### REPORT

OF THE

## Department of Public Parks,

FOR THE

QUARTER ENDING DEC. 31, 1874.

Hon. WILLIAM H. WICKHAM,  
Mayor of the City of New York:

SIR—In pursuance of section 27, chapter 335, Laws of 1873, I have the honor to transmit to you the following brief summary of the transactions of this Department for the three months ending December 31, 1874:

Proposals were publicly opened for the following works:

1. Slating Museum of Natural History Building.
2. Concrete flagging on the Plaza, situate at Fifth avenue, Fifty-eighth and Fifty-ninth streets.
3. Granite, stone, and mason work of a fountain in Madison square, with the following results:

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Maps of Kingsbridge road were adopted, in accordance with chapter 655, Laws of 1874, and filed.

A map of the district of Manhattan Island north of Inwood street was adopted, and the streets are being monumented and the maps for filing prepared.

A map of street, now known as One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street, from Tenth avenue to Kingsbridge road, was adopted and duly filed.

The Counsel to the Corporation was directed to take all necessary legal proceedings to acquire title to and open the following avenue and streets, as the same are laid down on the map prepared and filed by the Commissioners appointed under chapter 841, Laws of 1868, wherever said avenue and streets have not been heretofore legally opened:

Willis avenue, from One Hundred and Forty-seventh street to Third avenue.

One Hundred and Forty-eighth street, from Third avenue to St. Ann's avenue.

One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, from Third avenue to the Southern Boulevard.

One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street, from Third avenue to Elton avenue.

The late Treasurer of the Southern Boulevard Commission forwarded to this Department sundry books, papers, and maps, relating to said Commission, with the information that the said "Commission leaves no indebtedness."

A map was adopted, fixing the location of the railroad tracks on that portion of Third avenue, between One Hundred and Fifty-ninth street and One Hundred and Sixty-second street.

Contracts were awarded to the following-named persons for the several works set opposite their names:

1. T. W. Rollins, for slating Museum Building.
5. H. A. Gunther, for concrete flagging on Plaza, Fifth avenue, Fifty-eighth and Fifty-ninth streets.

8. Thomas Parry, for mason work, etc., of fountain on Madison Square.

Short abstracts of advertisements for proposals inserted in the CITY RECORD, were ordered to be published in the following Corporation papers:

New York Times, New York Tribune, Staats Zeitung, Commercial Advertiser, and Evening Post.

Requisition was made on the Comptroller for \$100,000 for the construction of the building for the Museum of Natural History, and \$100,000 for the construction of the building for the Museum of Art.

A narrow strip of concrete flagging was laid on the sidewalk round the Circle at Fifty-ninth street and Eighth avenue, at the cost of \$1,000.

At the request of the property-owners, and on the advice of the Engineers of the Department, a map was adopted, making certain changes in College and Morris avenues, in the late town of Morrisania, so as to make through communication to the Harlem river.

Wm. H. Hoyt, clerk, resigned his position October 31, 1874.

Some sheep and old materials were sold by auction.

Skating-houses were erected on the usual sites in Central Park.

A urinal was erected on Five Points Park.

The services of Division Gardener Mareno Israel were dispensed with, on the 23d December, 1874.

On the request of the Trustees of the Metropolitan Museum of Art, the bronze bust of William Cullen Bryant was loaned to said Trustees until such time when the Department under its rules can assign it a position for it on the Central Park.

Frederick Lacy Underhill, lately one of the Assistant Engineers of this Department, was appointed Rodman in the place of Isaac C. Halstead, deceased.

J. W. Mould, Architect, was employed to prepare the drawings, etc., for the fountain to be located on the south end of the Mall, Central Park.

Proposals were publicly opened for repairing the Sea-wall at the Battery, with the following result:

The contract therefor, was awarded to A. J. Honell.

A map was adopted making certain changes in Central (Jerome) avenue to meet the north end of a proposed tunnel under Harlem river from the end of Seventh avenue.

The North American Neuchatel Rock Paving Company, which laid the pavement on Union Square Park, under a contract dated July 25, 1872, and agreed to keep the same in repair for five years, at the rate of ten cents per square foot per annum, including the original laying. Subsequently, the Company became embarrassed and were unable to keep the pavement in proper repair. After repeated negotiations the Department considered it beneficial for the public interest to accept the proposition of said Company, to wit: that it be paid the sum of \$7,000 (in addition to the sum \$4,000 already paid) on their delivering 50 tons of ground Neuchatel Rock in full of all claims and demands against the Department or the City. The City have thus secured the pavement and enough material to keep it in proper repair for \$11,000; whereas, had the terms of the original contract been carried out, the City would have paid at the end of five years, from 1872, the sum of \$24,725.85.

The Commissioners took suitable cognizance of the death of the late Mayor, Hon. Wm. F. Havemeyer, and recorded their testimony of the esteem in which he was held by them, in resolutions which were engrossed and forwarded to his family.

Gate-keeper Charles Boyle resigned his position from December 1, 1874.

Requisition was made on the Comptroller for \$150,000 for the improvement of the Parks, under the provisions of chapter 645, Laws of 1874.

Proposals were publicly opened for lighting etc., lamps on the parks, squares, etc., under the control of this Department, for the four months ending April 30, 1874, with the following results:

Four hundred lamps on the City Parks were repaired.

Four new wheels were placed under the draw of Third Avenue Bridge, and other repairs were ordered, at a cost not exceeding \$500.

The contract for lighting with gas, etc., for four months, commencing January 1, 1875, all the public lamps under the control of this Department, in the following public parks, etc., namely, Reservoir Park, Park Avenue Park, Plaza at Fifty-eighth and Fifty-ninth streets and Fifth avenue, entrance to Central Park at Fifth avenue and Fifty-ninth street, Circle at Fifty-ninth street and Broadway, and Transverse Road No. 1,—was awarded to the Metropolitan Gas-light Company, in accordance with the proposal (No. 1) of said Company.

The contract for lighting with gas, etc., all the public lamps under the control of this Department, for the four months commencing January 1, 1875, within that portion of the City of New York bounded as follows, namely, by a line commencing at the intersection of the centre line of Seventy-ninth street and the East; river running thence along the centre of said Seventy-ninth street and the southerly line of Transverse Road No. 2, to the Hudson river; thence along said Hudson river to Spuyten Duyvil creek; thence along said creek to the Harlem river; thence along said Harlem river and through the draws in the Central and Third Avenue bridges to the East river; and thence along the East river to the centre line of Seventy-ninth street, the place of beginning,—was awarded to the Harlem Gas-light Company, in accordance with the proposal (No. 2) of said Company.

The contract for lighting with gas, etc., all the

public lamps under the control of this Department, for the four months commencing January 1, 1875, within that portion of the City of New York south of a line commencing at the intersection of the centre line of Grand street with the East river; running thence through the centre of Grand street to Sullivan street; thence through the centre of Sullivan street to Canal street; and thence through the centre of Canal street to the Hudson river,—was awarded to the New York Gas-light Company, in accordance with the proposal (No. 4) of said Company heretofore received.

The contract for lighting with gas, etc., all the public lamps under the control of this Department, except those on the ornamental lamp-posts at the north end of Union square, for the four months commencing January 1, 1875, within that portion of the City of New York bounded as follows, namely, on the north by the central line of Thirty-fourth street; on the south by the line running from the East river through the centre line of Grand street to the centre line of Sullivan street; thence through the centre line of Sullivan street to the centre line of Canal street; and thence through the centre line of Canal street to the Hudson river; on the east by the East river; and on the west by the Hudson river,—was awarded to the Manhattan Gas-light Company, in accordance with the proposal (No. 5) of said company.

In compliance with the desire of the property-owners adjoining the public place at the intersection of the Boulevard, Ninth avenue, and Sixty-third street, the plan of said public place was amended by dispensing with the proposed urinal thereon.

It was directed that advertisements for proposals for supplying five hundred tons of coal be published.

A urinal was ordered for the Grand-street Park at a cost not exceeding \$1,000.

Mr. George Kemp, who presented to the Department the bronze statue of "The Falconer," stated that the said statue was ready for delivery; whereupon, a suitable site was designated for the same.

One case, complete, for the exhibition of the collections in the new building for the Museum of Natural History, was ordered at a cost not exceeding \$1,000.

## BOARD OF REVISION AND CORRECTION OF ASSESSMENTS.

At a meeting of the Board of Revision and Correction of Assessments, held at the Comptroller's Office in the New Court-house, Tuesday, March 9, 1875, at 2:05 o'clock P.M.

Present—Andrew H. Green, Comptroller; E. Delafield Smith, Counsel to the Corporation; John K. Hackett, Recorder.

The minutes of the meeting of February 5, 1875, were read and approved.

The Comptroller presented to the Board the following assessment lists, transmitted by the Board of Assessors with communication dated February 2, 1875, and received by the Chief Clerk of this Board February 6, 1875, viz:

1. One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, regulating and paving with stone-blocks, from Boulevard to Hudson river.
2. Twenty-fourth street, paving with stone-blocks, from Eleventh avenue to North river.
3. Fifty-second street, paving with Belgian or trap-block pavement, between Fourth and Fifth avenues.
4. Bank street, paving with stone-blocks, from West street to Thirteenth avenue.
5. Thirteenth avenue, paving with stone-blocks, from Twenty-third to Twenty-fourth street (half the block).
6. Thirty-first street, paving with Belgian pavement, between Fourth and Lexington avenues.
7. Eleventh street, paving with Belgian pavement, from 100 feet east of Avenue D to the East river.
8. Eightieth street, regulating and grading, setting curb and gutter, and flagging, from the Eighth avenue to the River Drive (except from Eighth to Ninth avenue).
9. Eleventh street, north side, setting curb and gutter, and flagging and re-flagging, from Avenue D to the East river; also east side of Avenue D, from Eleventh to Thirteenth street.
10. Third street, setting curb and gutter, and flagging, from Goerck street to East river.
11. Tenth avenue, flagging, from Fifty-second to Fifty-third street.
12. St. Mark's place, flagging, between Second avenue and No. 48.
13. Lexington avenue, sewer, between Sixty-seventh and Sixty-eighth streets.
14. Fifty-sixth street, sewer, between Sixth and Seventh avenues.
15. Lewis street, sewer, between Houston and Sixth streets.
16. Fifty-seventh street, fencing, between Fifth and Sixth avenues.
