MESSAGES FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR.

The President laid before the Board the following message from his Honor the Mayor:

No. 2068.

City of New York, Office of the Mayor,
April 23, 1909.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Gentlemen—I return herewith, disapproved, proposed Resolution No. 2068, entitled:

“Resolution permitting C. Redmond to place a fruit stand.”

I find that section 50 of the Charter provides, in part, as follows:

“The Board of Aldermen shall not have power to authorize the placing or continuing of any encroachment or obstruction upon any street or sidewalk, except the temporary occupation thereof during the erection or repairing of a building on a lot opposite the same, nor shall they permit the erection of booths and stands within stoop line, except for the sale of newspapers, periodicals, fruits and soda water, and with the consent in such case of the owners of the premises.”

“The Board of Aldermen shall not pass any special ordinance in relation to any of the matters mentioned in this section.”

I am of the opinion that a fruit stand may not be allowed except in accordance with the provisions of the Charter, and as the proposed resolution is worded in such a way that a fruit stand might be placed on the highway, I return the same disapproved.

Dear Sir—I transmit herewith certified copy of a resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, April 23, 1909, recommending the establishment of the grade position of Clerk, at \$2,250 per annum, for one incumbent, in the office of the Mayor, also the establishment of the positions of Examiner of Accounts, at \$2,250 per annum; Accountant, at \$2,250 per annum, and Accountant, at \$1,750 per annum, for one incumbent for each position, in said office, together with form of resolution for adoption by the Board of Aldermen to indicate its concurrence therein.

To the Honorable, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—I respectfully submit the following report in relation to a resolution presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment at a meeting held April 2, 1909, by the Mayor, to wit:

"Whereas, It is necessary to transfer James T. Curtin, Clerk, \$2,250 per annum; Joseph G. Conlon, Examiner of Accounts, \$2,250 per annum; Matthew H. Murray, Accountant, \$2,250 per annum, and James Fitzsimmons, Accountant, \$1,750 per annum, all employed in the Office of the Commissioners of Accounts, to the Mayor's Office, he and is hereby is

"Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, acting in pursuance of section 56 of the Greater New York Charter, hereby recommends to the Board of Aldermen that the following named positions and salaries be added to those already existing in the Mayor's Office:

"Clerk, \$2,250 per annum, 1 incumbent.
"Examiner of Accounts, \$2,250 per annum, 1 incumbent.
"Accountant, \$2,250 per annum, 1 incumbent.
"Accountant, \$1,750 per annum, 1 incumbent."

This matter was referred to the Comptroller by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for examination.

The Mayor stated as his reasons for asking for these transfers that for some years past it has been found necessary to have men assigned to his office for the purpose of checking up and entering the bonds, warrants and vouchers received from the Department of Finance to be countersigned by the Mayor. This work is now of such volume, in order to insure its proper performance, the Mayor deems it necessary to have these men who have been temporarily detailed permanently attached to his staff. The Mayor also states that the employees, whose transfers are requested, are competent and reliable men, who have become thoroughly familiar with the work.

It is the intention of the Mayor, if this request is granted, to have these transfers take effect on May 15, 1909. To provide for the compensation of these employees for the balance of the year, a transfer of the sum of \$5,012.50 from other appropriations is required, an additional amount of \$300 being provided for by a modification in a schedule line in the appropriation entitled, "No. 1—Salaries—Mayor's Office."

The salaries to be paid the persons mentioned in the request of the Mayor, are the same as now received by them, with one exception; that of James T. Curtin, Clerk, at \$2,250 per annum, his present rate of compensation being \$1,650. Mr. Curtin has taken a promotion examination, and is eligible to advancement to the \$2,250 grade. He has been seventeen years in the City's service, and the Commissioners of Accounts state that the proposed promotion is merited by his long service and efficiency.

In order to adjust the appropriation account of the Mayor's Office for "Salaries," so as to permit of the payment of the increased salary to Mr. Curtin, it was agreed, in a conference between representatives of the Comptroller, the Mayor and Commissioners of Accounts, to change the rate of salary for the Executive Clerk in the Mayor's Office to \$1,050, the \$1,350 now provided in the Budget schedule not being available for the present incumbent this year, and further by the transfer of \$4,937.50 from appropriation item "No. 955, Salaries and Wages," and \$75 from appropriation item "No. 959, Contingencies, including Special Examinations," made to the office of the Commissioners of Accounts for the year 1909.

In view of the foregoing facts, I would recommend the approval of the Mayor's request in accordance with the resolutions attached hereto.

Hon. PATRICK F. MCGOWAN, President of the Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York City:

Sir—Application is hereby respectfully made for an issue of Special Revenue Bonds of \$30,000 for the maintenance of new park lands lately placed in the care of this Department, namely, the old Bensonia Cemetery plot, the Rodman Drake Park, and the new addition to Bronx Park, which last is now being inclosed with a fence. I feel that I ought to be enabled to employ a force of men in these parks to keep same in as presentable shape as possible.

The Bensonia Cemetery plot if not maintained is very likely to degenerate into a dumping ground, whereas until developed, can easily be maintained as a playground for the young people in that neighborhood.

The Rodman Drake Park is a plot of ground in which lies the body of Rodman Drake, the poet. The neglected condition of this land has often been adversely commented upon, in meeting and in the press, by the public spirited and literary people of this Borough and City. Now that it is in the possession of the City, I am of the opinion that an effort to at least maintain it in presentable shape should be made.

Office of the Board of Trustees, First Avenue and Twenty-sixth Street,
New York, April 20, 1909.

Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York City:

Gentlemen—On April 2 the Board of Trustees requested the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to establish the grade of Physician in Out Patients in the Department of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals for twenty incumbents, at a salary of \$300 each, and on April 16 the request was referred to the Comptroller and the President of the Board of Aldermen.

The Board of Trustees now applies for the issue of Special Revenue Bonds to provide for the salaries of these Physicians, whom it is proposed to appoint at Gouverneur Hospital, in the Out Patient Department, where the Board finds it impossible to retain competent Physicians without compensation. At the request of the Board of Trustees an Examiner from the Bureau of Municipal Investigation of the Department of Finance, accompanied by the President of the Board of Trustees, visited the Out Patient Department on Monday, March 15, 1909, and reported upon the work of the Physicians in the Comptroller, under date of March 24, recommending that the request of the Trustees receive favorable consideration.

The number of applicants for treatment is constantly increasing, and for that reason the patients are not receiving the necessary attention, the work being done so hurriedly by the small unpaid staff that at times an average of but two minutes' time can be given to the individual concerned.

In view of the very pressing need of improving conditions in this Out Patient Department, and the fact that the Trustees and the Medical Board can suggest no other way of doing so except by appointing a paid staff, it is hoped that prompt and favorable action may be taken upon this request.

To the Honorable Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—The following proceedings were this day directed by the Acting Police Commissioner:

Ordered, That the proceedings of April 10, 1909, requesting the Board of Aldermen to issue Special Revenue Bonds in the sum of \$800 for the purpose of paying rent of premises corner of Broadway and Stockton street, Williamsburg, Borough of Brooklyn, for a branch office of the Detective Bureau, be and are hereby amended to read as follows:

Whereas, In pursuance of a resolution adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund directing that heads of Departments who desire the leasing of premises not heretofore leased or included in the statement presented to the Budget Committee, before making application to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, apply to the Board of Aldermen for an issue of Special Revenue Bonds covering the amount the City will have to pay if leases are authorized by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund; and

Whereas, The exigencies of the Police Department require accommodation for a branch office of the Detective Bureau in the building No. 732 Flushing avenue, Williamsburg, Borough of Brooklyn.

Ordered, That the Board of Aldermen be and are hereby respectfully requested to authorize the issue of Special Revenue Bonds in the sum of \$800 for the purpose of paying the rent of the said premises for eight months in the year 1909, provided the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorize the said lease.

The name of the owner is J. G. Giambalvo.

The property to be leased is the second and third floors of a three-story brick building.

The term is for two years, with privilege of renewal for two years at the same rate.

The rental is \$1,200 per annum, payable quarterly, the owner to keep the property in repair.

The owner pays the water rent, but does not pay for janitor service nor light, but will furnish heat required for the premises days, nights, Sundays and holidays.

The least is necessary for a headquarters for a detective branch of about 150 men.

The premises are suitable and are the most reasonable that can be secured in the neighborhood for the purposes desired.

Hon. PATRICK F. MCGOWAN, President of the Board of Aldermen, City Hall, Manhattan, New York City:

Dear Sir—Under authority of chapter 198 of the Laws of 1909, which became a law by the approval of the Governor on the 16th of April, 1909, I appointed Leroy W. Rios and Frederick B. Bailey as Assistant District Attorneys of the County of Kings and fixed their salary at \$5,000 each per annum, the appointment to take effect the 1st day of May, 1909.

To meet these salaries I would respectfully request the Board of Aldermen to allow by resolution the issuance of Revenue Bonds to the amount of \$6,666.56, which will be the amount required for the current year.

Under a similar amendment to this law, which was known as chapter 77 of the Laws of 1907, I appointed two additional Assistant District Attorneys, Mr. Martin and Mr. Carrao, and on the 16th day of April, 1907, the Board adopted the following resolution:

"In the Board of Aldermen:

"Resolved, That, in pursuance of the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the amended Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and it is hereby requested to authorize the Comptroller to issue Special Revenue Bonds not to exceed the sum of \$9,000, the proceeds whereof to be applied to pay the salaries of additional Assistant District Attorneys of the County of Kings, as provided by chapter 77 of the Laws of 1907."

The above resolution was sent to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and on the 30 day of May, 1907, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted the following resolution:

"Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of and concurs in the resolution of the Board of Aldermen adopted April 16, 1907, in relation to an appropriation of \$9,000 to pay the salaries of two additional Assistant District Attorneys of the County of Kings for the year 1907, as provided by chapter 77 of the Laws of 1907, and that for the purpose of providing means therefor the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized, pursuant to the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, to issue Special Revenue Bonds of The City of New York to the amount of \$9,000, redeemable from the tax levy of the year succeeding the year of their issue."

I make this explanation concerning the issue of Bonds in 1907 for this purpose, as it established a precedent in the matter.

Senate, No. 572—Chapter 198.

An act to amend chapter four hundred and thirty-eight of the laws of eighteen hundred and ninety-seven, as amended by chapter seventy-seven of the laws of nineteen hundred and seven, entitled "An act regulating the appointment of assistant district attorneys for the county of Kings."

Became a law April 16, 1909, with the approval of the Governor.

Passed, three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Section one of chapter four hundred and thirty-eight of the laws of eighteen hundred and ninety-seven, as amended by chapter seventy-seven of the laws of nineteen hundred and seven, entitled "An act regulating the appointment of assistant district attorneys for the county of Kings," is hereby further amended so as to read as follows:

Section 1. There shall not be more than *ten* assistant district attorneys for the county of Kings. The power to appoint and to remove, and to adjust, regulate and determine the salaries of assistant district attorneys for said county is hereby vested in the district attorney of said county. All such salaries shall be paid in equal monthly payments. Every appointment of an assistant district attorney for said county hereafter made shall be by writing subscribed by said district attorney and filed in the office of the clerk of said county. Each such appointee must, before entering upon the duties of his office, subscribe and file in the office of said clerk the constitutional oath of office. No person except an attorney and counsellor-at-law and a resident of said county shall be appointed an assistant district attorney.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

Hon. JOHN F. AHEARN, President of the Borough of Manhattan, City Hall, City:

Dear Sir—Complaint having been made to this association of the absence of street signs at many of the intersections of principal streets, especially in the central part of the Borough, inspection has been made, as to this particular, of Broadway and of Madison avenue, from One Hundred and Twentieth street to Forty-second street, in the case of each.

On Broadway, from Ninetieth to One Hundred and Twentieth street, a distance of one and one-half miles, with 30 street intersections, there are but four intersections which have signs on both sides of Broadway, and 4 intersections which have signs on one side only, while 22 intersections have no signs whatever. On the west side of Broadway there are no signs between One Hundredth street and One Hundred and Eighteenth street, a distance of nearly one mile. On the east side there are but 2 signs between One Hundredth street and One Hundred and Twentieth street. From Ninetieth street to Forty-second street few if any of the intersections have signs on both sides of the street, and nearly every alternate cross street on either side of Broadway is without a sign.

On Madison avenue, from One Hundred and Twentieth street to Forty-second street there are 78 intersections, each of which should have 2 signs, or a total of 156. In fact, there are but 109 signs, 47 short of the proper number.

We transmit herewith schedule, showing the intersections of Broadway, and of Madison avenue, from which one or both signs are missing.

We are further informed that street signs are lacking in many other parts of the Borough, but have not made a general inspection to verify the statement.

You will recall that about three years ago \$30,000 was appropriated and a contract made for placing two signs at every intersection in the Borough, on diagonally opposite corners, and that there was long delay in performance of the contract. We were later informed that the work had been fully done and every street intersection equipped with two signs.

In view, however, of the numerous cases in which street signs are missing, shown by our very limited inspection, we respectfully suggest that you cause a thorough inspection to be made of the streets of the entire Borough and promptly take such steps as may be necessary to replace all missing street signs. The obvious inconvenience to citizens, and particularly to strangers, caused by the present conditions, affords sufficient reason why this request should be complied with.

Sir—Under a recent contract, held by James Shewan & Sons, for repairing the Municipal Ferryboats as such repairs became necessary, one of the Staten Island Ferryboats—the "Manhattan"—was delivered to the contractors. In the progress of the work on this boat, it was found that the moneys authorized to be expended under the contract would not permit the completion of all the repairs needed; and the boat is now in such condition that it cannot be used, owing to repairs needed to two of her boilers.

One of the boats of the Thirty-ninth Street Ferry—the "Castleton"—was damaged on the 14th inst., necessitating her temporary withdrawal from service for a short time; and another ferryboat—the "Stapleton"—is undergoing repairs. This leaves the Department without a spare boat on either the Thirty-ninth Street Ferry or the Staten Island Ferry.

To complete the repairs to the boilers on the ferryboat "Manhattan" will involve an expenditure in the neighborhood of \$1,300, and I respectfully request that a resolution be adopted by the Board of Aldermen, authorizing me to issue an order for this additional work, at an estimated cost of \$1,300, otherwise than by contract after advertisement, in order that the boat may be placed in commission with the least possible delay.

Section 1. All bread made or procured for the purpose of sale, sold, offered or exposed for sale in The City of New York shall be made in a clean and sanitary place, of good and wholesome flour or meal, and shall contain no deleterious substance or material.

Sec. 2. Every loaf of bread made or procured for the purpose of sale, sold, offered or exposed for sale in The City of New York shall weigh a pound avoirdupois (except as hereinafter provided), and such loaf shall be considered to be the standard loaf in The City of New York. Bread may also be made or procured for the purpose of sale, sold, offered or exposed for sale in half, three-quarter, double, triple, quadruple, quintuple or sextuple loaves, and in no other way.

Every loaf of bread made or procured for the purpose of sale, sold, offered or exposed for sale in The City shall have affixed thereon in a conspicuous place a label at least one inch square, or, if round, at least one inch in diameter, upon which label there shall be printed in plain type, the letters and figures of which label shall be printed in black ink upon white paper, the weight of the loaf in pounds, or fraction of a pound, avoirdupois, whether the loaf be a standard loaf or not. The business name and address of the maker, baker or manufacturer of the loaf shall also be printed plainly on each label.

Sec. 3. Every maker, baker or manufacturer of bread, every proprietor of a bakery or bakeshop, and every seller of bread in The City of New York, shall keep scales and weights suitable for the weighing of bread in a conspicuous place in his bakery, bakeshop or store, and shall, whenever requested by the buyer, and in the buyer's presence, weigh the loaf or loaves of bread sold or offered for sale.

Sec. 4. If any person, firm or corporation shall make, or procure for the purpose of sale, sell, offer or expose for sale within The City of New York any bread which is not made of good and wholesome flour or meal, any bread which contains a deleterious substance or material, any bread the loaf or loaves of which are not standard, half, three-quarter, double, triple, quadruple, quintuple or sextuple loaves, as defined in section 2 of this ordinance, or any bread which is not made in a clean and sanitary place, or shall make or procure for the purpose of sale, sell, offer or expose for sale within The City of New York any standard loaf or loaves of bread which do not weigh one pound, or any bread the loaf or loaves of which do not weigh as much as the weight marked thereon, or any bread the loaf or loaves of which do not have affixed thereon the label marked as hereinbefore provided, contrary to the provisions of this ordinance, such person, firm or corporation shall be fined not less than ten dollars nor more than one hundred dollars for each offense.

The provisions of this ordinance, other than the provisions of section 1 and section 4 (so far as section 4 relates to violations of section 1), shall not apply to crackers, pretzels, biscuits, huns, scones, rolls, or loaves of fancy bread weighing less than one-fourth of a pound avoirdupois, or in what is commonly known as "stale bread," sold as such, provided the seller shall at the time of sale expressly state to the buyer that the bread so sold is stale bread.

Whereas, in pursuance of such laws, this Board adopted a resolution on December 11, 1908, fixing the date for public hearing thereon as January 8, 1909, at which citizens were entitled to appear and be heard, and publication was had for at least fourteen (14) days in "The New York Herald" and "New York Tribune," newspapers designated by the Mayor, and in the City Record for ten (10) days immediately prior to the date of hearing; and the public hearing was duly held on such day and

Whereas, This Board has made inquiry as to the money value of the franchise or right applied for, and proposed to be granted in the New York and Queens County Railway Company, and the adequacy of the compensation proposed to be paid therefor, now therefore it is

Resolved, That the following form of the resolution for the grant of the franchise or right applied for by the New York and Queens County Railway Company, containing the form of proposed contract for the grant of such franchise or right, be hereby introduced, and entered in the minutes of this Board, as follows, to wit:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby grants to the New York and Queens County Railway Company the franchise or right fully set out and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant thereof, embodying all of the terms and conditions, including the provisions as to rates, fares and charges upon and subject to the terms and conditions in said proposed form of contract contained, and that the Mayor of The City of New York be and he hereby is authorized in execute and deliver such contract in the name and on behalf of The City of New York, as follows, to wit:

Proposed Form of Contract.

This contract made this _____ day of _____, 1909, by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and the New York and Queens County Railway Company (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, witnesses:

In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as follows:

Section 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right and privilege to construct, maintain and operate a double track extension to its present street surface railway, with the necessary wires and equipment, for the purpose of conveying persons and property, in the Borough of Queens, in The City of New York, upon the following route, to wit:

Beginning at and connecting with the existing tracks of the Company at or near the intersection of Debevoise or Second Avenue and Pierce Avenue, thence westerly in, upon and along said Debevoise or Second Avenue to and connecting with the existing tracks of the Company in Jackson Avenue.

The said route, with turnouts, switches and crossovers, briefly sketched, is shown upon a map entitled:

"Map showing proposed street surface railway of the New York & Queens County Railway Company in the Borough of Queens, City of New York, to accompany petition dated December 4, 1908, in the Board of Estimate and Apportionment," and signed by W. O. Wood, Vice-President and General Manager, and L. H. Meyer, Engineer in Charge, a copy of which is attached hereto, to be deemed a part of this contract, to be construed with the text thereof, and to be substantially followed. Provided that deviations therefrom and additional turnouts, switches and crossovers which are consistent with the foregoing description, and the other provisions of this contract, may be permitted by resolution of the Board.

Sec. 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company:

First—The consent in writing of the owners of half in value of the property bounded on said streets and avenues to the construction and operation of said railway shall be obtained by the Company within thirty (30) days from the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and a copy of such consents shall be filed with the Board within such time, or in the event that such consents cannot be obtained within such time the Company shall within one month thereafter make application to the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court for the substitution of Commissioners in the manner provided by the Railroad Law to determine if said railway ought to be constructed; otherwise this grant shall cease and terminate.

Second—The said right to construct, maintain and operate said railway shall be held and enjoyed by the Company for the term of twenty-five (25) years from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for the further period of twenty-five (25) years upon a fair revaluation of such right and privilege.

If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal it shall make application to the Board, or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two years and not later than one year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The determination of the revaluation shall be sufficient if agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual rate of compensation to the City be fixed at a less amount than the sum required to be paid during the last year of this original contract.

and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable, then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate and at such amount as shall be determined by three disinterested freeholders selected in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six months prior to the expiration of this original contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may have their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations, without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuation so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but no annual sum shall, in any event, be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year of this original contract. If, in any year, the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, then the Company shall pay the annual rate therefore prevailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate. The compensation and expenses of the said appraisers shall be borne jointly by the City and the Company, each paying one-half thereof.

Third—The Company shall pay to the City for the privilege hereby granted the following sum of money:

The sum of five hundred dollars (\$500) in cash within thirty (30) days after the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the privilege hereby granted.

During the first term of five (5) years an annual sum which shall be no less than four hundred dollars (\$400), and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts (if such percentage shall exceed the sum of four hundred dollars (\$400)).

During the remaining term of twenty (20) years an annual sum which shall be no less than five hundred dollars (\$500), and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts (if such percentage shall exceed the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500)).

The gross annual receipts mentioned above shall be that portion of the gross earnings of the Company from all sources within the limits of the City as shall bear the same proportion to such gross earnings as the length of the extension hereby granted shall bear to the entire length of the railway of the Company in operation within the limits of the City.

The annual charges shall commence from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

All annual charges as above shall be paid into the treasury of the City on November 1 of each year, and shall be for the amount due to the City on next preceding.

Provided that the first annual payment shall be only that portion of the first annual charge as the time between the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor and September 1 following shall bear to the whole of one year.

Whenever the percentage required to be paid shall exceed the minimum amount as above, then such sum over and above such minimum shall be paid on or before November 1 of each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding.

The annual charges herein provided are intended to include the percentage of gross receipts now required to be paid by railway companies to the City, pursuant to the Railroad Law as amended.

Fourth—The annual charges or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of this contract, whether original or renewed, notwithstanding any change in any statute or in the Charter of any other railway or railroad company, providing for the payment for railway or railroad rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or privileges hereby granted, whether original or renewed or of any part thereof, or of the route mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignor or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this contract and that the assignor or lessee agrees and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the Charter of such assignor or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignor or lessee agrees and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the Charter of such assignor or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

Fifth—The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass in or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations, or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Sixth—Upon the termination of this original contract, or if the same be renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any other cause, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the tracks and equipment of the Company constructed pursuant to this contract, within the streets and avenues, shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any company or individual.

If, however, at the termination of this contract, as above, the Board shall on order by resolution, the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice from the Board, remove any and all of the tracks and other equipment constructed pursuant to this contract, and the said streets and avenues shall be restored to their original condition at the sole cost and expense of the Company.

Seventh—The Company shall commence construction of the railway herein authorized within ninety (90) days from the date upon which the consents of the property owners are obtained, or from the date upon which the decision of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court that such railway ought to be constructed is rendered in lieu of such consents, and shall complete the construction and place the same in full operation within nine (9) months from the date of obtaining such consents or such decision,

otherwise this grant shall cease and terminate, and all sums paid or which may be deposited with the Comptroller of the City as hereinafter provided, shall thereupon be forfeited to the City; provided that such period may be extended by the Board for a period or periods not exceeding in the aggregate six months each, and provided, further, that when the commencement or completion of said construction shall be prevented by legal proceedings in any court or by works of public improvement, or from other causes not within the control of the Company, the time for the commencement or completion of such construction may be extended for the period of such prevention, but no delay shall be allowed for unless the court proceedings shall be diligently prosecuted by the Company, and provided further that in no case shall such delay be deemed to begin until the Company shall have given written notice to the Board of any such court proceedings or other occasion of delay, and deliver to the Board copies of any injunction or other orders, and the papers upon which the same shall have been granted, and unless upon the request of the Board the Company shall, in writing, consent that the Board either in its own name as a party, or in the name of the City as a party, may intervene in any such proceedings.

Eighth—Said railway shall be constructed and operated in the latest approved manner of street railway construction and operation, and it is hereby agreed that the Board may require the Company to improve or add to the railway equipment, including rolling stock and railway appliances, from time to time, as such additions and improvements are necessary, in the opinion of the Board. Upon failure on the part of the Company to comply with the direction of the Board within a reasonable time, the rights hereby granted shall cease and terminate.

Ninth—Said railway shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City who have jurisdiction in such matters, as provided by the Charter of the City.

No construction upon said railway shall be commenced until written permits have been obtained from the proper City officials.

In any permits so issued such officials may also impose such conditions, as a condition of the granting of the same, as are necessary for the purpose of protecting any structures, in the streets and avenues, over which such officials have jurisdiction, and the Company shall comply with such conditions.

The electrical equipment to be installed by the Company for the operation of the railway within the limits of the City, whether the same be upon streets and avenues or upon private property, shall be constructed and maintained under the supervision and control of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

Tenth—Said railway may be operated by overhead electric power substantially similar to the overhead electric system now in use by street surface railways in the Borough of Queens, or by any other motive power except locomotive steam power or horse power, which may be approved by the Board, and consented to by the abutting property owners in accordance with the provisions of law, and by the Public Service Commission for the First District of the State of New York.

Provided, however, that the Board, upon giving to the Company one year's notice, may require the Company to operate its railway upon the whole or upon any portion of its route, by underground electric power substantially similar to the system now in use on the street surface railways in the Borough of Manhattan, or by any other practical motive power then in use which does not require the use of poles and overhead wires in the streets and avenues, and thereupon to discontinue the use of the overhead trolley system, and to remove its poles, wires and other structures used by it for that purpose from the streets and avenues of the City.

And provided further that the Company shall not be required under the provisions of this contract to make such change upon the route hereby authorized until the existing line of the Company on Borden Avenue and Jackson Avenue, between the East River and Debevoise Avenue, shall have been so changed.

Eleventh—Upon six months' notice by the Board to the Company, all wires for the transmission of power, except trolley wires, for the operation of the railway upon all or any portion of the route hereby authorized, shall be placed in conduits beneath or alongside of the railway. The Company shall provide in such conduits two ducts not less than three inches in diameter for the exclusive use of the City. Such ducts shall be used only by the Company for the operation of its railway and by the City, as above.

Twelfth—The rate of fare for any passenger upon said railway shall not exceed five (5) cents, and the Company shall not charge any passenger more than five (5) cents for one continuous ride from any point on said railway, or a list or branch operated in connection therewith, to any point thereof, or of any connecting line or branch thereof, within the limits of the City.

The Company shall carry free upon the railway hereby authorized, during the term of this contract, all members of the Police and Fire Departments of the City, when such employees are in full uniform.

Thirteenth—No cars shall be operated upon the railway hereby authorized, other than passenger cars, cars for the transportation of express matter and cars necessary for the repair or maintenance of the railway, and no freight cars shall be operated upon the tracks of said railway.

The rate for the carrying of such property over the said railway upon the cars of the Company shall in all cases be reasonable in amount, subject to the control of the Board, and may be fixed by the Board after notice to the Company and a hearing had thereon, and when so fixed such rate shall be binding upon the Company, and no greater sums shall be charged for such services than provided for by it.

Fourteenth—The Company shall attach to each car run over the said railway proper fenders and wheel guards in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities.

Fifteenth—All cars which are operated on said railway shall be heated during the cold weather in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities.

Sixteenth—All cars operated on said railway shall be well lighted by electricity, or by some lighting system equally efficient, or as may be required by the Board.

Seventeenth—Cars on the said railway shall run at intervals of not more than thirty (30) minutes both day and night, and as such officer as reasonable convenience of the public may require or as may be directed by the Board. Provided, however, that the Company, during the first five (5) years of this contract, shall not be required to operate its cars between the hours of 1 o'clock a. m. and 3 o'clock a. m., each day, unless the Board shall determine after a hearing had thereon that public convenience requires the operation of cars during said hours.

Eighteenth—The Company, as long as it shall continue to use any of the tracks upon the streets and avenues in which said railway shall be constructed, shall cause to be returned at

least three times every twenty-four hours, when the temperature is above 35 degrees Fahrenheit, the entire width of the streets and avenues, except when the width of said streets and avenues shall exceed 60 feet between such lines, in which case the Company shall cause to be watered only 60 feet in width of each roadway, and the Company shall provide for such purpose at least one tank car, the capacity of which shall be sufficient to water such streets and avenues in a satisfactory manner.

Nineteenth—The Company shall at all times keep the streets and avenues upon which the said railway is constructed, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and for a distance of two feet beyond the rails, on either side thereof, free and clear from ice and snow; provided, however, that the Company shall, at the request of the President of the Borough of Queens, enter into an agreement for each winter season, or part thereof, to clean an equivalent amount of street surface from house line to house line.

Twentieth—As long as said railway, or any portion thereof, remains in any street or avenue, the Company shall pave and keep in permanent repair that portion of the surface of the street or avenue in which said railway is constructed, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks, and for a distance of two feet beyond the rails, on either side thereof, under the supervision of the local authorities, whenever required by them to do so, and in such manner as they may prescribe. And the City shall have the right to change the material or character of the pavement of any street or avenue, and in that event the Company shall be bound to replace such pavement in the manner directed by the proper City officer, at its own expense, and the provision as to repairs herein contained shall apply to such renewed or altered pavement.

Twenty-first—Any alteration in the sewerage or drainage system, or to any other subsurface, or to any surface structures in the streets, required on account of the construction or operation of the railway, shall be made at the sole cost of the Company, and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe.

Twenty-second—It is agreed that the right hereby granted to operate a street surface railway shall not be in preference or in hindrance to public work of the City, and should the said railway in any way interfere with the construction of public works in the streets and avenues, whether the same is done by the City directly, or by a contractor for the City, the Company shall, at its own expense, protect or move the tracks and appurtenances in the manner directed by the City officials having jurisdiction over such public work.

Twenty-third—Should the grades or lines of the streets and avenues in which the right to construct the railway is hereby granted be changed at any time after the railway has been constructed, and during the term of this contract, the Company shall, at its own expense, change its tracks and appurtenances to conform with such new grades and lines, and during the construction of any public improvement upon said street the Company shall take care of and protect the tracks and appurtenances at its own expense, all to be done subject to the direction of the City official having jurisdiction over the construction of such change.

Twenty-fourth—The Company shall, within thirty (30) days after the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor, take the necessary proceedings under the provisions of the Railroad Law for the abandonment of that portion of its existing route, described as follows:

Beginning at the intersection of Pierce Avenue and Debevoise Avenue, thence westerly in, upon and along said Pierce Avenue to Lockwood Street, thence southerly in, upon and along said Lockwood Street, along said Avenue Street and Lane Street to the intersection of said route with the existing tracks of the Company on Jackson Avenue, at or near the intersection of Lane Street and Jackson Avenue, and shall within sixty (60) days from the commencement of operation of the railway hereby authorized, remove at its own expense all of its tracks, wires and other equipment from the above-described streets and avenues, and restore the same to their original condition.

Twenty-fifth—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account of the gross earnings from all sources, and shall, on or before November 1 of each year, make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of the business done by the Company for the year ending September 30 next preceding, in such form as he may prescribe. Such report shall contain a statement of such gross earnings, total miles in operation within the limits of the city and the miles of railway constructed and operated under this contract, and such other information as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report, and may examine its officers under oath.

Twenty-sixth—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, this contract may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel, on notice of ten (10) days to the Company, or at the option of the Board by resolution of said Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the railway constructed and in use by virtue of this contract shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or in equity.

Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear, action may be taken by the Board forthwith.

Twenty-seventh—If the Company shall fail to give efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, or fail to maintain its structure in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company specifying any default on the part of the Company, and requiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time; and upon failure of the Company to remedy such defect within a reasonable time, the Company shall on each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains in the City the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250) as fixed or liquidated damages, or the Board, in case such structure which may affect the surface of the streets, shall not be in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid, shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company in which case the Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the fund hereinafter provided for.

Twenty-eighth—The Company shall assume all liability in persons or property by reason of the construction or operation of the railway authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or defaults of the Company.

Twenty-ninth—This grant is upon the express condition that the Company, within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the

Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City the sum of fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500), either in money or securities, to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of all of the terms and conditions of this contract, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charges for the privilege hereby granted, the efficiency of the public service rendered, the repairs of the street pavement, the removal of snow and ice and the quality of construction of the roadway; and in case of default in the performance by the Company of such terms and conditions the City shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings; or after default in the payment of the annual charges, shall collect the same, with interest, from the said fund after ten days' notice in writing to the Company; or in case of failure to keep the said terms and conditions of this contract relating to the roadway, heating and lighting of cars, fenders, wheel guards and watering of street pavements, the Company shall pay a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) per day for each day of violation, and the further sum of ten dollars (\$10) per day for each car that shall not be properly heated, lighted or supplied with fenders or wheel guards, in case of the violation of the provisions relating to those matters.

The procedure for the imposition and collection of the penalties in this contract shall be as follows:

The Board, on complaint made, shall give notice to the Company, directing its President, or other officer, to appear before the Board on a certain date not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why the Company should not be penalized in accordance with the foregoing provisions. If the Company fails to make an appearance, or, after a hearing, appears in the judgment of the Board to be in fault, said Board shall forthwith impose the prescribed penalty, or where the amount of the penalty is not prescribed herein, such amount as appears to the Board to be just, and without legal procedure direct the Comptroller to withdraw the amount of such penalty from the security fund deposited with him. In case of any default made upon the security fund the Company shall, upon ten (10) days' notice in writing, pay to the City a sum sufficient to restore said security fund to the original amount of fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500), and in default thereof this contract shall be canceled and annulled at the option of the Board, acting in behalf of the City. No action or proceeding at right under the provisions of this contract shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to the City.

Thirtieth—The grant of this privilege is subject to whatever right, title or interest the owners of abutting property or others may have in and to the streets and avenues in which the Company is hereby authorized to operate.

Thirty-first—The words "notice" or "direction," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean a written notice or direction. Every such notice or direction to be served upon the Company shall be delivered at such office in the City as shall have been designated for the Company, or if no such office shall have been designated, or if such designation shall have been for any reason become inoperative, shall be mailed to the City postpaid, addressed to the Company at the City. Delivery or mailing of such notice or direction as and when above provided, shall be equivalent to direct personal notice or direction, and shall be deemed to have been given at the time of delivery or mailing.

Thirty-second—The words "streets or avenues" and "avenues" wherever used in this contract shall be deemed to mean "streets, avenues, highways, parkways, driveways, cunettes, easements, bridges, viaducts, tunnels, public squares or any other property to which the City has title" encountered in the route hereinafter described, and upon or in which authority is hereby given to the Company to construct a railway.

Thirty-third—If at any time the powers of the Board or any other of the authorities herein mentioned or intended to be mentioned shall be transferred by law to any other Board, authority, officer or officers, then and in such case, such other Board, authority, officer or officers, shall have the powers, rights and duties herein reserved to or prescribed for the Board or other authority, officer or officers.

Section 2. This grant is also upon the further and express condition that the provisions of the Railroad Law pertinent hereto shall be strictly complied with by the Company.

Section 4. The Company promises, covenants and agrees on its part and behalf, to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms and conditions and requirements in this contract and contained.

In witness whereof the party of the first part, by its Mayor, thereto duly authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City, has caused the corporate seal of said City to be hereunto signed and the corporate seal of said City to be hereunto affixed, and the party of the second part, by its officers, thereto duly authorized, has caused its corporate seal to be hereunto signed and its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed, the day and year first above written.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby grants to the South Shore Traction Company the franchise, or right fully set out and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant thereof, embodying all of the terms and conditions, including the provisions as to rates, fares and charges upon and subject to the terms and conditions in said proposed form of contract contained, and that the Mayor of the City of New York be and he hereby is authorized to execute and deliver such contract in the name and on behalf of the City of New York, as follows, to wit:

PROPOSED FORM OF CONTRACT.

This contract made this day of 1909, by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and the South Shore Traction Company (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, witnesseth:

In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as follows:

Section 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the following rights and privileges:

First—To construct, maintain and operate a street surface railway with the necessary wires and equipment for the purpose of conveying persons and property in the Boroughs of Queens and Manhattan of the City of New York, upon the following routes, to wit:

Beginning at the southerly line of the Queensboro Bridge plaza, the same being the northwesterly side line of Jackson avenue; thence by double track southerly across Jackson avenue to a proposed new street, to be named and laid out upon a map or plan, which map was adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on May 26, 1905, and approved by the Mayor June 13, 1905; thence by double track in and upon said proposed new street and across the proposed viaduct to be constructed as a part of such proposed new street to Thomson avenue; thence by double track in and upon Thomson avenue to Hoffman boulevard; thence by double track in and upon Hoffman boulevard to Broadway and Jamaica turnpike or Fulton street; thence by double track in and upon Broadway and Jamaica turnpike or Fulton street to Campbell avenue; thence by double track in and upon Campbell avenue to Archer place; thence by double track

in and upon Archer place and in and upon private property to the intersection of Tindall street with Archer place; thence by single track in and upon Archer place and by private property crossing the Rockaway turnpike and Division street to Church street; thence by single track in and upon Church street to Twombly place; thence by double track in and upon Twombly place to Fleet street; thence by double track in and upon Fleet street to Prospect street; thence by double track in and upon Prospect street and crossing the tracks of the Long Island Railroad to Cumberland street; thence by double track in and upon Cumberland street to a point within six hundred feet of the Merrick Plank road; thence by single track in a general southerly direction and approximately parallel with New York avenue in and upon private property to a point approximately in the line of the prolongation of Central avenue, if the same were extended; thence by single track in a general easterly direction in and upon private property to and across the Merrick Plank road to Central avenue; thence by single track in a general easterly direction in and upon Central avenue as it winds and turns, and crossing the Montauk Division of the Long Island Railroad to a point where Central avenue intersects the boundary line between The City of New York and the County of Nassau.

Also the following-described alternate routes which may be combined and used in conjunction with portions of the hereinabove-described route for the purpose of making one complete route only, of not more than a double-track street surface railway from the intersection of Hoffman boulevard with Pierston street to the intersection of Merrick Plank road with Central avenue.

Beginning at the intersection of Rose avenue with Brooklyn and Jamaica turnpike or Fulton street; thence by double track in and upon Rose avenue to Archer place; thence by double track in and upon Archer place to its intersection with Camino avenue.

Beginning at the intersection of Rose avenue with Camino street; thence by double track in and upon Camino street and in and upon private property to the intersection at Archer place with Tindall street.

Beginning at a point in Division street approximately in a line with the prolongation of Archer place if the same were extended; thence by single track in and upon Division street to Twombly place; thence by double track in and upon Twombly place to and across Church street.

Beginning at a point on private property between Brooklyn and Jamaica turnpike or Fulton street and the tracks of the Long Island Railroad, approximately in a line with the prolongation of Guilford street if the same were extended; thence by double track southerly in and upon private property to and across the tracks of the Long Island Railroad to Guilford street; thence by double track still southerly in and upon Guilford street to Liberty avenue; thence by double track in and upon Liberty avenue to Henry street; thence by double track in and upon Henry street to South street; thence by double track in and upon South street to New York avenue; thence by double track in and upon New York avenue to a point approximately in line with the prolongation of Central avenue if the same were extended; thence by double track in and upon private property in a general easterly direction to the intersection of the Merrick Plank road with Central avenue.

Beginning at a point in the Brooklyn and Jamaica turnpike or Fulton street, opposite Alsup street; thence by double track in and upon Brooklyn and Jamaica turnpike or Fulton street to Rockaway turnpike; thence by double track in and upon Rockaway turnpike and across the tracks of the Long Island Railroad to a point at or near Johnson avenue; thence by double track in and upon Johnson avenue in a general easterly direction across Division street to Beaver street; thence by double track in and upon Beaver street and across the tracks of the Long Island Railroad to Church street; thence by double track and upon Church street to South street.

Beginning at the intersection of Johnson avenue with Guilford street; thence by double track in and upon Johnson avenue to Rockaway turnpike.

Beginning at the intersection of Fleet street with Prospect street; thence by double track in and upon Fleet street to Washington street; thence by double track in and upon Washington street and across the tracks of the Long Island Railroad to South street.

Beginning at the intersection of Pierston street with Hoffman boulevard; thence by double track in and upon Pierston street to Kaplan avenue; thence by double track in and upon Kaplan avenue to Amherst street; thence by double track in and upon Amherst street to Alsup street; thence by double track in and upon Alsup street to the Brooklyn and Jamaica turnpike or Fulton street; thence by double track in and upon Brooklyn and Jamaica turnpike or Fulton street to Church street; thence by double track in and upon Church street and across the tracks of the Long Island Railroad to and across Beaver street.

Beginning at the intersection of Degraw avenue with Kaplan avenue; thence by double track in and upon Degraw avenue to Alsup street; thence by double track in and upon Alsup street to Amherst street.

And to cross such other streets and avenues, named and unnamed, as may be encountered in said routes.

All of the above described routes are within the Borough of Queens, City of New York, and are, together with turnpikes, switches and crossovers, hereby authorized shown upon two maps each entitled:

"Map showing proposed railway of the South Shore Traction Company in the Borough of Queens, City of New York, in company petition dated December 28, 1908, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment."

—and signed by James T. Wood, as President, and W. B. Spencer, Chief Engineer, a copy of which is attached herein, is to be deemed a part of this contract, is to be construed with the text thereof, and is to be substantially followed, provided that deviations therefrom and additional turnpikes, switches and crossovers, which are consistent with the foregoing descriptions, and the other provisions of this contract may be permitted by resolution of the Board.

Second—To operate the cars of the Company upon two tracks when constructed upon the Queensboro Bridge and approaches therein, such tracks to be assigned to the Company by the Commissioner of Bridges; beginning at the northwesterly side line of Jackson avenue at the bridge plaza, in the Borough of Queens, and there connecting with the tracks of the Company above described; thence in and upon said bridge plaza to the easterly approach to the Queensboro Bridge; thence upon and along said bridge approach and across intersecting streets and avenues to the Queensboro Bridge; thence upon and along the Queensboro Bridge to the westerly bridge approach; thence upon and along said westerly bridge approach to the westerly terminus thereof at Second avenue, in the Borough of Manhattan. The said route is more particularly shown upon the map heretofore referred to, and is to be operated by the Company as a cable-car route in connection with the route heretofore described.

Sec. 2. The grant of the right or privilege to construct, maintain and operate the said railway from the Queensboro Bridge plaza, at Jackson avenue, Borough of Queens, to the intersection of Central avenue and the boundary line between the Borough of Queens and the County of Nassau, upon the route heretofore described, is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company:

First—It is agreed that the Company, before commencing construction on any portion of the route heretofore described as lying between the intersection of Hoffman boulevard with Pierston street and the intersection of Merrick Plank road with Central avenue, shall notify the Board in writing which of the routes herein described between those points the Company selects and adopts as the route upon which it shall construct the railway. Upon such notification by the Company to the Board, all of the rights and privileges hereby granted upon the routes not so selected and designated shall be considered null and void and of no effect, and the Company shall be deemed thereupon to have waived all rights or franchises which are hereby granted upon the routes not so selected and designated by the Company. The Company further agrees that it shall select and designate its route as herein provided not later than eighteen (18) months from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

Second—The Company shall not construct a double-track street surface railway upon any portion of the routes herein described between Jackson avenue and the intersection of Merrick Plank road with Central avenue, unless the streets and avenues in which such routes are described shall have at the time when such railway shall be constructed, a roadway at least 30 feet in width, and the Company shall not construct a double-track street surface railway in Guilford street as it now exists or may be extended, unless the roadway of that street shall exceed 30 feet in width.

Third—The consent in writing of the owners of half in value of the property bounded on said streets and avenues to the construction and operation of said railway shall be obtained by the Company within six (6) months from the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and a copy of such consent shall be filed with the Board within such time, but the Board may, for cause shown, grant an additional period not exceeding three (3) months within which to obtain and file such consents of property owners, or in the event that such consents cannot be obtained within such time or such extension of such time as shall be granted by the Board, the Company shall, within one (1) month thereafter, make application to the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court for the appointment of Commissioners in the manner provided by the Railroad Law to determine if said railway ought to be constructed; otherwise this grant shall cease and determine.

Fourth—The said right to construct, maintain and operate said railway shall be held and enjoyed by the Company for the term of twenty-five (25) years from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for the further period of twenty-five (25) years, upon a fair revaluation of such right and privilege.

If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal it shall make application to the Board, or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at any time, not earlier than two (2) years and not later than one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The determination of the revaluation shall be sufficient if agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual rate of compensation to the City be fixed at a less amount than the sum required to be paid during the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract.

If the Company and the Board shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding twenty-five (25) years shall be reasonable, and either the City (by the Board) or the Company shall be bound upon request of the other to enter into a written agreement with each other fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable, but in no case shall the annual rate so fixed be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable, then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate and at such amount as shall be determined by three disinterested freeholders selected in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six (6) months prior to the expiration of this original contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three (3) months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations, without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuations so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but no annual sum shall, in any event, be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year of this original contract. If in any case the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract then the Company shall pay the annual rate therefore prevailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate. The compensation and expenses of the said appraisers shall be borne jointly by the City and the Company, each paying one-half thereof.

Fifth—Upon the termination of this original contract, or if the same be renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any cause, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the tracks and equipments of the Company constructed pursuant to this contract within the streets and avenues shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any company or individual.

If, however, at the termination of this contract or above, the Board shall so order by resolution, the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice from the Board, remove any and all of its tracks and other equipment constructed pursuant to this contract, and the said streets and avenues shall be restored to their original condition at the sole cost and expense of the Company.

Sixth—Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any individual or other corporation a similar right or privilege upon the same or

other terms and conditions over the routes heretofore described.

The use of the railway, constructed by the Company under this contract, including the tracks, wires and other equipment, or any structures used in connection therewith in streets, avenues and private property heretofore described shall be permitted by the Company to any individual or corporation in which the City may have granted, or may hereafter grant, the right or privilege to use such streets, avenues and private property for street railway purposes, upon payment by such individual or corporation to the Company the following:

(a) An initial payment to be mutually agreed upon by said corporation or individual and the Company, and in case of failure on the part of such individual or corporation and the Company to agree upon the amount of such initial payment, such amount shall be determined by three disinterested freeholders selected in the following manner: One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Company; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the individual or corporation; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall determine the amount of such payment. Such appraisers, in fixing such amount, shall consider compensation to the Company for: First, the sinking fund which may have been or should have been set aside for the retirement of the total investment represented by such property of the Company as is used by said individual or corporation, from the date of the granting of this franchise to the date upon which said individual or corporation begins the use of such property of the Company; second, the moneys expended by the Company in its organization and promotion; third, the increased value of the territory as a district suitable for railway operation, which increase may have resulted from the operation of the Company; fourth, the loss of business to the Company which may result from direct competition on its own lines; fifth, any other purpose or purposes which the appraisers may deem as justly due to said Company by such individual or corporation for the use of such property. The compensation and expenses of the said appraisers shall be borne by such individual or corporation.

(b) An annual payment which shall equal the legal interest on such proportion of the actual cost of the construction of such railway and structures, and additions and betterments thereto, as the number of cars operated by such individual or corporation shall bear to the number of cars operated by the companies then using the same; and also such proportion of the cost of keeping the tracks and electrical equipment in repair, and the cost of additions and betterments thereto, such proportion of laying and repairing of pavement and removal of snow and ice and all other duties imposed upon the Company by the terms of this contract in connection with the maintenance or the operation of said railway as used, as the number of cars operated by such individual or corporation shall bear to the number of cars operated by the companies then using the same, together with the actual cost of the power necessary for the operation of the cars thereon of such individual or corporation. Provided, however, that if, in the opinion of the Company, the legal rate of interest upon the cost of such railway shall be an insufficient sum to be paid for the use of such tracks, it may appeal to the Board, and the Board may fix a percentage upon the cost to be paid to the Company, at a sum in excess of the legal rate of interest, if, in its opinion, such action is justified.

The Company shall not at any time operate, nor shall, upon the request of the Board, consent to the construction or operation, upon the routes heretofore described, of any street surface railway which may accommodate the use of any portion of the railway which shall be constructed by the Company pursuant to this contract.

Seventh—Said railway may be operated by overhead electric system now in use by street surface railways in the Borough of Queens, or by any other motive power, except locomotive steam power or horse power, which may be approved by the Board, and constrained to be the electric power system, in accordance with the provisions of law, and by the Public Service Commission for the First District of the State of New York.

Provided, however, that the Board, at any time after the first ten (10) years of this contract, upon giving to the Company one (1) year's notice, may require the Company to operate its railway upon the whole or any portion of its route lying in and northwesterly from the Brooklyn and Jamaica turnpikes or Fulton street, and

at any time after the first fifteen (15) years of this contract, upon giving to the Company one (1) year's notice, may require the Company to operate its railway upon the whole or any portion of its route lying southerly from the Brooklyn and Jamaica turnpikes or Fulton street, by underground electric power, substantially similar to the system now in use on the street surface railways in the Borough of Manhattan, or by any other practical motive power then in use which does not require the use of poles and overhead wires in the streets and avenues, and thereupon to discontinue the use of the overhead trolley system and remove its poles, wires and other structures used by it for that purpose, from the streets and avenues of the City.

Eighth—Said railway shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City who have jurisdiction in such matters, as provided by the Charter of the City.
