

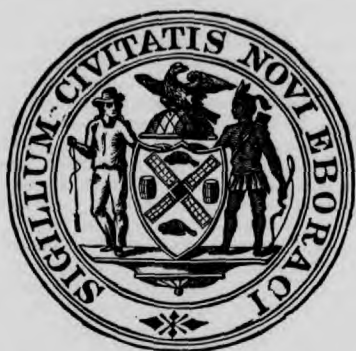

## BOARD OF LOCAL IMPROVEMENTS.

## FIRST DISTRICT, BOROUGH OF RICHMOND.

Meeting of the Local Board, First District, Borough of Richmond, held at the Borough Office, St. George, Borough of Richmond, February 21, 1899, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon.

The roll was called and the following members were present and answered to their names: Councilman Bodine, Councilman O'Grady, Alderman Vaughan and President Cromwell. The minutes of the meeting of February 7, 1899, were duly approved.

The matter of the construction and repair of sidewalks, curbs and gutters in front of premises situated as appears by the public notices for the meetings of February 14 and February 21, 1899, published respectively in the CITY RECORD on February 4, 1899, and February 11, 1899, was taken up for consideration, and, on motion of Councilman O'Grady, it was voted that the matter of enforcing the construction and repair of sidewalks, curbs and gutters in front of the premises described in said notices be laid over until the first day of June, 1899, and that if said sidewalks, curbs and gutters were not then in such a condition as the rules of the Department of Highways in The City of New York required, the matter of their construction and repair should be referred to the proper authorities.

On motion of Councilman Bodine, it was voted that the Secretary be instructed to request the Department of Highways to make investigation concerning the manner in which the electric light company had left the curb, gutter and sidewalk after erecting their poles in front of the premises of Archibald Fulton, situated on Richmond avenue, in the Third Ward of the borough.

On motion of Councilman O'Grady, Petition No. 31, for the reconveyance by the city to the National Prohibition Park Company of a part of College avenue, in the First Ward of the borough, was laid over, pending a report from the Commissioner of Highways on the subject.

The following resolution, offered by Councilman O'Grady, was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the Local Board of the First District, Borough of Richmond, The City of New York, hereby directs that a crosswalk be constructed across Jay street, in the First Ward of the borough, at such point near the end of the bridge leading from the ferry-house at St. George to said Jay street as to the Commissioner of Highways may seem most practicable; and be it further

Resolved, That this resolution be forwarded to the Board of Public Improvements for its approval.

The following resolution was offered by Alderman Vaughan and unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the Local Board, First District, Borough of Richmond, The City of New York, hereby recommends to the Board of Public Improvements that proceedings be initiated to grade that part of Occident avenue lying between Orient and Ward avenues, and to pave the same with macadam pavement to a width of about sixteen feet.

A letter from the Honorable Henry P. Morrison, Deputy Commissioner and Chief Engineer, dated February 11, 1899, written in response to a letter of the Secretary, dated February 7, 1899, and stating that the estimated cost of macadamizing Tyson street, in the First Ward of the borough, would be \$1,360, was received and ordered on file.

President Cromwell offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Local Board of the First District, Borough of Richmond, earnestly deprecates any action on the part of any branch of the City Government which will tend in any way to diminish the transportation facilities, already greatly inadequate, between the Borough of Richmond and other portions of the city; and be it further

Resolved, That it specially deprecates any action which will remove the terminals of the elevated railroads in the Borough of Manhattan from their present position of convenience and accessibility to the ferries connecting with the boroughs of Richmond and of Brooklyn; and be it further

Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be sent to both branches of the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York.

Councilman O'Grady objected to the passage of the resolution on the ground that as yet the members of the Municipal Assembly had received no official notice that the terminals above referred to were to be interfered with.

On motion of Councilman O'Grady, the proposed resolution was laid over.

On motion, the meeting adjourned.
