



Whereas, Under the provisions of the act of the Legislature, chapter 636 of the Laws of 1874, in section 1 of the said act, it has become the duty of this Department to assume the charge and control of the Small-pox Hospitals, and to designate the places to which persons sick with this disease shall be removed; and

Whereas, An appropriation for this purpose has now been made; and

Whereas, By the concurrence of the Board of Charities and Correction, pursuant to the requirements of the aforesaid act, the hospitals for the reception and treatment of cases of small-pox, now in use, are to be transferred to the care of this Department, upon the notice given, and this Board has been officially informed of the acquiescence of the Board of Charities and Correction in the action proposed to comply with the aforesaid laws.

Resolved, That the Board of Health, in pursuance of the provisions of sub-division 3 of section 1 of chapter 636 of the Laws of 1874, do hereby designate as proper places to which to remove and care for persons afflicted with the contagious disease known as small-pox, and as the places for the reception and treatment of persons so sick or removed, the Small-pox Hospitals heretofore in use, being the following-named premises, viz.: That portion of Bellevue Hospital, in the City of New York, now used for the temporary reception and detention of such persons, together with the stone building and the pavilions (quarantine and convalescent) on Blackwell's Island, used and known as the Small-pox Hospital.

Resolved, That a copy of the foregoing preamble and resolution be forwarded to the Commissioners of Charities and Correction, and that they be respectfully requested to transfer all of said premises, with the furniture and fixtures therein, to this Board, on the 20th day of January, 1875.

That leave of absence be and is hereby granted to Dr. John T. Nagle for three days, and Allott Lodge for four days.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending January 9, 1875. The number of inspections made by the Inspectors was 2,024, as follows, viz.:

8 public building, 1,131 tenement houses, 222 private dwellings, 122 other dwellings, 3 manufactorys and workshops, 3 stores and warehouses, 40 stables, 1 coal-yard, 59 slaughter-houses, 4 fat-rendering establishments, 2 gut-cleaning establishments, 3 manure dumps, 10 sunken and vacant lots, 40 yards, courts, and areas, 51 cellars and basements, 27 waste-pipes and drains, 113 privies and water-closets, 7 streets, gutters and sidewalks, 4 dangerous stairways, 1 cistern and cesspool, 6 dangerous and smoky chimneys, 15 other nuisances, together with 148 visits of the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received from Inspectors was 503.

During the past week 33 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Inspectors for investigation and report.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 151 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 124 houses, 124 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

57 cases of small-pox were removed to the hospital and 2 dead bodies to the Morgue by the Ambulance Corps.

19 permits were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of this port.

45 permits were granted to scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The following number of cases of contagious diseases was reported during the week ending January 9, 1875, viz.: Typhus fever, 1; lymphoid fever, 6; scarlet fever, 56; measles, 7; diphtheria, 141; small-pox, 109; and cerebro-spinal meningitis, —.

144 loads of night-soil were removed by the Night Scavengers from the privy-vaults of the City.

The following amount of meat and fish were condemned by the officers as unfit for human food during the week ending January 9, 1875: Cattle, 1 carcass; calves (bab), 14 carcasses; sheep, 4 carcasses; hogs, 3 carcasses; veal, 40 pounds; and fish, 8,325 pounds.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

During the week ending January 10, 1875, there were issued from this Bureau 632 burial permits for city deaths, 19 for bodies in transitu, and 48 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 632 deaths, 151 marriages, 499 births, 48 still-births, 19 applications for transit permits, and 63 returns from the Coroners. There were 22 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths; and 4 transcripts of birth record, 7 of marriage, and 15 of death were issued from this Bureau. 2 cases of death were referred to the Coroners.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, BUREAU OF VITAL STATISTICS, January 12, 1875.

To the Secretary of the Board of Health:

SIR—In the week that ended on Saturday the 9th inst., 632 deaths were reported in this city, but this is in excess of the actual number that died, for it is found that 186 of these reported deaths occurred during the last days of the previous week. The daily mortality began to increase on the 13th day of December last, with the beginning of particularly inclement and changeable temperature, and was specially excessive on the 18th, 25th, and 27th days of December, and the 2d day of January. The death-rate began to decrease at the beginning of the present week, notwithstanding the excessive cold.
