Whereas, The Sanitary Superintendent has certified to this Board that the building situated upon the lot No. 346 W. 16th street, New York City, has become dangerous to life by reason of want of repair.

Ordered, That all persons in said building situated upon lot No. 342 W. 16th street, New York City, be required to vacate said building on or before the 23d day of January, 1874, at 12 o'clock M., for the reason that said building is dangerous to life by reason of want of repair; and further, that this order be affixed conspicuously on the front of said building, and be served as the law requires under the direction of the Sanitary Superintendent; and further, that said building be not again used as a human habitation without a written permit from this Board.

That Robert Danfield, Jr., be appointed a member of the Disinfecting Corps, with salary at the rate of \$900 per annum, and be assigned to duty by the Sanitary Superintendent in the new sanitary districts in the northern part of the city.

That a permit be granted to the New York Fertilizer Co., upon the execution of an undertaking approved by the attorney.

That the Register of Records be authorized to enter the record of marriages the certificate of Edward Gallagher and Rebecca Lewis, in compliance with the law.

That the attorney be directed to discontinue suit against Wm. Frothingham, M. D., for violation of the Sanitary Code.

That the Sanitary Superintendent be authorized to secure the necessary accommodations in Morrisania for stabling, and for the storage of disinfectants at an expense not to exceed \$500 per annum.

That the salary of George S. Hastings, acting assistant to the attorney, be fixed at \$4000 per annum from January, 1874, this increase being in consideration of his extra services as a referee in hearings under the first sub-division of section 14, chapter 74, Laws of 1866.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending Jan. 10, 1874:—

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,827, as follows: 3 public buildings; 796 tenement houses; 189 private dwellings; 118 other dwellings; 23 manufactories and workshops; 70 stores; 70 stores and warehouses; 83 stables; 54 slaughter houses; 2 lard rendering establishments; 2 gut cleaning establishments; 6 fat rendering establishments; 4 manure dumps; 3 breweries; 1 cemetery; 15 sunken and vacant lots; 52 yards, courts and areas; 85 cellars and basements, 39 waste pipes and drains; 85 privies and water closets; 62 streets gutters and sidewalks; 5 dangerous stairways; 14 other nuisances; 4 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports received thereon from the sanitary and assistant sanitary inspectors was 441.

During the past week 74 complaints have been received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 60 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 58 houses, 58 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, &c.

Four cases of small pox were removed to the hospital, and one dead body to the Morgue, by the Ambulance Corps.

vious week. The rate of mortality in London, the third week in December, was equal to a yearly death-rate of 38 per 1,000 inhabitants, and in the 21 chief cities and towns of Great Britain it was equal to 32 per 1,000; while in Paris and in Berlin it was at 24, and in Vienna at 21 per 1,000. The great fluctuations in the rate of mortality in some of the cities of England at this season have been experienced in our American cities this winter.

The amount of meat and fish condemned by the officers as unfit for human food, during the week ending Jan. 10, 1874, was: Sheep, 7 carcasses; hogs, 8 carcasses; veal, 2 carcasses; veal (bob), 33 carcasses; pigs, 16 carcasses; squirrels, 33; beef, 1644 pounds; veal (cut), 234 pounds; poultry, 833 pounds; pork, 5310 pounds, and fish, 11,450 pounds.

During the week ending Jan. 10, 1874, there were issued from this Bureau 490 burial permits for city deaths, 23 for bodies in transitu, and 36 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 490 deaths, 176 marriages, 489 births, 36 still-births, 23 applications for transit permits, and 32 returns from coroners. There were 26 searches of the registers of births, marriages and deaths, and 2 transcripts of birth record, 4 of marriage, and 25 of death, were issued from this Bureau; 1 case of death was referred to coroners.

The Superintendent begs leave to call the attention of the Board to the fact that the reporting cases of contagious diseases coming under their treatment is quite imperfectly performed by the medical practitioners of the city. The Board relies chiefly upon them for such information as will enable it to discharge its duty towards them and the public in this important direction; and while in the main they have co-operated with the Board in this respect, the number omitting such reports is unduly large. For example—during December, 1873, there were 319 deaths from contagious diseases reported to this bureau, of which number but 131 had been previously reported as being sick. There were therefore 188 unreported cases, of most of which we should have had no knowledge whatever but for their fatal termination, and the necessity of stating the cause of death upon the death-certificate. The whole number of contagious diseases reported for that month was 667, including the 319 fatal cases above mentioned. If we subtract the latter from the former we find that 348 cases were reported as sick. If this report embraced all cases of contagious diseases occurring in that month—this would show a fearful mortality indeed. It is not intended to convey the idea that physicians are at present unusually direct in this regard—the contrary is true, but it has incidentally come to the knowledge of the inspectors that there is still room for great improvement. The profession theoretically recognizes the usefulness of statistics in medical as in other matters, but to be valuable these should be accurate. Accuracy can only be attained by the cheerful co-operation of physicians, and when we consider at how little cost this might be given, it does not seem too much for the Board to expect.

Apart from statistics, however, private practitioners have seldom the time, the authority, nor always the inclinations to search for the causes of these diseases, or the attending circumstances in particular cases, and to employ broad preventive measures.

Neglect in reporting cases is sometimes excused on the plea of poverty, but if contagious diseases are so prevalent as to make the postage onerous, the Board ought certainly to know it. Sometimes patients are reluctant to be exposed to the slight publicity of having their name, address and disease entered in the book of the Board, the physician forgetting that his silence subjects him to a penalty. Oftener this neglect is due to forgetfulness, or to the absence of printed blanks, which are supposed to be indispensable. Blanks are always furnished when applied for, but we cannot be supposed to know the condition of each physician's supply.

When new blanks are printed I propose to back them with the section of the Sanitary Code referring to the subject, together with the amount of penalty which may be collected on its violation. I would most respectfully ask the Board to adopt such additional measures as in its judgment will secure a fuller record of those sick with contagious diseases.

SIR—There were 490 deaths reported in the week ending January 10, against 503 that actually occurred in the preceding week. There was a marked decrease in the fatality of diphtheria and scarlatina during the week. This, and the general decrease of the death-rate is a favorable indication.

The mean temperature of the week was 44.2 degrees Fahr., and the mercury fell to freezing point only two or three times. Nearly four inches depth (3.92) of rain fell during the week, and the mean barometrical pressure was at 29.879 inches. No disease except pneumonia exhibited any marked increase of fatality.

The death-rate was equal to 25.48 in the 1,000 yearly, in the last week, and to 26.15 in the pre-
