

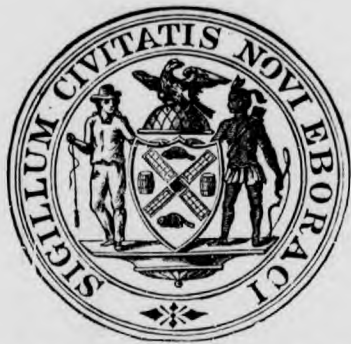

SIR—The Board of Police of the Police Department of the City of New York, pursuant to section 27 of chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873, respectfully submits the following report of the operations and transactions of the Police Department, for the three months ending September 30, 1876:
