ORDER OF THE COMMISSIONER OF HEALTH AND MENTAL HYGIENE OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK TO MODIFY THE ORDER OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH REGARDING THE CLOSURE OF CERTAIN CHILD CARE PROGRAMS

WHEREAS, the New York City Board of Health (the "Board") issued an Order for the Closure of Certain Child Care Programs and Family Shelter Based Drop Off Child Supervision Programs (the "April 3, 2020 Order") on April 3, 2020; and

WHEREAS, there continues to be an urgent public health need in the City to slow the spread of COVID-19, and extraordinary measures have been implemented by both the State and the City to do so; and

WHEREAS, Executive Orders 202.4 and 202.11 issued by the New York State Governor Andrew Cuomo required a plan for child care for children of health care professionals and first responders who are critical to the COVID-19 response effort, and there is also a need to provide child care to children of other essential businesses or entities including government employees, food workers and pharmacy employees; and

WHEREAS, I find there is an urgent health need to modify the Board's April 3, 2020 Order so that child care programs provided by an employer for the benefit of health care professionals, first responders, government employees, food workers, pharmacy employees and other employees of essential businesses or entities is provided without interruption;

NOW THEREFORE I, Oxiris Barbot, M.D., Commissioner of the New York City Department of Health and Mental Hygiene, finding a public health emergency within the City of New York continues, and that it is necessary for the health and safety of the City and its residents, do hereby exercise the power of the Board of Health to prevent, mitigate, control and abate the current emergency, to amend the Board's April 3, 2020 Order that certain childcare programs and family shelter based drop off child supervision programs close and cease operations before Monday, April 6, 2020, so that:

1. Any child care program operated by or on behalf of an employer of health care professionals, first responders, government employees, food workers, pharmacy employees or other employees of essential businesses or entities as defined by the Governor or his designee, that is providing child care only to children under the care of those employees, is not subject to the April 3, 2020 Order and may continue to operate; and
2. I, in accordance with efforts to slow the spread of COVID-19 and further the protection of public health, may permit any child care program subject to the April 3, 2020 Order to remain open upon a determination that doing so would serve the interest of this Order and the April 3, 2020 Order.

This Order shall be effective immediately and remain in effect so long as the April 3, 2020 Order of the Board remains in effect, subject to the authority of the Board of Health to continue or rescind, alter, or modify this Order pursuant to section 3.01(d) of the New York City Health Code.

ORDER OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK REQUIRING ELECTRONIC REPORTING OF DEATHS

WHEREAS, on March 7, 2020 New York State Governor Andrew Cuomo declared a State disaster emergency for the entire State to address the threat that the novel coronavirus 2019 ("COVID-19") poses to the health and welfare of State residents and visitors, and such declaration remains in effect; and

WHEREAS, on March 12, 2020, Mayor Bill de Blasio declared a state of emergency in the City to address the threat posed by COVID-19 to the health and welfare of City residents, and such declaration remains in effect; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor directed all agency heads, including the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene (the "Department") and the Board of Health (the "Board"), to take all appropriate and necessary steps to preserve public safety and to render all required and available assistance to protect the security, well-being and health of the residents of the City, and such direction has been renewed in subsequent emergency executive orders and remains in effect; and

WHEREAS, the number of deaths in the City reported to the Department has increased dramatically in recent weeks, with reported deaths related to COVID-19 having increased to over 15,000 deaths by April 24, 2020; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to subdivision (d) of section 205.03 of the Health Code, hospitals, skilled nursing facilities and hospices that report 10 or more deaths to the Department per year, as well as the Office of the Chief Medical Examiner, are required to make such reports electronically, specifically by electronically preparing death certificates and confidential medical reports and filing such documents with the Department electronically; and

WHEREAS, the Health Code permits anyone reporting less than 10 deaths to the Department per year to use non-electronic reporting, but the submission and processing of such papers requires in-person staffing, and given the increased number of deaths as well as social distancing measures ordered in recent weeks, such non-electronic reporting of deaths is neither safe nor feasible; and

WHEREAS, on April 9, 2020, Mayor de Blasio issued Emergency Executive Order No. 106, suspending provisions of section 17-196 of the Administrative Code to the extent such provisions prohibit requiring the use of the electronic death registration system for the registration of deaths during a declared emergency and require regular training on the use of such system, and the Mayor further authorized the Board to require the electronic registration of all deaths occurring within the City; and

WHEREAS, on April 10, 2020 the Commissioner duly issued a Commissioner's Order Requiring Electronic Reporting of Deaths, pursuant to section 3.01 of the Health Code to effectuate the Mayor's Emergency Executive Order and require the electronic filing of all death certificates and confidential medical reports filed with Department;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that at its meeting on April 28, 2020, the Board of Health does hereby modify the Commissioner's Order Requiring Electronic Reporting of Deaths of April 10, 2020 and amend the Health Code as follows:

1. Subdivision (d) of section 205.03 is modified to require that all persons required to report any deaths to the Department are required to electronically prepare death certificates and confidential medical reports and to file such documents with the Department electronically; and
2. Subdivision (e) of section 205.03 is suspended to the extent such subdivision requires facilities, organizations and individuals reporting deaths electronically to apply for and obtain approval from the Department prior to implementing an electronic reporting system, provided that any such facility, organization or individuals shall electronically prepare and file with the Department death certificates and confidential medical reports in the manner and form directed by the Department and shall comply with any procedures and training requirements related to such preparation and filing imposed by the Department.

This Order shall be effective immediately and remain in effect so long as Section 6 of Mayor de Blasio's Emergency Executive Order No. 106 remains in effect, including any extension thereof, or such earlier time as the Commissioner may indicate pursuant to promoting social distancing policies as well as the timely filing and reporting of death certificates and confidential medical reports of death.

ORDER OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK REGARDING FUNERAL DIRECTOR SERVICES

WHEREAS, on March 7, 2020 New York State Governor Andrew Cuomo declared a State disaster emergency for the entire State of New York to address the threat that the novel coronavirus 2019 ("COVID-19") poses to the health and welfare of New York residents and visitors, and such declaration remains in effect; and

WHEREAS, on March 12, 2020, Mayor Bill de Blasio declared a state of emergency in the City of New York (the "City") to address the threat posed by COVID-19 to the health and welfare of City residents, and such declaration remains in effect; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor directed all agency heads, including the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene (the "Department") and the Board of Health (the "Board"), to take all appropriate and necessary steps to preserve public safety and to render all required and available assistance to protect the security, well-being and health of the residents of the City, and such direction has been renewed in subsequent emergency executive orders and remains in effect; and

WHEREAS, the number of deaths in the City reported to the Department has increased dramatically in recent weeks, with reported deaths related to COVID-19 having increased from over 2000 deaths by March 31, 2020 to over 15,000 such deaths by April 24, 2020; and

WHEREAS, on April 9, 2020, Governor Cuomo issued Executive Order 202.15 which temporarily suspended or modified certain provisions of the State Public Health Law, the Not for Profit Corporation Law, and the New York Codes, Rules and Regulations to allow the New York State Department of Health (the "NYSDOH") to approve out of state funeral directors and unregistered but licensed funeral directors to act under the supervision of a licensed and registered funeral director, and to allow funeral directors or undertakers to authorize persons deputized by NYSDOH to be agents authorized to perform certain tasks required of a funeral director; and

WHEREAS, on April 14, 2020, the NYSDOH Bureau of Funeral Directing issued a guidance letter to funeral directors approving out of state funeral directors, unregistered but licensed funeral directors, and certain deputized agents of a funeral directors to associate with a duly licensed and registered supervising funeral director pursuant to the Governor's Executive Order 202.15; and

WHEREAS, Articles 205 and 207 of the Health Code require funeral directors to perform certain acts, including filing reports of deaths and removing remains from the place of death or other location for final disposition; and

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED at its meeting on April 28, 2020, the Board of Health does hereby amend the New York City Health Code to suspend and modify any provision of Article 205 and Article 207 that may be inconsistent with allowing an out of state funeral director, an unregistered (passive and inactive) but licensed funeral director, or a deputized agent of a funeral director as described in guidance issued by the NYSDOH Bureau of Funeral Directing to act in accordance with Governor Cuomo's Executive Order 202.15 and any subsequent amendment or extension thereof, provided that such person registers with the Department as required by Article 205.

This Order shall be effective immediately and remain in effect until the end of the public health emergency or such earlier time as the Commissioner may indicate, in accordance with any extension and expiration of Governor Cuomo's Executive Order 202.15, and pursuant to promoting the timely removal and final disposition of human remains in the City.

2. SUBJECT: Extended Painted Sidewalk

- In Section 4-01, add a new definition for "extended painted sidewalk" as a closed area marked by a double solid line or bound by a double solid line and the curb that is only intended to provide additional sidewalk, median, or refuge space for pedestrians.
- In Section 4-04, clarify that "extended painted sidewalk" must be treated as sidewalk for the purposes of traffic operations and not as the "roadway", i.e. pedestrians have the right of way to enter and stand in them at all times, etc., and provide any special rules or restrictions as to activities conducted there within.
- In Section 4-07, clarify that no vehicle is to cross a double solid line (double solid already defined in MUTCD 3B.04.30, but ambiguously defined as a lane line, i.e. between travel lanes, not explicitly at the edge of the roadway).
- In Section 4-08(e), clarify that no vehicle shall be parked/standing/stopping in an "extended painted sidewalk", since they are considered sidewalk.
B. Reason: To provide a clear definition of term "extended painted sidewalk" and to define the prohibited activities within them.
C. Objectives: To prevent any operation of a vehicle, including parking, standing, and stopping, in areas marked by a double solid line or bound by a double solid line and the curb or edge of traveled way that is intended to provide additional sidewalk, median, or refuge space and to empower enforcement activities against such operations.
D. Legal basis: Section 2903(a) of the New York City Charter.
E. Other relevant laws: Federal Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices section 3B.04.30

6. SUBJECT: Cyclists Allowed to Follow Pedestrian Control Signals

- A. Anticipated contents: Amend Section 4-12(p) of the Traffic Rules allowing cyclists to follow pedestrian control signals when crossing an intersection, except where otherwise indicated by traffic control devices, and provided that the cyclist yields to pedestrians in the crosswalk.
- B. Reason: Formalizing existing behavior where cyclists are following pedestrian signals that provide a safe crossing ahead of turning drivers. In 2018, DOT conducted a seven-month pilot program to allow cyclists to follow the pedestrian signal at 50 designated intersections. The vast majority of the crashes occurring at these intersections during the study period were unrelated to the use of the pedestrian signal by cyclists. Based on the experience of this pilot program, allowing bicyclists to also benefit from head start provided by pedestrian signal will enhance safety for bicyclists and reduce stressful interactions at intersections without increasing the burden to any pedestrian.
- C. Objectives: To provide consistency between the NYC Administrative Code and the Traffic Rules.
- D. Legal basis: Section 2903(a) of the New York City Charter.
- E. Other relevant laws: Section 19-195.1 of the NYC Administrative Code (Local Law 154 of 2019).

7. SUBJECT: Vehicles to Stop for Pedestrians instead of Yield

- A. Anticipated contents: Amend Section 4-04(b) of the Traffic Rules to require operators of vehicles and bicyclists to stop for pedestrians in crosswalks when traffic controls are not in place or not in operation. The operators of vehicles and cyclists in any lane of travel will have to stop and remain stopped for pedestrians in crosswalks until the pedestrians cross the street.
- B. Reason: Yielding rates in New York City are low. Many pedestrian fatalities involve failure to yield. A rule change would strengthen pedestrian right of way at uncontrolled intersections, support Vision Zero, simplify enforcement, and

could lead to greater public awareness of the importance of giving priority to pedestrians in crosswalks.

- C. Objectives: To provide greater clarity and public awareness on pedestrian right of way.
- D. Legal basis: Section 2903(a) of the New York City Charter.

8. SUBJECT: Cyclists Allowed to Turn on Red Signal Indication

- A. Anticipated contents: Amend Section 4-12(p) of the Traffic Rules allowing cyclists to turn onto an intersecting street during a steady red traffic control indication, except where otherwise indicated by traffic control devices, and provided that the cyclist stops their bicycle first and yields to pedestrians in the crosswalk and, if merging into a travel lane, yields to oncoming traffic on the intersecting street. A cyclist may not turn across opposing lanes of traffic.
- B. Reason: Formalizing existing behavior and providing cyclists an opportunity to turn ahead of turning traffic allowing them to avoid the blind spot of turning vehicles and the "hook" type of crash, one of the most common threats to cyclists at intersections.
- C. Objectives: To allow safe cycling behaviors by allowing an action that makes cycling safer by moving cyclists away from turning vehicles.
- D. Legal basis: Section 2903(a) of the New York City Charter.
- E. Other relevant laws: NYS Vehicle and Traffic Law Section 1111.
- F. Types of individuals and entities likely to be affected: Cyclists and general public.
- G. Approximate schedule: Fourth Quarter of FY 2021.

9. SUBJECT: Cyclists Allowed to Proceed Through Red Signal Indication or Stop Sign at "Top of the T" Locations

- A. Anticipated contents: Amend Section 4-12(p) of the Traffic Rules allowing cyclists to proceed through red signal indication or Stop sign at "top of the T" locations, except where otherwise indicated by traffic control devices, and provided that the cyclist stops their bicycle first and yields to pedestrians in the crosswalk. A "top of the T" location is a location at an intersection that does not have an intersecting street.
- B. Reason: Formalizing existing behavior where there is no history of crashes. It allows cyclists to maintain momentum which saves energy and reduces trip time, making cycling more attractive.
- C. Objectives: To allow safe cycling behaviors by allowing an action that makes cycling more appealing and requiring less strength and energy.
- D. Legal basis: Section 2903(a) of the New York City Charter.
- E. Other relevant laws: None.
- F. Types of individuals and entities likely to be affected: Cyclists and general public.
- G. Approximate schedule: Fourth Quarter of FY 2021.

WHEREAS, on March 7, 2020, New York State Governor Andrew Cuomo declared a State disaster emergency for the entire State of New York to address the threat that COVID-19 poses to the health and welfare of New York residents and visitors; and

WHEREAS, Emergency Executive Order No. 98, issued March 12, 2020 and extended by Emergency Executive Order No. 106, issued April 9, 2020, contains a declaration of a state of emergency in the City of New York due to the threat posed by COVID-19 to the health and welfare of City residents, and such declaration remains in effect for a period not to exceed thirty (30) days or until rescinded, whichever occurs first; and

WHEREAS, this Order is given because of the propensity of the virus to spread person-to-person and also because the actions taken to prevent such spread have led to property loss and damage; and

WHEREAS, measures taken to combat the spread of COVID-19 may prevent individuals, businesses and other entities from meeting legally imposed deadlines for the filing of certain documents or for the completion of other required actions; and

WHEREAS, this Order is given in order to ensure that the Governor's orders are enforced; and

NOW, THEREFORE, pursuant to the powers vested in me by the laws of the State of New York and the City of New York, including but not limited to the New York Executive Law, the New York City Charter and the Administrative Code of the City of New York, and the common law authority to protect the public in the event of an emergency:

Section 1. I hereby direct that sections 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, and 7 of Emergency Executive Order No. 110, dated April 29, 2020, are extended for five (5) days.

§ 2. I hereby modify sections 5 and 6 of Emergency Executive Order No. 100 to authorize all hospitals and ambulatory surgery centers in New York City, including New York City Health and Hospitals Corporation, to resume performance of elective procedures in accordance with Governor Cuomo's Executive Order No. 202.25.

§ 3. I hereby modify section 3-703(1-b) of the New York City Administrative Code to extend the Campaign Finance Board's notification deadline for contributions exceeding the doing business limitation from four-business-days to eight-business-days and to extend the Campaign Finance Board's notification deadline for contributions exceeding the doing business limitation from twenty days to a sixty days.

§ 4. I hereby suspend section 3-710.5(ii)(a) of the New York City Administrative Code to the extent such section requires the Campaign Finance Board to schedule an adjudication or serve a petition within ninety (90) days of a candidate or principal committee's response to a notice of alleged violations and selection of adjudication process, provided the Board shall schedule such an adjudication or serve such a petition as soon as practicable following such a response.

§ 5. I hereby suspend section 1054(c) of the New York City Charter to the extent such section requires that the Voter Assistance Advisory Committee convene at least every other month, provided that such committee shall meet at reasonable intervals as practicable to further its duties and responsibilities.

§ 6. Section 1 of Emergency Executive Order No. 106 is amended to read as follows: I hereby direct that sections 1 and 2 of Emergency Executive Order No. 105, dated April 4, 2020, are extended for five (5) days. Further, I hereby order that the extension of section 2 of Emergency Executive Order No. 105 is retroactive to and deemed to have been in effect as of April 9, 2020. Nothing in this section shall affect the extension provided for by section one of this Order.

§ 7. This Order incorporates any and all relevant provisions of Governor Executive Order No. 202 and subsequent orders issued by the Governor of New York State to address the State of Emergency declared in that Order pursuant to his powers under section 29-a of the Executive Law.

§ 8. I hereby direct the Fire Department of the City of New York, the New York City Police Department, the Department of Buildings, the Sheriff, and other agencies as needed to immediately enforce the directives set forth in this Order in accordance with their lawful enforcement authorities, including but not limited to Administrative Code sections 15-227(a), 28-105.10.1, and 28-201.1, and section 107.6 of the New York City Fire Code. Violations of the directives set forth in this Order may be issued as if they were violations under the New York City Health Code, title 24 Rules of the City of New York sections 3.07 and 3.11, and may be enforced as such by the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene or any other agency named in this section.

§ 9. This Emergency Executive Order shall take effect immediately, and shall remain in effect for five (5) days unless it is terminated or modified at an earlier date.

READER'S GUIDE

The City Record (CR) is published each business day. The Procurement section of the City Record is comprised of notices of proposed New York City procurement actions, contract awards, and other procurement-related information. Notice of solicitations and other notices for most procurement methods valued at or above \$100,000 for goods, services, and construction must be published once in the City Record, among other requirements. Other procurement methods authorized by law, such as sole source procurements, require notice in the City Record for five consecutive editions. Unless otherwise specified, the agencies and offices listed are open for business Monday through Friday from 9:00 A.M. to 5:00 P.M., except on legal holidays.

NOTICE TO ALL NEW YORK CITY CONTRACTORS

The New York State Constitution ensures that all laborers, workers or mechanics employed by a contractor or subcontractor doing public work are to be paid the same wage rate that prevails in the trade where the public work is being done. Additionally, New York State Labor Law §§ 220 and 230 provide that a contractor or subcontractor doing public work in construction or building service must pay its employees no less than the prevailing wage. Section 6-109 (the Living Wage Law) of the New York City Administrative Code also provides for a "living wage", as well as prevailing wage, to be paid to workers employed by City contractors in certain occupations. The Comptroller of the City of New York is mandated to enforce prevailing wage. Contact the NYC Comptroller's Office at www.comptroller.nyc.gov, and click on Prevailing Wage Schedules to view rates.

CONSTRUCTION/CONSTRUCTION SERVICES OR CONSTRUCTION-RELATED SERVICES

The City of New York is committed to achieving excellence in the design and construction of its capital program, and building on the tradition of innovation in architecture and engineering that has contributed to the City's prestige as a global destination.

VENDOR ENROLLMENT APPLICATION

New York City procures approximately \$17 billion worth of goods, services, construction and construction-related services every year. The NYC Procurement Policy Board Rules require that agencies primarily solicit from established mailing lists called bidder/proposer lists. Registration for these lists is free of charge. To register for these lists, prospective suppliers should fill out and submit the NYC-FMS Vendor Enrollment application, which can be found online at www.nyc.gov/selltonyc. To request a paper copy of the application, or if you are uncertain whether you have already submitted an application, call the Vendor Enrollment Center at (212) 857-1680.

SELLING TO GOVERNMENT TRAINING WORKSHOP

New and experienced vendors are encouraged to register for a free training course on how to do business with New York City. "Selling to Government" workshops are conducted by the Department of Small Business Services at 110 William Street, New York, NY 10038. Sessions are convened on the second Tuesday of each month from 10:00 A.M. to 12:00 P.M. For more information, and to register, call (212) 618-8845 or visit www.nyc.gov/html/sbs/nycbiz and click on Summary of Services, followed by Selling to Government.

PRE-QUALIFIED LISTS

New York City procurement policy permits agencies to develop and solicit from pre-qualified lists of vendors, under prescribed circumstances. When an agency decides to develop a pre-qualified list, criteria for pre-qualification must be clearly explained in the solicitation and notice of the opportunity to pre-qualify for that solicitation must be published in at least five issues of the CR. Information and qualification questionnaires for inclusion on such lists may be obtained directly from the Agency Chief Contracting Officer at each agency (see Vendor Information Manual). A completed qualification questionnaire may be submitted to an Agency Chief Contracting Officer at any time, unless otherwise indicated, and action (approval or denial) shall be taken by the agency within 90 days from the date of submission. Any denial or revocation of pre-qualified status can be appealed to the Office of Administrative Trials and Hearings (OATH). Section 3-10 of the Procurement Policy Board Rules describes the criteria for the general use of pre-qualified lists. For information regarding specific pre-qualified lists, please visit www.nyc.gov/selltonyc.

NON-MAYORAL ENTITIES

The following agencies are not subject to Procurement Policy Board Rules and do not follow all of the above procedures: City University, Department of Education, Metropolitan Transportation Authority, Health & Hospitals Corporation, and the Housing Authority. Suppliers interested in applying for inclusion on bidders lists for Non-Mayoral entities should contact these

entities directly at the addresses given in the Vendor Information Manual.

PUBLIC ACCESS CENTER

The Public Access Center is available to suppliers and the public as a central source for supplier-related information through on-line computer access. The Center is located at 253 Broadway, 9th floor, in lower Manhattan, and is open Monday through Friday from 9:30 A.M. to 5:00 P.M., except on legal holidays. For more information, contact the Mayor's Office of Contract Services at (212) 341-0933 or visit www.nyc.gov/mocs.

ATTENTION: NEW YORK CITY MINORITY AND WOMEN-OWNED BUSINESS ENTERPRISES

Join the growing number of Minority and Women-Owned Business Enterprises (M/WBEs) that are competing for New York City's business. In order to become certified for the program, your company must substantiate that it: (1) is at least fifty-one percent (51%) owned, operated and controlled by a minority or woman and (2) is either located in New York City or has a significant tie to New York City's business community. To obtain a copy of the certification application and to learn more about this program, contact the Department of Small Business Services at (212) 513-6311 or visit www.nyc.gov/sbs and click on M/WBE Certification and Access.

PROMPT PAYMENT

It is the policy of the City of New York to pay its bills promptly. The Procurement Policy Board Rules generally require that the City pay its bills within 30 days after the receipt of a proper invoice. The City pays interest on all late invoices. However, there are certain types of payments that are not eligible for interest; these are listed in Section 4-06 of the Procurement Policy Board Rules. The Comptroller and OMB determine the interest rate on late payments twice a year: in January and in July.

HOW TO READ CR PROCUREMENT NOTICES

Procurement notices in the CR are arranged by alphabetically listed Agencies, and within Agency, by Division if any. The notices for each Agency (or Division) are further divided into three subsections: Solicitations, Awards; and Lists & Miscellaneous notices. Each of these subsections separately lists notices pertaining to Goods, Services, or Construction.

Notices of Public Hearings on Contract Awards appear at the end of the Procurement Section.

At the end of each Agency (or Division) listing is a paragraph giving the specific address to contact to secure, examine and/or to submit bid or proposal documents, forms, plans, specifications, and other information, as well as where bids will be publicly opened and read. This address should be used for the purpose specified unless a different one is given in the individual notice. In that event, the directions in the individual notice should be followed.
