lands, tenements and hereditaments and premises affected thereby, having any objections thereto, do file their said objections, in writing, duly verified, with him at his office, No. 166 Montague street, in the Borough of Brooklyn, in The City of New York, on or before the 9th day of April, 1910, and that the said Commissioner will hear parties so objecting, and for that purpose will be in attendance at his said office on the 12th day of April, 1910, at 11 o'clock a. m.

Third—That the Commissioner of Assessment has assessed any or all such lands, tenements and hereditaments and premises as are within the area of assessment fixed and prescribed as the area of assessment for benefit by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on the 8th day of May, 1908, and that the said area of assessment includes all those lands, tenements and hereditaments and premises situate and being in the Borough of Brooklyn, in The City of New York, which, taken together, are bounded and described as follows, viz.:

Beginning at a point on the line midway between Eighteenth avenue and Nineteenth avenue,

where it is intersected by a line midway between Seventy-fifth street and Seventy-sixth street, and running thence southeastwardly along the said line midway between Seventy-fifth street and Seventy-sixth street, to the intersection with a line midway between Nineteenth avenue and Twentieth avenue; thence southwardly along the said line midway between Nineteenth avenue and Twentieth avenue; thence southwardly along the said line midway between Nineteenth avenue and Twentieth avenue to a point distant 100 feet southwestwardly from the southerly line of Eighty-sixth street; thence northwestwardly and parallel with Eighty-sixth street to the intersection with a line bisecting the angle formed by the prolongations of the center lines of Eighteenth and Nineteenth avenues as laid out southwestwardly from Eighty-second street; thence northeastwardly along the said bisecting line to the intersection with a line midway between Eighteenth avenue and Nineteenth avenue as laid out northeastwardly from Eighty-second street; thence northeastwardly along the said line midway between Eighteenth avenue and Nineteenth avenue to the point or place of beginning.

Fourth—That the abstracts of said estimate of damage and of said assessment for benefit, together with the damage and benefit maps, and also all the affidavits, estimates, proofs and other documents used by the Commissioners of Estimate and by the Commissioner of Assessment in making the same, have been deposited in the Bureau of Street Openings in the Law Department of The City of New York, No. 166 Montague street, in the Borough of Brooklyn, in said City, there to remain until the 20th day of April, 1910.

Fifth—That, provided there be no objections filed to either of said abstracts, the reports as to awards and as to assessments for benefit herein will be presented for confirmation to the Supreme Court of the State of New York, Second Department, at a Special Term thereof, to be held in the County Court House, in the Borough of Brooklyn, in The City of New York, on the 25th day of May, 1910, at the opening of the Court on that day.

Sixth—In case, however, objections are filed to the foregoing abstracts of estimate and assessment, or to either of them, the motion to confirm the reports as to awards and as to assessments shall stand adjourned to the date to be hereafter specified in the notice provided in such cases to be given in relation to filing the final reports, pursuant to sections 981 and 984 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 658 of the Laws of 1906.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for the City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any collusion with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
