Hon. WILLIAM H. WICKHAM, Mayor of the City of New York:

SIR-In pursuance of section 27, chapter 335, Laws of 1873, I have the honor to transmit to you the following brief summary of the transactions of this Department for the three months ending December 31, 1874:

Proposals were publicly opened for the following works:

A map of street, now known as One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street, from Tenth avenue to Kingsbridge road, was adopted and duly filed.

The Counsel to the Corporation was directed to take all necessary legal proceedings to acquire title to and open the following avenue and streets, as the same are laid down on the map prepared and filed by the Commissioners appointed under chapter 841, Laws of 1868, wherever said avenue and streets have not been heretofore legally opened:

Willis avenue, from One Hundred and Fortyseventh street to Third avenue.

One Hundred and Forty-eighth street, from Third avenue to St. Ann's avenue.

One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, from Third avenue to the Southern Boulevard. One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street, from Third

avenue to Elton avenue. The late Treasurer of the Southern Boulevard Commission forwarded to this Department sun-

dry books, papers, and maps, relating to said Commission, with the information that the said "Commission leaves no indebtedness." A map was adopted, fixing the location of the

railroad tracks on that portion of Third avenue, between One Hundred and Fifty-ninth street and One Hundred and Sixty-second street.

Requisition was made on the Comptroller for \$100,000 for the construction of the building for the Museum of Natural History, and \$100,000 for the construction of the building for the Museum

A narrow strip of concrete flagging was laid on the sidewalk round the Circle at Fifty-ninth street

and Eighth avenue, at the cost of \$1,000.

At the request of the property-owners, and on the advice of the Engineers of the Department, a map was adopted, making certain changes in College and Morris avenues, in the late town of Morrisania, so as to make through communication to the Harlem river.

Wm. H. Hoyt, clerk, resigned his position October 31, 1874.

Some sheep and old materials were sold by auction.

Skating-houses were erected on the usual sites in Central Park.

A urinal was erected on Five Points Park.

The services of Divison Gardener Mareno Israel were dispensed with, on the 23d December, 1874. On the request of the Trustees of the Metro-

politan Museum of Art, the bronze bust of William Cullen Bryant was loaned to said Trustees until such time when the Department under its rules can assign it a position for it on the Central Park.

Frederick Lacy Underhill, lately one of the Assistant Engineers of this Department, was appointed Rodman in the place of Isaac C. Halstead, deceased

J. W. Mould, Architect, was employed to prepare the drawings, etc., for the fountain to be located on the south end of the Mall, Central

A map was adopted making certain changes in Central (Jerome) avenue to meet the north end of a proposed tunnel under Harlem river from the end of Seventh avenue.

The North American Neuchatel Rock Paving Company, which laid the pavement on Union Square Park, under a contract dated July 25, 1872, and agreed to keep the same in repair for five years, at the rate of ten cents per square foot per annum, including the original laying. Subsequently, the Company became embarrassed and were unable to keep the pavement in proper repair. After repeated negotiations the Department considered it beneficial for the public interest to accept the proposition of said Company, to wit: that it be paid the sum of \$7,000 (in addition to the sum \$4,000 already paid) on their delivering 50 tons of ground Neuchatel Rock in full of all claims and demands against the Department or the City. The City have thus secured the pavement and enough material to keep it in proper repair for \$11,000; whereas, had the terms of the original contract been carried out, the City would have paid at the end of five years, from 1872, the sum of \$24,725.85.

The Commissioners took suitable cognizance of the death of the late Mayor, Hon. Wm. F. Havemeyer, and recorded their testimony of the esteem in which he was held by them, in resolutions which were engrossed and forwarded to his family.

## REVISION AND CORRECTION OF ASSESSMENTS.

At a meeting of the Board of Revision and Correction of Assessments, held at the Comptroller's Office in the New Court-house, Tuesday, March 9,

The minutes of the meeting of February 5, 1875, were read and approved.

The Comptroller presented to the Board the following assessment lists, transmitted by the Board of Assessors with communication dated February 2, 1875, and received by the Chief Clerk of this Board February 6, 1875, viz:

1. One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, regulating and paving with stone-blocks, from Boulevard to Hudson river.

2. Twenty-fourth street, paving with stone-blocks, from Eleventh avenue to North river.

3. Fifty-second street, paving with Belgian or trap-block pavement, between Fourth and Fifth avenues.

4. Bank street, paving with stone-blocks, from West street to Thirteenth avenue.

4. Bank street, paving with stone-blocks, from West street to Thirteenth avenue.
5. Thirteenth avenue, paving with stone-blocks, from Twenty-third to Twenty-fourth street (half

6. Thirty-first street, paving with Belgian pavement, between Fourth and Lexington avenues.
7. Eleventh street, paving with Belgian pavement, from 100 feet east of Avenue D to the East

8. Eightieth street, regulating and grading,

8. Eighteth street, regulating and grading, setting curb and gutter, and flagging, from the Eighth avenue to the River Drive (except from Eighth to Ninth avenue).

9. Fleventh street, north side, setting curb and gutter, and flagging and re-flagging, from Avenue D to the East river; also east side of Avenue D,

from Eleventh to Thirteenth street.

10. Third street, setting curb and gutter, and flagging, from Goerck street to East river.

11. Tenth avenue, flagging, from Fifty-second

to Fifty-third street.

12. St. Mark's place, flagging, between Second avenue and No. 48.

13. Lexington avenue, sewer, between Sixty-seventh and Sixty-eighth streets.
14. Fifty-sixth street, sewer, between Sixth and

Lewis street, sewer, between Houston and Sixth streets.

16. Fifty-seventh street, fencing, between Fifth and Sixth avenues.

The foregoing assessment lists being in proper form and no objections having been filed, on motion of the Comptroller they were severally confirmed, all the members of the Board voting

in the affirmative.

The assessment list for sewer in Fortieth street, The assessment list for sewer in Fortieth street, between First and Second avenues, received from the Board of Assessors with communication dated February 6, 1875, with objections to the same filed by Mr. Stephen J. O'Hare was also presented to the Board by the Comptroller. Mr. O'Hare appeared in regard to the objections filed by him. After consideration of the said objections, and a After consideration of the said objections, and a hearing of the communication of the Commissioner of Public Works, of February 2, 1875, transmitted by the Board of Assessors in regard to this matter, on motion of the Comptroller, it was ordered that the assessment list, with the objections received, be returned to the Board of Assessors, with the request that such list be transmitted to the Department of Public Works for re-examination and report as to the performance of the work.

March 4.—Alfred J. Murray, Superintendent of Construction, dismissed the service of the De-partment, to take effect from and after 4th

March 4.—From J. R. McPherson, President, etc., for lease of south side Pier No. 22, North river, and to have the same extended. Denied. Repairs Ordered, etc.

March 4.—Engineer-in-Chief directed to make requisition upon the Treasury to have "Munday's" friction drum applied to the ten ton derrick, at a cost not exceeding \$250, and cartage to the place of delivery.

Miscellaneous.

-Secretary authorized to attend sale to be held on 3d inst., of 125 feet of bulkhead property on the North river, north of Piers Nos. 34 and 36, and bid for the same to the extent of \$25,000, conditioned that the said bid shall not be binding upon the City unless the consent of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund shall hereafter be obtained.

March 4.-H. W. Mitchell, lessee of berth southside pier foot of Twenty-fourth street, North river, notified that in all cases where wharf property is assigned by the Department for special purposes for a shorter period than one year, the monthly rent therefor must be paid in advance.

March 4.- Commissioner Budd requested to confer with Commissioners of Pilots in reference to depositing dredged material.

March 4.—Dock Superintendent of the District directed to report as to pile drivers on water front between Thirty-fourth and Thirty-fifth streets, North river, and by whom owned.

March 4.—Commissioners of the Sinking Fund informed that information asked for by them in reference to cost of new piers, rents, etc., cov-ers a wide field, much of which was furnished on August 28th, last, and that it will require considerable time to furnish the information asked for, but that it will be transmitted as soon as possible, and calling their attention to the fact that in the meantime the Department is seriously embarrassed for want of money, and that a requisition was made by this Board on January 14th, last, and forwarded to the office of the Comptroller, but for reasons unknown to this Board no attention was paid to the same until 25th of February last.

March 4.—Request of Hoboken Land and Improvement Company, to have matter of rent for ferry premises, foot of Christopher street, reconsidered, denied and said Company requested to forward at once amount of rent due for said

March 4.—Draft of an act to be presented to the Legislature, prepared by Mr. James W. Gerard, at suggestion of Counsel to the Corporation, relative to reducing the width of South street, and length of piers, to the extent of about sixty feet, from that laid down under the new plans adopted, accepted, and action of Commissioner Wales in the premises approved.

#### ORDINANCES.

Ordinance Relating to Removing Snow, Ice, etc., from Sidewalks.

An Ordinance to amend Chapter 42 of the Revised Ordinances of 1866, entitled "Of Pawnbrokers, Dealers in Second-hand Articles, and Keepers of Junk Shops—Relating particularly to Pawnbrokers."

ARTICLE I. Ot Pawnbrokers and Loanbrokers, or Keepers of Loan Offices.

Section 1. The Mayor may from time to time grant licenses, under his hand and seal, to such persons as shall produce to him satisfactory evidence of their good character to exercise or carry on the business of a pawnbroker, or of a loan-broker or keeper of a loan office, and no person shall exercise or carry on the business of a pawnbroker, loanbroker, or keeper of a loan office without being duly licensed by the Mayor, under the penalty of fifty dollars for each day he or she shall so exercise or carry on said business without such license

Sec. 2. Every person receiving such licenses shall pay therefor the sum of fifty dollars for the

Sec. 3. Every person so licensed shall, at the time of receiving such license, enter, with two sufficient sureties, into a joint and several recognizance to the Mayor and Aldermen of the City of New York in the penalty of five hundred dollars, conditioned for the due observance of all such ordinances of the Common Council as may be passed or in force respecting pawnbrokers and loanbrokers, or keepers of loan offices, at any time during the con-tinuance of such license.

Sec. 4. Every pawnbroker and loanbroker, or keeper of a loan office, shall keep a book in which shall be fairly written, at the time of each loan, an accurate account and description of the goods, article, or thing pawned or pledged, the amount of money loaned thereon, the time of pledging the same, the rate of interest to be paid on such loan, and the name and residence of the person pawning or pledging the said goods,

person pawning or pledging the said goods, article, or thing.

Sec. 5. Every pawnbroker and loanbroker, or keeper of a loan office, shall, at the time of each loan, deliver to the person pawning or pledging any goods, article, or thing, a memorandum or note, signed by him or her, containing the substance of the entry required to be made in his or her book by the last preceding section; and no charge shall be made or received by any pawnbroker or loanbroker, or keeper of a loan office, for any such entry, memorandum, or note.

Sec. 6. The said book shall, at all reasonable times, be open to the inspection of the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, and Special Justices for preserving the peace of the City of New York, or any or either of them, or of any person who shall be duly authorized in writing for that purpose, by any or either of them, and who shall exhibit such written authority to such pawnbroker, loanbroker,

written authority to such pawnbroker, loanbroker, or keeper of a loan office.

Sec. 7. Every pawnbroker, loanbroker, or keeper of a loan office, who shall violate or neglect, or refuse to comply with any or either of the provisions of the fourth, fifth, or sixth sections of this chapter shall for every such offerse forfait and chapter, shall, for every such offense, forfeit and pay the sum of twenty-five dollars.

Sec. 8. No pawnbroker, loanbroker, or keeper of a loan office, shall ask, demand, or receive any greater rate of interest than twenty-five per cent. per annum upon any loan not exceeding the sum of twenty-five dollars, or than ten per cent. per annum upon any loan exceeding the sum of twenty five dollars, under the penalty of one hundred dollars for every such offense.

Sec. 9. No pawnbroker, loanbroker, or keeper of a loan office, shall sell any pawn or pledge until the same shall have remained one year in his or her possession; and all such sales shall be at public auction, and not otherwise, and shall be made or conducted by such auctioneer as shall be designated and approved of for that purpose by the Mayor of the City of New York. Sec. 10. Notice of every such sale shall be pub-lished for at least six days previous thereto, in one

or more of the daily newspapers printed in the City of New York; and such notice shall specify the time and place at which such sale is to take place, the name of the auctioneer by whom the same is to be conducted, and a description of the goods or articles to be sold.

Sec. 11. The surplus money, if any, arising from any such sale, after deducting the amount of the loan, the interest then due on the same, and the expenses of the advertisement and sale, shall be paid over by the pawnbroker, loanbroker, or keeper of a loan office, to the person who would be entitled to redeem the pledge in case no such

be entitled to redeem the pleage in case he such sale had taken place.

Sec. 12. No pawnbroker, loanbroker, or keeper of a loan office, shall make any loan on the separate or divided part or parts of any one article or thing, and which article or thing shall have been offered entire or collectively to him or her by way

of pawn or pledge.

Sec. 13. No pawnbroker, loanbroker, or keeper of a loan office, shall, under any pretense whatever, purchase or buy any second-hand furniture, metals, or clothes, or any other article or thing whatever, offered to him or her as a pawn or pledge.

Sec. 14. Every pawnbroker, loanbroker, or keeper of a loan office, who shall violate or neglect, or refuse to comply with any or either of the provisions of the eighth, ninth, tenth, eleventh, twelfth, and thirteenth sections of this chapter, shall, for every such offense, forfeit and pay the sum of one hundred dollars.

Section 15. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 16. This ordinance shall take effect im-

ORDINANCE Relating to Hackney Coaches or Carriages.

Rates and Prices of Fares.

AN ORDINANCE amending the Ordinances enti-tled "Ordinances for the Government of Hackney Coaches in the City of New York," passed October 7, 1874.

The Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York, in Common Council con-vened, do ordain as follows:

The Title Third of said Ordinances shall be amended so as to read as follows:

TITLE THIRD OF THE RATES AND PRICES OF FARES:

The prices or rates of fares to be taken by or

paid to the owners or drivers of hackney coaches or carriages, shall be as follows: 1st. For conveying a passenger any distance not exceeding one mile, fifty cents; for conveying

two passengers the same distance, seventy-five cents, or thirty-seven and a half cents each; and for every additional passenger, thirty-seven and a

2d. For conveying a passenger any distance exceeding a mile, and within two miles, seventy-five cents; and for every additional passenger, thirty-seven and a half cents.

3d. For the use of a hackney coach or carriage by the hour, with one or more passengers, with the privilege of going from place to place, and stopping as often as may be required, one dollar an hour.

4th. In all cases where the hiring of a hackney coach or carriage is not at the time thereof specified to be by the day or hour, it shall be deemed to be by the mile.

5th. For children between two and fourteen

years of age, half price is only to be charged; yand for children under two years of age, no charge is to be made.

6th. Whenever a hackney coach or carriage shall be detained, excepting as aforesaid, the owner or driver shall be allowed after the rate of eventy-five cents an hour.

ORDINANCE Relating to Hay and Straw. [To take effect March 7, 1875.]

AN ORDINANCE to amend Article II. of Chapter XXXVI. of the Revised Ordinances of 1866. The Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York, do ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. Article II. of Chapter XXXVI. of the Revised Ordinances of 1866, is hereby amended by adding thereto two additional sections, as follows:

SEC. 14. Hereafter it shall not be lawful for any person to sell, or offer for sale, within the corporate limits of the City of New York, any hay or straw by the bale, unless the exact gross and net weight shall be legibly and distinctly marked on every such bale of hay or straw, under a penalty of ten dollars for each bale of hay or straw so sold or offered for sale in contravention of the provisions of this ordinance.

SEC. 16. The Commissioners of Police are here-

by directed to cause the provisions of the ordi-nance hereby amended to be rigidly enforced. SEC. 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in-consistent or conflicting with the provisions of this

ordinance are hereby repealed.

SEC. 3. The ordinance shall take effect five months after the date of its adoption.
