MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Municipal Civil Service Commission, New York, December 31, 1910.

To His Honor, the Mayor:

Sir-The Municipal Civil Service Commission of The City of New York herewith submits the report it is required by law to make of its transactions for the past year. The Commission notes with regret the death of Mr. Charles R. Miles, a clerk, who

had served the Commission faithfully since June 1, 1903. The number of applications filed for competitive examinations was 29,589, an increase of 1,468 over the number received during the year 1909, and the greatest number received in any year by the Commission. The number would probably have been much greater but for the fact that only such examinations were ordered as were Police Commissioner and Health Officer absolutely necessary for the needs of the various City Departments.

The volume of business of the Commission has steadily increased in proportion to the increase in the work of the various departments of the City government, and the Commission found difficulty in satisfying the needs of the service and keeping within its own appropriation. To accomplish this the work of the examining department has been carried on under pressure and without increase in the force of ex-

During the year 52,812 persons were notified for examination, an increase over 1909 of 27,574. The maximum number of applications received in any one day was 1,116, the largest number received in any one day for competitive examinations.

In the Labor Class there were 12,083 applications filed during the year, as against 17,440 during 1909. This falling off the Commission believes to be due to the fact that for all positions requiring skilled labor oral and practical tests are now given to all applicants, and they are no longer registered as heretofore upon the presentation of a certificate from former employers as to proficiency in the various trades.

Recent tests given for Pavers and Rammers not only proved the ability of the

candidates, but some of the corporation yards of the city were incidentally paved by them without cost to the city for the labor performed. In like manner the work horses belonging to the Department of Parks were shod under the direction of competent examiners, and the proficiency of the candidates for the position of Horseshoer

There were checked and certified during the year 18,382 payrolls for City employees, as compared with 17,219 during the year 1909. The number of individual names certified to was 1,267,790.

There were also recorded on the roster of employees changes in status to the number of 2,910, as follows: Resignations 867 | Retirements Dismissals 1,316 Reinstatements

The system of semi-monthly salary payments, recently inaugurated, will add materially to the work of the Commission in checking of payrolls and will require a substantial addition to its force.

The Promotion Bureau of the Commission, recently created and placed under the charge of Mr. Thomas C. Murray, Assistant Chief Examiner, has proven to be a success. An entirely new system for the keeping of efficiency records has been installed in nearly every Department of the City government, and the various departmental promotion boards have been instructed how to maintain the records by one of our examining force. In order that promotion examinations may demonstrate the real efficiency of candidates for advancement in their respective departments, it is important that these records be accurately and uniformly kept and that our promotion examinations be based on actual knowledge of the needs of such departments. To that end the Commission has recommended the employment of two investigators who P. J. SCULLY, City Clerk and Clerk of the Board of Aldermen. should devote part of their time to visiting departments and supervising efficiency

The Commission has also established a bureau of investigation of character and PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION—FIRST DISTRICT. of the statements as to previous employment and experience of candidates. Many such statements are unquestionably overdrawn, and in some cases mere fabrications, and it is important that some steps be taken to remedy this evil. If these erroneous statements were to be taken at their face value, it would be manifestly unfair to the truthful candidate where experience is a factor in an examination. It is also important that no persons be certified for appointment until their good character is shown and their statements as to previous employment verified.

A serious problem confronting the Commission is the handling of the everincreasing number of applicants for examinations. In 1890 the number of persons examined was 2,110, and the seating capacity of the examination room was 150. These figures were increased in the year 1900 to 8,831 applicants, of whom 2,501 failed to take the examinations, although preparations were made for the examination of the whole number of candidates. The Commission's examination room at that time accommodated about 250 persons at a sitting. The Commission is now able to accommodate about 600 persons, but during the present year fourteen examinations were ordered in which more than 600 candidates competed. For the examination for Senior Clerk 10,510 applications were filed and 3,712 persons actually competed. The Commission was obliged to spread the examination over several days and to hire outside rooms for examination purposes.

Examinations are conducted by the Commission from time to time to maintain lists of persons competent in point of character and ability for the many and various bus, and Broadway-Ainsterdam lines."—Commissioner Maltbie.—3.15 p. m.—Room positions under the City government, the variety of which can best be observed by a perusal of the printed schedules to be submitted. They include all grades of clerical Railway Company.—"Application for the approval of change of motive power on positions, engineers of construction of buildings, bridges and aqueducts; inspectors of iron and steel, masonry, carpentry and plumbing; physicians, interpreters, matrons and nurses; original and promotion examinations for the uniformed forces of the Police, Fire, Street Cleaning and Correction Departments.

Technical examinations for mechanics are conducted at the New York Trade School, the Pratt Institute, and by our own examiners in the shops of the Fire Department and the Department of Bridges. This system continues to meet with the approval of mechanics seeking appointment, and undoubtedly enables the several departments to procure the services of persons of ability in their respective trades. The Commission has sought to make these examinations practical in their character and to confine them to such matters as will fairly test the capacity and fitness of the candidates to discharge the duties of the service in which they seek to be appointed.

The Commission believes that the provisions of the Constitution and the laws governing/entrance to and advancement in the service are now respected and better understood by the public generally, and that their enforcement tends to the improvement of the service and to the establishment of higher standards of character and efficiency. 
