

AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Adjourned Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their office, No. 209 Stewart Building, on Tuesday, November 16, 1886, at 3 o'clock P. M.

Present—Commissioners Spencer, Dowd, Baldwin, Barnes, Ridgway and Fish; also Chief Engineer Birdsall of the Department of Public Works.

The minutes of the adjourned meeting of the 12th instant were read and approved.

The Committee of Finance and Audit reported that the special matters heretofore referred to them, with reference to allowing Coldwell, Wilcox & Co., contractors, fifty per cent. on their contract for ironwork, and also in reference to allowing Smith & Brown, contractors, a part payment for ne delivered for the masonry for the new gate-house on Section I, were still under consideration,

stone delivered for the masonry for the new gate-house on Section 1, were still under consideration, and they reported progress. Approved.

The Chief Engineer reported that he had made an investigation of the accidents and their cause at Shaft 16 on the 19th of October, and of Shaft 27 on the 27th of October; and that he was unable to learn that there was any special blame to be charged against any person in the employ of the Commission. Which was read and ordered placed on file.

The Commissioner of Public Works submitted the six similar property-maps of the lands required for Shaft Site No. 15½, in the town of Greenburg, Westchester County; also the six similar property-maps of the additional land required at Shaft Site No. 8, in the town of Mount Pleasant, Westchester County; and in connection therewith, on motion of Commissioner Baldwin, the following resolutions were presented.

Resolved, That the six similar property-maps of additional lands required upon the line of the New Aqueduct, in the town of Mount Pleasant, and county of Westchester, at Shaft Site No. 8, submitted to the Aqueduct Commissioners by the Commissioner of Public Works under date of November 16, 1886, be and the same are hereby adopted by the Aqueduct Commissioners; and it is hereby ordered that said maps be transmitted to the Counsel to the Corporation, with a certificate of said approval signed by the Aqueduct Commissioners, adopting said maps; the said maps to be filed and furnished to the Commissioners of Appraisal, as required by law; and the said Counsel

to the Corporation is hereby requested to take, at as early day as practicable, the required proceedings for acquiring the lands described upon said maps. Adopted.

Resolved, that the six similar maps of the property required for the proper construction and maintenance of the New Aqueduct on the line of said Aqueduct in the town of Greenburg, county of Westchester, at Shaft Site No. 15½, and known as Parcels Nos. 299, 299½, 300 A, 300½ and 300½ as the same are shown upon said maps, submitted to the Aqueduct Commissioners by the Commissioner of Public Works under date of November 16, 1886, be and the same are hereby adopted by the Aqueduct Commissioners; and it is hereby ordered that said maps be transmitted to the Counsel to the Corporation, with a certificate of such approval, signed by the Aqueduct Commissioners adopting said maps; the said maps to be filed and furnished to the Commissioners of Appraisal, as required by law; and the said Counsel to the Corporation is hereby requested to take, at as early day as practicable, the required proceedings for acquiring the lands described upon said maps. Adopted.

The Comptroller, under date of 13th instant, gave notice of the issue of warrants for the payment of vouchers not certified to by the Aqueduct Commissioners in favor of Spencer G. McNary, Westchester Coun ty Section, \$251 68.

The Mutual Life Insurance Company, New York County Section, \$250 00—which was ordered entered upon the books of the Commission, and filed.

The Secretary submitted a notice of lien, filed by John Kelly against O'Brien & Clark, contractors on Section 9, for \$1,020, which was referred to the Commissioners adjourn they adjourn to meet on Wednesday, 24th instant, unless in the meantime they are called together as provided for in the By-Laws and Rules of Order of the Commission. Carried.

Commissioner Ridgway then offered the following resolution:

Whereas, Notwithstanding the repeated promises of contractors Brown, Howard & Co., and John Brunton & Co., to comply with the order given unde

John Brunton & Co., to comply with the order given under direction of the Commission by its Chief Engineer to light the tunnels under their contracts with electricity, and improve their method of ventilation; and

Whereas, They have not complied with said order, but on the contrary, in places where masonry is being put in, it frequently appears that they allow the air boxes to be displaced so that there is no provision for the introduction of pure air into the headings; and

Whereas, They still continue the use of gasoline lamps, vitiating the air to such an extent as to make it detrimental to health and life; therefore be it

Resolved, That this Commission take immediate steps to enforce the order issued by the Chief Engineer to the contractors under date of June 22, and September 9, directing them to place electric lights and power blowers upon their work."

Unanimonsly adopted.

Commissioner Baldwin then moved that the Secretary be directed to transmit a copy of the resolution last adopted to the Counsel to the Corporation, with a request that he give his opinion at as early date as possible as to the best means to be adopted by the Commissioners to compel the contractors to use the necessary and proper lighting and ventilating apparatuses. Carried.

Commissioner Fish then offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Committee on Construction be requested to report at the next meeting of the Commission the reasons why the work on Section 13 has been so delayed; and what steps can be taken to expedite the work on that section. Adopted.

Commissioner Barnes then offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Commission learns with regret of the death of Assistant Engineer Thomas Franklin, who was employed in the office of the Chief Engineer of this Commission, and an engrossed copy thereof transmitted to his bereaved family, assuring them of our sincere sorrow and sympathy. Adopted.

The Commissioners then adjourned.

REPORTED MORTALITY* for the week ending November 20, 1886, together with the ACTUAL MORTALITY for the week ending November 13, 1886.

W. DE F. DAY, M. D., Sanitary Superintendent and Register:

SIR—There were 683 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, November 20, 1886, which is an increase of 32, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 126 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1885. The actual mortality for the week ending November 13, 1886, was 718, which is 124.6 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 25.66 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,454,068.


