Banking Commission.

The quarterly meeting of the officers to designate city depositories, in accordance with section 196, chapter 466, Laws of 1901, was held on Wednesday, Aug. 1, 1917. Present—John Purroy Mitchel, Mayor; Milo R. Maltbie, Chamberlain, and Albert E. Hadlock, Deputy Comptroller.

The Chamberlain reported that the banks replied to his letter asking what rates of interest would be paid during the coming quarter, as follows:

Class A Deposits: Sixty-six banks offered to pay 3 per cent. or more; 15 to pay 2½ per cent., and 15 to pay 2 per cent.

Class B. Deposits: Four banks offered to pay 3 per cent.; 3 to pay 2½ per cent.; 53 to pay 2½ per cent., and 38 to pay 2 per cent.

The Chamberlain offered the following:

“Resolved, That the present City depositories be redesignated and that the following banks be designated as City depositories: Chemical National Bank, Mercantile Trust & Deposit Co., Scandinavian Trust Co. and the Citizens National Bank instead of the Citizens Central National Bank.” Unanimously adopted.

The Chamberlain offered the following:

“Resolved, That the minimum rate of interest on deposits be fixed at two (2) per cent.; that the Chamberlain be empowered, wherever he may do so in his best judgment, to enter into contract for such higher rate of interest as may be obtained.”

Unanimously adopted.

Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

A regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held on Tuesday, July 10, 1917, at 2 p. m.

Present—Dr. Bramman, the President, in the Chair; Messrs. Paulding, O'Keeffe, Farley, Stern and Robbins, Trustees, Excused, Mr. Sachs and Mr. Kingsbury, Commissioner of Public Charities.

Dr. O'Hanlon, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

During the past week the Department of Charities has been transferring bodies from a cemetery in Brooklyn for reinterment in a cemetery on Harts Island, exchanging the old coffins for new ones at the 29th st. pier. This has been done somewhat publicly, and much of the old material was left on the pier for several hours.

The dining rooms for employees at Bellevue is greatly overcrowded because of its physical layout and it is impossible to serve properly from 500 to 600 employees three meals daily; at an expenditure of approximately \$3,000 it would be possible to prepare the basement in I and K so that we would have much additional space and better facilities. While this would not be ideal, it would better meet the situation than their present quarters, pending completion of pavilions F and G. As there are no funds available for this purpose, it will be necessary to ask for an issue of corporate stock.

The office situation at Fordham Hospital has been improved since the last meeting by the employment of an expert Telephone Operator at a salary of \$50 per month. A modification of schedules will be necessary to provide for the salary, which probably we can meet for the remainder of the year from accruals, and provide for this position in the Budget for 1918. Your authorization is requested.

Incidental to the 4th of July there were treated at Gouverneur 11 cases, at Bellevue 5, and at Harlem 9, all for minor injuries, such as burns and lacerations, except two, one a gunshot wound at Gouverneur and one at Harlem. The case at

Gouverneur received his injuries from a stray bullet, was operated upon at the hospital, but died. At Harlem Hospital boy 14 years old was shot in the neck by a .22-calibre ball from a blank cartridge pistol. He was operated on the 6th of July and died last night.

Dr. Gregory, Director of the Psychopathic and Alcoholic Services, recommends the appointment of Dr. Jewett, Resident Alienist, at \$1,500 a year, and the temporary appointment of Drs. Miller and Meyer during the absence of Dr. Connely.

The daily average census at the various hospitals during the month of June was as follows: Bellevue, 1,439; Gouverneur, 193; Harlem, 308; Fordham, 244; Neponsit, 93.

On separate motion, duly seconded and carried in each instance, action was taken upon the report of the General Medical Superintendent, as follows:

Dr. O'Hanlon was instructed that if the changing of the old coffins to the new ones by the Department of Public Charities on the pier at E. 29th st. becomes too public he should bring this to the attention of the Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities.

A request was authorized to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for corporate stock in the sum of \$3,000 to prepare to basement of pavilions I and K to provide additional space for a dining room for employees.

The appointment of a Telephone Operator at Fordham Hospital and the modification of schedules to provide for the salary and to make provision in the departmental estimate for 1918 for this position were approved.

The appointment of Dr. Jewett as Resident Alienist at \$1,500 and the temporary appointments of Dr. Miller and Dr. Meyer during the absence of Dr. Connely were also approved, provided their credentials meet with the approval of the President.

COMMITTEE REPORTS.

The President presented a tabulation of bids received at Bellevue Hospital on July 9 for the layout of the grounds at Harlem Hospital as follows: Jennings & John, \$13,800; J. M. The question of appointing an architect for the construction of a new roof ward at Fordham Hospital was considered. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried to request the President to arrange for the appointment of R. F. Almirall as architect for this work.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, this matter was referred to the General Medical Superintendent with instructions to communicate with Miss Bamber, the Assistant Superintendent of Nurses, calling her attention to this condition.

On the recommendation of the Medical Board and the Conference Committee of Harlem Hospital, the following appointments were authorized: Irving J. Pinkus, as Assistant Surgeon to Out Patients, Children's Clinic; W. J. Murphy, as Assistant Physician to Out Patients, evening cardiac clinic.

The creation of the position of Assistant Neurologist and the appointment of Junius Hardin McHenry (on leave), was approved.

Reference was made to the departmental estimate for 1918. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this subject was referred to the Budget Committee, consisting of Mr. O'Keeffe and Mr. Sachs, for recommendation.

The great delay in obtaining funds for the construction of pavilions F and G, and the question of solving the kitchen problem at Bellevue was discussed. After consideration, it was moved, seconded and carried to authorize a request for corporate stock to build the kitchen section of F and G, the remaining portions to be erected as soon thereafter as funds become available, and to request the architect to furnish an estimate of the cost to construct this part of the building and tunnels to connect with A and B and L and M.

The question of appointing an architect for the construction of a new roof ward at Fordham Hospital was considered. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried to request the President to arrange for the appointment of R. F. Almirall as architect for this work.

COMMUNICATIONS.

A letter, dated July 3, was presented from the Bronx Board of Trade, inquiring why so few members of the visiting staff of Fordham Hospital are residents of The Bronx and asking that two Bronx men be appointed to the positions of Directors of the Medical and the Surgical Services. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried to inform the Bronx Board of Trade that the policy of the department in making appointments has been to obtain the best men available and that residence in any particular section has never been considered and never entered into the question of appointments, and that in compiling a list showing the residence of the men on the visiting, assistant visiting and adjunct assistant visiting staff, we find that of the twenty-one men appointed to the hospital ten are residents of The Bronx. It was also decided to ask the Bronx Board of Trade for its cooperation in obtaining physicians and surgeons in active practice in that community to accept positions in the Out Patient Department of Fordham Hospital with the prospect of promotion to superior positions.

The minutes of the Medical Board of Harlem Hospital for June 19 were presented. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the General Medical Superintendent was instructed to give his attention to the needs of the gynaecological service and to include in the departmental estimate for 1918 the place of Technician on the pathological side of the laboratory, as well as providing places for full-time social service nurses in the admitting office and in the cardiac clinic. The plan of organization for improving the service in the Out Patient Department and co-ordinating this work with the hospital and the plan for the pediatric service were approved. The request for leave of absence of Irving S. Haynes, Director of the Gynaecological Service, from June 20 to Sept. 15, the service during his absence to be covered by Dr. Cherry and Dr. Stein, was approved.

A letter dated July 3 from McKim, Mead & White was presented, together with an application from E. Rutzler Co. for final payment on their contract for the heating and ventilating work in the new building for the Out Patient Department of Gouverneur Hospital. On the recommendation of the Building Committee and the architect, the work was accepted and final payment authorized.




