REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES.

Report of Committee on Finance—

No. 2477.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

The Committee on Finance of the Board of Aldermen, to whom was referred the assessment rolls of the estates, real and personal, of The City of New York for the year 1909, together with a communication from the Comptroller of The City of New York, dated June 7, 1909, transmitting the Budget in detail for the year 1909, accompanied by his certificates of: First, the aggregate amount of the Budget for the year 1909; second, additional appropriation to the Department of Health for the year 1909 under and pursuant to the provisions of section 236 of the Greater New York Charter as amended; third, amount of County charges and expenses for the respective counties included in the Budget for the year 1909; fourth, amount of County charges and expenses for the respective counties paid during the year 1908, from the proceeds of Special Revenue Bonds; fifth, estimated revenues of the General Fund for the reduction of taxation during the current year, respectfully submits the following

Report:

The aggregate amount of the Budget for the year 1909 is one hundred and fifty-six million five hundred and forty-five thousand one hundred and forty-eight dollars and fourteen cents (\$156,545,148.14), which includes county charges and expenses for the four counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, aggregating five million one hundred and seventy-five thousand seven hundred and ninety-six dollars and twenty-three cents (\$5,175,796.23), leaving one hundred and fifty-one million three hundred and sixty-nine thousand three hundred and fifty-one dollars and ninety-one cents (\$151,369,351.91), in which should be added an additional appropriation to the Department of Health for the year 1909, under and pursuant to the provisions of section 236 of the Greater New York Charter as amended, of seven thousand six hundred dollars (\$7,600), making a total amount of one hundred and fifty-one million three hundred and seventy-six thousand nine hundred and fifty-one dollars and ninety-one cents (\$151,376,951.91), which affects the general tax rates of The City of New York.

In addition to the amount of five million one hundred and seventy-five thousand seven hundred and ninety-six dollars and twenty-three cents (\$5,175,796.23) included in the Budget for county charges and expenses, the following amounts disbursed during the year 1908 from the proceeds of Special Revenue Bonds for judgments and claims for county charges or liabilities, are to be raised by tax in the year 1909, in the respective counties, as provided by subdivisions 3 and 7 of section 188 of the revised Greater New York Charter, viz:

Section 902 of the Charter, referred to in the Comptroller's communication, directs that the amounts required for the payment of all county charges and expenses shall be levied and collected from the taxable property within each of said counties respectively, to the end that each of said counties shall ultimately bear and pay all expenses necessary to be incurred for county as distinguished from City purposes. Compliance with the provision of law will, of course, forever prevent a uniform tax rate from prevailing in The City of New York.

Your committee recommends that in fixing the actual tax rates in the tax levy ordinance the decimal fractions of such rates be not carried beyond five figures, i. e., hundred thousandths of one per cent., as any smaller fraction would have no practical effect on individual assessments, while increasing enormously and unnecessarily the difficulties of extending the tax rolls and preparing tax bills. The total loss by omission of such remote decimals will be only \$224.30 in the whole tax levy of \$122,745,210.17.

As there is nothing to be gained by separate extensions on the tax rolls of the City and County rates, your Committee recommends that the aggregate thereof, or, in other words, the total tax rates in each Borough, as the case may be, be fixed in the ordinance levying the taxes for the year 1909. Such an ordinance has been prepared and is submitted herewith for approval and adoption by the Board of Aldermen.

SPECIAL ASSESSMENTS IN THE BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN, TO BE COLLECTED WITH THE ANNUAL TAXES.

The Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments have added to the assessment rolls of the Borough of Brooklyn:

First—The amounts required by law to be raised with the annual taxes for the payment of principal and interest on bonds issued pursuant to chapter 311 of the Laws of 1886, as amended by chapter 335 of the Laws of 1886, for flagging, curbing, guttering and paving certain streets in the Twenty-sixth Ward of said Borough (late Town of New Lots).

Second—The annual installment required by law to be collected as a part of the annual taxes for sewerage improvements in the Twenty-ninth Ward of said Borough (late the Town of Flatbush), pursuant to the provisions of chapter 161 of the Laws of 1889 and amendments thereto.

Third—The annual installment required by law to be collected as a part of the annual taxes for street improvements, in the Thirty-first Ward of said Borough (late the Town of Gravesend), pursuant to the provisions of chapter 118 of the Laws of 1892 as amended.

Fourth—The annual installment required by law to be collected as a part of the annual taxes for the improvement of Flatbush avenue, in the Twenty-ninth Ward of said Borough (late the Town of Flatbush), pursuant to the provisions of chapter 161 of the Laws of 1889, as amended by chapter 356 of the Laws of 1894.

The amount to be raised for the payment of the principal and interest on the New Lots bonds is fifty-one thousand six hundred and sixty-nine dollars and sixty-five cents (\$51,669.65); the amount of the Flatbush sewer installment is five thousand three hundred and nine dollars and eight cents (\$5,389.08); the amount of the Thirty-first Ward improvement installment is forty-five thousand nine hundred and sixty-seven dollars and eighty-five cents (\$45,967.85); the amount of the Flatbush avenue improvement installment is thirty-three thousand nine hundred and twenty dollars and seventy cents (\$33,920.70).

The law requires that these assessments and installments be included in the tax levy ordinance to be levied and collected with the annual taxes.

ORDINANCE OF THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN.

AN ORDINANCE to provide the necessary means for the support of the government of The City of New York and the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, and for other purposes, and to levy taxes on the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation in The City of New York, pursuant to law, in and for the year 1909.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. There shall be and hereby is imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation of and within The City of New York, the sum of one hundred and seventeen million one hundred and forty-five thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine dollars and seven cents (\$17,145,889.07), to pay the expenses included in the Budget for the year 1909, for conducting the public business of The City of New York in each department and branch thereof, including principal and interest of the City debt and an amount provided for deficiency in taxes, pursuant to chapter 309 of the Laws of 1906, amounting to one hundred and fifty-six million five hundred and forty-five thousand one hundred and forty-eight dollars and fourteen cents (\$156,545,148.14), and an additional appropriation to the Department of Health, for the year 1909, under and pursuant to the provisions of section 234 of the Greater New York Charter as amended, of seven thousand six hundred dollars (\$7,600), amounting to the aggregate of one hundred and fifty-six million five hundred and fifty-two thousand seven hundred and forty-eight dollars and fourteen cents (\$156,552,748.14), remaining after deducting therefrom the sum of five million one hundred and seventy-two thousand seven hundred and ninety-six dollars and twenty-three cents (\$5,176,796.23), being the aggregate of the county charges and expenses of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, included therein, which sum is hereinafter levied and imposed upon said counties in the manner provided by section 902 of the Greater New York Charter; and after also deducting the sum of thirty-four million two hundred and thirty-one thousand and sixty-two dollars and eighty-four cents (\$34,231,062.84), supplied by the General Fund for the Reduction of Taxation as raised by the Comptroller of The City of New York in a communication dated June 7, 1909, transmitting his certificate of the amount of the appropriations made for the year 1909, copies of which communication and certificates and of the said Budget are as follows:

City of New York—Department of Finance,

June 7, 1909.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—Section 902 of the amended Greater New York Charter provides as follows:

"It shall be the duty of the Comptroller of said City to prepare and submit to the Board of Aldermen, at least four weeks before its annual meeting in each and every year, for the purpose of imposing the annual taxes, a statement setting forth the amounts by law authorized to be raised by tax in that year, on account of the Corporation of The City of New York, as hereby constituted, or for City purposes within said City as created by this act, and purposes for which said City is liable, and on account of the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, and also an estimate of the probable amount of receipts into the City Treasury during the then current year from all sources of revenue of the general funds, including surplus revenue from the Sinking Funds of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York, and of any of the Municipal and Public Corporations, or partial Municipal and Public Corporations by this act consolidated with the Municipal Corporation known as the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York, other than the surplus revenues of any such Sinking Funds for the payment of interest on the City Debt of the Municipal Corporation known as the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York, or the like debts of the Municipal and Public Corporations by this act consolidated as aforesaid, and the said Board of Aldermen is hereby authorized and directed to deduct the total amount of such estimated receipts from the aggregate amount of all the various sums which by law they are required to order and cause to be raised by tax in said year, for the purposes aforesaid, and to cause to be raised by tax only the balance of such aggregate amount after making such deductions."

Section 902 of the amended Greater New York Charter provides as follows:

"In the statement submitted by the Comptroller to the Board of Aldermen, as above provided in this chapter, he shall each year include and state specifically the sum or sums necessary to be raised to pay during the current year the salaries of the County officers and the other County charges and expenses in the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, respectively, and the Board of Aldermen is hereby authorized and directed to levy upon and collect from the taxable property within each of said Counties, respectively, the sum or sums so necessary to be raised to pay the salaries of County officers and other County charges and expenses of such County; to the end that each of said Counties shall ultimately bear and pay all expenses necessary to be incurred within the County for County as distinguished from City purposes."

In pursuance of the foregoing provisions of law, I have the honor to submit to your Honorable Body statement as follows:

First—The Budget in detail for the year 1909.

Second—Copy of resolutions authorizing additional appropriation to the Department of Health for the year 1909, pursuant to the provisions of section 236 of the Greater New York Charter.

Third—The amount of County charges and expenses in the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, respectively, included in said Budget, as well as the amount of County charges and expenses paid during the year 1908 from the proceeds of Special Revenue Bonds, which amounts together are to be raised, respectively, by levy upon taxable property within each of said Counties, as provided by section 902 of the Charter.

Fourth—The estimated receipts of the General Fund for the Reduction of Taxation.

Concerning the receipts of the General Fund for the Reduction of Taxation, the following are the items of my estimate:

BUDGET FOR 1909.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment makes this the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and nine, being: First, the amounts estimated to be required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of said City for the said year, viz.: One hundred and forty-eight million four hundred and forty-six thousand nine hundred and four dollars and eighty-three cents (\$148,446,904.83); second, the amounts estimated to be required to pay the charges and expenses of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond for the said year, viz.: Five million one hundred and seventy-five thousand seven hundred and ninety-six dollars and twenty-three cents (\$5,175,796.23), and, third, the amount estimated to be the deficiency on January 1, 1908, in the product of taxes theretofore levied, deemed to be uncollectible and not otherwise provided for, as required by chapter 209 of the Laws of 1906, viz.: Two million nine hundred and twenty-two thousand four hundred and forty-seven dollars and eight cents (\$2,922,447.08).

Be it further Resolved, That, in pursuance of the provisions of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment makes this the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and nine, with the exception that the items contained in the schedules under the titles "Salaries" or "Salaries and Wages," in the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City and County governments, shall be administered under the following terms and conditions:

First—That no change shall be made by any Board or head of an Office, Bureau or Department in the City or County governments in the schedules of "Salaries" and "Salaries and Wages" herein contained, except when authorized thereto by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and when such change will not increase the monthly rate of the total amount herein appropriated for the said schedules of "Salaries" and "Salaries and Wages" for monthly payrolls in the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County governments.

Second—(a) That the heads of the several Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City and County governments shall prepare their several payrolls for audit by the Department of Finance in accordance with the items of the aforesaid schedules, entitled "Salaries" and "Salaries and Wages," and (b) set forth on said payrolls the monthly, weekly or daily pro rata expenditures of said appropriations and the total amounts expended up to the time of and including said monthly and weekly payrolls, and (c) the unexpended balance of each appropriation against which said payrolls are chargeable.

FOR CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

Conditions Governing Payments to Charitable Institutions.

The appropriations in this Budget are made subject to the following conditions:

1. The accounts and records of all charitable institutions receiving public moneys shall be so kept as to show all receipts, disbursements and population in such form as shall be satisfactory to the Comptroller. Records must show the addresses of parents, guardians or nearest relatives of inmates and other information designed to facilitate inquiry into their financial inability to make provision for dependents in the institutions.

2. Moneys received from the City Treasury shall be used by such institutions for recurring expenses of "care, support, education and maintenance."

3. All institutions receiving public moneys and all their books of record and accounts shall at all reasonable times be open to the visitation, inspection and examination of duly authorized representatives of the Department of Finance and at all proper times the Department of Public Charities shall have access to the record of inmates.

4. Upon its appearing to the satisfaction of the Comptroller that it would be to the public interest to withhold payments to any charitable institution for which an apportionment has been made, he shall in his discretion suspend payments and give written notice to such institution of his intention to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to cease making further payments, and upon the determination of said Board that such payments shall terminate, the right of any such institution to receive payments for services rendered thereafter shall thereupon end.

5. Except where appropriations are made in bulk and not upon the per capita basis, no payment shall be made for inmates of private charitable institutions unless the same shall have been accepted by the Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities as proper charges upon the City. Except in emergency cases in hospitals, the Commissioner of Charities shall not accept as proper charges against the City inmates capable of paying for their own support or for whose care adequate provision can be made in public hospitals. The City shall not be liable for any payment to charitable institutions in excess of the apportionment which may have been made to such institutions, notwithstanding any per capita rates of payment that may have been fixed for the inmates thereof.

6. All institutions receiving money from the City are required to state specifically the amounts so received, as from the City Treasury, in their printed annual reports.

7. No money shall be paid to any private charitable institution which pays any salary to or gives any consideration, financial or of any kind, for services to, or that has any business dealing with, or secures goods or merchandise, directly or indirectly, from any officer or trustee or member of its Board of Managers.

8. That charitable institutions for children now carried in the Budget and not sending their inmates to the public schools, and not sharing in the Corporate School Fund, and not receiving teachers and school supplies from the Board of Education, but giving in their own buildings secular education to the children resident in the institutions, shall be paid a per capita of 7 cents per day, five school days in the week, for each child of four years of age and over receiving such instruction during ten months in the year. This money to be paid under the authorization of section 230 of the Charter, but under the general conditions relating to institutions receiving Corporate School money, as provided in section 1154.

9. Magistrates are requested to transfer dependent, and when judicious, no-proper guardianship children, and all cases coming to their attention in the courts where no crime is proven against the child, to the Commissioners of Charities, who can commit to institutions. Magistrates are earnestly requested not to commit a dependent child to an institution on a court commitment.

10. The Commissioner of Charities is instructed to take such steps, either by appeal to the national authorities or by proper bills in the Legislature, as to provide that the children of emigrants abandoned within one year after arrival in this City be returned to the country whence they came.

11. In determining the acceptance of patients in private hospitals as proper charges (see Rule 5) the Commissioner of Charities shall first consider the nature of the service actually rendered to the patients by the

hospitals. The records of the institutions and the bed-card notes showing the treatment given shall be received as the essential evidence in deciding acceptances or rejections.

12. No dependent child under 16 years of age shall be accepted as a proper charge upon the City and no money will be paid for the care, support, maintenance or education of such child unless it shall have been lawfully committed to a suitable private charitable institution having its own plant and equipment for the proper protection and care of children, under the supervision of the State Board of Charities, and has been placed in this Budget by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

This order has no relation to the class of children of such mental and physical condition as those cared for in the City Institution at Randall's Island.

In addition to the sums mentioned in the preceding sections of this ordinance, to be levied and imposed upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation according to law, of and within The City of New York, there shall also be and is hereby imposed upon the real estate in the Twenty-sixth Ward (late Town of New Lots) of the Borough of Brooklyn, bounded by that part of any street, avenue or highway in said ward improved by flagging, gutting, curbing and paving under authority of chapter 311 of the Laws of 1886, as amended by chapter 335 of the Laws of 1886, for the purpose of meeting the principal and interest on bonds issued for the above purposes, the sum of fifty-one thousand six hundred and sixty-nine dollars and sixty-five cents (\$51,669.65), as the same has been apportioned and assessed by the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments on each lot, piece or parcel of land, in the proportion of benefit derived, as heretofore fixed and determined by the Commission charged with making said improvements; there shall also be and is hereby imposed upon the real estate in the Twenty-ninth Ward (late Town of Flatbush) in said Borough of Brooklyn, bounded by that part of any street, avenue or highway in said ward benefited by the construction of sewers authorized by chapter 161 of the Laws of 1889 and the amendments thereto, the sum of five thousand three hundred and nine dollars and eight cents (\$5,309.08), as the same has been apportioned and assessed by the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments on each lot, piece or parcel of land in proportion to the benefit derived, as heretofore fixed and determined by the Board of Street and Sewer Commissioners of said town and its successors; and there shall be and is hereby imposed upon the real estate in the Thirty-first Ward (late Town of Gravesend), in said Borough of Brooklyn, bounded by that part of any street, avenue or highway in said ward benefited by local improvements for which the unpaid assessments heretofore levied in said town exceeding the sum of one hundred dollars are, under the provisions of chapter 118 of the Laws of 1892, and the amendments thereto, to be levied in forty annual installments, the sum of forty-five thousand nine hundred and sixty-seven dollars and eighty-five cents (\$45,967.85), as the same has been apportioned and assessed by the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments on each lot, piece or parcel of land in proportion to the benefit derived, as heretofore fixed and determined; and there shall also be and is hereby imposed upon the real estate in the Twenty-ninth Ward (late Town of Flatbush), in said Borough of Brooklyn, situated within the district of assessment fixed and determined by the Board of Assessors of The City of New York, for the improvement of Flatbush avenue, under authority of chapter 356 of the Laws of 1894, for the purpose of meeting the principal and interest on the bonds issued for said improvement, the sum of thirty-three thousand nine hundred and twenty dollars and seventy cents (\$33,920.70), as the same has been apportioned and assessed by said Board of Assessors on each lot, piece or parcel of land lying within the boundary lines of said assessment districts.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree to accept such report and adopt said ordinance.

The Commissioner reconsidered his action of June 8, 1909 (80870), and granted the request of the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey for a refund of \$112.50, the amount paid to this Department by the company's contractor for the storage of sand on the marginal street area in the vicinity of Pier 11, North River.

A communication was received from the Corporation Counsel (81898)—Stating, in response to inquiry, that the Department should proceed to prepare a statement of its operating expenses, in accordance with the provisions of chapter 377 of the Laws of 1907, relating to the issue of Corporate Stock for current operating expenses. Filed.

A new plan for the improvement of the water-front, between Gantvoort and Bloomfield streets, North River, was forwarded to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for approval.

The Commissioner of Public Works was requested to prevent the erection of any building in the vicinity of East Fifty-ninth street and Ralph avenue, Mill Creek, Brooklyn, until such time as a permit has been obtained from this Department.

The Municipal Civil Service Commission was requested to authorize the transfer of William A. Law from the position of Dock Laborer to that of Rigger.

The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund were requested to approve a lease to Ferdinand Plummer (81525) of bulkhead beginning at a point in the southerly line of Academy street, distant 280 feet westerly from the easterly side of Nangle avenue, running thence southerly and at right angles to the southerly side of Academy street 95 feet, more or less. The lease to have the right to extend said bulkhead southerly a distance of 30 feet and to fill in bulkhead said extension, together with the right to erect upon the area of marginal street inshore of said 125 feet of bulkhead, structures for carrying on the coal business. The lease to be for a term of five years, at a rental of \$700 per annum, with the privilege of renewal for a further term of five years at an advance of ten per cent.

A communication (81946) was received from the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund transmitting certified copies of resolutions adopted June 9, 1909, as follows:

1. Approving of and authorizing a lease, by private agreement, to the New Jersey and Staten Island Ferry Company of a franchise to operate a ferry to and from the foot of the road surveyed by Tunn's Tappan, July 14, 1898, leading from the westerly extremity of the Shore road or Richmond terrace, in the Town of Northfield, Borough of Richmond, City of New York, from and to the foot of East Jersey street, Elizabethport, City of Elizabeth, County of Union and State of New Jersey, upon the following terms and conditions:
 The lease to be for a term of five years from May 1, 1899, at an annual rental of \$800, the lessee to make and deliver to the Commissioners of Docks of the City of New York, whenever requested by him, a statement in writing, verified by the oath or affirmation of the proper officer, of the actual expenditures for and gross receipts from said ferry, wherever expended or collected; the remaining terms and conditions of the lease to be similar to those contained in the lease to the New Jersey and Staten Island Ferry Company by the City of New York, dated August 1, 1904.

2. Approving of the establishment by the Commissioners of Docks of a ferry from and to a point between Ocean avenue and Twenty-first street, Sheepshead Bay, to and from various points in Jamaica Bay.

3. Approving of and authorizing a lease, by private agreement, to William F. Steele, of a franchise to operate a ferry from and to a point between Ocean avenue and Twenty-first street, Sheepshead Bay, to and from various points in Jamaica Bay, for a term of five years from the first day of June, 1909; the rental for said franchise to be \$100 per annum, payable annually in advance on the first day of June of each year. The remaining terms and conditions of the lease to be similar to those now used by the Department of Docks and Ferries for similar ferries at that locality.

4. Approving of a lease to Thuma Brothers of the south side of the pier foot of East Thirty-second street, East River, for a term of five years, beginning July 1, 1909, at a rental of \$1,500 per annum; it being understood and agreed that the lessee shall not have the use of the outer end of the pier, and that said outer end shall at all times be kept free and clear, and that boats on the south side of the pier shall be berthed in such manner as not to interfere in any way with the landing of boats at the outer end; the remaining terms and conditions of the lease to be similar to those contained in leases of wharf property now used by the Department of Docks and Ferries.

5. Approving of lease of B. Koronsky & Son of the following described land under water in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York: Beginning at a point in the bulkhead along the easterly side of East street, between Water and Cherry streets, East River, distant 25 feet southerly from the southerly side of Cherry street extended, where the same intersects the bulkhead; thence running southerly along the bulkhead on the easterly side of East street a distance of 60 feet; thence easterly and at right angles to the bulkhead a distance of 15 feet; thence northerly and parallel with said bulkhead along the easterly side of East street a distance of 60 feet; thence westerly and at right angles to the preceding course a distance of 15 feet to the point or place of beginning; the lease to be for a term of 5 years, from July 1, 1909, at a rental of 27½ cents per square foot per annum; the lessee to have the privilege of erecting upon said land under water a platform, together with such other structures as may be necessary to carry on the coal business; the said platform and structures to be erected in accordance with plans and specifications to be first submitted to and approved by the Chief Engineer of the Department of Docks and Ferries. The lease to contain a clause to the effect that the lessee shall not in any way interfere with the operation of the Fire Department on the southerly side of the Grand street pier. The remaining terms and conditions of the lease to be similar to those contained in forms of leases now in use by the Department of Docks and Ferries.

6. Approving of lease to the Bouker Contracting Company of the following described property, viz.: Crib work dump inside of established bulkhead line between Seventy-first and Seventy-second streets, East River, with an approach from the foot of East Seventy-first street. The lease to be for a term of five years from August 1, 1909, at a rental of \$4,000 per annum, the lessee to have license and authority to maintain and operate a crib work dump during the term of said lease between Seventy-first and Seventy-second streets, East River, Borough of Manhattan, inside the bulkhead line, with an overhang (a portion of which extends beyond the bulkhead line), with an approach from the foot of East Seventy-first street about 93 feet long by 19 feet in width; the lessee to erect and maintain during the term of said lease tally house, etc. In case the Department of Docks and Ferries shall require the above described premises in order to proceed with the improvement of the water-front at

that vicinity, the Commissioner of Docks will grant to the said Bonker Contracting Company, at a place to be selected by said Commissioner, a space 300 feet long, between Seventieth and Seventy-third streets, East River, together with the right to build the necessary runways, ramps and approaches thereat, also a tally house. Any dumping boards, runways, ramps and approaches and other structures erected under the provisions of this lease to be erected in accordance with plans and specifications to be submitted to and approved by the Commissioner of Docks and under his direction and supervision. It is also understood and agreed that the premises demised or any part thereof, shall not be used nor be permitted to be used as a stable, nor for the sorting or storage of rags, barrels, boxes or refuse of any kind, and the premises shall at all times be kept in a clean and sanitary condition, to the satisfaction of the Commissioner of Docks; it being understood and agreed that at the expiration of the lease the lessee shall have the privilege of removing said dumping board, ramps and approaches and other structures erected under the terms of this lease. The remaining terms and conditions of the lease to be similar to those contained in leases of wharf property now used by the Department of Docks and Ferries.

7. Approving of and authorizing a lease to the Long Island Railroad Company, by private agreement, of franchise to operate a ferry from and to the foot of East Thirty-fourth street, East River, Borough of Manhattan, to and from the foot of Borden avenue, Long Island City, Borough of Queens, together with all that certain wharf property situated in the Borough of Manhattan, in The City of New York, known and described as follows, to wit: Bulkhead at the foot of East Thirty-fourth street, East River, including all other properties and wharf structures belonging to the City which have heretofore been used for the purpose of said ferry, for a term of one year from May 1, 1909, at a rental of 2 per cent. of the gross receipts of said company annually. The lessee shall furnish a statement of the receipts and expenditures of said ferry, duly verified by the proper officer of said company, to the Commissioner of Docks, whenever so requested by him, and The City of New York, its officers, agents or employees shall at all times have access to and power to examine the books and accounts of said lessee relating to the affairs of said ferry; the remaining terms and conditions of the lease to be similar to those contained in leases of ferry franchises and wharf property now used by the Department of Docks and Ferries.

8. Fixing the time and place for a hearing on the new plan laying of the waterfront between West Two Hundred and Fifth and West Two Hundred and Fifteenth streets, Harlem River.

9. Approving of and authorizing lease to the Interborough Ferry Company of franchise to operate ferries from and to the foot of East Tenth street, to and from the foot of Greenpoint avenue, Brooklyn, and from and to the foot of East Twenty-third street, Manhattan, to and from the foot of Greenpoint avenue, Brooklyn, together with the wharf property and structures belonging to the City, which have heretofore been used for the purposes of said ferries, for a term of 25 years from May 1, 1909, at a rental of 2 per cent. of the gross receipts of said company annually, but in no case shall said rental be less than \$7,500 per annum, and said lessee shall furnish a bond of a surety company to be approved by the Commissioner of Docks, in the sum of \$15,000, for the faithful performance of all the terms and conditions of the lease; the lessee shall furnish a statement of the receipts and expenditures of said ferry, duly verified by the proper officer of said company, to the Commissioner of Docks, whenever so requested by him, and The City of New York, its officers, agents or employees shall at all times have access to and power to examine the books and accounts of said lessee relating to the affairs of said ferry; the remaining terms and conditions of the lease to be similar to those contained in leases of ferry franchises and wharf property now used by this Department. Filed.
