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# EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT.

Communication from the Mayor to the Comptroller.

EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT, CITY HALL, NEW YORK, June 30, 1875.

Hon. ANDREW H. GREEN,

Comptroller, etc. : SIR-This is now the last day of June, and the firemen are not yet paid the amounts of salary

due them on the 1st of the month for services during last May. The delay has been caused by an attempt to compel the Mayor to countersign a separate warrant for each of the individuals to be paid - and that contrary to the system which has been hitherto pursued since my term as Mayor commenced. As matters now are, under the methods pursued in the Finance Department, I am compelled to countersign an average of between three and four thousand warrants each month; this is in addition to a great number of licenses, certificates, bonds, transfers, etc. Nothing more in that line should be imposed upon the Mayor, except in a case of necessity.

My objections to signing an unnecessary number of warrants are based, as were the objections of Mayor Havemeyer and Mayor Vance, not upon considerations of the Mayor's personal convenience or inconvenience in the matter ; but upon the facts that the Mayor is distinctively the executive officer of the city; that it is no part of the functions of the office that he should become a mere drudge for any of the Departments; that he has quite as much as he can do well and properly to perform his duties as the executive officer; and that his usefulness is impaired by a slavish attention to matters of mere detail which should be regulated in the several Departments. Whatever the law requires or expects of me, that, of course, I shall do cheerfully; and, more, I shall always exert myself to contribute as much as possible, not only to the harmony and efficiency of the administration, but to the convenience and comfort of everybody who has a part in or dealings with the local government. I shall not, however, be a party to what I cannot but consider unreasonable exactions.

The Finance is but one of the numerous Departments of the city government requiring my atten-tion; and I am not willing to sacrifice the possibility of usefulness as Mayor to become a mere clerk of any of the Departmdnts.

It is true that the law provides that the Finance Department shall prescribe the manner in which salaries shall be drawn, and the mode by which they shall be paid. But it goes on to qualify and explain that general provision by specifically enacting with reference to the particular cases in which there are numbers of persons to be paid in companies, etc., that : "Wages and salaries, including payments for the Board of Education, may be paid upon pay-rolls, upon which each person named thereon shall separately receipt for the amount paid to such person, and in every case of payment upon a pay-roll, the warrant for the aggregate amount of wages and salaries included therein may be made payable to the superintendent, principle teacher, foreman, or other officer designated for the purpose." (Section 29, chapter 335, Laws of 1873, as amended by section 8, chapter 326, Laws of that year.)

I am advised that that general discretion, vested in the Finance Department by the general provision referred to, even if no limitations had been prescribed or distinctly suggested by the law, would not have conferred upon the Comptroller individually any right to exercise that discretion arbitrarily or unreasonably—but that such a discretion would, like the discretion allowed to courts and all public officers, be required to be exercised in all cases with sound judgment, not tyranically or oppressively, but with a reasonable regard for and deference to all the circumstances of each particular case. I am further advised, that the particular section of the law above quoted, is a distinct suggestion and limitation as to how the general discretion of the Finance Department is to be exercised with regard to payments to the members of the several companies of firemen.

The law provides for a single warrant for the aggregate amount of the pay-roll of each company. That warrant may be drawn payable either to the foreman of the company, or to any "other officer designated for the purpose." The law does not indicate who shall "designate" the officer for the purpose, though both my immediate predecessors and I have been quite willing that such designations as you have made to disburse the amounts of wages and salaries paid upon pay-rolls, should go unquestioned. And the discretion you have exercised in that matter has followed no rule as to persons.

For instance : In the case of the teachers you make, every month, the warrant to the principal teacher of each school for the aggregate amount due the teachers of that school. In the case of employees of the Department of Public Parks, you make every month a single warrant payable to a clerk of that Department (who is called the "Disbursing Clerk"), for the aggregate amount due the employees named on each of several pay-rolls. In the case of the laborers in the Department of Public Works, you make a warrant payable to an employee of the Finance Department (who is called the "Paymaster") for the aggregate amount of each pay-roll. In the Department of Public Charities and Correction, you make, every month, a warrant to the same "Paymaster" last referred to, for the t of each of the pay-rolls. It is the same with regard to certain pay-rolls in the Health Department, though for the employees of the Small-pox Hospital, you make, every month, a warrant payable to the President of the Health Department for the aggregate amount of that particular pay-roll. And so on throughout the several Departments. In the Fire Department, you made a warrant payable to the same "Paymaster" above mentioned, for the aggregate amount of the paytoll of each company, for the salaries due for each of the months of January, February, March, and April last ; and I am quite at a loss to perceive any sufficient reason for the attempt now made to make payment by a separate warrant to each individual fireman. And that attempt having been made to change the arrangement with regard to the Fire Department, what guarantee is there that the same attempt will not be next made to change the arrangement with regard to payment of the thousands of laborers employed upon the public works, or to the individual school teachers. I do not know any reason for separate warrants to the individual firemen which does not apply with equal force to the individual laborers and all other employees of the city. In a correspondence heretofore had between us, it was suggested that a difficulty, in payment of the amount due each company of firemen by means of a single warrant drawn to the "paymaster" the Finance Department, was found in the fact that that "paymaster" did not always find all the men at the engine house when he reached there, and that the men who thus chanced not to receive their pay when the others got theirs, were put to inconvenience in afterwards collecting their money.

But that difficulty is obviated by the consideration that the warrant may be payable, not to an officer of the Finance Department, who is busy with the performance of other duties than paying the firemen, but to an officer or employee of the Fire Department itself, whose duty it would be to dis-burse the moneys to the men at times when they could conveniently receive it, and with proper regard to the discipline and efficiency of the service.

There was recently addressed to me a letter purporting to come from the foremen and others of some of the Fire Companies, and whose signatures, written upon separate sheets of paper, were at-tached to it. The evidence is complete that, as I immediately suspected, that letter originated elsewhere than in the Fire Department, and that the signatures to it were obtained by a trick practised by persons who have been removed by me from office, for incompetent and corrupt administration-the men not fully understanding what they were signing. Indeed, many of them have both previously and since, expressed opinions and preferences other than those stated in that paper.

The only contribution by that letter made to the discussion is the theory that, as a fire alarm may be sounded at the very moment the men receive their money from the "paymaster," they, having no secure places in which to deposit the money, may, by putting it in their pockets at that moment, run the risk of losing it in the confusion of their work at the fire to which they are hurried away—and that, therefore, the men would rather receive individual warrants than money. But the futility of that reason thus put by somebody else into the mouths of the firemen is evident when it is recollected that few, if any, of those men keep bank accounts ; that, if they have individual warrants, they do not deposit them, but immediately proceed to the most accessible bank or merchant, and there draw the money, which goes into their pockets, and is as likely to be caught there by a fire, and so to be lost, at one time as at another.

The immediate object of this letter is to suggest to you, if you have the authority to do so, to designate an officer or employee of the Fire Department itself to be the payee of a warrant drawn upon each pay-roll, for each company of firemen-just as you designate a clerk of the Department of Public Parks to perform the duties of disbursing moneys to the employees of that Department. It is a matter of entire indifference to me who that person may be, though Commissioner Vincent C. King informs me that he is quite willing to act in that capacity. He is a merchant of standing and responsibility, and, if you desire it, will furnish a satisfactory bond for the faithful performance of the duty.

If you doubt your authority to make such a designation, perhaps the Fire Department itself has the power, under the law, to designate a proper person in the Department for the purpose. And, if neither you nor they can act, then I would remind you that the Charter, section 90, provides that the Common Council may, by ordinance, solve the difficulty, and, by section 17, may enforce obedience by ordaining penalties for each and every violation thereof."

I am quite ready to confer with you upon the subject at any time, and shall be gratified if you will promptly adopt some feasible method of relieving the firemen.

## Sanitary Bureau

Sanitary Bureau. The following is a record of the work performed by the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending June 26, 1875. The total number of inspections made by the Inspectors was 2,533, as follows : 1 public building, 1,365 tenement houses, 154 private dwellings, 129 other dwellings, 16 manufactories and workshops, 10 stores and ware-houses, 90 stables, 96 slaughter-houses, 7 fat-rendering establish-ments, 1 dyeing establishment, 8 public sewers and drains, 1 cemetery, 6 dumping grounds, 49 sunken and vacant lots, 101 yards, courts, and areas, 79 cellars and basements, 98 waste-pipes and drains, 164 privies and water-closets, 52 street gutters and sidewalks, 14 dangerous stairways, 1 dangerous and smokey chimney, 3 piggeries, 3 cisterns and cesspools, 14 other nuisances, together with 71 visits of the Inspectors to cases of contagious diseases. The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 822. During the past week 106 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the In-spectors for investigation and report. 95 permits were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port. 283 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

Preath Omeer of the Port. 283 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks. The Disinfecting Corps have visited 112 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 107 houses, together with clothing, bedding, etc. They have also dis-infected 2,894 privies and water-closets, 282 yards, courts, and areas, 163 cellars and basements, and 192¼ miles of street gutters. 68 cases of small-pox were removed to the hospital, and 3 dead bodies to the Morgue by the Ambulance Corps. The following number of cases of contagious diseases were reported during the week ending June 26, 1875: Typhoid fever, 9; scarlet fever, 28; measler 25; diphtheria, 65; small-pox, 113, and cerebro-spinal meningitis, 3. 18 tanks and 5,953 cans of night-soil were removed by the vight scavengers from the privy-vaults of the city during the week ending June 26, 1875. The following amount of meat and fish was condemned by the officers as unfit for human tood during the week ending June 26, 1875: cattle, 3 carcasses; veal, 2 carcasses; lambs, 2 carcasses; beef, 493 pounds; veal, 804 carcasses; mutton, 1,611 carcasses; poultry, 358 pounds; and fish, 11,525 pounds.

# Bureau of Vital Statistics.

During the week ending June 26, 1875, there were issued from this Bureau 522 burial permits for city deaths, 11 for bodies *in transitu*, and 40 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 522 deaths, 138 marriages, 417 births, 40 still-births, 11 applications for transit permits, and 74 returns from Coroners. There were 26 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 2 transcripts of birth-record, 2 of marriage, and 26 of death were issued from this Bureau. 2 cases of death was referred to Coroners.
