On motion of Commissioner Hatch—

Resolved, That Alexander Davidson, Superintendent of Supplies, be and he is hereby directed to superintend the receiving and delivery of fuel and forage which is to be delivered under existing contracts made or hereafter to be made by this Department.

On motion of Commissioner Hatch—

Resolved, That the Inspector of Combustibles be and he is hereby authorized to lease the stable No. 86 Amity street, for the use of this Department, at the rate of thirty-five dollars per month, payable monthly, with the privilege of the Department surrendering the same at their own option.

### NEW COUNTY COURT-HOUSE COMMISSION.

Abstract of the Proceedings of the New County Court-house Commission.

JUNE 17, 1874.

The Commissioners of the New County Court-house met at 2 P.M., on Wednesday, June 17, 1874, in the Chamber of the General Term, Superior Court.

The roll was called, and there were present: John P. Cumming, Smith E. Shaw, and Thomas B. Tappen.

Absent—Wyllis Blackstone.

The minutes of the meeting held June 15, 1874, were read and adopted.

On motion, Commissioner Tappen was elected Chairman *pro tem.*

Commissioner Cumming moved that the Janitor of the New County Court-house be sent for to attend the meeting.

Which motion was adopted.

The Janitor, Mr. Wm. H. Redfield, immediately appeared before the Commission, and, in response to certain inquiries, stated that of four desks used by the former Commission three were in the possession of the Commissioners of Accounts, and one somewhere in the County Court-house; and that the only room in the building not now in use was that formerly occupied by the Board of Supervisors as a Committee-room.

Commissioner Shaw moved that the Secretary *pro tem.* be and he is hereby authorized to obtain the keys of the room formerly used as a Committee-room by the Board of Supervisors, and, if necessary, to employ a locksmith, and take possession of said room.

The Chairman *pro tem.* put the question whether the Commissioners would agree with said motion.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote:

Affirmative—Commissioners Tappen, Cumming, and Shaw.

Commissioner Shaw moved that the Secretary *pro tem.* be authorized to procure a sign for the office of the Commission.

Which motion was laid upon the table.

On motion of Commissioner Cumming, the Secretary *pro tem.* was directed to place the clock now in the keeping of the Janitor, in the office of the Commission as soon as it is taken.

The Commission then adjourned to meet again on Friday, the 19th instant, at 1:30 P.M.

### REPORT

OF THE

### DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS,

FOR THE QUARTER ENDING JUNE 30, 1874.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS,

NEW YORK, Sept. 10, 1874.

Hon. WM. F. HAVEMAYER, Mayor of the City of New York:

SIR—In compliance with section 27 of the Charter, and with your communication of June 30 I have the honor to submit herewith a report of the transactions of this Department for the quarter ending June 30, 1874, consisting of the reports of the various Bureaux in the Department, and statements "A" and "B," exhibiting the amounts appropriated for the use of the Department, the expenditures incurred under the several appropriations, and the balances remaining unexpended.

The expenditures of the Department on taxation account, from appropriations set apart for its use for the maintenance of the structures, property, and machinery of the Croton Aqueduct, reservoirs, and distributing system; for the maintenance and repairs of boulevards, roads, and avenues, street pavements, sewers, public buildings, free floating-baths; for supplies to and cleaning public offices, including all the Civil and Police Courts; and for salaries of officers, clerks, and other permanent employees of the Department, were \$347,347.79.

Under the resolutions of the Board of City Record, charging this Department with the duty of supplying stationery, printing, and blank-books to the several city departments, officers, and courts, the amount of \$21,881.01 was expended, and requisition was also made for the payment of bills approved by that Board, not incurred by this Department, amounting to \$2,248.52.

The amounts shown in statement "A" as having been expended for "Printing, Stationery, and Blank-books, for Executive and Legislative Departments up to April 30, 1874," are taken from statements furnished by the Department of Finance, this Department having had no control over such expenditures.

No expenditures were made by the Department previous to June 30, under the appropriations for repairing county buildings, and supplying and cleaning county offices, which are placed under its control by the act consolidating the city and county governments. The amounts shown in statement "A" as having been expended under county appropriations are taken from statements furnished by the Clerk of the Common Council and *ex-officio* Clerk of the Board of Supervisors, who had control of the appropriations previous to the Consolidation act.

The expenditures on Trust accounts during the quarter, were as follows:

For regulating, grading, paving, sewerage, and otherwise improving streets, avenues, boulevards, etc., to be refunded by assessments.....	\$1,123,706 76
For alterations of Croton Aqueduct on Tenth avenue.....	64,547 56
For laying Croton pipes, improvement of reservoirs, etc.....	290,356 15
For reconstruction of old sewers.....	18,972 27

The great bulk of the work carried on by this Department is necessarily done during the Second and Third quarters, and the earlier part of the Fourth quarter of the calendar year, when the season is favorable to the prosecution of outdoor work, and the expenditures are consequently much larger than during the other parts of the year; a comparison of expenditures would therefore be of no value, unless the amount of work done is taken in consideration—a computation of which would require so much labor and space, that it cannot properly come within the compass of this report, but is reserved for the regular annual report of the Department.

SIR—In compliance with your request, I have the honor to make the following report:

There were received at this Bureau during the months of April, May, and June, 1874, three thousand seven hundred and twenty-three complaints of obstructions and incumbrances on streets and sidewalks, and against dangerous and smooth vault covers, all of which said complaints received due and proper attention.

The parties complained of as obstructing and incumbering the streets and sidewalks were served with notices to remove the incumbrances and desist from the further violation of the ordinances in that respect.

Since the 1st day of April last no removals (except one) of incumbrances or obstructions from the street or sidewalk has been made by this Bureau, on account of not having any money to pay the incidental expenses of such removal. A removal of clothing was made from the sidewalk on Eighth avenue at the request of the Mayor, he stating that if the removal was made he would be responsible for the expenses.

Complainants are daily calling upon me and demanding that this Bureau should make removals to the corporation yard of articles obstructing the street and sidewalks, but such removals cannot be made unless money is provided to pay the incidental expenses of such removals. This Bureau in its active operations (of removing incumbrances) has been suspended for the past 3 months for the reason above stated.

There were issued from this Bureau during the three past months five hundred and forty-eight permits to builders to temporarily place building materials on the street for the erection or repair of buildings.

Six permits were issued to parties owning premises to cut down rotten or dangerous trees from the sidewalks in front of their residences.

Seventy-six notices were issued to owners and occupants of premises to repair dangerous and broken sidewalks.

A large number of complaints have been received from the Commissioners of Police against persons using smooth vault covers.

Blank notices have been prepared for service upon parties complained of, and as soon as printed will be filled up and duly served.

## PLANTING.

Since April 1, 201 American elms have been planted upon the Boulevard, which completes the two rows on the "center piece," from the circle at Fifty-ninth street to Manhattan street (the terminus of the center piece), besides setting out a row, along each sidewalk, wherever the sewers were completed.

On the Avenue St. Nicholas, 83 sugar maples were set along each sidewalk, extending from One Hundred and Tenth street to One Hundred and Sixteenth street.

## MAINTENANCE OF THE BOULEVARD, STREETS, AND AVENUES NORTH OF FIFTY-NINTH STREET.

No new roads or avenues have been opened for use since my last report, and the length (14 11-100 miles) being kept in repair is the same; the present force employed is 65 men and teams.

## FORCE EMPLOYED.

The force employed upon all the works under the direction of this Bureau, on April 1, 1874, was 1,707 men and teams; the present force is 1,805 men and teams.

The number of men placed upon the works by appointment has been 298 men and teams.

The number discharged for inefficiency, neglect of duty, and other causes, has been 110 men and teams.

The remainder of the decrease have left the work of their own accord.

On motion of Commissioner Disbecker, it was Resolved, That Rule 226 of the Manual be amended so as to read as follows:

## RULE 226.

The Station-houses are to be used exclusively for Police business, and must not be used for any other purpose. No person shall be permitted to remain in the Police Station-house without express permission from the officer in charge, except members of the Department and persons on business. The names of all persons receiving such permission shall be entered in full upon the blotter. Discussions and conversations in Station-houses by members of the force or others in relation to party politics are improper, and will not be permitted. No person, except the superior officers of the Department, shall be allowed to enter behind the desk.

Resolved, That the above-amended rule be promulgated to the force by the Superintendent.

On motion of Commissioner Disbecker, it was Resolved, That detailments of members of the force to the performance of Police service exclusively beyond the limits of the City of New York, on the application of individuals, corporations, or associations, will not hereafter be made, except in cases where the people of the City of New York will be directly benefited by such service.

Resolved, That meetings of the Board of Police be "public," except only such as by exposure would hinder or defeat efforts that may be or are being made for the prevention or detection of crime, or the apprehension of criminals.
