## DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS.

Abstract of the Proceedings of the Department of Public Parks during the week ending Saturday, July 27, 1878.

## MEETING HELD JULY 24, 1878.

Present—Commissioners Wenman (President), Wetmore, Conover and Lane.  
 The pay of Mr. Emil Beyer, chairman, was fixed at \$78 per month.  
 The following resolutions were adopted:  
 Whereas, An act of the Legislature has been passed in reference to the improvement of Tompkins square, and resolutions of the Common Council on the same subject have been communicated to the Board,  
 Resolved, That it be referred to the Superintending Architect to report thereon with plans and recommendations.  
 Whereas, The Common Council, by resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen, on the 16th July, 1878, and approved by his Honor the Mayor on the 20th July, 1878, has directed this Department to restore Tompkins square as a public park, as authorized by chapter 411 of the Laws of 1878,  
 Resolved, That requisition be and hereby is made upon the Comptroller of the City of New York, to create and issue, in the name and on behalf of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of

the City of New York, a public fund or stock to the amount of fifty thousand dollars, to be applied to payment for the work so directed by the Common Council, as authorized by section 2, chapter 411, Laws of 1878.

Resolved, That the Secretary be directed to prepare and insert the necessary advertisements for proposals for furnishing the Department with coal for the current year, not to exceed in all 600 tons, and to be delivered at such times and places, and in such quantities, as may be required during 1878.

Resolved, That all tickets for mechanics and laborers issued for all work on Manhattan Island, shall be sent by the Secretary, addressed to the Superintendent of Parks; and for all work in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards such tickets shall be sent by the Secretary, addressed to the Superintendent of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards.

Resolved, That on the appointment of any mechanic or laborer, the Secretary notify the Disbursing Clerk of such appointment, and that on the Disbursing Clerk being further notified by the employee under whose supervision such mechanic or laborer is placed, that he has gone to work, he place his name on the pay-roll.

Resolved, That it be referred to Commissioner Lane, with power to see that the terms of the two agreements between this Department and the New York Elevated Railroad Company, one dated the tenth day of February, 1876, and the other dated the third day of July, 1878, are from time to time complied with.

Resolved, That from and after this date all estimates for material and work, whether through Treasurer's orders or otherwise, shall be opened by the Board at a Board meeting and publicly announced at that time.

Resolved, That the duties of Frank A. Calkins, Assistant Engineer; Otto Sibeth, Draughtsman; Samuel E. Warren, Draughtsman; and Julius Munckwitz, Jr., Draughtsman, be performed under the direction of the Superintending Architect.

## NOTICE IN RELATION TO JURORS FOR STATE COURTS

NEW YORK, June 1, 1877.

APPLICATIONS FOR EXEMPTIONS WILL BE heard here, from 9 to 4 daily, from all persons hitherto liable or recently serving who have become exempt, and all needed information will be given.

Those who have not answered as to their liability, or proved permanent exemption, will receive a "jury enrollment notice," requiring them to appear before me this year. Whether liable or not, such notices must be answered (in person, if possible, and at this office only) under severe penalties. If exempt, the party must bring proof of exemption; if liable, he must also answer in person, giving full and correct name, residence, etc., etc. No attention paid to letters.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called or pay their fines. No mere excuse will be allowed or interference permitted. The fines, received from those who, for business or other reasons, are unable to serve at the time selected, pay the expenses of this office, and if unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquents.

All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States and District Court jurors are not exempt.

Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted.
