## COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a Meeting held at the Mayor's Office, at 1.30 o'clock P. M., on Wednesday, August 21, 1895.

Present—William L. Strong, Mayor; John W. Goff, Recorder; Richard A. Storrs, Deputy Comptroller; Anson G. McCook, Chamberlain, and William M. K. Olcott, Chairman, Committee on Finance, Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the meeting held on August 13, 1895, were read and approved.

The following communication was received from the Armory Board:

BOARD OF ARMORY COMMISSIONERS, NEW YORK, August 14, 1895.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—At a meeting of the Armory Board held this day the following was adopted: "Resolved, That the proposal of James R. F. Kelly & Co., Havemeyer Building, for completing the armory for Troop "A," on the easterly side of Madison avenue, extending from Ninety-fourth to Ninety-fifth street, amounting to eighteen thousand nine hundred and seventy-seven dollars (\$18,977), be accepted as being the lowest bid for said work, and that the same be submitted to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for their concurrence, and to the Comptroller for his approval of the sureties therein, and when so approved the Chairman of this Board be authorized to execute the contract on behalf of this Board."

Whereupon the Deputy Comptroller offered the following:

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of and concur in a resolution of the Armory Board, adopted August 14, 1895, accepting the proposals of James R. F. Kelly & Co. for completing the armory for Troop "A," on the easterly side of Madison avenue, extending from Ninety-fourth to Ninety-fifth street, amounting to eighteen thousand nine hundred and seventy-seven dollars (\$18,977).

Which was unanimously adopted.

The Deputy Comptroller reported orally on the application of the Fulton Market Fish Mongers' Association for permission to erect on iron awning over the platform in front of the market (Minutes, August 8, 1895, page ), and offered the following:

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby concur in and approve of the action of the Board of Docks in granting permission to the Fulton Market Fish Mongers' Association to erect a shed on the platform between Piers 22 and 23, East river.

The following communication was received from the Board of Police:

POLICE DEPARTMENT, NEW YORK, August 19, 1895.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—At a meeting of the Board of Police held this day it was, Resolved, That application be and is hereby respectfully made to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for permission to change the stabling accommodations for patrol wagon service at No. 161 East Seventieth street (Twenty-fifth Precinct), from the basement to the second floor, at same place, at an additional cost of ten dollars per month, the said basement being improperly ventilated.

Whereupon the Deputy Comptroller offered the following:

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of and concur in a resolution of the Board of Police, changing the stabling accommodations for patrol wagon service at No. 161 East Seventieth street (Twenty-fifth Precinct) from the basement to the second floor, at an additional cost of ten dollars (\$10) per month.

Which was unanimously adopted.

The following communication was received from the Commissioner of Street Cleaning for modification of lease of premises, No. 79 Rutgers Slip:

DEPARTMENT OF STREET CLEANING, NEW YORK, August 21, 1895. Hon. WILLIAM L. STRONG, Mayor, Chairman, Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

SIR—I respectfully request that the resolution adopted by the Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, June 12, 1895, giving this department permission to lease the top loft of premises No. 79 Rutgers Slip, be modified so that the same shall read for five years from May 1, 1895, instead of for five years from August 1, 1895. Respectfully,

Whereupon the Deputy Comptroller offered the following:

Resolved, That the resolution adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, June 12, 1895, in relation to the lease of the top loft of No. 79 Rutgers Slip, for the Street Cleaning Department, be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Resolved, That, in pursuance of the provisions of section 705 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, as amended by chapter 368 of the Laws of 1894, the Commissioner of Street Cleaning be and hereby is authorized to enter into a lease with Thomas Hitchcock of the top loft (fifth story) of the building on the north side of Rutgers Slip, on the river front, for the term of five years, from May 1, 1895, at a yearly rental of two hundred dollars (\$200); and the Counsel to the Corporation is requested to prepare the said lease and indorse it with his approval as to form. Which were unanimously adopted.

The Deputy Comptroller offered the following resolutions relative to lease of premises No. 303 East One Hundred and Tenth street for Department of Street Cleaning:

Resolved, That the resolution adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, June 12, 1895, in relation to lease of the first floor, cellar and yard of premises No. 303 East One Hundred and Tenth street, be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Resolved, That, in pursuance of the provisions of section 705 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, as amended by chapter 368 of the Laws of 1894, the Commissioner of Street Cleaning be and hereby is authorized to enter into a lease of the first floor, cellar and yard of the premises No. 303 East One Hundred and Tenth street, for the term of three years from April 15, 1895, at a yearly rental of three hundred dollars (\$300); and the Counsel to the Corporation is requested to prepare the said lease and indorse it with his approval as to form. Which were unanimously adopted.

At this time the Recorder appeared and thereafter participated in the proceedings.

The following communications were received from the District Attorney for additional accommodations for his office:

DISTRICT ATTORNEY'S OFFICE, August 13, 1895.

Hon. WILLIAM L. STRONG, Mayor:

DEAR SIR—The space devoted to the use of the District Attorney in the New Criminal Court Building is, and has been from the first occupation of the building, altogether inadequate. The privacy of persons officially connected with the office, and the proper custody of papers, is impossible in the present arrangement of rooms. The whole floor would not be more than enough to supply this office with complete accommodations. The executive officers of the Department of Street Cleaning have to-day removed from this building, and the space they occupied on the third floor, lying immediately adjacent to the office of the District Attorney, is now available. I very respectfully and earnestly urge you, as a member of the Sinking Fund Commission, to convene that body as soon as possible, and have these rooms officially designated for the use of the District Attorney. It will take until the first of September, using the utmost expedition, to fit them properly for use, and at that time all of our courts will be in session again, and the entire force of this office will have returned from summer vacations to duty.

I need scarcely say to you that, in the examination of witnesses prior to trial, and in the investigation of cases for presentation to the Grand Jury, it is necessary for the furtherance of public justice that privacy and secrecy should in most instances be observed, and this is impossible with two or three assistants crowded in one room, each having his respective visitors, and each unable to preserve from the hearing of others matters of the gravest public importance.

This matter is so vitally essential that I feel justified in thus urging it upon your attention. I suppose it is competent for you, as head of the Sinking Fund Commissioners, to designate these rooms for our use in advance of their meeting, if you should find it impossible to convene them speedily. In such case, we could go on at once with the work of fitting them for occupation.

Under the law passed this year, creating an additional Part of the Court of General Sessions, it is proposed to use the room now occupied by the Clerk as a court room, and it thus becomes necessary to provide quarters for the Clerk of the court. I understand that it is contemplated to use as a clerk's office the room on the first mezzanine floor, now occupied by the library. It will therefore be necessary to provide other quarters for the library. Provision has been made by a special statute passed this year for a library for the Court of General Sessions. Both the justices of that court and myself are of the opinion that a portion of the rooms vacated by the Street Cleaning Department can be used for that purpose; and under a designation made by you for the use by my office of the rooms above mentioned, I will reserve for the purposes of a library for the Court of General Sessions all room needed therefor.

DISTRICT ATTORNEY'S OFFICE, August 19, 1895.

Hon. WILLIAM L. STRONG, Mayor:

MY DEAR SIR—Aggrievedly to the suggestion contained in your valued favor of 16th instant I submit herewith a diagram indicating what changes I think could properly and profitably be made to secure accommodations for this office.

It is proposed to use the two large rooms in the southeast corner of the third floor for the purposes of the Court of General Sessions, more particularly to accommodate its library, and for any special detail with respect to any change or alteration in those rooms (if any is necessary), I would respectfully refer the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to the officials of that court.

I propose to turn over to the Court of General Sessions the library now belonging to this office, together with the book-cases in which the books are contained, which will be some considerable saving in the creation of a proper library for that court. The room now used by this office for a library, together with the anteroom adjoining, can be so cut up or partitioned as to give me three additional rooms for the use of my assistants.

I will take for myself and stenographers the two small rooms formerly occupied by the Street Cleaning Commissioner and his secretary, and use the room now occupied for my private office as the public entrance and reception room. One apparent objection to this plan is that there is no connection between the Street Cleaning Commissioner's old rooms and my present quarters, but this has no foundation in fact. When I first came in this office, I found in my room what appeared to be an imposing and substantial safe vault. I subsequently ascertained that this so-called safe vault was apparently without any protection, that it was nothing more than a passage between my room and the Street Cleaning Commissioner's rooms, and that it consisted of a flimsy wall of hollow brick, which had holes punched through it, and through which I could look from the so-called burglar-proof vault into the Street Cleaning Commissioner's rooms. Of course I could not and would not use any such hollow mockery for the safe-keeping of valuables. This safe is now used as an ordinary store-room; and by taking out its front doors and breaking through its hollow brick back, which is a simple and inexpensive job, my present rooms will be connected with the two rooms of the Street Cleaning Department.

Trusting the foregoing suggestions will meet with the approval of the Sinking Fund Commissioners. I remain, with great respect,

The following communication was received from the Clerk of the Court of General Sessions for an additional court-room, library, etc.:

COURT OF GENERAL SESSIONS OF THE PEACE, August 19, 1895.

Hon. WM. L. STRONG, Chairman of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

DEAR SIR—The experience of the past year demonstrates that the rooms set apart in the Criminal Court Building for the various Parts of the Court of General Sessions are entirely inadequate for the proper despatch of criminal business, and that further space is an absolute necessity. In addition to this, I beg to state that preparations must be immediately begun for establishing an additional Part (4) of the Court, in accordance with the provisions of the Act of the last Legislature, as well as for locating a court library also provided for by legislative action.

In order to have the new court-room, with necessary chamber adjoining and library in readiness by the first of January next, as provided by law, additional space must be assigned for the use of the Court of General Sessions as speedily as possible.

It must appear to your Honorable Body only reasonable that ample accommodation should be provided for the proper equipment of the Court of General Sessions in the edifice originally designed and erected as a court building.

I therefore respectfully request that the rooms in the Criminal Court Building, until recently occupied by the Street Cleaning Department, be designated and assigned by your Honorable Body for the sole use of the Court of General Sessions of the Peace of the City and County of New York.

Col. John R. Fellows, District Attorney, was heard in support of the applications.

Whereupon the Recorder offered the following:

Resolved, That the large room situated on the southwest corner of the third story of the Criminal Court Building, heretofore occupied by the Department of Street Cleaning, be and hereby is assigned for the use and occupancy of the Court of General Sessions for the Court Library.

Resolved, That the rooms in the centre of the south side of the third story of the Criminal Court Building, in the rear of the elevator, heretofore occupied by the Commissioner of Street Cleaning and his secretary, be and hereby are assigned for the use and occupancy of the District Attorney.

Which were unanimously adopted.

The following communication was received from Hon. William Travers Jerome, Justice of the Court of Special Sessions:

COURT OF SPECIAL SESSIONS, NEW YORK, August 16, 1895.

The Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of the City and County of New York:

GENTLEMEN—As Justice presiding at this term of the Court of Special Sessions I beg to submit the following requests to your Honorable Body on behalf of myself and associates:

First—The chambers provided for the Judges of this court consist of two small rooms. There is no water-closet, wash-basins or lockers. While the rooms are small they are adequate, but we request that the following changes be made in them, viz.: That in the west room a water-closet, urinal and wash-basin be placed and also five lockers for coats, hats, umbrellas, etc. This will add, at a slight expense, very much to the comfort and convenience of the Justices.

Second—While this Court handles many times the number of cases handled by the Court of General Sessions, the accommodation for its Clerk's office is not one-quarter of that provided for the Court of General Sessions Clerk. It is very necessary that our Clerk should have another room in addition to what has already been assigned to him. This is very necessary for the orderly and rapid transaction of the business of this court.

Third—In constructing this building no provision was made for a pen for prisoners for the Court of Special Sessions. A pen was provided for the use of the Police Court at the east side of the building, and that pen we are now using for our prisoners. In a short time that court-room will be occupied and that pen used for the City Magistrates' Court, and we shall have no place to put our prisoners. Under our court-room is a room used by the Burial Permit Bureau. This room is similar to the one under the City Magistrates' Court-room on the east side of the building which is used now by us as a pen and is designed for the use of the Court of the City Magistrate. The room under our court-room, at slight expense, can be turned into a pen for the use of this court and a stairway cut leading into our court. The Recorder, a member of your Honorable Body, can inform you of the location of this room and the imperative need that this court has for a pen for its prisoners. At present the public business is obstructed and much valuable time lost by the necessity of sending a distance of a block for every prisoner needed. We respectfully request, therefore, that the room now used for the Bureau for Burial Permits be appropriated for the use of a prison pen for this court, and that suitable changes be made in it to fit it for this purpose.

While our first two requests would conduce greatly, if granted, to our comfort and convenience, our third request is of such imperative importance that we must urge immediate action upon it by your Honorable Body.

In connection therewith, the Deputy Comptroller submitted a report of Engineer McLean of the Finance Department, in relation to the improvements asked for by the Court.

Whereupon the Recorder offered the following:

Resolved, That the application of the Justices of the Court of Special Sessions for lockers and conveniences for the Judges' Chambers be and hereby is approved.

Resolved, That the room on the southerly side of the basement floor of the Criminal Court Building, now occupied by the Health Department for the Burial Permits office, be and hereby is assigned to the Court of Special Sessions for a prisoners' pen for the said Court, provided suitable accommodations can be obtained elsewhere for the Permit Office.

Which were unanimously adopted.

The Recorder then offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the architect of the work on the New Criminal Court Building be and hereby is requested to furnish plans and estimates for the changes required for access to the newly assigned rooms and the library, and for the arrangement of partitions in the District Attorney's offices, and for the furniture required for these rooms, including the library and prisoners' pen; and also for the lockers and conveniences in the Judges' Chambers, Court of Special Sessions.

Which was unanimously adopted.

Commissioner Roosevelt submitted the following changes in the rules governing roller skating and the use of children's velocipedes in Central Park:

1st. That roller skating be permitted at the following places in Central Park, in addition to such other permission heretofore granted: On the Mall, from Marble Arch to Terrace Bridge. On the walk west of the East Drive and on the walk east of the Centre Drive, leading from Fifty-ninth street, and Fifth, Sixth, Seventh and Eighth avenues entrances, to the Mall. On the walk leading from Sixty-seventh street and Fifth avenue entrance to the Mall, under the Willowdel Arch. (These walks to be used only in going to the Mall.)

2d. That no permits be required for children's tricycles, velocipedes, etc., in Central Park; but no child, unless accompanied by an adult attendant, shall be permitted to bring into or ride on the walks of Central Park any tricycle or velocipede.

3d. That roller skating be prohibited on the Mall on Saturdays and Sundays after 1 P. M., from May until October.
