Minutes of a Duly Advertised Meeting of the Local Board of the Flatbush District, Held Wednesday, June 22, 1910.

The roll was called and the following members answered: Lewis H. Pounds, Commissioner of Public Works, presiding; Alderman Lewis M. Potter, Alderman O. Grant Esterbrook.

The Secretary presented resolutions initiating the following improvements:

1140. A resolution to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by closing and discontinuing Avenue G, from West st. to 18th ave., and Gravesend ave., which on motion of Commissioner Pounds was unanimously adopted.

1141. A resolution to regulate, grade, set cement curb and lay cement sidewalks on Martense st., from Nostrand ave. to New York ave., which on motion of Alderman Esterbrook was unanimously adopted.

1142. A resolution to reduce the width of the roadway of E. 17th st. from 44 feet to 34 feet between curbs, from the southerly side of Elm ave., as now in use, southerly to Avenue O, which on motion of Alderman Potter was unanimously adopted.

1142. A resolution to reduce the width of the roadway of E. 17th st. from 44 feet to 34 feet between curbs, from Avenue O to Kings Highway, which on motion of Commissioner Pounds was laid over.

1143. A resolution to regulate, grade, set cement curb and lay cement sidewalks on E. 28th st., between Emmons and Voorhies aves., which on motion of Alderman Potter was unanimously adopted, Alderman Morrison appearing and voting.

Dear Sir—Herewith I submit my report for the quarter ending March 31, 1910.

The daily average census of all the employees in the Department during the quarter was 2,384, the Nurses of the different institutions being included therein, their daily average census being 335 during this period.

The following shows the causes and number of changes during the first quarter for 1910: Appointments, 953; promotions, 158; resignations, 223; transfers, 22; dismissals, 718.

During this quarter 2,775 letters were written and sent out by this office (of which 707 were signed by the Commissioner and 145 by the First Deputy Commissioner), covering the business transactions of this Department with other City Departments, the public, private and charitable societies and institutions, hospitals and the State.

There were 8 general and 17 special orders issued during the period and 26 propositions accepted and awarded, for work costing not over \$10,000 in each case.

The services of another Clerk, to act as Statistician, are needed.

#### Changes.

A Graduate Nurse from Bellevue and Allied Hospitals has recently been assigned to this office to care for patients sent down here for transfer to the Island hospitals. Trained Hospital Helpers from the same institution are also assigned here and this enables us to handle the sick more promptly and efficiently and the patients are made more comfortable.

As the "Lowell" has now been assigned to make hourly trips from 9 in the morning until 2.30 in the afternoon, except on Saturdays, and the "Brennan" or "Fidelity" at 10.30 a. m. and 3.30 p. m., we are able to transport patients and transfer patients in a more humane and comfortable way. They need not remain on this pier as long as formerly, exposed to the inclemency of the weather and they can be assigned to the different hospital wards more promptly and satisfactorily. Those who remain here at noon time are given lunch in the waiting rooms and otherwise made as comfortable as possible.

#### Improvements.

A card system has been started for a certain class of patients.

The new schedule adopted for the boat service is, perhaps, the greatest improvement made during this quarter.

#### Needs.

Fire protection. Permission to use this office occasionally for teaching purposes. An interchangeable record system between all public hospitals. Two isolation rooms, extending from the waiting rooms on the south side to the first boat landing, one for men and one for women. Construction might be similar to the waiting rooms, but arranged so that they can be closed air tight for purposes of fumigation. Respectfully yours,

Report of the Departmental Dietitian.

May 25, 1910.

Hon. MICHAEL J. DRUMMOND, Commissioner:

Dear Sir—

Organization of the Dietary Department.

On March 1, the position of Dietitian was established at the New York City Hospital, the New York City Training School for Nurses and at the Manhattan Division of the Home for Aged and Infirm.

#### Visits to Dietary Departments.

I have continued my visits to the Dietary Departments of the institutions. The criticisms I have found necessary to make have largely been owing to the incompetent, poorly paid help with which the Resident Dietitians and their Assistants have to deal. To get satisfactory results, there must be competent people to do the work.

#### Dietaries and Food Supplies.

The approved dietaries of the institutions continue to be carried out as far as possible under existing conditions.

Owing to high bids and a shortage of funds we have been obliged to dispense with a number of articles of food which have been allowed in former years.

#### Equipment, etc.

There is an urgent need for dishes and other table furnishings, as well as pantry and kitchen equipment to properly conduct the Dietary Department.

#### Teaching of Classes.

At the New York City Training School for Nurses, 30 class periods of two hours each have been taught on the subject of Dietetics during this quarter by Miss Margery Greenwood, Dietitian at the Training School Home, and Miss Helen L. McDunnough, Dietitian at the New York City Hospital, the lessons having been evenly divided between Miss Greenwood and Miss McDunnough. Besides these lessons, two practical tests were given to the pupils.

At the Metropolitan Training School, Miss Esther B. Lucas taught 12 class periods of two hours each in Dietetics and 8 class periods of one hour each on Bacteriology during the quarter.

At Cumberland Street Hospital, Brooklyn, Miss Sadie D. Drayton, Pupil Dietitian at Kings County Hospital, taught three class periods of two hours each, and Miss Mabel White, Pupil Dietitian at Kings County Hospital, taught nine class periods of two hours each, making in all twelve lessons on Dietetics given at the Cumberland Street Hospital. There being no Dietitian at this hospital, it is necessary to have the teaching done by the Pupil Dietitians from Kings County Hospital. The pupils are graduates from domestic science schools and have had experience in teaching. Respectfully submitted,

Sir—I have the honor to submit herewith my first quarterly report of the affairs of this institution for the quarter ending March 31, 1910:

#### Classification of Inmates Admitted During the Quarter.

January—Deaf: Female, 2. Blind: Male, 4; female, 1. Epileptic: Male, 4. Paralyzed: Male, 4; female, 1. Crippled: Male, 21; female, 1. All others: Male, 149; female, 61.

February—Deaf: Male, 2. Blind: Male, 2. Epileptic: Male, 5. Paralyzed: Female, 1. Crippled: Male, 9; female, 1. All others: Male, 100; female, 73.

March—Deaf: Male, 2. Blind: Male, 6; female, 1. Epileptic: Male, 2. Paralyzed: Male, 2. Crippled: Male, 9; female, 2. All others: Male, 138; female, 76.

#### Improvements.

The Neurological Hospital is now completed. The beds and furniture are installed and the building can be formally opened at any time. The grounds around the hospital have been regraded and a new cinder walk constructed on the southerly side.

#### Needs.

The bathing facilities in the hospital wards and the two blind wards are inadequate. These buildings ought to be enlarged to afford accommodations for additional bath tubs and space. Additional dormitories are required for the inmates. Owing to the increasing number of inmates each year, I am obliged to use springs on the floors and verandas, especially during the winter months. Two new dormitories are required for the employees, one for the male and one for the female, as at present a number of the employees are obliged to sleep in one room, and a great many of these rooms are unsuitable for sleeping apartments. The male and female dining rooms for the inmates are too small, and the construction of a new dining room for males, between Ward "L" and the male barracks, is urgently needed. The female dining room to be erected south of the female barracks. A staff house for the doctors is urgently needed, in order that they may have a meeting room and better sleeping quarters. At present the doctors are sleeping in the male barracks. A one-story brick day room for women is needed, as at present the women have no place to sit other than the wards.

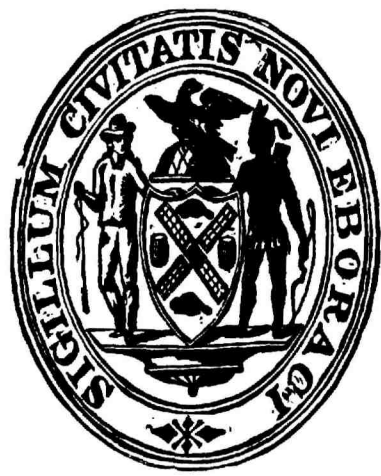

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.
