## MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Minutes of a Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York, Held Wednesday, August 15, 1917, at 10.30 o'clock a. m.

Present—Dr. Henry Moskowitz, President; Darwin R. James, Jr., and Alexander Koegh, Commissioners. The president presided.

A public hearing was called on the proposed amendment of the Classification by striking from the Exempt Class under the heading "Mayor's Office" the title "Confidential Inspector of Weights and Measures." There were no appearances and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

The Commission then went into regular session, and, on motion, the minutes of the meetings held July 11 and 13, 1917, were approved.

Candidates should be familiar with the laws affecting the care and relief of indigent persons and needy children in New York City; with the methods and agencies for the care and assistance of needy children, the sick and the poor, and with the present work and historical growth of both public and private agencies and institutions for the care and relief of such persons. Experience or special training in connection with charitable institutions, hospital social service, societies for the relief of the poor in their homes, or for aiding or protecting children, or training along similar lines is desirable and will be given weight.

Candidates must be at least 21 years of age and not more than 50 years of age on or before the closing date for the receipt of applications.

The compensation rates proposed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for this position are from \$1,080 to \$1,380 per annum. Under the terms and conditions of the budget for the year 1917, appointments will, as a rule, be made at the lowest compensation rate.

Vacancies occur from time to time.

Only those who pass the physical examination will be summoned for the practical test. Only those who pass the practical test will be summoned for the written test on Duties.

The practical test will be a test of the candidates' knowledge of and proficiency in baseball, basketball, soccer, football, track and field athletics, tennis and gymnasium apparatus work. Candidates will also be required to demonstrate their ability to teach the various playground games and setting up exercises.

Applications for this examination must be filed on a special blank, Form B.

Duties: To organize, lead and supervise the outdoor play and athletic activities of boys; to conduct the customary activities in indoor gymnasiums; to oversee public tennis grounds and other fields given over to public recreation.

Requirements: Candidates should possess a high school education or its equivalent and should have had successful and extensive experience as play leaders or athletic officials, or as amateur or professional competitors or coaches in one or more appropriate branches of sport. They should also understand the proper care and use of playground and gymnasium equipment and supplies and should possess a practical knowledge of First Aid Remedies and practices.

Candidates must be at least 18 years of age and not more than 40 years of age on the date of filing applications.

The compensation rates proposed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for this position are from \$900 to \$1,080 per annum. Under the terms and conditions of the budget for the year 1917, appointments will, as a rule, be made at the lowest compensation rate.

**Resolutions Adopted.**

Whereas, the Division of Factory Inspection has submitted to this Commission the following requests for variation of law, made by the parties named herein, in which appeal is made from a strict compliance with the orders issued by the Inspection Division against the premises noted below, the granting of which would necessitate a variation of law; and

Whereas, the Division of Inspection has had a reinspection made in each case, and in accordance with the reports submitted recommends as follows:

(1) Premises affected, Amsterdam, foot Elk st., rear; appellant, Shuttleworth Bros. Co. 2—Provide 2 legal exits; 4-story nonfireproof building; sprinkler; open lofts; no combustibles; no fire alarm; occupancy above the 2d floor; 1; no interior stairs; no egress from roof; imperfect horizontal exit on 2d, 3d and 4th floors; imperfect fire escape, on 2d floor only; openings fireproof.

Recommendation: Provide interior wooden stairs at east end of building from 4th floor to ground, enclosed in wooden partitions with door at foot of each stairway; underside of bridge used as horizontal exit to be covered with metal; fusible links to be provided on all fireproof windows in bridge; no fireproof sill to be required for horizontal exit on 2d floor.



Each bid shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making a bid for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer or employee of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid must be verified by the oath, in writing, or the party or parties making the bid that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true.

No bid will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of such bid, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks or trust companies of The City of New York, or a check of such bank or trust company signed by a duly authorized officer thereof, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement, to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

All bids for supplies must be submitted in duplicate.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid.

For particulars as to the quantity or quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation of the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done or the supplies are to be furnished.
