LAWS OF THE STATE RELATING TO THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Chapter 485.

AN ACT authorizing the Board of Engineers of the Fourth Avenue Improvement to alter their plans for crossing at and between Fifty-first and Fifty-third streets, in the City of New York.

(Passed June 5, 1875; three-fifths being present.)

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. The Board of Engineers of the Fourth Avenue Improvement, organized pursuant to chapter seven hundred and two of the Laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-two, are authorized, if they shall deem it expedient so to do, to alter their plans and specifications for said improvement, by changing the location of the bridge over the railroad, and the approaches thereto by said act, directed to be constructed between Fifty-second and Fifty-third streets, to between Fifty-first and Fifty-second streets, instead of between Fifty-second and Fifty-third streets, and to locate the foot bridge at Fifty-third street, instead of at Fifty-first street, and in such case to file plans and specifications, showing such changes of location, in the office of the Comptroller of the City of New York, with like effect, as to such bridges and approaches and changes rendered necessary thereby, as if the same had been exhibited upon the plans and specifications authorized by said act, but nothing in this act contained shall be construed to interfere with the work of the improvement of said avenue, as now in progress, under the direction of said Board of Engineers, in any respect, except as to said bridges and approaches, and the work made necessary by such changes of location, nor shall the cost to the City of said improvement be increased by the changes of location authorized hereby.

§ 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

Chapter 492.

AN ACT relative to taxation and appropriations in the City of New York, and to provide for the payment of part of the cost of the Fourth avenue improvement, from revenue bonds to be paid from taxation in eighteen hundred and seventy-six, instead of eighteen hundred and seventy-five, and to reduce the tax levy of eighteen hundred and seventy-five accordingly.

(Passed June 5, 1875; three-fifths being present.)

The People of the State of New York represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. The Comptroller of the City of New York is hereby authorized and directed to certify to the Board of Aldermen of said City, acting as the Board of Supervisors, the amount of estimated revenues of the general fund, including estimated receipts from interest on assessments in eighteen hundred and seventy-five, applicable to the reduction of taxation for the year eighteen hundred and seventy-five; and the said Board of Supervisors is hereby directed to deduct said amount so certified by the said Comptroller, from the amount of the appropriations made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the City of New York, for the year eighteen hundred and seventy-five instead of the amount of estimated revenues of the general fund heretofore deducted by the said Board of Estimate and Apportionment in the final estimate for the said year, and the aggregate amount of which said final estimate, after deducting said amount of the revenues of the general fund, and the amount required to be deducted by the second section of this act, shall be certified by the said Comptroller to the said Board of Supervisors, and shall be raised and collected by said Supervisors by tax upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation within the City and County of New York, as provided by section one hundred and twelve, of chapter three hundred and thirty-five, of the Laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-three.

§ 2. Instead of raising the whole amount of money required by section three, of chapter three hundred and eight, of the Laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-four, to be raised by tax, in the year eighteen hundred and seventy-five, for the improvement of Fourth avenue, between Forty-fifth street and the Harlem river, now in progress in the City of New York; the sum of eight hundred and thirteen thousand, seven hundred and sixty-seven dollars and fifty cents only shall be raised by tax in the year eighteen hundred and seventy-five, and the sum of seven hundred and eighty-five thousand dollars shall be included in the final estimate, and be raised by tax in the year eighteen hundred and seventy-six toward the expense of the said Fourth avenue improvement and in anticipation of the levy and collection of the amount so to be raised, the Comptroller of the City of New York is authorized and required to issue revenue bonds of said City for such amount as may from time to time be required to be paid, pursuant to the provisions of section seven, of the act entitled "An act to improve and regulate the use of Fourth avenue, in the City of New York," passed May fourteenth, eighteen hundred and seventy-two, for one-half the sum certified in the manner specified in said section seven, to have been expended on the improvement of Fourth avenue in said City, authorized by said act, and such revenue bonds to the amount hereby required to be raised in the year eighteen hundred and seventy-six, shall be paid from the amount so to be raised by tax in the year eighteen hundred and seventy-six, and the sum of seven hundred and eighty-five thousand dollars, being a part of the amount authorized by the said act of eighteen hundred and seventy-four, to be raised in the year eighteen hundred and seventy-five, shall be deducted from the final estimate for the year eighteen hundred and seventy-five, certified by the Comptroller to the Board of Supervisors.

§ 3. This act shall take effect immediately.

Chapter 493.

AN ACT to repeal an act entitled "An act to further provide for the rebuilding and repairing of sewers in the City of New York," passed March twenty-nine, eighteen hundred and seventy-one.

(Passed June 5, 1875; three-fifths being present.)

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. The act entitled "An act to further provide for the rebuilding and repairing of sewers in the City of New York," passed March twentieth, eighteen hundred and seventy-one, is hereby repealed.

§ 2. This act shall take effect on the first day of January, eighteen hundred and seventy-six.

Chapter 494.

AN ACT to alter the map or plan of the City of New York, by striking therefrom the proposed Avenue B, between Sixty-eighth and Seventy-ninth streets, and the proposed Avenue A, between One Hundredth and One Hundred and Sixth Streets.

(Passed June 5, 1875; three-fifths being present.)

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. All that part of the proposed Avenue B, between Sixty-eighth street and Seventy-ninth street; also, all that part of the proposed Avenue A, between One Hundredth street and One

of the best quality, to be well screened, and in good order and each ton to consist of 2,240 pounds. None other will be accepted. All of said coal to be delivered in about the following sizes and quantities, free of all expenses, at the following places, during the months of July and August, 1875, in such quantities as may be called for:

- At Blackwell's Island—
3,280 tons grate size.
250 tons stove size.
1,000 tons grate size, "for steamboats."
- At Ward's Island—
1,650 tons grate size.

330 tons egg size.

SCHOOL FOR NURSES.

THE COMMISSIONERS OF PUBLIC CHARITIES and Correction purpose opening a School for Nurses, at Charity Hospital, on the first day of August next. It is their design to offer to worthy young women, between the ages of twenty and thirty-five, the opportunity to acquire proficiency in a pursuit, which is at once honorable, useful, and remunerative, by educating them in the profession of Nursing. Every effort will be made to elevate the occupation, by a course of careful instruction from competent teachers, and by considerate and generous treatment of the pupils. The course of training will occupy two years, and will embrace lectures upon nursing, food, ventilation, midwifery, and all subjects connected with nursing.

The lectures will be given by Physicians connected with the Hospital, and will include a course of twelve lectures upon each subject every six months, and frequent instruction at the bedside.

At the expiration of two years the Nurses will be examined by a Committee of Physicians, and those who are competent and qualified will receive a diploma, signed by the Commissioners of Charities and Correction and the Examining Committee.
