FOR THE QUARTER ENDING JUNE 30, 1874.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS,

NEW YORK, Sept. 10, 1874.

Hon. WM. F. HAVEMEYER, Mayor of the City of New York:

SIR—In compliance with section 27 of the Charter, and with your communication of June 30 I have the honor to submit herewith a report of the transactions of this Department for the quarter ending June 30, 1874, consisting of the reports of the various Bureaux in the Department, and statements “A” and “B,” exhibiting the amounts appropriated for the use of the Department, the expenditures incurred under the several appropriations, and the balances remaining unexpended.

The expenditures of the Department on taxation account, from appropriations set apart for its use for the maintenance of the structures, property, and machinery of the Croton Aqueduct, reservoirs, and distributing system; for the maintenance and repairs of boulevards, roads, and avenues, street pavements, sewers, public buildings, free floating-baths; for supplies to and cleaning public offices, including all the Civil and Police Courts; and for salaries of officers, clerks, and other permanent employees of the Department, were \$347,347.79.

Under the resolutions of the Board of City Record, charging this Department with the duty of supplying stationery, printing, and blank-books to the several city departments, officers, and courts, the amount of \$21,881.01 was expended, and requisition was also made for the payment of bills approved by that Board, not incurred by this Department, amounting to \$2,248.52.

The amounts shown in statement “A” as having been expended for “Printing, Stationery, and Blank-books, for Executive and Legislative Departments up to April 30, 1874,” are taken from statements furnished by the Department of Finance, this Department having had no control over such expenditures.

No expenditures were made by the Department previous to June 30, under the appropriations for repairing county buildings, and supplying and cleaning county offices, which are placed under its control by the act consolidating the city and county governments. The amounts shown in statement “A” as having been expended under county appropriations are taken from statements furnished by the Clerk of the Common Council and *ex officio* Clerk of the Board of Supervisors, who had control of the appropriations previous to the Consolidation act.

The expenditures on Trust accounts during the quarter, were as follows:

For regulating, grading, paving, sewerage, and otherwise improving streets, avenues, boulevards, etc., to be refunded by assessments..... \$1,123,706 76
For alterations of Croton Aqueduct on Tenth avenue..... 64,547 56
For laying Croton pipes, improvement of reservoirs, etc..... 290,356 15
For reconstruction of old sewers..... 18,972 27

Total..... \$1,497,582 74

The great bulk of the work carried on by this Department is necessarily done during the Second and Third quarters, and the earlier part of the Fourth quarter of the calendar year, when the season is favorable to the prosecution of outdoor work, and the expenditures are consequently much larger than during the other parts of the year; a comparison of expenditures would therefore be of no value, unless the amount of work done is taken in consideration—a computation of which would require so much labor and space, that it cannot properly come within the compass of this report, but is reserved for the regular annual report of the Department.

SIR—The following is the report of the transactions of this Bureau for the months of April, May, and June of this year:

NEW PAVEMENTS.

Belgian or trap-block pavements have been laid in the following localities under contracts which are completed:

Second avenue, between Sixty-third and Sixty-sixth streets.
Fifty-fourth street, between Tenth and Eleventh avenues.
Sixty-fifth street, between Third and Fifth avenues.
Sixty-eighth street, between Fourth and Fifth avenues.
Eightieth street, between Fifth and Madison avenues.

And the granite pavement work has been completed on One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, from Harlem River to Manhattan street, and Manhattan street from One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street to North River.

The new contracts for pavements entered into will be found in the report of the Contract Clerk.

REPAIRS TO STREET PAVEMENTS.

Work on repairs to stone, wooden, and concrete pavement was commenced in the latter part of the month of March, and a large force of men was soon engaged, which, as repairs were made where most urgently needed, was compelled to be reduced in order to keep the work going throughout the usual season for making repairs, viz., from April to November, inclusive.

The appropriations for stone pavements, \$100,000, and for wooden or concrete pavements, \$50,000, I regard as inadequate for the repairs needed; more particularly so for the wooden pavements, as many places which should be repaired will receive no attention, owing to the want of money to do the work. A particular instance is Seventh avenue, which is almost impassable for vehicles.

The stone pavements in the most important thoroughfares at this time are generally in fair condition.

CROTON-PIPES.

The force of men engaged in laying Croton-pipes, placing fire-hydrants, &c., has been considerably reduced—numbering now some three hundred and fifty men.

For repairs to pipes, stop-cocks, fire-hydrants, &c., the usual force of three companies has been employed.

The Chief Engineer's report will give the amount of pipes laid.

VAULTS.

The receipts for vault permits for the past three months amounted to fourteen thousand four hundred and forty-six dollars and twenty-nine cents (\$14,446.29).

The natural flow of the Croton river has thus far this year furnished a full supply of water for the city without having to draw from the stored water in the Croton basin. Last year, at this time, we were drawing largely from the storage reservoir at Boyd's Corners.

The consumption and waste of water is steadily increasing. We are now bringing into the city 5,000,000 gallons daily over what was brought in at this time last year.

The Aqueduct has been kept in good repair, and every precaution is taken to secure a steady and uninterrupted supply of water to the city.

The work of changing the Aqueduct between Ninety-third and One Hundred and Thirteenth streets has so far progressed, that the pipes for the new conduit are delivered and all laid, except those to connect with the gate-houses. The masonry for these is underway. Contracts have been made for the cut stone required for these houses; also, proposals have been received for the gates.

The work of extending the distribution of the Croton water, and the laying of the four-foot main on the west side, to give a more full supply and better head of water in the lower part of the city, has been steadily pushed forward.

During the last quarter Croton-mains have been laid as follows:

6,850 lineal feet of 48-inch pipe.	
7,700 do. 20 do.	
3,080 do. 12 do.	
6,020 do. 6 do.	
2,575 do. 4 do.	

In order to give better protection to the valuable property stored in Church street, a 20-inch Croton-main has been laid in that street, and twenty large double-nozzle hydrants placed in the several streets, between Vesey and Leonard streets, adjacent to Church street, and connected with the Croton-main in that street.

Twenty-five other new fire-hydrants have been placed. The 12-inch Croton-main on old Broadway, between Fiftieth and Fifty-fourth streets, has been taken up and relaid on the new line of Broadway.

The connections made where pipes formerly terminated, leaving dead ends, and the blowing out of the pipes, has removed most of the causes of complaint of bad water, and such complaints have almost ceased. Complaints are still made of lack of head to carry the water to the upper stories of houses in the lower part of the city, but this will be only remedied by additional large mains, and some more active steps taken to stop the waste of water.

SIR—In compliance with your instructions, I herewith submit a report of the operations of the Bureau of Lamps and Gas for the three months ending June 30, 1874.

In Exhibit A you will find a statement of all vouchers certified by me during the quarter, showing a total expenditure of one hundred and forty-six thousand three hundred and eighty dollars and nine cents (\$146,380.09), of which eighteen hundred and sixty-one dollars and twenty-five cents was on account of the appropriation for lamps and gas for 1873; one hundred and forty-four thousand three hundred and sixty-six dollars and nine cents was on account of the appropriation for 1874; ninety dollars and twenty-five cents was for lamps and gas, Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards; and sixty-two dollars and fifty cents on account of Contingencies, Department of Public Works. SIR—In compliance with your request, I herewith submit a report of the operations of this Bureau for three months ending June 30, 1874.

As soon as the season permitted the repairs rendered necessary by the action of the elements during the past winter, and by the usual wear and tear on the several streets, roads, and avenues under the charge of this Bureau, were commenced.

The Eighth avenue, from Avenue St. Nicholas to the Harlem river, has been regravelled and rolled.

Large quantities of broken stone and gravel have been used in repairing Kingsbridge road, from Tenth avenue to Spuyten Duyvil Creek.

A complete top dressing of gravel, obtained in the vicinity, has been placed on Tenth avenue, from One Hundred and Forty-second to One Hundred and Fifty-second street.

Break Neck Hill road, Fort Washington Depot road, and all the unpaved streets in the upper part of the city, which are used by the public as means of communication, have been repaired to the extent that circumstances required, and the limited amount of the appropriation therefor would permit.

The sprinkling of the several roads, especially the Eighth avenue, from One Hundred and Twenty-second street to McComb's Dam Bridge, has been performed to the full extent that the appropriation would allow.

The following is a statement of the condition of the appropriation for Roads and Avenues, and Sprinkling, and the amount expended under the same during the quarter ending June 30, 1874:

SIR—In compliance with your request, I have the honor to make the following report:

There were received at this Bureau during the months of April, May, and June, 1874, three thousand seven hundred and twenty-three complaints of obstructions and incumbrances on streets and sidewalks, and against dangerous and smooth vault covers, all of which said complaints received due and proper attention.

The parties complained of as obstructing and incumbering the streets and sidewalks were served with notices to remove the incumbrances and desist from the further violation of the ordinances in that respect.

Since the 1st day of April last no removals (except one) of incumbrances or obstructions from the street or sidewalk has been made by this Bureau, on account of not having any money to pay the incidental expenses of such removal. A removal of clothing was made from the sidewalk on Eighth avenue at the request of the Mayor, he stating that if the removal was made he would be responsible for the expenses.

Complainants are daily calling upon me and demanding that this Bureau should make removals to the corporation yard of articles obstructing the street and sidewalks, but such removals cannot be made unless money is provided to pay the incidental expenses of such removals. This Bureau in its active operations (of removing incumbrances) has been suspended for the past 3 months for the reason above stated.

There were issued from this Bureau during the three past months five hundred and forty-eight permits to builders to temporarily place building materials on the street for the erection or repair of buildings.

Six permits were issued to parties owning premises to cut down rotten or dangerous trees from the sidewalks in front of their residences.

Seventy-six notices were issued to owners and occupants of premises to repair dangerous and broken sidewalks.

A large number of complaints have been received from the Commissioners of Police against persons using smooth vault covers.

Blank notices have been prepared for service upon parties complained of, and as soon as printed will be filled up and duly served.

On the Avenue St. Nicholas, 83 sugar maples were set along each sidewalk, extending from One Hundred and Tenth street to One Hundred and Sixteenth street.

MAINTENANCE OF THE BOULEVARD, STREETS, AND AVENUES NORTH OF FIFTY-NINTH STREET.

No new roads or avenues have been opened for use since my last report, and the length (14 11-100 miles) being kept in repair is the same; the present force employed is 65 men and teams.

FORCE EMPLOYED.

The force employed upon all the works under the direction of this Bureau, on April 1, 1874, was 1,707 men and teams; the present force is 1,805 men and teams.
The number of men placed upon the works by appointment has been 298 men and teams.
The number discharged for inefficiency, neglect of duty, and other causes, has been 110 men and teams.
