The Committee of Finance and Audit reported their examination and audit of estimates con-tained in Vouchers Nos. 8892 to 8897, inclusive, amounting to \$52,046.95; and of bills contained in Vouchers Nos. 8898 to 8905, inclusive, amounting to \$1,215.98. To the Honorable the Committee on Construction :

GENTLEMEN—On November 16, 1892, I presented to you five bids for the construction of a bridge across Sawmill river, near Shaft 12; the bids then presented were \$975, \$1,028.75, \$1,141, \$1,180.50 and \$1,218 respectively; the Engineer's estimate being \$900. Owing to the lateness of the season, you postponed further consideration of the work until this year. I had some difficulty in obtaining bids, but I am now able to submit the following tenders:

## BOARD OF ARMORY COMMISSIONERS.

MAYOR'S OFFICE, CITY HALL, New York, July 19, 1893.

A meeting of the Armory Board was held this day at the office of the Mayor. Present—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the Com-missioner of Public Works, Brigadier-General Louis Fitzgerald and Colonel James Cavanagh. The minutes of the meeting held July 7, 1893, were read and approved. Notice was filed by the Superintendent of Buildings of a violation of the building law in the construction of the Seventy-first Regiment Armory "in that the roof of the southeast turret, which exceeds 60 degrees pitch, is not constructed of iron rafters and lathed with iron on the inside and plastered." plastered."

John R. Thomas, the Architect, and the Clerk of the Works being present, each made state-ments in relation to it, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments was requested to communicate with Superintendent Brady on the subject.

The President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments reported in relation to the change in the number, of windows in the Luntern Roof of the Seventy-first Regiment Armory, that the alteration does not change the cost of the work or lessen the light or efficiency of the windows, other than making them larger and more difficult to open and close, the subject was referred back to the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments with power.

In relation to the heighth of the east wall, complained of as being too low to allow proper flashings, and stated that an examination shows the necessity of at least nine inches additionals heighth and recommending it to be done, and presenting the following communication on the sub-ect from the Architect, recommending that it be raised one foot in heighth.

Hon. EDWARD P. BARKER, Secretary Board of Armory Commissioners, New York City : DEAR SIR—I recommend that the east wall of the drill-room of the Seventy-first Regiment Armory be raised one foot in height for a distance of about one hundred and seventy feet in the centre of its length. It is important and desirable that this be done. Mr. Gallagher agrees to furnish the material and perform the labor incident thereto for the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars (\$150), and this I consider a reasonable price.

In relation to the retaining-wall about platform and steps in the basement, reporting that no provision was made for it by the Architect, and stating the necessity of the work, and recommendng it be done.

The Board authorized that said work to the east wall to a height of one foot, and retaining-wall, as recommended by the Architect and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assess-ments, but deferred action as to charging to the Architect the cost of the work as well as other extra work found to be necessary. That the large doors of the drill-room on Thirty-fourth street side cannot slide as intended by the plans. The Architect was directed to report on the matter at the next meeting of the Board.

In relation to the cost-of-arms called for by the contract to be cut in granite, and opposing the recommendation of the Architect to substitute sand-stone for granite. It was decided to make no change in the specifications.

The Mayor offered a resolution that the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments be empowered by the Board to decide on difficulties and questions of construction arising during the vacation term when the Board could not readily convene, so that the work need not be delayed. Which was adopted.

On motion, adjourned.

General Fitzgerald reported that Mr. Dickel had consented to renew the lease of his building

General Fitzgerald reported that Mr. Dickel had consented to renew the lease of his building for an armory for \$5,000 per year, and offered the following : Resolved, That the Comptroller be authorized, with the concurrence of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, to renew, for a term of one year, the lease of the premises Nos. 134 and 136 West Fifty-sixth street, owned by Charles Dickel and now occupied as an armory by Troop "A," N. G., S. N. Y., for an annual rental of \$5,000, the other conditions of the lease unchanged. Which was adopted by the following vote : Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the Commis-sioner of Public Works, Brigadier-General Louis Fitzgerald and Col. James Cavanagh. On motion adjourned.

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

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The 1,096 deaths represent a death-rate of 30.20, against 25.28 for the previous week and 38.09 for the corresponding week of 1892.

for the corresponding week of 1892. Contagious and infectious diseases show a marked increase chiefly of measles, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever, typhus fever and small-pox being respect-tively 125, 216, 67, 21, 6 and 3, against 130, 173, 81, 11, 3 and 5 for the previous week, a total of 438 against 403. There was an increase of diphtheria in the First, Eleventh, Fifteenth, Seventeenth and Twenteth Wards, and a noticeable decrease in the Thirteenth, Eighteenth and Twenty-first Wards. The increase of measles was mainly in the Eighth, Tenth, Fourteenth, Seventeenth, Eighteenth and Twentieth Wards, while there was a considerable decrease in the Sevent, Eleventh and Twelfth Wards. There was a marked increase of scarlet fever in the Tenth Ward, the decrease being chiefly in the Eleventh, Twelfth, Nineteenth and Twenty-second Wards. Eleven of the 21 cases of typhoid fever were above Fortieth street, and 8 were below Fourteenth street. Five of the 6 cases of typhois fever were below Fourteenth street, and 2 of the 3 cases of small-pox were in the Sixth Ward. were in the Sixth Ward.
