

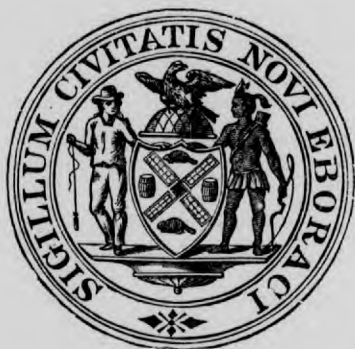

Commissioner Voorhis offered the following:

Whereas, It appears, by a communication on file in this Department, bearing date of August 22, 1887, signed by John McMackin, Chairman, and J. N. Bogert, Secretary of the United Labor Party, that under the provisions of the law creating a fifth Election Inspector, Commissioner John McClave was selected to appoint one Inspector of Election to represent said party or organization in the election next ensuing; and

Whereas, It also appears, by a communication on file in this Department, bearing date of September 7, 1887, and signed by Joseph H. Tooker, as Chairman, and Peter Murray, as Secretary of the General Committee of the Democratic organization of the City and County of New York (Irving Hall), that in pursuance of chapter 490 of the Laws of 1887, Commissioner John R. Voorhis has been and is designated to appoint an Inspector of Election in each Election District of the City and County of New York, to represent said party or organization at the election next ensuing; and

Whereas, In a communication on file in this Department, of date September 9th instant, signed by Messrs. William Penn Rogers, Ernest Bohm and others, it is set forth that the signers represent the Progressive Labor Party, wherein it is claimed that said Progressive Labor Party is entitled to the appointment of the fifth Inspector of Election in each Election District provided for in chapter 490 of the Laws of 1887, and protesting against the assignment or allotment of the aforesaid fifth Inspector to either the United Labor Party or the Irving Hall Party or organization, on the ground that neither of said parties are lawfully entitled to said appointment; therefore, be it

Resolved, That the foregoing communications, or copies thereof, together with any and all other papers received from either of said parties or organizations relating to the subject in question, be transmitted by the Chief Clerk of this Department to the Counsel to the Corporation, with a request that he will, at his earliest convenience, advise this Board as to its powers and duties in regard to the aforesaid several claims for the appointment of a fifth or additional Inspector or Inspectors of Election in each Election District in this City and County.

Lost—Commissioners Porter and Voorhis voting aye; Commissioners French and McClave voting no.

Commissioner McClave offered the following:

Whereas, The United Labor Party, a political party or organization, organized and acting as such in the City and County of New York, as well as elsewhere, did at the municipal election of 1886, held in the said city, being the municipal election next preceding the date hereof and next preceding the appointment of Inspectors of Election for the City and County of New York, in 1887, cast as many as, and upwards of, fifty thousand votes for its candidate for Mayor, being the head of its ticket; and

Whereas, The Board of Police of the City of New York has determined that the said party or organization is not entitled to the appointment of, at least, one or any of the four Inspectors in each election district, provided in section 1850 of chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, and for whom provision was therein made before the said act was amended by chapter 490 of the Laws of 1887, and two of whom it is therein provided on State issues shall be of different political faith and opinions from their associates; and

Whereas, I, the undersigned, a Police Commissioner of the City of New York, and a member of the said Board of Police, have been designated by the Chairman and Secretary of the organization of the said United Labor Party in the City of New York, for the purpose of the appointment herein-after made;

Now, therefore, pursuant to the provisions of said section 1850 of the said act, amended as aforesaid, I do hereby appoint and certify that there are appointed by me to be the further and additional Inspectors of election of the political faith or opinion of the said United Labor Party, one in each election district of the City of New York, the persons named in the schedule hereto annexed for the respective districts as therein named.

A communication from P. Curley, Dock Master, in reference to the complaint of G. H. Shaffer, President of the Wholesale Oyster Dealers and Planters' Association, respecting the obstructing of bulkhead between Christopher and West Eleventh streets, North river, was referred to Executive Session.

A petition from residents of West Farms, Westchester and vicinity, requesting the Board to grant Henry Gugisberg permission to erect and maintain a temporary and movable foot-bridge at Cross street, West Farms, was,

On motion, laid on the table and the Secretary directed to request said petitioners and the parties who protested against the erection of said bridge to appear before the Board on Thursday, 15th instant, at 3 o'clock P. M.

The following communications were received, read and,

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, action being taken where necessary, as stated, to wit:

From Hon. Abram S. Hewitt, Mayor—Respecting the observance of Monday, September 5th instant, as a holiday.

From Civil Service Supervisory and Examining Boards—In relation to the appointment of an Assistant Engineer, the examination of certain Laborers for promotion to Watchmen, etc. The action of Commissioner Marshall in replying thereto was approved.

1st. Approving sureties submitted by John Gillies to his contract for building Pier foot of West Thirty-seventh street, North river.

2d. Enclosing copy of preambles and resolutions adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, which were,

On motion, ordered to be spread in full on the minutes, as follows:

Whereas, The Board of the Department of Docks have transmitted to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund a map and plan for the improvement of the westerly side of the Harlem river, between the westerly side of the Eighth avenue at the southerly side of One Hundred and Fifty-ninth street and High Bridge, made and prepared pursuant to the provisions of section 712 of chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, as amended by chapter 517 of the Laws of 1884, which plan was approved, adopted and declared to be the sole plan determined upon by the Department of Docks for the section of territory embraced therein, under a resolution passed June 28, 1887, and have requested the approval of said plan by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund; and

Whereas, It appears that the exterior or bulkhead-line laid down upon said plan conforms to and coincides with that of the map and plan for "The improvement of the Harlem river and Spuyten Duyvil creek, from the North to the East river, through the Harlem Kills," made and adopted by the Commissioners of Appraisal appointed by the Supreme Court, upon the application of the United States, under chapter 147 of the Laws of 1876, approved July 9, 1876; and

Whereas, It is believed that said plan for the improvement of the water front of the Harlem river in said locality, by providing for docks or slips in the marsh land, is well adapted for commercial purposes and for promoting and securing the public interests;

Resolved, That, after due examination, the said plan for the improvement of the water-front of the Harlem river, between the westerly side of Eighth avenue at the southerly side of One Hundred and Fifty-ninth street and High Bridge, be and the same is hereby approved and adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund; the following certificate of approval to be written thereon and signed by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, to wit:

We, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of the City of New York, hereby certify that the annexed plan for improving the water-front of the City of New York, determined upon and transmitted to us by the Board of the Department of Docks of said city, was this day adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of said city, under and pursuant to the provisions of section 712 of chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, as amended by chapter 517 of the Laws of 1884.

That the territory or district covered and controlled by said plan is as follows, viz.: The westerly side of Harlem river, between the westerly side of Eighth avenue at the southerly side of One Hundred and Fifty-ninth street and High Bridge.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby consent to and approve of the action of the Department of Docks on the 25th day of August, 1887, changing the lines of Pier, old No. 37 (new No. 29), East river, at the foot of Market street, from the lines as determined by the Department of Docks, and adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, April 27, 1871, to lines as shown on the plans submitted by the Engineer-in-Chief and described as follows: The easterly line of the pier as hereby fixed and established, to be coincident with the line of the pier as shown upon plans adopted by the Department of Docks, April 13, 1871; the width of the pier to

be forty feet instead of one hundred feet, and the length of the pier on its centre line to be three hundred and eighty feet instead of three hundred and seventy-five feet.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund do hereby consent to and approve of the change in the lines of Pier, new No. 37, North river, near the foot of Charlton street, from the lines as determined by the Board of Docks and adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund April 27, 1871, to lines located as follows:

"The proposed southerly line of the pier to be 15.9 feet northerly of the southerly line of the pier as determined and adopted in 1871, the proposed northerly line of the pier to be 15.9 feet northerly of the northerly line of the pier as determined and adopted in 1871; the said 15.9 feet being measured at and along the bulkhead-line; the said proposed northerly and southerly lines to extend westerly from the bulkhead-line at an angle of 87° 30' therewith, the angle being measured on the northerly side of the lines; instead of at an angle of about 86° 30' similarly measured, as determined and adopted in 1871; the width of the pier to remain 80 feet, and its length to remain 588 feet as determined and adopted in 1871;" under and by authority of section 712 of chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, and as shown by the plans of the proposed change submitted by the Department of Docks.

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, and the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted to the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, owners and occupants of Pier "G," between Sixty-seventh and Sixty-eighth streets, North river, which said company has built upon land lying under water belonging to the City and leased to said company by this Department, to erect thereon, at their own cost and expense, a shed for the reception and delivery of freight received and discharged thereat by steam transportation, the said shed to be erected subject to sections 772 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882.

The work of erecting said shed to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, and in accordance with the amended plans submitted therefor, and which are hereby approved.

The said shed to revert to and become the property of the City of New York, free of any claim for cost or otherwise, whenever the pier upon which it is constructed shall revert to the City under the provisions of the lease thereof, and at the termination of said lease or of the renewal of same, by expiration or otherwise, provided that the said company shall, within ten days from the date hereof, assent, in writing, to the conditions of the resolutions aforesaid.

The said work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, provided that the said company shall within ten days from the date hereof assent in writing to the conditions of this resolution as aforesaid.

A communication from the Engineer-in-Chief respecting the building of Pier, new 29, in place of Pier, old 37, East river, and recommending that the Department of Street Cleaning be directed to remove dumping-board from said pier, was,

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, and the following resolution was unanimously adopted by the affirmative votes of Commissioners Stark, Matthews and Marshall:

Resolved, That the Engineer-in-Chief be and hereby is directed to proceed with the removal of Pier, old 37, East river, and with the construction of Pier, new 29, East river, at the foot of Market Slip, and a temporary approach thereto within the established lines for the same, and that all the work hereby ordered be performed otherwise than by contract, as required by section 714 of the Consolidation Act, and that it be done by the force of the Department by day's work, except so much of the labor and material as is now or may hereafter be contracted for, and that all the materials, tools and dredging necessary therefor, and not heretofore contracted for, or which may not hereafter be contracted for, be purchased by the Treasurer otherwise than by contract.

On motion, the President was authorized to notify the Department of Street Cleaning that this Department propose to build a new pier in place of Pier, old 37, near the foot of Market Slip, East river, and request Commissioner Coleman to call on the Commissioners in reference to a location for dumping-board now erected on said Pier, old 37, East river.

Commissioner Marshall, to whom was referred the communication from the Counsel to the Corporation, enclosing bill of \$113.45, received from Robinson, Scribner & Bright, for fees on searches in the matter of the sale of bulkhead property by the Old Dominion Steamship Company, recommended that said amount be paid.

On motion, the Chief Clerk was directed to include said claim in the next audit.

The report of the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 6839, in reference to the application of the Nassau Ferry Company for permission to erect an open shed at the foot of East Houston street, East river, was,

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, and the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted to the Nassau Ferry Company, lessees of ferry franchise and wharf property at Houston street, East river, to erect and maintain during the will of the Board, two frame sheds over the ferry bridge, open at both ends, fifty and fifty-six feet long, forty-one feet wide and twenty-four feet high, for the shelter of passengers carried by said ferry, and for the protection of property received and discharged thereat by steam transportation; the said sheds to be constructed subject to the regulations required by section 772 of "the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882," and in conformity with the requirements of the Building and Fire Laws of the City of New York, and in accordance with the plans and specifications submitted therefor, which are hereby approved. The said work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, provided that the said company shall, within ten days from the date hereof, assent, in writing, to the conditions of this resolution as aforesaid.

Commissioner Marshall, to whom was referred the application of the Glen Cove Manufacturing Company, for permission to erect a pier or platform near the foot of Jackson street, East river, submitted a report thereon containing certain recommendations, which were,

On motion, laid on the table, and the subject was again referred to Commissioner Marshall for further consideration.

The President offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, That the Engineer-in-Chief be and is hereby directed to furnish the Board, at his earliest convenience, a list with a description of all piers where any part of said piers is owned, or claimed to be owned by private parties, with the name and address of each claimant.

earth, sand or of stone. If of stone, no piece of stone shall be larger than sixteen inches in its largest dimensions, and provided that all the filling shall be done as directed by the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, and under his supervision.

BOARD OF ARMORY COMMISSIONERS.

MAYOR'S OFFICE, CITY HALL,

A meeting of the Armory Board was held this day, at 2 P. M., at the office of his Honor Mayor Hewitt.

Present—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, and the Commissioner of the Public Works Department.

No bids were received for the iron work of the Eighth Regiment Armory, and the Board decided to ask the bidders for the other branches of work on the building to let their bids remain in force till the iron work could be readvertised ten days, and the Secretary was instructed to so advertise it.

It was resolved to ask the opinion of the Corporation Counsel whether, under the law, this Board must supply each regiment of the National Guard of the State of New York in this city with an armory, and whether there is any lawful impediment to assigning more than one regiment to an armory.

The Secretary reported that a letter had been sent to the contractors of the Twelfth Regiment Armory in relation to the complaints to the Bureau of Repairs and Supplies.

A reply was read stating that the roof work had been done in accordance with the specifications and was put on in February, 1886, that it needed painting now, and further stated that they would repair the present leaks right away. Referred to the Commissioner of the Department of Public Works.

A communication was received from the Colonel of the Eighth Regiment asking for cleaning, calcimining, etc., of his armory. Which was also referred to the Commissioner of the Public Works Department.

4th. A penalty of five dollars (\$5) is hereby established, and will be imposed in each and every case where the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the use of water through hose, or in any other wasteful manner, are violated, and such penalties will be entered on the books of the Bureau against the respective buildings or property, and, if not collected, be returned in arrears in like manner as other charges for water.

5th. Charges for so-called extra water rents of every nature, imposed or incurred prior to June 9, 1887, will be canceled of record on the books of the Department.

NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will be allowed for any portion of one year.
