George McAneny, President, Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York City: Dear Sir-I would respectfully request permission to purchase, without advertising, fresh fish, oysters, clams, fresh fruits and vegetables and agricultural and botanical supplies for the year 1915, not to exceed the following amounts: Fresh Fish, Oysters and Clams.....

The reason for these requests is that we have found that by receiving weekly quotations from fish dealers we can purchase such fish as are running in the market, whereas, under the contract system, the contractor sends largely what he chooses, with the result that the institutions obtain very little variety. The conditions of the fish market are so changeable that the contract is very undesirable, and experience in the

therefore, be it

open market during the year 1914 were lower than during the year 1913, when the contract system was in vogue, and the results were more satisfactory to institutions.

As to the fresh fruits and vegetables, would say it is practically impossible for the successful bidder to bid intelligently upon this contract, for the reason that upon fresh fruits and vegetables it is extremely difficult to gauge the market properly. The result is that there is a great deal of speculation upon the contract, with resultant high prices and very limited bidding. It is desired to obtain these items in open market upon weekly quotations, along the lines upon which the fish, etc., is being purchased.

As to the agricultural and botanical supplies, would say that these embrace the purchase of seed, privet, etc., which it is practically impossible to properly specify, for which reason the Department desires to obtain quotations only from very high class houses, and in this way obtain the delivery of seeds of proper quality, which insure

Gentlemen-On October 28, 1914, the Board of Education requested the establishment of rates of compensation for janitors of sundry public schools. In connection therewith we report as follows:

For the janitor of new Public School No. 115, 176th and 177th Streets, between St. Nicholas and Audubon Avenues, Manhattan, a rate of \$4,236, based on measurement of the building is requested. A temporary rate of \$150 per month is paid the janitor at the present time. The new addition to Public School No. 169, Audubon Avenue, 168th and 169th Streets, Manhattan, is now occupied for school purposes, and it is proposed to increase the compensation of the janitor thereof from \$3,456 per annum to \$4,116, based on the increased measurements. It is requested that the temporary rate of \$150 per month now paid the janitor of Public School No. 53, 168th Street, Findlay and Teller Avenues, The Bronx, be increased to \$4,164, the entire building being occupied for school purposes.

In the Borough of Brooklyn, temporary rates, that is, regular rates, less rent allowance, are requested for the following buildings:

Annex to Public School No. 17, North 1st Street, near Bedford Avenue, \$720 per annum, less \$221 rent allowance.

Public School No. 84, Glenmore and Stone Avenues and Watkins Street. \$7,068

per annum, less \$221 rent allowance.

Public School No. 154, 11th Avenue, Windsor Road and Sherman Street, \$3,036 per annum, less \$221 rent allowance.

For the new Bay Ridge High School, still incomplete, at 4th Avenue, 60th and Senator Streets, the Board of Education requests a temporary rate of \$150 per month in order to provide the building with a caretaker. A temporary rate of \$180 per month is proposed for the temporary janitor of Public School No. 139, Avenue C. East 13th and 14th Streets, the regular janitor being absent on sick leave. This is less than the regular annual rate, \$2,772. The janitor of Public School No. 97, Benson and 25th Avenues, has the care of a two-room portable building at Stillwell Avenue and Avenue S. It is stated that since the portable building is so long a distance from the main building an additional cleaner will be required to care for it, necessitating an increase of rate from \$240 to \$480 per annum. Since no request was made or allowed for this increased rate in the 1915 budget, we recommend that it be denied.

New Public School No. 94, Old House Landing Road, Little Neck, Queens, is completely occupied for school purposes. The Board of Education, therefore, requests that the temporary rate of compensation of \$75 per month be changed to the regular rate, based on measurement, \$2,064 per annum. An increase in the rent allowance for the janitor of Public School No. 37, Higbie Avenue and Springfield Road, Springfield. Queens, is requested. The rent allowance is now \$221, but since Springfield contains only private homes, it is stated that it is impracticable for the janitor to procure living accommodations at the present rate. No request was made in the Departmental Estimate of the Department of Education for 1915 for the increased rent allowance. Therefore, we recommend that it be denied. The janitor of Public School No. 12, Steuben Street, Stapleton, Richmond, has the care of a new two-room portable building for which the Board of Education requests a compensation of \$144 per annum.

We recommend the adoption of the attached resolution granting the requests, with the exception of the increased rate for the care of the portable buildings used as an annex to Public School No. 97, Brooklyn, and the increased rent allowance for Public

No. 1067 Resolution and Memorandum in Regard to Charge in 1915 Budget of The City of New York for Department of Public Charities, as Against New York County and Bronx County.

Whereas, in the Budget of the City of New York for the year 1915, New York County is charged with \$82,980 as its pro rata share for maintenance of charitable institutions and Bronx County is charged with the sum of \$31,020; and whereas said charges are evidently out of proportion, and, upon investigation, it will be ascertained that the number of dependents in charitable institutions in Bronx County, as against the number of dependents in charitable institutions in New York County, would make the amount that Bronx County should be charged with considerably less than \$31,020; and

Whereas, in the Budget for 1914, a superintendent, stenographer, clerk and examiner were added to the Code, No. 1914, Bureau of Dependent Adults, Manhattan, for the purpose of establishing a branch office in the Bronx, which office was made necessary by reason of the Inferior Criminal Courts Act, which provides that a branch of the Department of Public Charities be maintained in or near the Court of Domestic Relations; and

Whereas, since the 1st of January, 1914, a Court of Domestic Relations is established in the Borough of Bronx, but no office was opened in the Bronx, except that on the 1st of April, 1914, a hospital helper receiving \$40 a month was detailed for the Borough of Bronx, and a Superintendent who had been detailed for the Borough of Bronx was instead sent to Brooklyn in a subordinate position; and

Whereas, Bronx County dependents are compelled to go to East 59th Street, in

the Borough of Manhattan; and Whereas, in this Budget the Department of Public Charities asks for several increases in salary and several additional social investigators, superintendents and the like, all of which are unnecessary and do not in any way assist dependents, as can better ascertained by the annexed communication from the Department of Public

Charities and memorandum in reply; therefore, be it Resolved, that the Finance Committee of this Board be and they hereby are empowered to investigate and inquire into the facts aforementioned, and report to this Board as to whether or not Bronx County is paying more than its pro rata share towards the maintenance of charitable institutions in the Budget of the City of New York for 1915, and further as to what became of the money appropriated in the 1914 Budget for the opening of a Bronx County office of the Department of Public

Charities. Department of Public Charities of the City of New York, Municipal Building, Tenth Floor, November 17, 1914. Hon. HARRY ROBITZEK, City Hall, New York City:

Dear Sir—I am in receipt of your letter of November 14th addressed to former Commissioner of Public Charities, Hon. Michael J. Drummond, asking for certain information regarding the establishment of the Bronx office of the Department of Public Charities, and certain other matters pertaining to the Budget of 1915. I am very glad, indeed, to give you all the information I have regarding these matters, and I will take up each of your questions and answer them as briefly as possible.

(1) You ask what has become of the Bronx office of the Department of Public Charities and what has been done with the money appropriated for it by the Budget

The 1914 Budget of the Department of Public Charities does not contain any appropriation for the opening of the Bronx office of this Department. When I became Commissioner, however, I learned that there was an understanding with the former Commissioner that an office would be established in the Bronx, and that provision was made under Code 1914, the appropriation for the Bureau of Dependent Adults, Manhattan, for such additional workers as might be necessary to man that office. The office was accordingly established in the Bergen Building, No. 1932 Arthur Avenue, on April 1st, 1914, and has been in operation ever since.

(2) You are under the impression that Hospital Helpers, receiving various salaries, have been changed to Social Service Workers in the Budget of 1915, with salaries ranging from \$1,200 to \$4,000 a year.

In reply to this question, I desire to say that in no instance has this Department asked in the 1915 Budget to change Hospital Helpers to Social Service Workers. Doubtless you refer to the change of title of Examiners of Charitable Institutions to Social Investigators. This title has been changed, but the salary schedule for this class has been decreased. There is, in addition, however, a Director of Social Investigations at \$4,000, which, I imagine, is the position you refer to as a Superintendent at \$4,000 a year. This Director's duties are in no way similar to the duties of the Superintendents of the Bureaus of Dependent Adults, nor the Superintendents of the Children's Bureaus in the different boroughs. These Superintendents attend to applications made at the office, and have supervision over certain field work. The Superintendents of the several Children's Bureaus and Bureaus of Dependent Adults will be under the general direction of the Director of Social Investigations, so far as their work relates to investigations. The Director of Social Investigations will have immediate charge of the planning and supervision of the work of one hundred and twenty-one social investigators, and will be the co-ordinating agent between the various Bureaus, in order to prevent duplication and other useless effort. These Social Investigators and the Social Service Workers connected with the hospitals have never had a supervising head, and it is necessary for someone, not only to direct their work, but to express judgment as to what should be done with the cases. You understand, of course, that the disposition of a case is a serious matter, whether or not a child is taken away from a family to be placed in an institution for a certain period, or whether, by exercising some judgment and care, a widow may be enabled to support herself and her children. Such matters should be placed for final decision in the hands of a very competent and responsible person.

(3) You ask why Bronx County should pay \$31,020 for the maintenance of the Charities Department as compared with \$82,980 for New York County.

In reply to this question, I beg to inform you that the appropriations that you

refer to in this question are not requests of the Department of Public Charities, and are not included within its Budget. It is evident that you refer to the Budgetary appropriations for charitable institutions for each of the counties, under the general heading "Health, Sanitation and Care of Dependents." I beg to say that these appropriations are made up in the Comptroller's office, and constitute the fixed charges and contributions made to certain institutions for the feebleminded adults, feebleminded children, deaf mutes, blind, and the deaf and dumb, from the various counties embraced in this City. The institutions receiving these appropriations are designated by the State to receive this class of patients, which are paid for at a definite per capita rate, and the counties are called upon to pay only when it sends persons to these institutions. The only explanation I can give for the enormous amounts paid by Bronx County, compared with New York County, is that your county apparently in the past has sent to these institutions a larger proportion of feebleminded, blind and deaf and dumb than New York County.

This office is made necessary by reason of the Inferior Criminal Courts Act, which provided that a branch of the Department of Public Charities shall be maintained in or near the Court of Domestic Relations. The office was opened in April, 1914, but the employees provided in the Budget have not been assigned to it; instead an hospital helper, receiving \$40 per month, is detailed there.

2. No hospital helpers have been changed to Social Service Workers in the Budget for 1915. However, Examiners of Charitable Institutions have been changed to Social Investigators. There is no decrease in the salary of those who are at present employed as Examiners, they will receive the same salary under the title of Social Investigators. However, there is an item of 29 additional Social Investigators, at a salary of \$900 per annum, and a Director at \$4,000. This latter position is

absolutely unnecessary. It is quite evident that the Commissioner of Charities does not intend to do any real social service work. The 29 additional investigators are needed to investigate the circumstances of patients entering municipal institutions and frequent reinvestigation of cases committed to child-caring institutions. This work has not been done heretofore for the reason that the Department of Public Charities had not sufficient

help for this purpose. Miss Cannon, Director of the Social Service Work of the Massachusetts General Hospital, a recognized authority on this work, and who recently made a study of the Department of Public Charities for the Commissioner of Charities, states that a Social Service Worker cannot handle more than ten (10) cases per month. On this basis over six hundred Social Service Investigators would be required.

The duties of the Commissioner of Charities, in relation to cases admitted to institutions under his supervision or subsidized by the City, are defined by law, and

the Social Service work is not a part of his duty.
While every one recognizes that Social Service Work is all important in the investigation of cases applying to the Department of Public Charities, it cannot be effectively carried out by that Department as it has not power to extend outdoor relief. If, after making an intensive study of an applicant for relief, it is, in the opinion of the Investigator, advisable to assist the family in their home, the case would have to be referred to a private organization; this society would not extend immediate assistance, but would go through the same course of procedure that was taken by the Investigator of the Department of Public Charities, and would have to be satisfied that outdoor relief was the proper method of rehabilitating the family. This would be a duplication of work and an unnecessary delay in extending the proper measures of relief. It would be better for the D. P. C. Investigators to confine their activities to ascertaining whether or not the applicant is a proper public charge, and if in the course of their investigations they find that a family is in need of relief at home, or a man is out of employment, the case could be referred, as is now done by Examiners of the Department of Public Charities, to the proper private agency dealing with the

The Commissioner of Charities, in his letter, states that "these Superintendents attend to applications made at the office and have supervision over certain field work." The Superintendents referred to have supervision over the very work that he intends to have done by the Social Investigators. He further states that "the Director of Social Investigations will have immediate charge of the planning and supervision of the work of the one hundred and twenty-one social investigators, and will be the co-ordinating agent between the various bureaus in order to prevent duplication and other useless effort." If this work is to be given to a Director of Social Investigations, what then becomes of the duties now assigned to the Second Deputy Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities? The Second Deputy Commissioner has had a long experience in social service work and is presumed to be an expert, and in the assignment of the work to his Deputies the Second Deputy Commissioner was given supervision of the Bureaus of Dependent Adults and the Children's Bureaus, and he is the co-ordinating agent between these Bureaus. There might be some justification for this request if the Second Deputy Commissioner was to be dropped, but as long as the Deputy Commissioner remains there is no need of a Director at \$4,000 per annum as co-ordinating agent between the various Bureaus.

Another reason given by the Commissioner of Charities for the appointment of a Director of Social Investigations is that "it is necessary for some one not only to direct their work but to express judgment as to what should be done with the cases. * * * that the disposition of a case is a serious matter, whether or not a child is taken away from a family to be placed in an institution for a certain period, or whether by exercising some judgment and care, a widow may be enabled to support herself and children. Such matters should be placed for final decision in the hands of a very competent and responsible person."

At the present time the Superintendents of the different Bureaus of the Department of Public Charities not only direct the work of the Investigators, but they

determine what should be done in each case.

In the Children's Bureaus of the Department of Charities, all cases before being acted upon are referred to one of the three private organizations, depending upon the religion of the applicant. This is done in order that the private societies may make an investigation and assist the family in their home, thus preventing the children from becoming public charges. A report is always received from the private societies before the children are committed, and the children are not committed unless that action is recommended by the private societies.

The only inference to be drawn from the last statement of the Commissioner of Charities is that the present Superintendents of the Children's Bureaus and the Bureaus of Dependent Adults are not competent and responsible persons.

The Superintendent of the Children's Bureau, Manhattan, has held his present position for the past 25 years. That he is competent can be judged from the fact that but one-third of the applicants are committed to institutions. In addition to this, sufficient money is collected from the relatives, as part payment for the children, to more than pay the expenses of the Bureau.

The Superintendent of the Children's Bureau, Brooklyn, was the assistant of the Superintendent of the Children's Bureau, Manhattan, for 15 years, and has held his present position 3½ years. He is a thoroughly competent man in every respect.

The Superintendent of the Bureau of Dependent Adults, Manhattan, has been employed in the Department of Public Charities for the past six years, serving as Examiner of Charitable Institutions, clerk and Acting Deputy Superintendent, Clerk in charge of the Tuberculosis Hospital Admission Bureau, and has held the position of Superintendent for the yast 3½ years. He is regarded as an efficient man.

The Superintendent of the Bureau of Dependent Adults, Richmond, has been employed in the Department of Public Charities for......years. Prior to his present assignment he was Superintendent of the Bureau of Dependent Adults, Brooklyn for.....years. He also is an efficient man.

To state that these men are not competent and responsible is absurd. A Director of Social Investigations who had not had at least several years experience in the Department of Charities would be incompetent. To hold a position of Superintia it is offered is excessive, and in addition a large sum will be needed to make it suitable tendent of a Bureau of the Department of Public Charities requires a knowledge of for the purpose intended, that the City now owns property more centrally located in the Poor Laws of the State. Its investigation has convinced the Committee that these objections are not well founded. The real estate expert of the Finance Department, whose experience and judgment is second to none, and the judges of the court, all declare that this is an opportunity for the City to secure at a price much lower than it could be had under any other circumstances a beautiful building in a commanding and convenient location, accessible for litigants, lawyers and witnesses by many transit lines. These officers further state that the necessary changes can be made at a moderate expene to the City, which will then have a well equipped court house which will be a credit to the City for many years to come. The suggested anoyance by noise is, in the opinion of the Committee, as a result of its visit to the building, a matter which is not susceptible of proof.

As regards certain City property within this judicial district available for a court house site, the Committee believes, after investigation and hearing testimony on this subject, that there is no site which is as available and upon which a court house of this convenience and appearance can be erected.

This court is at present occupying premises No. 249 Manhattan Avenue, southwest corner of Powers Street, Borough of Brooklyn. I have caused such an investigation to be made, and find that the building is unsanitary and absolutely unfit for the purposes for which it is used. In my opinion, the Williamsburgh Trust Company Building, which is located on the easterly side of Driggs Avenue, between South Fourth and South Fifth Streets, Borough of Brooklyn, is the most available property in this section for court house purposes, and the selection of the same has been approved by the Board of City Magistrates.

Before the purchase of the Williamsburgh Trust Company Building can be authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, it must first be selected by your body as a court house site. It is very important that immediate action be taken in connection therewith, in order that preliminary steps may be commenced for the fitting up of this building as a court house.

Dear Sir—On July 20, 1914, I asked that the Board of Aldermen authorize an issue of special revenue bonds in the amount of \$7,600, to provide for an estimated deficit to that extent in the fund for the purchase of chemicals used in the purification of the Croton and Bronx water supply.

I am now able to reduce the amount estimated to be required for this purpose to the sum of \$4,300. This reduction is made possible by transfers of funds recently effected which, however, were not practicable at the time of my previous request.

In support of the estimate, I submit the following table: Amount estimated to be consumed from October 19, 1914, to January 1, 1915, inclusive: Chloride of lime on hand October 19, 1914...... 240,366 pounds.

*255,347 pounds. The estimated daily consumption of 4,500 pounds is based upon the average consumption during the past year at the Dunwoodie chlorinating plant. The price per pound is based upon the result of the last public letting, held in the latter part of September. The containers are included for the reason that they are charged for at the same rate as the contents.

I trust that you will appreciate the importance of replenishing this appropriation at the earliest possible moment, as the purity of the water supply renders it essential that an ample quantity of chemicals should be on hand at all times.

Account No. 2649-Food Supplies-Requested, \$43,228 The net amount appropriated to date for Food Supplies was \$339,623.00. This was based on the per capita allowance of 16 cents per day for prisoners, on an average census of 5,000 prisoners, and an allowance of 31 cents per day for employees. The expenditures during the first eight months of the year exceeded the allowances referred to by .0014 per day for prisoners and .0487 for employees. Moreover, the census of the prisoners since the first of July, 1914, has increased considerably, until it now exceeds 5,900, and the indications are that the average census for the months of November and December will exceed 6,000.

Investigation by this department indicates that the total amount required for Food Supplies for the purposes stated for the remainder of the year will be approximately \$57,500. Against this sum there is now available a balance of \$23,000 in the

Food Supply Account, leaving a deficit in that account of about \$34,500.

On August 31, 1914, the Brooklyn Disciplinary Training School for Boys was abolished by a resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment dated May 22, 1914. At this time there was an outstanding contract liability of about \$10,000 which has since been abrogated by the several contractors, and this amount is now available for transfer to the Food Supplies Account in the Department of Correction. This transfer will be made soon and will have the effect of reducing the deficit of \$34,500 to \$24,500, for which special revenue bonds may be issued, as compared with the sum of \$43,228.00 requested.

Account No. 2653-Medical and Surgical Supplies-Requested, \$4,887. The net appropriation to this account to date is \$6,688. The increased census of prisoners has resulted in an increased use of Medical Supplies, and the prices for such supplies have also advanced. Investigation shows that up to November 4, 1914, liabilities had been incurred amounting to \$1,111.72 in excess of the total allowance for the year. In addition to this sum it is estimated that the expenditures from this account for the last two months of the year will amount to about \$2,100. Account No. 2660-Household Equipment-Requested, \$6,225. The net appropriation to this account is \$16,242.84 and the balance unencumbered

Owing to the increased census the supply of blankets for prisoners' beds is inadequate and investigation shows that it will be necessary to provide 1,500 additional pairs of blankets at a cost of \$5,625.00. This additional allowance will provide blankets for 750 prisoners, it being the custom to use two pairs on each bed.

The supply of towels in the various institutions is limited and an allowance of one additional towel for each prisoner is urgently necessary. For this purpose it will be necessary to purchase 6,000 yards of toweling at a cost of \$600.00. The total sum required to replenish this account will then amount to \$6,225. This appears to be reasonable.

Investigation shows that at the Workhouse on Blackwell's Island, the stock of dresses is use and in storeroom is sufficient to provide two dresses for each of the 600 prisoners. The request for \$600 for the purchase of 8,000 yards of seersucker is for the purpose of making about a thousand dresses. This will provide an additional dress for each female prisoner at the Workhouse, and the balance of the dresses will be distributed among the female prisoners in other institutions of the department. This request appears to be reasonable and necessary.

The \$1,575 requested for the workhouse cloth was found to be unnecessary, as there is on hand a sufficiently large stock of clothes and raw material to meet the requirements of the department for the remainder of the year.

The request for 15,000 yards of ticking was found to be in excess of the requirements, and an allowance of only 7,000 yards at a cost of \$1,050 is recommended. This will provide material for 2.000 shirts, 1,000 for the Workhouse on Blackwell's Island and 1,000 for the Branch Workhouse at Hart's Island.

The 2.000 lbs. of offal leather requested is urgently needed for repairing prisoners' shoes. The repair shops have no supply of this leather, and more expensive leather is being now used. The offal leather requested will last about three months and will cost \$320.

It is estimated that the cost of 12,200 yards of muslin will require an outlay of about \$900.

The \$2,000 requested for miscellaneous materials is mainly needed for the following purposes: About \$600 will be required for white lead for painting the interior of the Penitentiary on Blackwell's Island. An outlay of \$450 is also necessary for lumber for the Reformatory on Hart's Island for use in the carpentry school and for miscellaneous repairs to the reformatory buildings. Various other materials are urgently needed for minor repairs to buildings and equipment, requisitions for which are withheld in the Auditor's Office for lack of funds. It is estimated that these materials will cost from \$800 to \$900.

It therefore appears that of the additional allowance requested in this account, namely \$3,440, that \$2,900 should suffice.

Account No. 2669-General Repairs-Requested, \$1,500. On November 1, 1914, this account had an unencumbered balance of \$941.49. The Steamer "Correction," owned by the Department of Correction, is greatly in

need of extensive repairs, the cost of which, it is estimated, will exceed \$2,000. The centre of the boat has sagged in over a considerable area, and unless it is raised a breakdown of the machinery in the engine room may occur. The boilers are in very bad condition and to thoroughly overhaul them it will be necessary to recover them and to replace the suction pipe, also the circular seams must be chipped and caulked and a number of leaky rivets made tight. A new iron ice shoe about 16 feet long and 4 feet deep will also be needed on the bow of the boat, and new ice guards must be fixed over two manhole plates. Repairs to the decks, which it will be necessary to recaulk in many places, made necessary by the wear and tear caused by the increase in freightage due to carrying the additional freight formerly handled by the Steamer "Massasoit," which was transferred to the Department of Public Charities on June 18, 1914. In addition to these repairs enumerated many other minor repairs are necessary so that the amount of \$1,500, requested in addition to

No. 1071. An Ordinance Regulating the Construction, Operation and Maintenance of Elevators in The City of New York.

By Alderman Hamilton—
AN ORDINANCE regulating the construction, operation and maintenance of

elevators in the City of New York.

Be It Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. Definitions. For the purposes of this ordinance:

(a) The term elevator shall mean any devise within or in connection with a building or structure used for carrying persons or things upward or downward;

(b) The term passenger elevator shall mean and include any elevator designed and used for carrying persons other than those necessary for its safe operation;
(c) The term freight elevator shall mean and include any elevator designed and used for the carrying of things and such persons only as are necessary for its safe

operation or handling the things caried by it;

(d) The term amusement device shall mean and include all mechanically operated devices which are used to convey persons in any direction as a form of amusement.

Section 2. Rules. The superintendent of buildings shall make rules not inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance regulating with a view to safety the construction, maintenance and operation of all elevators and amusement devices, now

existing or hereafter installed.

Before such rules and any changes thereof shall become operative they shall be published in the CITY RECORD on eight successive Mondays, but not until a public hearing on the same has been held when a request for such hearing has been made. All rules heretofore legally promulgated and in force at the time of the passage

of this ordinance shall continue in force until amended or repealed as herein provided. Section 3. Permits. Before any passenger or freight elevator shall hereafter be installed or altered in any building or before any amusement device shall hereafter be constructed or altered, the owner or lessee, or the agent, architect or contractor of either, shall submit to the superintendent of buildings, in such formas the superintendent may prescribe, an application accompanied by the prescribed plans and drawings showing the proposed construction and mode of operation. Such application must be approved by the superintendent before any such elevator or amusement device shall

be installed, constructed or altered.

Repairs to elevators and amusement devices may be made without filing such application, unless such repairs include the changing of the type or make of elevator or its motive power, or any change in safety devices or operating mechanism.

Section 4. Certificate. It shall be unlawful for the owner or lesee to operate any passenger elevator or amusement device hereafter installed or constructed or permit the operation or use of the same until a certificate shall have been obtained from the superintendent of buildings that such elevator or amusement device has been inspected and has been found to be safe.

The superintendent of buildings shall within a reasonable time after being requested to do so inspect or cause to be inspected any elevator or amusement device hereafter installed or constructed, and if the same is found to be safe and in conformity with the provisions of this ordinance and the rules adopted thereunder,

shall issue a certificate to that effect.

Nothing herein contained shall prevent the temporary use of any elevator during construction provided a notice is conspicuously posted on or in connection with such elevator to the effect that such elevator has not been officially approved.

Section 5. Record of Passenger Elevators. Every passenger elevator shall be given a serial number for purposes of identification. In the case of elevators hereafter installed such serial number shall be assigned when the first certificate is issued, and in the case of existing elevators; as soon as inspection can be made for that purpose. A docket of all passenger elevators shall be kept in each borough giving under the corresponding serial number of description of its location sufficient for identification, together with such other information as type of construction, motive power, rise, rated speed, inspection, etc., as the superintendent of buildings may deem desirable. The owner or lessee, or agent of either, shall cause such number, together with the most recent certificate of inspection to be attached or posted in the elevator car in the manner prescribed by the rules.

Section 6. Inspection. The superintendent of buildings shall cause an inspection of all passenger elevators to be made at least once in every three months, and of amusement devices at least once in each year. He may accept inspections made by any properly accredited insurance or causualty company, or inspection service retained or engaged by the owner or lessee, provided such company or service shall satisfy the superintendent of buildings of the competency of its inspector, shall abide by the rules adopted under this ordinance, and shall file with the superintendent of buildings a full report of each and every inspection, together with its recommendations. Upon notice from the superintendent of buildings, or his duly authorized representative, any repairs found necessary to passenger elevators shall be made without delay by the owner or lessee, and in case defects are found to exist which endanger life or limb by the continued use of such passenger elevator then the use of such elevator shall cease, and it shall not again be used until a certificate shall be first obtained from said superintendent of buildings that such elevator has been made safe. Nothing herein contained shall prevent or relieve the superintendent of buildings from making inspections of freight elevators or of amusement devices when there is reason to believe that defects exist or that the elevator is being used for passenger service. After every inspection which shows any passenger elevator to be safe and in conformity with the requirement of this ordinance and the rules adopted thereunder the superintendent of buildings shall issue to the owner or lessess of such elevator a certificate to that effect.

Section 7. Riding on Elevators Restricted—It shall be unlawful for any person, other than the operator or those necessary to handle freight, to ride on, or for the owner or lessee of any elevator knowingly to permit any person to ride on any elevator other than a passenger elevator. Every freight elevator shall have a notice posted conspicuously thereon as follows: THIS IS NOT A PASSENGER ELEVATOR. IT IS UNLAWFUL FOR ANY PERSON, OTHER THAN THE OPERATOR OR THOSE NECESSARY TO HANDLE FREIGHT, TO RIDE ON THIS ELEVATOR.

Section 8. Operators—Except as may be specifically provided in any other law or ordinance, every passenger elevator, except full automatic push button elevators and escalators, must be in charge of a competent operator of reliable and industrious habits, not less than eighteen years of age, with sufficient previous experience in running an elevator under the instruction of a competent person. In case the superintendent of buildings shall find that the person engaged in running an elevator is incompetent or

not qualified, the owner or lessee of such elevator shall, upon notice from the superintendent of buildings, at once discontinue the operation of such elevator by such operator. No person shall employ or permit any person to operate any passenger elevator who does not possess the qualifications prescribed therefor by this or any other law or ordinance.

Section 9. Accidents—The owner or lessee, or person in charge of any passenger or freight elevator or amusement device shall immediately notify the superintendent of buildings of each and every accident to a person or damage to apparatus on, about or in connection with such elevator or amusement device, and shall afford the superintendent of buildings or his representative every facility for investigating such accident or damage. The superintendent of buildings shall without delay, after being notified, make an investigation of such accident or damage, and shall place on file in the bureau of buildings a full and complete report of such investigation. Such report shall give in detail all material facts and information available and the cause or causes so far as they can be determined, and shall be open to public inspection at all reasonable hours.

When an accident involves the failure or destruction of any part of the construction or operating mechanism, the use of such elevator or amusement device shall be discontinued until a certificate shall have been issued by the superintendent of buildings that such elevator or amusement device is or has been made safe; and no part of the construction or operating mechanism shall be removed or disturbed, except as may be necessary to relieve persons injured, nor shall repairs be made until permission has been granted by the superintendent of buildings.

Section 10. Interlocking of Cars and Doors—All passenger elevators, now existing and in use or hereafter constructed or installed, moving in a vertical shaft, shall have placed thereon or attached thereto some device that will automatically prevent the elevator car from being moved in either direction while the shaft door at which the elevator car is standing is unlocked; and unless it is equipped with such a device it shall be unlawful to operate or use any passenger elevator hereafter constructed or installed or to continue in use after the specified dates any existing passenger elevator, as follows:

any elevator having a rise of 200 feet or more, October 1st, 1915; any elevator having a rise of more than 90 feet and less than 200 feet, if located in an office building or department store, January 1st, 1916; if located in a hotel, April 1st, 1916; if located in any other business building, July 1st, 1916; if located in any

1st, 1916; if located in any other business building, July 1st, 1916; if located in any building coming under the provisions of the Tenement House Act, October 1st, 1916; if located in any other building or structure, January 1st, 1917; and any elevator having a rise of less than 90 feet, April 1st, 1917.

Nothing herein contained shall prevent the use of a switch or device, properly safeguarded against misuse or abuse, that will make possible the operation of the elevator independently of the automatic safety device prescribed by this section, but it shall be unlawful to use such switch or device except in case of emergency or for the making of repairs under conditions prescribed by the superintendent of buildings.

The rules promulgated by the superintendent of buildings under the provisions of this ordinance shall fix the requirements for the devices prescribed by this section. The superintendent of buildings shall approve for use any device that may conform to the requirements of this section and the rules adopted thereunder, as soon as possible after such device or drawings of the same have been submitted to him. But no such device shall be considered as meeting requirements until it has been approved by the superintendent of buildings.

Section 11. Speed Safeties—It shall be unlawful to use any passenger elevator that is not provided with safety devices, applied in conformity with the rules of the superintendent of buildings and maintained in good condition, for bringing the elevator car to rest without serious injury to the passengers whenever it may, for any reason whatsoever, exceed its rated speed by more than forty per cent, or reach a speed of 850 feet per minute.

Section 12. Enforcement; Penalties—This ordinance shall be deemed a part of the Building Code, and each superintendent of buildings shall, in his own borough, enforce its provisions and the rules adopted thereunder. Any and every violation of the provisions of this ordinance or of the rules adopted thereunder shall subject the owner, lessee or agent of the building or premises, where such violation has been committed or shall exist, and the architect, builder, contractor, or any other person who has assisted in the commission of such violation, to the same legal procedure and the same penalties as are prescribed for violations of the Building Code; and such violation shall be subject to the same legal remedies and prosecuted in the manner prescribed in said Building Code.

The operation of any elevator or amusement device after notice has been given by the superintendent of buildings or his duly authorized representative that such elevator or amusement device is unsafe shall be deemed a misdemeanor and punishable as such.

Section 13. When Effective—This ordinance shall take effect on January 1, 1915. Which was referred to the Committee on Buildings.

An Ordinance Regulating the Height, Size and Arrangement of Buildings in The City of New York.

AN ORDINANCE Regulating the Height, Size and Arrangement of Buildings in

the City of New York.

Be It Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Definition Figure 1.

Section 1. Definitions—For the purposes of this ordinance,
(a) the curb level shall be the mean curb level in front of and for the full width of the building, except that when a building is located on a corner lot the curb level shall be the mean curb level of the curb in the street of greatest width;

(b) the height of any wall shall be the vertical distance from the curb level to the highest point of such wall;
(c) a street wall shall be any wall bordering on a street, avenue, road, alley,

lane, highway, boulevard, concourse, driveway, culvert, sidewalk and crosswalk, every class of public road, square and place, or marginal way;

(d) in a street of varying width, the average width in any block shall be the

width determining height in that block;

(e) a lot shall mean the ground area covered by the building erected thereon and the open spaces required by or provided in accordance with this ordinance for such building;

(f) the depth of any lot shall be taken to mean the average depth;
(g) the least dimension of any court shall be taken to mean the least distance between walls or between any wall and a lot line measured on a line perpendicular

to the centre of any side of said court;

(h) the first story shall mean that story to which the main entrance leads, but the floor of which shall be not more than seven feet above the highest point of the

curb on any street on which the building abuts.

Section 2. Height Limits—Every building, hereafter erected, shall be so constructed that the street wall will not exceed in height the limits hereinafter prescribed, or that any other wall or any part of such building other than church spires or belfries, and chimneys for power or manufacturing plants, will not project beyond the lines or planes hereinafter referred to as set-back planes, except that any part or parts of a building not exceeding in aggregate area twenty-five per cent. of the lot on which the building is situated may be erected to any height, provided that such part or parts shall be distant at all points at least twenty feet, measured horizontally, trom all lot lines other than a street line bordering on or a street line at its intersection with a body of water, a public street, square, park, or marginal way, more

than one hundred and fifty feet wide, with or without an intervening street.

Section 3. Street Walls—Except as otherwise in this ordinance provided, the limiting height for street walls shall be twice the width of the street, but not more than three hundred feet, provided, however, that on streets less than fifty feet in width the limit shall be one hundred feet.

When a single building is erected upon a corner lot, facing upon streets of different widths, the limiting height of the street walls shall be determined by the street of greatest width.

When a single building not on a corner lot abuts upon streets of different widths, the limiting height of each street wall shall be determined by the width of the street on which it abuts.

Section 4. Set-back Planes—The set-back planes shall start at the limiting heights for street walls provided in this ordinance and incline upwards and backwards from the street in the ratio of one foot horizontally for each four feet vertically.

Section 5. Open Spaces Required—In all buildings hereafter erected, except tenement houses, lodging houses and theatres, yards and courts, as hereinafter pre-

scribed, shall be provided above the level of the second story floor beams. No yard or court required by this ordinance shall be covered over in any manner whatever, but such yards and courts shall at every point be kept open and unobstructed for the full height thereof, except for the ordinary projections of windows sills and lintels, and cornices or gutters to the extent of not more than twelve inches.

Section 6. Yards-At the rear of every building hereafter erected there shall be a yard extending across the entire width of the lot, at every point open, from the

floor level of the second story to the sky.

Such yard shall contain not less than ten per cent. of the area of the lot, and its least dimension shall be not less than ten per cent. of the depth of the lot. At any story above the first an additional one per cent. of the area of the lot shall be provided in such yard for each story above the first, provided that such additional yard area may be reduced by the area of any setbacks and prescribed courts at any

When the building is located on a lot fronting upon two or more streets, but not on a corner, no yard shall be required, but set-backs and courts of the minimum dimensions hereinafter prescribed, containing an aggregate area not less than that prescribed for yards, shall be provided. When the building is located on a lot at the corner of two or more streets no yard shall be required, but an area at any story of not less than one per cent. of the area of the lot for each story above the first shall be provided in set-backs or courts of the minimum dimensions hereinafter prescribed. Section 7. Courts-The least dimension of any court provided in accordance

with this ordinance shall be at any point not less than one and one-quarter inches for every foot of height such point is above the curb level, but not less than six feet.

Section 8. Buildings on Same Lot—If more than one building is hereafter placed on any lot, or, if any building is placed on the same lot with an existing building, the several buildings for the purposes of this ordinance shall be considered as detached parts of one building.

Section 9. What Included-Any structure, whether independent or attached to a building, shall, for the purposes of this ordinance, be deemed a building or part of a building and shall be subject to the provisions of this ordinance.

Nothing in this ordinance shall prevent the projection of a cornice beyond the street line or a set-back plane to an extent not exceeding five per cent. of the width

of the street. Section 10. Existing Buildings-No building now exisiting or hereafter erected shall be so altered or enlarged as to be in violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance, nor shall any lot area be so reduced or diminished that the uncovered areas shall be less than required by any law or ordinance or required to maintain the proper percentage of open lot in the case of such buildings which in conformity with the provisions of Section 1 extend above the set back planes. But nothing herein contained shall require any change in existing buildings or buildings for which permits have been heretofore lawfully issued and the construction of which is diligently prosecuted within a year of the date of the permit.

No building, now exceeding the restrictions fixed by this ordinance, may be rebuilt, except in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance, if, for any cause whatever,

it is wholly or in part removed.

Section 11. Unlawful Occupancy-It shall be unlawful to occupy or permit the occupancy of any building hereafter erected, altered or enlarged, and maintained in

violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance.

Section 12. Enforcement; Penalties-This ordinance shall be deemed a part of the Building Code, and each superintendent of buildings shall, in his own borough, enforce its provisions and the rules adopted thereunder. Any and every violation of the provisions of this ordinance or of the rules adopted thereunder shall subject the owner, lessee or agent of the building or premises where such violation has been committed or shall exist, and the architect, builder, contractor, or any other person who has assisted in the commission of such violation, to the same legal procedure and the same penalties as are prescribed for violations of the Building Code; and such violation shall be subject to the same legal remedies and prosecuted in the manner prescribed in said Building Code.

Section 13. Existing Provisions Repealed-The following provisions of the Building Code are hereby repealed:

(a) That portion of Section 8 reading: "Any such building hereafter erected

shall not cover more than ninety per cent. of the lot area."

(b) That portion of Section 10 reading: "Whenever any such building hereafter erected shall be located on any other than a corner lot or plot, it shall not cover in the aggregate more than 90 per cent. of the area of such lot or plot at and above the second story level, if not more than five stories in height, and two and one-half per cent. less for every additional story in height; and on a corner lot, when covering an area of not more than 3,000 square feet, it shall not occupy more than 95 per cent. of the area of such lot at and above the second story level. In case any such building is to occupy a number of lots, the Commissioner of Buildings having jurisdiction may allow the free air space, proportioned as herein stated, to be distributed in such manner as, in his opinion, will equally as well secure light and ventilation.

(c) That portion of Section 11 reading: "Office buildings, when not erected on a corner, shall not cover more than 90 per cent. of the lot area, at and above the second

story level.'

AN ORDINANCE to Amend "An Ordinance establishing the fire limits in The City of New York," adopted by the Board of Aldermen June 30, 1914, and approved August 14, 1914, and Establishing Additional Restricted Limits.

Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows: Section 1. An Ordinance Establishing the Fire Limits in The City of New York, adopted by the Board of Aldermen June 30, 1914, and approved by the Mayor August 14, 1914, is hereby amended.

(a) By adding a section, to be known as Section 2, to read as follows:

Section 2. Except as otherwise specifically provided in any other ordinance, no frame or wood structure shall be built hereafter within the following areas or limits hereinafter referred to as Suburban Limits, and it shall be unlawful to maintain, occupy or use any such structure erected in violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance, provided, however, that nothing herein contained shall prevent the erection, maintenance or occupancy of any frame building to be used exclusively for residence purposes with not more than fifteen sleeping rooms and covering not more than eighty per cent. of the width of the lot or plot on which it is erected and maintaining on at least one side an open space or open spaces as may be necessary to preserve such restriction, or of any one-story frame stable not exceeding six hundred square feet in area or fifteen feet in height and erected on the same plot with a one or two-family building and maintained on all sides at least four feet from any lot line. In the Borough of Manhattan, all that portion of the borough not included in the

No frame, wood or other combustible structure shall be moved from without to within the fire limits, nor from one lot to another within the fire limits [.], except that when condemnation proceedings have been held and the property has been acquired by the city previous to the enactment of this ordinance, frame buildings located on such property may be moved to any vacant lot within the fire limits provided such buildings shall be so moved before July first, 1915.

(d) by changing the numbers of Section 3, 5 and 8, to 4, 6 and 9 respectively.

(e) by substituting for Section 6 the following: Section 7. Enforcement; Penalties-This ordinance shall be deemed a part of the Building Code, and each superintendent of buildings shall, in his own borough, enforce its provisions. Any and every violation of the provisions of this ordinance shall subject the owner, lessee or agent or the building or premises where such violation has been committed or shall exist, and the architect, builder, contractor, or any other person who has assisted in the commission of such violation, to the same legal procedure and the same penalties as are prescribed for violations of the Building Code; and such violation shall be subject to the same legal remedies and prosecuted in the manner prescribed in said Building Code.

[Section 6. The superintendents of buildings shall, each in his own borough, enforce the provisions of this ordinance. Any and every violation of this ordinance shall be subject to the same penalties prescribed for violations of the Building Code which shall be prosecuted and collected in the manner prescribed in the Building Code.]

(f) by substituting for Section 7 the following:

Section 8. Existing Provisions Repealed—The following ordinances and sections or parts of sections of the Building Code are hereby repealed:

(1) that part of Section 142 of the Building Code reading:

"No wood building within or without the fire limits shall be moved from one lot to another until a statement setting forth the purposes of said removal and the uses to which said building is to be applied is filed in the Department of Buildings, and a permit be first obtained therefor. By Alderman Weil-AN ORDINANCE to amend the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York relating to the "use of sidewalks."

Be It Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows: Section 1. Section 466 of article 5 of chapter 12 of part 1 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York, relating to the "use of sidewalks," is hereby

amended to read as follows:

Sec. 466. Driving on Sidewalks. Except as provided in this article, no horse vehicle shall be driven, backed, led or allowed to stand on any sidewalk [which has been curbed], except that wares or merchandise in process of loading and unloading, shipment, or being received from shipment, may be transferred from trucks or other vehicles over the sidewalk by the use of skids, [or by backing up trucks on the sidewalk in so doing,] provided a passageway be kept open within the stoop line of buildings for the free passage of pedestrians.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF Health of the Department of Health, held October 27, 1914, the following resolution was

Adopted:

Resolved, That the following regulations governing the sale and care of food in New York
City be and the same are hereby adopted to take effect immediately:

Regulations Governing the Handling, Storing, Offering for Sale and Selling of Food and Drink in Retail Stores.

and Drink in Retail Stores.

General Regulations Governing the Conduct of All Retail Stores.

Regulation 1. Rooms, Insanitary Conditions, Ventilation and Water Closets: Food and drink shall not be handled, stored, offered for sale or sold in any stable, room used for sleeping purposes, or in any room or place which is dark, damp, poorly ventilated, dirty or insanitary, or in direct communication with such stable or room or with a water-closet compartment, except when such water-closet compartment is enclosed by a suitable and properly lighted vestibule. Every such water-closet compartment, except when provided with mechanical means of cept when provided with mechanical means of ventilation, shall have a window at least 1 foot by 3 feet between stop beads, opening to external air, and the entire window shall be made so as to readily open, or an opening connecting with the external air measuring at least 144 square inches for each water-closet or urinal with an increase of 72 square inches for each additional water-closet or urinal. The doors of water-closet compartment and vestibule shall be provided with compartment and vestibule shall be provided with self-closing devices; the door of the water-closet compartment opening inward, and the door of vestibule opening outward. Water-closet fixtures and vestibules shall be maintained in a clean and sanitary condition and in good repair.

Regulation 2. Rubbish, Useless or Offensive Material: No accumulation of rubbish, useless or offensive material shall be permitted in any room or place where food or drink is handled, stored, offered for sale or sold.

Regulation 3. Lighting: All rooms or places in which food or drink is handled, stored, offered for sale, or sold, shall be properly and adequately lighted so that all parts thereof may be readily inspected.

inspected. Regulation 4. Screening of Doors, Windows and Other Openings: All doors, windows and other openings shall be properly screened from May 1st to October 31st. Screen doors shall be provided with self-closing devices.

Regulation 5. Construction of Walls and Ceilings: Walls and ceilings shall be of a smooth, hard material and must be kent clean and easi

ings: Walls and ceilings shall be of a smooth hard material and must be kept clean and sani-

hard material and must be kept clean and sanitary and in good repair.

Regulation 6. Construction of Floors: Floors shall be smooth and must be kept clean and sanitary and in good repair.

Regulation 7. Counters, Shelves, Show Cases and Windows: All show or display cases or windows, counters, or shelves, used in handling, keeping and displaying food or drink, shall be kept clean and sanitary, free from dust dirt or kept clean and sanitary, free from dust, dirt or other contaminating material and in good repair,

Regulation 8. Drainage of Refrigerators, Ice-

Regulation 8. Drainage of Refrigerators, Ice-Boxes, Etc.: Waste water from refrigerators, ice-boxes, refrigerated display cases, windows or counters, vats or tanks, or other containers, used in refrigerating and storing food or drink, shall discharge into an open, water-supplied, properly trapped, sewer-connected sink.

Regulation 16. Raw Material: All raw material used in the manufacture of ice-cream, ices, or other frozen products, shall be healthy, fresh, sound, wholesome and safe for human

Regulation 17. Storing of Foodstuffs to be Considered Prima Facie Evidence of Their Use: The presence of any ice-cream, ices, or other frozen products in any part of the establishment shall be deemed prima facie evidence of its use for human food.

Regulation 18. Storage of Food on Floor: No food intended for human consumption shall be deposited or allowed to remain within 2 feet of the surface of any sidewalk, street, alley, or

be deposited or allowed to remain within 2 reed of the surface of any sidewalk, street, alley, or public place or the floor of any building where exhibited unless the same shall be contained in boxes or other receptacles so as to be protected from dogs and other animals and their excre-

from dogs and other animals and their excretions.

Regulation 19. Return of Old, Soft or Melted Ice-cream Prohibited: No old, soft, melted, salted or broken packages of ices, ice-cream, or other frozen products, returned to the manufacturer for any cause whatsoever, shall under any circumstances be melted, refrozen or again used in the manufacture of any such product.

Regulation 20. Use of Brass, Lead, Copper, or Other Metallic Faucet, Tank, Etc., That May Affect Liquids: No person shall use any tap, faucet, tank, fountain or vessel, or any pipe or conduit in connection therewith, which shall be composed or made, either wholly or in part of brass, lead, copper, or other metal or metallic substance that is or will be affected by a liquid so that dangerous, unwholesome and deleterious compounds are formed therein or thereby, or such that soda water, syrups, or other liquids, or any beverage, drink, or flavoring material drawn therefrom shall be unwholesome, dangerous or detrimental to health.

Regulation 21. Milk, Cream and Condensed Milk Used in the Manufacture of Ice-cream: No milk, cream or condensed milk, or combination or mixture thereof, shall be used in the manufacture or preparation of ices, ice-cream:

No milk, cream or condensed milk, or combination or mixture thereof, shall be used in the manufacture or preparation of ices, ice-cream, or other frozen products which does not comply with the provisions of the Sanitary Code.

Regulation 22. Filing of Milk and Cream Tags: Immediately after contents of containers for milk, cream, condensed milk, or a combination or mixture thereof, are emptied, the tag thereon shall be removed and kept on file for a period of two months thereafter for the inspection of the Department of Health.

Regulation 23. Garbage Receptacles: Suitable, water-tight, properly covered, galvanized iron or

water-tight, properly covered, galvanized iron or other sanitary metal cans for receiving and hold-ing without leakage all garbage and other waste material shall be provided. A tight fitting cover shall be provided for each can, and the can shall be kept covered. All garbage and other waste material shall be removed from the premises daily and shall not be allowed to become a nuisance.

Regulation 24. Water-closets and Washing Facilities: A sufficient number of water-closets conveniently located shall be provided for all employees engaged in the handling and manufacturing of ice-cream, ices, or other frozen products, and such water-closets shall be kept clean and sanitary and in good repair. A wash room conveniently located shall be provided, furnished with soap, running water and fresh, clean, individual towels daily. A notice shall be conspicuously posted in water-closet compartment or washroom directing all employees to cleanse their hands before leaving and immediately before commencing work. The use of common towels is prohibited.

Regulation 25. Lockers for Employees: Sufficient lockers of metallic construction shall be provided on premises for street clothing of employees engaged in the handling and manufacturing of ice-cream, ices, or other frozen products; Regulation 24. Water-closets and Washing

ing of ice-cream, ices, or other frozen products; such lockers, however, shall not be located in any room where ice-cream, ices, or other frozen products, are manufactured or handled.

Regulation 26. Health of Employees: No

person who has any infectious or venereal disease shall be permitted to prepare or handle any ice-cream, ices, or other frozen products, or any utensils used in preparing, manufacturing or handling same.

Regulation 27. Habits of Employees: regulation 27. Habits of Employees: All persons preparing, manufacturing, or handling ice-cream, ices, or other frozen products, shall be cleanly in their habits, and must wash their hands before beginning work and after visiting toilet.

Regulation 28. Clothing of Employees: persons preparing, manufacturing or handling ice-cream, ices or other frozen products shall ice-cream, ices or other frozen products shall wear clean, washable, outer garments.

Regulation 29. Cleanliness of Employees Engaged in Mixing Ingredients: All persons immediately before engaging in the mixing of ingredients entering into the composition of frozen products or its subsequent freezing or handling shall thoroughly wash their hands and shall thereafter keep them clean during such manufacture and handling.

Regulation 30. Employees Designated to Cut and Wrap Brick Ice-cream: Employees shall not touch the product with their hands at any time; provided, however, employees especially designated to cut and wrap brick ice-cream and to

fill fancy molds, which work necessitates some handling of the product, shall be scrupulously clean and wear clean, washable clothing and caps. Regulation 31. Smoking and Use of Tobacco Prohibited: Employees shall not smoke or chew tobacco while at work.

Regulation 32. Spitting Signs: Placards prohibiting spitting on floors shall be conspicuously posted.

Regulation 33. Cuspidors: A sufficient number of cuspidors shall be provided and shall be cleaned and disinfected daily.

Regulation 34. Refrigeration of Perishable Foodstuffs: All ice cream, ices and other frozen products, stored for sale, shall be stored and kept refrigerated in a properly constructed refrigerator.

Regulation 35. Housing of Animals Prohibited:
No animals, excepting cats, shall be housed, or kept in any room where ice cream, ices or other frozen products are exposed, packed, handled, stored, manufactured, offered for sale or sold.
Regulations Governing the Preparation, Storing, Offering for Sale and Selling of Food and Drink in Kitchens, Serving and Dining Rooms of Hotels, Restaurants, Boarding Houses, Cafes, Lunch Rooms, Saloons, Grill Rooms and Buffets, or Other Public Places.
Regulation 1. Rooms, Insanitary Conditions, Ventilations and Water Closets: Food and drink shall not be prepared, cooked, mixed, baked, exposed, bottled, packed, handled, stored, manufactured, offered for sale or sold in any stable, room used for sleeping purposes, or in any room or tured, offered for sale or sold in any stable, room used for sleeping purposes, or in any room or place which is dark, damp, poorly ventilated, dirty or insanitary, or in direct communication with such stable or room or with a water-closet compartment, except when such water-closet compartment is enclosed by a suitable and properly lighted vestibule. Every such water-closet compartment, except when provided with mechanical means of ventilation, shall have a window at least 1 foot by 3 feet between stop beads, opening to an external air, and the entire window shall be made so as to readily open, or an opening connecting with the external air measuring at least 144 square inches for each water-closet or urinal with an increase of 72 square inches for each additional water-closet or urinal. Material: No accumulation of rubbish, useless or offensive Material: No accumulation of rubbish, useless or offensive material shall be permitted in any room or place where food or drink is prepared, cooked, mixed, baked, exposed, bottled, packed, handled, stored, manufactured, offered for sale or sold.

Regulation 4. Lighting: All rooms or places in which food or drink is prepared, cooked, mixed, baked, exposed, bottled, packed, handled, stored, manufactured, offered for sale or sold. shall be properly and adequately lighted, so that all parts thereof may be readily inspected.

Regulation 5. Screening of Doors, Windows and Other Openings: All doors, windows and other openings shall be properly screened from May 1st to October 31st. Screen doors shall be provided with self-closing devices.

Regulation 6. Construction of Walls and Ceilings: Walls and ceilings shall be of a smooth, hard material and must be kept clean and sanitary and in good repair, and shall be of light colored finish.

Regulation 7. Construction of Floors: Floors

Regulation 7. Construction of Floors: Floors shall be smooth and water-tight and must be kept clean and sanitary and in good repair and shall be scrubbed or flushed with water twice weekly. Regulation 8. Counters, Shelves, Show Cases and Windows: All show or display cases or windows, counters or shelves, used in handling, keeping and displaying food and drink, shall be kept

ing and displaying food and drink, shall be kept clean and sanitary, free from dust, dirt and other contaminating material and in good repair.

Regulation 9. Refrigerators, Ice Boxes, Etc.: All refrigerators, ice boxes and appurtenances thereof used for the storage of food or drink shall be kept clean and sanitary and in good repair, and the compartment used for the storage of ice shall be lined with some proper metallic substance so as to be water-tight.

Regulation 10. Drainage of Refrigerators, Ice Boxes, Etc.: Waste water from refrigerators, ice boxes, refrigerated display cases, windows or counters, vats or tanks, or other containers, used in refrigerating and storing food or drink shall discharge into an open, water-supplied, properly-trapped, sewer-connected sink.

Regulation 11. Refrigeration of Perishable Foodstuffs: All perishable food or drink shall be

Foodstuffs: All perishable food or drink shall be stored and kept refrigerated in a properly constructed refrigerator.

Regulation 12. Lighting and Ventilation of Kitchens: All kitchens shall be provided with proper and adequate windows, or with artificial light and mechanical means of ventilation, so that all parts thereof may be readily inspected and ventilated. Regulation 13. Ventilation of Stoves, Ovens and Ashpits: All stoves, ovens and ashpits shall be provided with ventilating hoods and pipes or with other mechanical means to so ventilate same

as to render harmless to persons working therein any steam, gases, vapors, excessive heat or any impurities that may be generated or released by or in the process of making, preparing, baking and cooking food.

Regulation 14. Wooden Platforms: All wooden platforms used in kitchens and not entering into the permanent construction of building shall be thoroughly scrubbed daily with hot water and Sal Soda, or other suitable cleansing agent.

Regulation 15. Construction of Apparatus, Utensils and Appurtenances: All apparatus, utensils and appurtenances thereof used in the preparation and handling of food or drink shall be so constructed and placed that they can be thoroughly cleaned and shall be kept clean and sanitary and in good repair.

Regulation 16. Sinks and Water Supply: Suitable sinks with an adequate supply of running not and cold water shall be provided.

Regulation 17. Cleanliness of Utensils: All utensils used in the preparation, service and sale of food or drink shall be properly cleansed with hot water after being used, and no utensil shall, under any circumstances, be used a second time unless it shall have been, after previous use thereof, so cleansed, and in such cleansing the use of water which has become insanitary by previous use is prohibited.

Regulation 18. Use of Rusted or Badly Worn Utensils Prohibited: The use of any utensil used in the preparation, service and sale of food or drink, which is badly worn, rusted, corroded, or in such condition that it cannot be rendered clean and sanitary by washing, is prohibited.

Regulation 19. Protection of Foodstuffs: All foodstuffs not protected by a fly and dustproof wrapper must be covered in cases of glass, metal, wood, or close mesh wire screening, so as to prevent contamination by dust, dirt and flies.

Regulation 20. Storage of Food on Floor, Sidawalk Etc. No food intended for human con-

Regulation 20. Storage of Food on Floor, Sidewalk, Etc.: No food intended for human consumption shall be deposited or allowed to remain within 2 feet of the surface of any side-

walk, street, alley or public place, or on the floor of any building where exhibited, unless the same shall be contained in boxes or other receptacles so as to be protected from dogs and other animals and their excretions.

Regulation 21. Covering of Food and Drink: Food and drink shall be kept covered so as to prevent contamination from dust, dirt, flies and other contaminating material.

Regulation 22. Storing of Foods in Metal Containers: All foods that are preserved or canned in metal containers shall be removed therefrom immediately upon being opened so as to prevent contamination thereof.

Regulation 23. Raw Material: All food, drink and raw material used in the preparation, service and sale shall be healthy, fresh, sound, wholesome and safe for human consumption.

Regulation 24. Storing of Foodstuffs to Be Considered Prima Facie Evidence of Its Use: The presence of any food, drink or raw material in any part of the establishment shall be deemed prima facie evidence of its use for human food.

Regulation 25. Coloring Matter of Preservatives: The presence in any part of an establishment of any prohibited coloring matter or presence or preservatives. Regulation 25. Coloring Matter of Preserva-tives: The presence in any part of an establish-ment of any prohibited coloring matter or pre-servative shall be deemed prima facie evidence of its use and the presence of any such material may be sufficient cause for the prosecution of the owners and proprietors of the establishment. Regulation 26. Disposition of Food and Drink Unfit for Human Consumption: Food or drink which has become unfit for human consumption.

Unfit for Human Consumption: Food or drink which has become unfit for human consumption shall be kept separate and apart from other foodstuffs which are held, kept and offered for sale, properly denatured, marked "Condemned" and removed daily.

Regulation 27. Garbage Receptacles: Suitable, water-tight, properly covered, galvanized, iron, or other sanitary metal cans for receiving and holding without leakage all garbage and other waste material shall be provided. A tight-fitting cover shall be kept covered. All garbage and other waste material shall be removed from the premises daily and shall not be allowed to become a nuisance.

Regulation 38. Housing of Animals Prohibited: No animals, excepting cats, shall be housed or kept in any room where food or drink is prepared, cooked, mixed, baked, exposed, bottled, packed, handled, stored, manufactured, offered for sale or sold.

Every such water-closet compartment, except when provided with mechanical means of ventilation, shall have a window at least 1 foot by 3 feet between stop beads, opening to external air, and the entire window shall be made so as to readily open or an opening connecting with the external air measuring at least 144 square inches for each water-closet or urinal with an increase of 72 square inches for each additional water-closet or urinal. The doors of water-closet compartment water-closet compartment, except when such square inches for each additional water-closet or urinal. Regulation 8. Construction of Benches, Tables, Etc.: All benches, tables used in the breaking out of eggs for food purposes shall be of smooth, hard material and constructed so that they can be kept clean and sanitary.

Regulation 9. Cleaning of Floors, Walls and Utensils: All floors, walls, and utensils must be thoroughly cleaned and washed at the close of the day's work Construction of Benches,

thoroughly cleaned and washed at the close of the day's work.

Regulation 10. Sinks and Water Supply: Suitable sinks, with an adequate supply of running hot and cold water, shall be provided.

Regulation 11. Cleanliness of Utensils: All utensils used in the breaking out of eggs for edible purposes shall be properly cleansed with hot water after being used and no utensil shall, under any circumstances, be used a second time unless it shall have been, after previous use thereof, so cleansed, and in such cleansing the use of water which has become insanitary by previous use is prohibited.

thereof, so cleansed, and in such cleansing the use of water which has become insanitary by previous use is prohibited.

Regulation 12. Use of Rusted or Badly Worn Utensils Prohibited: The use of any utensil used in the breaking out of eggs for edible purposes, which is badly worn, rusted, corroded, or in such condition that it cannot be rendered clean and sanitary by washing is prohibited.

Regulation 13. Construction of Apparatus, Utensils and Appurtenances: All apparatus, utensils and appurtenances thereof, used in the breaking out of eggs for edible purposes, shall be so constructed and placed that they can be readily cleaned and shall be kept clean and sanitary and in good repair.

Regulation 14. Apparatus for Cooling Eggs to be Provided: Proper apparatus for immediately cooling the eggs to a temperature of less than 45° F. shall be installed in all establishments where eggs are broken out for food pur-

ments where eggs are broken out for food pur-

Regulation 15. Temperature of Eggs: Eggs broken from shell intended for food purposes shall be deemed adulterated if the temperature

shall be deemed adulterated if the temperature of the eggs is above 45° F.

Regulation 16. Light Leakers: Eggs which are commercially known as "Light Leakers" and where the contents are sweet and clean may be broken out for food purposes provided said eggs have been kept in a clean and sanitary manner, approved by the Department of Health and properly protected from dust, dirt and other contaminating matter.

properly protected from dust, dirt and other contaminating matter.

Regulation 17. "Spots" or "Spot Eggs:" No person shall break out for food purposes eggs which are known as "spots" or "spot eggs." The term "spots" and "spot eggs" when used herein means all eggs that are partially hatched, broken yolked, blood ringed, or veined; and all unsound eggs, including those affected by moulds or which are partly decomposed, or have become sour.

Regulation 18. Covering of Eggs Broken from Shell: No receptacles containing eggs broken from shells shall be allowed to remain uncovered except the receptacle into which the eggs are

except the receptacle into which the eggs are actually being broken.

Regulation 19. Denaturing of "Spots" or "Spot Eggs:" During the process of breaking out or candling of eggs for food purposes all eggs found to be "spots" or "spot eggs" shall be immediately denatured. The term "denatured" when used herein refers to the treatment of eggs with a substance approved by the Department of Health, the presence of which on the eggs prevents their use for human food.

Regulation 20. Receptacles for "Spots" and "Spot Eggs:" Suitable receptacles for "spots" and "spot eggs" shall be provided in the candling and breaking out room. Such receptacles shall and breaking out room. Such receptacles shall at all times contain a sufficient quantity of the denaturant approved by the Department of Health, and shall be stencilled with 2" block let-

Regulation 21. Marking of Containers: Each container or receptacle used for bringing eggs broken from shells intended for food purposes into the City of New York or holding, delivering, offering for sale or selling same shall be plainly and indelibly marked with the date and place where eggs were broken from shell and the name of person, firm, or corporation offering for

name of person, firm, or corporation offering for sale, selling or delivering same.

Regulation 22. Preservatives, Coloring Matter: The presence in any part of an establishment of any prohibitive coloring matter or preservative shall be deemed prima facie evidence of its use and the presence of any such material may be sufficient cause for the prosecution of the owners and proprietors of the establishment.

Regulation 23. Garbage Receptacles: Suitable, Regulation 23. Garbage Receptacles: Suitable, water-tight, properly covered, galvanized iron, or other sanitary metal cans for receiving and holding without leakage all garbage and other waste material shall be provided. A tight fitting cover shall be provided for each can. All garbage and other waste material shall be removed from the premises daily and shall not be allowed to become a nuisance.

Regulation 27. Clothing of Employees: All persons breaking out eggs for edible purposes shall wear clean, washable, outer garments.

Regulation 28. Spitting Signs: Placards prohibiting spitting on floors shall be conspicuously

posted.

Regulation 29. Cuspidors: A sufficient number of cuspidors shall be provided and shall be cleansed and disinfected daily.

Regulations Governing the Breaking Out of Eggs for Inedible Purposes.

Regulation 1. Lighting: All rooms in which eggs are broken from shell for inedible purposes shall be properly and adequately lighted so that all parts may be readily inspected.

Regulation 2. Construction of Walls and Ceilings: Walls and ceilings shall be of a smooth, hard material, and shall be kept clean and sanitary and in good repair and shall be painted or whitewashed as frequently as may be required whitewashed as frequently as may be required by the Department of Health. Regulation 3. Construction of Floors: Floors

shall be cement, properly graded to sewer-con-nected drains and must be kept clean and sani-tary and in good repair. Floors shall be

scrubbed, flushed and deodorized at the close of business each day.
