The President, Mr. William F. Baker, presided.

The minutes of the meeting held February 6 were approved.

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated February 4, forwarding a report of Mr. Rafferty, Examiner, on the application of James N. Kenney, No. 320 Columbia street, Brooklyn, for the position of Inspector of Masonry and Carpentry, with a request for instructions. Notification in the matter of acquiring title by The City of New York to certain lands, etc., situated in the blocks bounded by Fifteenth and Sixteenth streets, Avenues D and C, and Avenue D and Tompkins street and the pierhead lines on the East river, in the Borough of Manhattan, as an addition to the Willard Parker Hospital, that Wilbur Larremore, Charles P. Dillon and William J. Carroll were duly appointed Commissioners of Estimate and Appraisal and qualified as such on the 21st of January, 1907, and their oaths were filed in the office of the Clerk of the County of New York on that date, was received from the Corporation Counsel and ordered on file.

Communication from the Comptroller, transmitting a copy of a communication under date of January 29, 1907, addressed to the Comptroller by Charles W. Ridgway, attorney, in relation to a piece of property situated between East One Hundred and Thirty-second street and East One Hundred and Thirty-third street, 54 feet west of Willow avenue, in the Borough of The Bronx, the said property having a frontage on said streets of 75 feet and the depth of same being 210 feet, offering said property to The City of New York for the purpose of erecting thereon a stable for the use of the Department of Health for the sum of \$25,000 was received and, on recommendation of the President, the following preambles and resolution were adopted:

Whereas, Certain real property, namely, Nos. 1034 to 1038 East One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street, situated in the Borough of The Bronx, is now under lease by the Department of Health and is used by it for stabling purposes, and the said lease expired January 1, 1907, and the owner of the property declines to give the Department a renewal of the said lease except at a much higher rental; and

Whereas, An offer has been made by the owner of the real property situated on the north side of East One Hundred and Thirty-second street, beginning 54 feet west of Willow avenue, in the said Borough of The Bronx, and extending 210 feet deep on each side (to the south line of One Hundred and Thirty-third street), and being 75 feet in front and rear, to sell the same to The City of New York for the sum of \$25,000; and the Board of Health of the Department of Health of The City of New York deems the said land necessary, suitable and in every way desirable for the purpose of erecting a stable and other buildings thereon for the use of the Department of Health in said borough; now therefore be it

Resolved, That this Board respectfully recommends that the said real property be acquired for the uses and purposes of the Department of Health in the Borough of The Bronx and respectfully requests the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to the acquisition of said lands for the uses and purposes aforesaid, pursuant to the provisions of section 1436a of the Greater New York Charter.

A report of the General Medical Officer showing the necessity for procuring supplies in equipping the new Scarlet Fever Hospital at the foot of East Sixteenth street, Borough of Manhattan, occasioned by the increase in the number of cases of scarlet fever prevalent in The City of New York; and for procuring supplies for the clinics and the hospital at Otisville for the treatment of tuberculosis patients; and the President of the Board, to whom was submitted the said report, in which was estimated the amount of deficiencies that will exist in the funds appropriated by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the use of the Department of Health during the year 1907, recommended that copies of said report be forwarded to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment with the request that the sum of \$316,000 be appropriated for the year 1907 for the purpose of defraying the necessary expenses required by the Board of Health in the preservation of the public health in providing means to carry out the specifications therein contained; and, on motion, the following preambles and resolutions were duly adopted:

Whereas, It appears that certain appropriations made to the Department of Health by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the year 1907 will be insufficient to meet the legitimate and necessary expenses required to be incurred by the said Department by reason of the opening of the new scarlet fever hospital and equipping the same for use, and the great number of cases of contagious disease prevalent in The City of New York, especially scarlet fever and tuberculosis; and

Whereas, It is necessary to secure the services of additional Medical Inspectors and to purchase a larger number of supplies to be used by the Department in equipping hospitals for sustaining the increased number of patients in the contagious disease hospitals of the Department of Health; and

Whereas, At the present rate of expenditure, which is necessary to be maintained, the estimated amount of the deficiencies which will exist in the funds appropriated by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the use of the Department of Health for the year 1907 will be \$316,000; now therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Health, pursuant to the authority conferred by the provisions of chapter 535 of the Laws of 1893, hereby certifies to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the sum of \$316,000 should be appropriated for the year 1907 without delay, for the purpose of defraying the necessary expenses required to be incurred by the Board of Health for the preservation of the public health, as follows:

Whereas, Recent investigations made by this Department and Veterinarians in its employ have shown that numerous cases of glanders exist in The City of New York, a disease not only fatal to horses but also a menace to the health and dangerous to the life of human beings; and

Whereas, The number of Veterinarians employed in the Department of Health is insufficient for the present emergency, it being necessary, in order to control and eradicate said disease of glanders, to carefully examine and quarantine the horses in each stable where such cases are found to exist, or are known to have recently existed, and enforce such quarantine, as well as to take other extraordinary measures; therefore be it

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 535 of the Laws of 1893, the Board of Health hereby certifies to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) should be appropriated for the year 1907, for the purpose of defraying the necessary expenses required to be incurred by the Board of Health for the preservation of the public health in the employment of additional Veterinarians, with salary at the rate of one hundred dollars (\$100) per month, and for such other expenditures as may be found necessary.

Whereas, It is the consensus of medical opinion, and it has become established by research and scientific investigation and experiment, that malarial affection and various kindred forms of intermittent fever are due to infection carried by and communicated through the medium of mosquitoes; and

Whereas, There are many places in the various boroughs in which, by reason of the lowlands and the drainage, mosquitoes are bred and propagated in great numbers; and the existence of mosquitoes are a menace to the life and dangerous and detrimental to the public health; and the Government and State authorities are devising means and expending moneys for the eradication of these pests; and this Board deems it necessary, in the interests of the public health, to take measures for the eradication of this source of disease; therefore be it

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 535 of the Laws of 1893, the Board of Health hereby certifies to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) should be appropriated for the year 1907 for the purpose of defraying the necessary expenses required to be incurred by the Board of Health for the preservation of the public health in the destruction of mosquito breeding places throughout the entire City, and for the wages of the necessary Laborers and persons to be employed in connection with the work aforesaid.

Bill No. 315, introduced by Mr. Gluck in the Assembly, to amend the Greater New York Charter in relation to regulating the practice of midwifery, was received and referred to the General Medical Officer.

Statement of the condition of the Health Department Pension Fund for the month ending January 31, 1907, was submitted and ordered on file.

Communication from Ernst J. Lederle, Ph. D., Honorary Consulting Sanitarian of the Department of Health, submitting his resignation as such Honorary Consulting Sanitarian, was received, and, on motion, it was

Section 1. For the purpose of minimizing danger and in order that passengers may more conveniently board and alight from the railroad cars operated on Broadway, between Fifty-ninth and Manhattan streets, in the Borough of Manhattan, the railroad company, or companies, operating cars on said thoroughfare shall require the conductor to open the gate on the rear end of each and every car on the side nearest the parkways or small parks in the centre of said Broadway.

Sec. 3. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

All the filling, except as otherwise specified herein, shall be of ashes, cellar dirt, broken stone, etc., entirely free from garbage or any organic matter objectionable in the opinion of the Engineer.

At any section of the bulkhead wall the filling shall be brought up level with the top of the platform resting on the bulkhead wall at such section, and no higher, unless otherwise directed.

The filling shall be commenced within five days after the date of the receipt of a notification from the Engineer that the work or any part of it, is ready to be begun. GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the bid or estimate, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be enclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
