REPORT FOR THE WEEK ENDING JULY 12, 1913.

MEDICAL BOARD OF KINGSTON AVENUE HOSPITAL.

The Board of Health has recently appointed a number of prominent Brooklyn physicians as consulting and attending physicians to constitute the Medical Board of the Kingston Avenue Hospital. These physicians, whose names are given in the resolution quoted below, have all accepted the appointment, with the exception of two who are at present traveling in the West, and who probably have not yet received the notice of their designation.

The resolution establishing this advisory board was adopted May 6, 1913, and read as follows:

CERTAIN REQUIREMENTS OF THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH REGARDING INSTITUTIONS.

The following digest of rules of the department governing conditions in various kinds of public institutions was prepared in answer to a recent inquiry.

Hospitals.

1. All infectious diseases must be reported immediately to the Department of Health by telephone and postal card.

2. Adequate isolation rooms must be provided.

3. Wards in which infectious diseases develop are quarantined as follows: Diphtheria, 10 days; scarlet fever, 10 days; German measles, 10 days; measles, 14 days; smallpox, 21 days.

In cases of smallpox, all patients in hospital, and all employees, must be vaccinated. No patients are admitted to, or discharged from the wards, during the quarantine period.

4. All cases exposed to infectious diseases are examined once a week by a Department of Health Inspector.

5. Before a certificate or notice is issued by the Department of Health ending the quarantine, each person exposed is again examined by the Department of Health Inspector.

6. The infected ward must then be fumigated and the furniture washed with an antiseptic solution before new patients are admitted.

Asylums and Homes for Children.

The same requirements exist as for hospitals, with the exception that for children attending public school a certificate issued by the Department of Health must be furnished.

Dispensaries (Clinics).

1. Infectious diseases must be reported at once by telephone, and patient is not allowed to leave building until he or she is seen by the Department of Health Inspector.

2. All patients suffering with contagious diseases must be removed by the Department of Health ambulance to the Department of Health Hospital, unless said patient lives in a private house, where no boarders or roomers are kept.

3. Proper isolation room must be provided.

4. Fumigation of infected rooms must be performed by the person in charge.

Nurseries.

1. Infectious diseases must be reported immediately by telephone.

2. All patients suffering with contagious diseases must be removed by the Department of Health ambulance to the Department of Health Hospital.

3. The nursery is quarantined for a few days until thorough fumigation can be performed by the Department of Health.

4. The children exposed to the particular diseases are excluded from the nursery during the incubation period of the disease.

Day Nurseries.

New rules and regulations affecting day nurseries were published in the Weekly Bulletin of the Department of Health May 24, 1913, and space does not permit of their repetition.

Public Health Law.

The following is a copy of the Public Health Law (sections 313, 314, 315) relating to the conduct of institutions and the sanitary supervision over them by the Board of Health:

Section 313. Examination and Quarantine of Children Admitted to Institutions for Orphan, Destitute or Vagrant Children or Juvenile Delinquents. Every institution in this state, incorporated for the express purpose of receiving or caring for orphan, vagrant or destitute children or juvenile delinquents, except hospitals, shall have attached thereto a regular physician of its selection duly licensed under the laws of the State and in good professional standing, whose name and address shall be kept posted conspicuously within such institution near its main entrance. The words "juvenile delinquents" here used shall include all children whose commitment to an institution is authorized by the Penal Law. The officer of every such institution upon receiving a child therein, by commitment or otherwise, shall, before admitting it to contact with the other inmates, cause it to be examined by such physician, and a

written certificate to be given by him, stating whether the child has diphtheria, scarlet fever, measles, whooping cough or any other contagious or infectious disease, especially of the eyes and skin, which might be communicated to other inmates and specifying the physical and mental condition of the child, the presence of any indication of hereditary or other constitutional disease, and any deformity or abnormal condition found upon the examination to exist. No child shall be so admitted until such certificate shall have been furnished, which shall be filed with the commitment or other papers on record in the case, by the officers of the institution, who shall, on receiving such child, place it in strict quarantine thereafter from the other inmates, until discharged from such quarantine by such physician, who shall thereupon indorse upon the certificate the length of quarantine and the date of discharge therefrom.

Section 314. Monthly Examination of Inmates and Reports. Such physician shall at least once a month thoroughly examine and inspect the entire institution, and report in writing, in such form as may be approved by the State Board of Health, to the board of managers or directors of the institution, and to the local board of the district or place where the institution is situated, its condition, especially as to its plumbing, sinks, waterclosets, urinals, privies, dormitories, the physical condition of the children, the existence of any contagious or infectious disease, particularly of the eyes or skin, their food, clothing, and cleanliness, and whether the officers of the institution have provided proper and sufficient nurses, orderlies and other attendants of proper capacity to attend to such children, to secure to them due and proper care and attention as to their personal cleanliness and health, with such recommendations for the improvement thereof as he may deem proper. Such boards of health shall immediately investigate any complaint against the management of the institution or of the existence of anything therein dangerous to life or health, and, if proven to be well founded, shall cause the evil to be remedied without delay.

Section 315. Beds: Ventilation. The beds in every dormitory in such institution shall be separated by a passageway of not less than two feet in width, and so arranged that under each the air shall freely circulate and there shall be adequate ventilation of each bed, and such dormitory shall be furnished with such means of ventilation as the local board of health shall prescribe. In every dormitory six hundred cubic feet of air space shall be provided and allowed for each bed or occupant, and no more beds or occupants shall be permitted than are thus provided for, unless free and adequate means of ventilation exist approved by the local board of health, and a special permit in writing therefore be granted by such board, specifying the number of beds or cubic air space which shall, under special circumstances, be allowed, which permit shall be kept conspicuously posted in such dormitory. The physician of the institution shall immediately notify in writing the local board of health and the board of managers or directors of the institution of any violation of any provision of this section.

DEATH RATE FOR THE WEEK.

There were 1,270 deaths and a rate of 12.30 per 1,000 of the population reported during the week just passed, as against 1,390 deaths and a rate 14.02 for the corresponding week of 1912, a decrease of 120 deaths and 1.72 points. If the increase in population be taken into consideration, the decrease is represented by 177 deaths. The most noteworthy fact of the week's mortality was that for the first time in many years no death was attributed to scarlet fever. Measles, diphtheria and croup, whooping cough showed a slight decrease from the figures of last year; typhoid fever a considerable decrease. Diarrheal diseases under five years of age showed a much decreased mortality, due in part to the more favorable atmospheric conditions prevailing compared with the same week of 1912, which were accountable for the large decrease in the number of deaths from heatstroke. The reduced mortality prevailed at all ages, there having been thirty-nine fewer deaths among infants under one year of age, sixty less between five and sixty-five years, and twenty-eight less at ages over sixty-five years.

The death rate from January 1, 1913, to date was 14.84 as against 14.94 per 1,000 during the corresponding period of 1912.

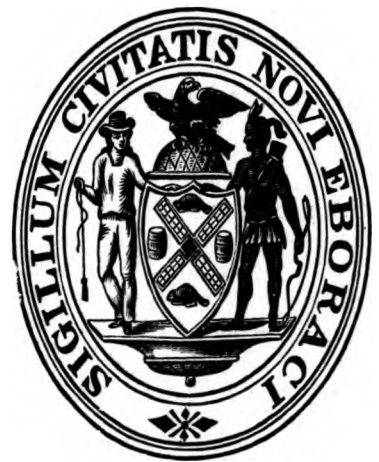

NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street, and the opening of the main sewer

in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances, or portion as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement, to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
