The Board met pursuant to adjournment.

Present—All the members, viz.:

Wm. H. Wickham, the Mayor of the City of New York; Andrew H. Green, the Comptroller of the City of New York; Samuel A. Lewis, the President of the Board of Aldermen; John Wheeler, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments.

The minutes of the meeting held February 13, 1875, were read and approved.

The Chairman presented the following communication from the New County Court-house Commissioners:

OFFICE OF THE
NEW COUNTY COURT-HOUSE COMMISSION,
NEW YORK, February 15, 1875.

Honorable Wm. H. WICKHAM, Mayor:

SIR—As Chairman of the Commission appointed to complete the New County Court-house, I beg leave to invite your attention to the necessity of some action being taken by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to enable the Commissioners to discharge the duties imposed upon them by law.

On the 12th of August, 1874, a requisition, accompanied by a communication setting forth the needs of the Commission as ascertained by diligent inquiry, was transmitted to the Comptroller. I inclose copies of both herewith for your information.

The requisition, which is now before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment should, I think, meet with a favorable reception, and authority be given to issue the small amount of stock called for thereby.

The purposes for which the requisition is made are absolutely required as a preliminary to enable any work to be started. As matters now stand, the Commissioners cannot procure any of the estimates and plans that were formerly in use, although they have made repeated efforts to get them, and are unable, without funds, to furnish the Board of Apportionment with any estimates or plans for the completion of the building.

We trust that you may deem it proper to exercise your influence to hasten the completion of a work which has long been a scandal and a disgrace to the mind of every public-spirited citizen, but which, if completed speedily and economically, will be one of the lasting honors of your administration as Mayor the City.

SIR—We have the honor to transmit herewith our requisition for ten thousand dollars, as authorized by section 7 of chapter 583 of the Laws of 1871, which sum we deem necessary to obtain the required plans and specifications, and a reliable estimate of the cost of the completion of the New County Court-house, and to defray the current expenses of the Commission.

As we have been unable to procure the plans of the building which were used by the former Commissioners, we cannot present you with an estimate of the cost of its completion, as we would desire to do, and cannot proceed immediately to the work of such completion.

It is necessary, however, and we believe it our duty to initiate the work of the Commission, by procuring the services of a competent architect, and obtaining such plans, estimates, and specifications as will enable us to go on at once with the work, whenever the legal embarrassments surrounding a large portion of the funds devoted to our use may be removed. It is believed that this will probably be the case during the coming autumn, and if sufficient funds should be then at our disposal, we will be ready to proceed with the work.

It has been suggested by some of the members of the Board of Apportionment, that, in view of the claims made against these funds, this Commission should refrain from taking any steps in the performance of its duty; but we cannot believe that such inactivity would be in accord either with the spirit and letter of the laws on the subject, or with the civic pride of the inhabitants of the City of New York.

The condition of the New County Court-house is, at present, a scandal and disgrace, of which every public-spirited citizen is heartily ashamed.

Because a vast amount of money has been squandered or stolen in its construction hitherto, is no reason why it should not be completed. It is now more than seventeen years since official action was first taken relative to its erection, and thirteen years since the work of construction was commenced; and we do not think that it is the public desire that it should remain unfinished during the generation in which it was begun.

We invite your co-operation and that of other gentlemen who may act officially in the matter, to aid us in finishing the Court-house—a task which we will endeavor to execute as speedily, economically, and thoroughly as possible.

The President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments moved to suspend the rule adopted by the Board at meeting of June 23, 1874, relating to calls of meetings, in order to act upon the resolutions now to be proposed by the Comptroller for the issue of "Assessment Fund Stock," "City Improvement Stock," "Assessment Bonds of the City of New York," and "New York City Bonds for the Liquidation of Claims and Judgments."

Which was agreed to.

The Comptroller presented the following preamble and resolution—

Which was offered for adoption by the President of the Board of Aldermen:

Whereas, Chapter 565 of the Laws of 1865 provides for "the laying out and improving of certain portions of the City and County of New York," by the Commissioners of the Central Park; and

Whereas, Section 94 of chapter 574 of the Laws of 1871 provides that "all acts conferring powers and devolving duties upon the Board of Commissioners of the Central Park are hereby transferred to and conferred upon the (said) Department of Public Parks;" and

Whereas, The Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks, pursuant to section 7 of said chapter 565 of the Laws of 1865, have adopted resolutions dated February 3, 1875, directing the issue of stocks to provide funds for the payment of the damages awarded by the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment, and of the expenses, charges, and disbursements in certain proceedings instituted by virtue of said chapter, to wit:

"In the matter of the application of the Commissioners of the Central Park, for and in behalf of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York, relative to laying out a new street parallel to One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, in an easterly direction from the Kingsbridge road across the Tenth avenue to the Boulevard, near the Harlem river, as laid out by the Commissioners of the Central Park of the City of New York, confirmed January 5, 1875, amounting to eighteen thousand five hundred and ninety-seven dollars, which sum is assessed upon said Corporation," and "relative to the opening of Tenth avenue, from a point 10,353 feet 6 inches northerly from One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, in a northwesterly, westerly, and southerly direction to the Eleventh avenue, as laid out by the Commissioners of the Central Park in the City of New York, confirmed December 2, 1874, amounting to forty-eight thousand three hundred and seventy-seven dollars and thirty cents;" and

Whereas, Chapter 920, Laws of 1869, provides that, "whenever any street, avenue, or public place is authorized and directed to be opened, widened, and extended by the proper authorities now or hereafter charged with that duty by law, the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment appointed by the Supreme Court in such proceeding may cause to be assessed on the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty a sum not to exceed one-half of the total cost thereof * * *," and

Whereas, Section 2 of that act provides that: "For the purpose of providing for any assessment made on the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty, under the operation of this act, the Comptroller of said City is authorized and directed, from time to time, to issue stock to be denominated 'City Improvement Stock,' which shall be redeemable within twenty years, and bear interest at a rate not to exceed seven per cent. per annum, payable semi-annually;" therefore

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized to issue, from time to time, as may be required, and at such rates of interest as he may determine, not exceeding seven per cent. per annum, "City Improvement Stock," author-

ized by chapter 920, Laws of 1869, amounting to sixty-six thousand eight hundred and ninety-six dollars and thirty cents (\$66,896.30).

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree with said preamble and resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor of the City of New York (Chairman), the Comptroller of the City of New York, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—4.

The Comptroller presented the following preamble and resolution—

Which was offered for adoption by the President of the Board of Aldermen:

Whereas, Chapter 565 of the Laws of 1865 provides for "the laying out and improving of certain portions of the City and County of New York," by the Commissioners of the Central Park; and

Whereas, Section 94 of chapter 574 of the Laws of 1871 provides that "all acts conferring powers and devolving duties upon the Board of Commissioners of the Central Park are hereby transferred to and conferred upon the (said) Department of Public Parks;" and

Whereas, The Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks adopted the third day of February, 1875, the following resolution, pursuant to section 7 of chapter 565 of the Laws of 1865:

"Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks hereby direct that the public fund or stock, authorized and directed to be created by section 7 of chapter 565 of the Laws of the State of New York, passed April 24, 1865, shall be issued at such time or times, and in such manner, of such description, and in such amounts as the Comptroller of the City of New York, in compliance with the provisions of said section, shall, from time to time, find to be necessary to provide funds for the payment of the damages awarded by the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment, and of the expenses, charges, and disbursements, in a certain proceeding instituted by virtue of said chapter, to wit:

"In the matter of the application of the Commissioners of the Central Park for and in behalf of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York, relative to the laying out, widening, and straightening of Kingsbridge road, between One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street and the Harlem river, in the City of New York; such public fund or stock shall be payable not more than forty years from the date of issue thereof, and shall bear interest, payable half yearly, at a rate not exceeding seven per cent. per annum; and the total amount of such fund or stock hereby directed to be issued shall not exceed the sum of one million two hundred and seventy-six thousand nine hundred and ninety-seven dollars and fourteen cents, and shall be issued in sums composed of even hundreds of dollars, and for not less than the par value thereof.

"Proposals for said fund or stock shall be invited by said Comptroller by advertisement for the period of ten days, and the fund or stock shall be awarded by the Comptroller to the person or persons, corporation or corporations, who shall offer the highest premiums for the same, except that said fund or stock, or any portion thereof, may be subscribed for and awarded to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of the City of New York, without proposals being invited for the same, in the manner aforesaid; and said Comptroller shall, upon the payment of the price for which said fund or stock shall be so awarded, issue certificates therefor, in such form as said Comptroller may direct, and as nearly as may be in the usual form of stock of the County of New York heretofore issued;" therefore

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized to issue, from time to time, as may be required, and at such rates of interest as he may determine, not exceeding seven per cent. per annum, the stock authorized by section 7 of chapter 565 of the Laws of 1865, in the name of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York, under chapter 304 of the Laws of 1874, payable not more than forty years from the date of issue thereof, in pursuance of a resolution of the Department of Public Parks, adopted February 3, 1875; which said stock, so authorized to be issued, shall be denominated "Assessment Fund Stock," to the amount of one million two hundred and seventy-six thousand nine hundred and ninety-seven dollars and fourteen cents (\$1,276,997.14).

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree with said preamble and resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote:
