Honorable Board of Aldermen, City of New York, City Hall, New York:

Honored Sirs—Inclosed please find resolutions adopted by the Rapid Transit League at a meeting held in Kearney's Hall on Thursday, April 14.

These are sent to his Honor the Mayor, members of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and to the Railroad Committee of the Board of Aldermen, with a view to correcting an erroneous opinion which has gone abroad to the effect that the people are unanimously favoring the Port Chester Railroad.

The Port Chester Railroad, because of its being first in the field, did get the unanimous support of the people of The Bronx, but since another company (the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company) has made application to your Honorable Body for assent to construct in the Borough of The Bronx. Inquiry has been made, and a large proportion of the tax-payers doubt the good faith of the claims made by the Port Chester Company, and now support the New York, Westchester and Boston Rail-

way Company, as they believe it undoubtedly able to build, while its branch lines furnish better facilities.

Resolved, That we, the Rapid Transit League, do most urgently press upon the Board of Estimate and Apportionment the necessity of an early report to the Railroad Committee of the Board of Aldermen; and be it further

Resolved, That we petition the Railroad Committee to act with celerity and dispatch in the event of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment returning the application of the said Committee with compensation fixed; and be it further

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen, when its Railroad Committee shall have reported the matter of the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company, be and hereby is requested by unanimous vote of the Rapid Transit League to at once take such action as will afford immediate relief to the residents of The Bronx.

New York Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York City:

Gentlemen—Will you kindly advise us when the New York and Port Chester Company ordinance will be passed by your Board? The public feeling of this section is becoming more and more aroused on account of this delay, which they do not understand and about which no reasonable excuse has been offered by any member of your Board. The matter has been thoroughly gone over, and all of the details are known to every man, woman and child of Westchester County and The Bronx as well as to every member of your Board, and there can be no valid public reason for this delay, which is an injury to the public.

We are receiving a great many communications about this matter, and we trust that you will be able to give us a reason for the injury which is being done the public or that you will act upon the matter by passing it at once.

In connection herewith it may interest you to know that every public association and large property interest of this section have retained attorneys to advise them about the New York, Westchester and Boston Company, and that, without exception, all of the attorneys report that the alleged Westchester and Boston has long ceased to exist; that they could not use any permit which they might receive from the Board of Aldermen or build any road under any such permit, and that the only effect of the Aldermen granting them any permit will be to probably involve many of the property owners of this section in needless law suits and litigation.

New Rochelle Board of Trade,  
April 18, 1904.

To the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Gentlemen—The New Rochelle Board of Trade respectfully beg to be informed when your Honorable Board will pass the ordinance of the New York and Port Chester Railroad, now before your body.

We have appeared before your body at every hearing which has been held on this matter, and upon behalf of our taxpayers, citizens and workmen urged immediate favorable action on this ordinance. The delay to which this matter is being subjected by the New York Board of Aldermen is working irreparable injury to the public of Westchester County, and as representatives of a portion of that public we beg to inquire the reason therefor.

We are advised by competent counsel that the extinct Westchester and Boston Railroad cannot use any assent or grant which your Honorable Board might give to them, for the reason that they have long since ceased to exist and that no Legislature whatever can ever revive them. Counsel inform us that the only effect that any favorable action on the extinct Westchester and Boston Railroad will be to cloud property titles and to precipitate a large number of law suits against property, thus vastly injuring the public and taxpayers of this section as well as The Bronx.

We cannot see why you cannot now take up and pass the Port Chester ordinance. We do not perceive why there should be any hearing of further reference on the matter. Every man of the present Board of Aldermen knows all about it. A hearing will only again show the unanimity of the public of Westchester County and The Bronx for immediate action on the Port Chester ordinance.

To the President and Members of the New York Board of Aldermen, City Hall, N. Y.:

Dear Sirs—We note with great pleasure that Alderman Goodman, President Haffen and the remainder of The Bronx Aldermen have now begun a campaign for the purpose of securing action on the ordinance of the New York and Port Chester Railroad, which has so long been held up by the Aldermen, against the unanimous demand, pleading and interests of every citizen, laboring man, wage earner and taxpayer of the Borough of The Bronx.

As you are probably aware, Hon. W. W. Niles, one of the most eminent lawyers in New York City, was recently retained by the Taxpayers' Alliance, having a membership of 5,000 taxpayers, for the purpose of advising the Alliance as to whether the already



recognized defunct Westchester and Boston really had any legal rights left. Mr. Niles reported to the Taxpayers' Alliance that that affair had been and was now absolutely dead beyond the power of ever being revived by any legislation. Two of his conclusions are as follows:

"My conclusion, therefore, on this point is that the railroad company is left a mere corporation, divested of all its property and franchises constituting property, and so without ability to change the route or to locate a new one.

"The result of this conclusion is that the New York, Westchester and Boston Railroad is in no position to locate and build a railroad in the event that the consent for which they have applied to the Board of Aldermen should be granted.—W. W. Niles, counsel to the Taxpayers' Alliance."

The Bronx as well as Westchester County are practically unanimous in asking the immediate favorable action by the Board of Aldermen on the New York and Port Chester Railroad ordinance. The Bronx is now absolutely devoid of transportation facilities and the entire public, laborers and wage earners are being grievously injured by the delay to which the New York and Port Chester Railroad is being subjected. The entire public realize that it is only through the Port Chester Railroad that you will get rapid transit in The Bronx, and relief.

We ask you in the interest of the laborers, wage earners, taxpayers, citizens and public generally of The Bronx to kindly support President Haffen and Alderman Goodman and The Bronx Aldermen in the efforts which we understand they are now going to make and continue to make to secure favorable action on the Port Chester Railroad.

It is the unanimous hope and prayer of all of the wage earners, taxpayers and citizens of The Bronx that Messrs. Goodman and Haffen will continue this fight in the interests of the taxpayers and wage earners at every meeting of the Board of Aldermen until favorable action is secured on the ordinance of the Port Chester Railroad. Every Alderman and public man who will assist in this matter will win the undying gratitude of the entire Borough of The Bronx. We trust that you will help us through our friends, President Haffen, The Bronx Aldermen and Alderman Goodman, in this contest.

The public, wage earners and taxpayers of the Borough of The Bronx respectfully call the attention of the Board of Aldermen to the fact that a hearing on the Port Chester application is absolutely unnecessary, for the reason that two hearings have already been held, at both of which there was a unanimous request for immediate action on that matter. A hearing will simply be wasting the time of the public. It is an unnecessary delay, and we respectfully submit that justice and fair play to the wage earners and taxpayers demands immediate favorable action on the Port Chester application by sending it to the Board of Estimate or by passing it directly in the Board of Aldermen.

#### LEGAL OPINION OF HON. WM. W. NILES TO TAXPAYERS' ALLIANCE OF THE BRONX, ON THE DEFUNCT NEW YORK, WESTCHESTER AND BOSTON RAILROAD.

Hon. ADOLPH C. HOTTENROTH, President, Taxpayers' Alliance:

Dear Sir—In reply to your request for an opinion as to the legal status at the present time of the New York, Westchester and Boston Railroad Company and the New York and Port Chester Railroad Company, I would advise you as follows:

I assume the following facts:

First—As to the New York, Westchester and Boston Railroad Company.

That the company was incorporated in March, 1872.

That the articles of incorporation were defective in that they did not include the affidavit required in section 2 of the Railroad Law of 1850.

That in 1876 the company became insolvent and a receiver was appointed.

That in 1861 the receiver, acting under an order of the Court, sold all the rights, title and interest of the company to its roadbed, right of way and all real estate, tracks and fixtures, which rights, etc., were purchased at said sale by one Van Pelt, and which sale was afterwards confirmed by an order of the Supreme Court.

That Van Pelt subsequently conveyed whatever he purchased to a corporation known as the East River and Connecticut Railway Company.

That in 1903 the company applied to the Board of Aldermen for authority to cross certain streets in the Borough of The Bronx, and that this application is now pending before the Board of Aldermen.

Second—As to the New York and Port Chester Railroad Company.

That this company was incorporated on April 1, 1901.

That it has applied to the Board of Railroad Commissioners for a certificate of public convenience and necessity and received such certificate.

That the action of the Board of Railroad Commissioners has been reviewed by the courts, and has been finally approved by the Court of Appeals.

That it has received the consent of the Common Council of New Rochelle and of the Common Council of Mt. Vernon to cross the streets within the limits of these cities. By the order of the Supreme Court of Westchester County it has received authority to cross streets outside of the limits of cities within Westchester County.

That it has applied to the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York for leave to cross streets in the Borough of The Bronx, which application is still pending before that Board.

Assuming that these facts are true, the question arises as to what is the conclusion to be drawn from them.

As to the failure of the New York, Westchester and Boston Railroad Company to attach the proper affidavit to its application, the defect might be perhaps cured by application to the court, or, if the court is without power, by a simple enabling act of the Legislature.

The receiver's sale of the corporate rights and property, however, presents a much more serious question.

The order under which the sale was made provided that the receiver should sell all the rights of said company, and all the rights, title and interest of said company, legal or equitable, in and to the roadbed and right of way, and all its real estate, tracks and fixtures. It did not expressly specify its franchises. I understand that the Railroad Company attempts to make a distinction between the word "rights" and "franchises," and while admitting the sale of the former, claims that the latter did not pass by such sale. In my opinion, the distinction is a fine one, and cannot be maintained. If, however, such a distinction does exist, it is not conclusive of this question.

The judgment under which the receiver was appointed decreed that he be appointed receiver of the rights, estates, franchises, credits, and all the property of the said defendant of what nature or kind soever. These franchises undoubtedly passed to the receiver upon his appointment. Those here referred to are, of course, the franchises which constitute property and not the franchise to be a corporation, and the order, therefore, directing him to sell, and under which he did sell all the rights of the corporation included all the franchises of the corporation constituting the property rights.

Among the rights which passed by such receiver's sale were the rights springing from the statutory location of the company's route, and since the sale the company, therefore, has no route, and no change of its route could therefore be made, nor can it locate a new route under section 13 of the Railroad Law.

My conclusion, therefore, on this point is that the railroad company is left a mere corporation divested of all its property and franchises constituting property, and so without ability to change the route or to locate a new one.

The result of this conclusion is that the New York, Westchester and Boston Railroad is in no position to locate and build a railroad in the event that the consent for which they have applied to the Board of Aldermen should be granted.

As to the New York and Port Chester Railroad Company, from the assumed facts, it would appear that they have complied with all requirements of law, and are in a position to locate and construct a road as soon as the consent for which they have applied to the Board of Aldermen is granted.

Hon. CHARLES V. FORNES, President, Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—I would respectfully ask your Honorable Board to permit me to enter into a contract with the Van Dorn Iron Works Company, without public letting, to place on the remainder of the cells at the Workhouse, Blackwell's Island (163 cells), new locks with emergency lever opening device, at twenty-six dollars (\$26) per cell, a total cost of \$4,238.

In the event of fire, by this device, all the cells on a tier can be opened simultaneously. The present system is antiquated and requires each cell to be opened with a key separately, and in case of fire, great loss of life might occur. About four years ago I had the above-mentioned locking device placed on three (3) tiers and find it excellent. The inmates can be released instantly as though they were in one cell.

AN ORDINANCE providing for an issue of Corporate Stock in the sum of one hundred and twenty-seven thousand dollars (\$127,000) for the purpose of providing means for the acquisition of property, located on Madison street, between Clinton and Montgomery streets, Borough of Manhattan, for the uses and purposes of the Thirteenth District Municipal Court.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen approves of and concurs in the following resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment April 15, 1904, and authorizes the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount and for the purposes therein specified:

"Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York to an amount not exceeding one hundred and twenty-seven thousand dollars (\$127,000) for the purpose of providing means for the acquisition of property, located on Madison street, between Clinton and Montgomery streets, Borough of Manhattan, for the uses and purposes of the Thirteenth District Municipal Court, and that when authority therefor shall have been obtained from the Board of Aldermen the Comptroller is authorized to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York, in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to an amount not exceeding one hundred and twenty-seven thousand dollars (\$127,000), the proceeds whereof to be applied to the purposes aforesaid."

The proposed ordinance is modified and amended in the annexed substitute ordinance which is recommended for adoption in lieu thereof.

They therefore recommend that the said annexed substitute ordinance be adopted.

Resolved, That the following ordinance to provide for a new market in the Eighth Ward of Brooklyn be amended to conform with the objections made by his Honor the Mayor in his Veto No. 5 presented at the stated session of the Board on March 8, 1904.

## (ORIGINAL ORDINANCE.)

AN ORDINANCE authorizing and providing for the location of a public market place and for the establishment and maintenance of a public market in the Eighth Ward of the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, for the acquisition of lands for this purpose, and for the regulation and maintenance of the same.

Whereas, The requirements of the inhabitants of the southerly and westerly portion of the Borough of Brooklyn, comprising an area equal to one-third of the entire Borough, demand the location of a public market in that vicinity, there being no market south of the Wallabout Market, distant about four miles from said localities; and

Whereas, The means of transportation by vehicles and cars, both trolley and steam, throughout said localities concentrate at or near the Thirty-ninth Street Ferry, in said borough; and

Whereas, The establishment of a public market in that vicinity would tend to greatly increase the assessed valuations of real estate throughout said localities, which are capable of sustaining a population at least four times greater than that now existing.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Provision is hereby made for the acquisition and establishment of a public market in the Eighth Ward of the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, upon the lands or lands under water hereinbelow described, which are hereby selected for a public market in said Borough of Brooklyn, and surveys and maps thereof are hereby directed to be made and filed as provided by law. Said lands or lands under water shall be acquired for said purposes by purchase or by condemnation proceedings as required by law; provided, however, that this matter be submitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and that no further proceedings be taken until the acquisition of said lands or lands under water is approved and authorized by a majority vote of all the members of said Board of Estimate and Apportionment, as required by law.

Sec. 2. The Corporation Counsel is directed and instructed to take the necessary steps to acquire title to said lands or lands under water and any and all rights and hereditaments in and to the same by condemnation proceedings to be conducted as required by law.

Sec. 3. The lands or lands under water so selected, whether purchased or acquired as above specified, shall be set apart for use as a market and dedicated to market purposes, and shall be used and occupied as such in the manner provided by law.

Sec. 4. The expense of the purchase and acquisition of said lands or lands under water and interests therein or any part thereof, and the amounts of the awards made in condemnation proceedings for the value of said lands or lands under water and interests therein, and the money for the payment thereof, together with the fees of

the Commissioners of Estimate, compensation of such necessary clerks or assistants as they may employ, and all other necessary expenses in and about said condemnation proceedings, including the fees of counsel employed by the Corporation Counsel in the proceeding, and all other reasonable expenses incurred by said Corporation Counsel in the conduct of said proceeding, shall be paid through the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York, and the Comptroller of said City is hereby authorized and directed, upon the requisition of said Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to issue such Corporate Stock of The City of New York from time to time to the amount of such requisition or requisitions, in the manner provided by law, and the amount so issued is hereby created a fund for the purposes aforesaid, but no bonds or other evidences of indebtedness shall be issued under the authority of this ordinance unless the proposition for creating such debt shall first be approved by a majority vote of the whole Board of Estimate and Apportionment, as provided by law. The proceeds of such bonds shall be paid into the City Treasury and shall be used solely for the purposes aforesaid.

Sec. 5. The lands or lands under water hereinabove mentioned and referred to are described as follows: All that certain plot, piece or parcel of land or land under water situate, lying and being in the Eighth Ward of the Borough of Brooklyn, County of Kings, City of New York, State of New York, bounded and described as follows, to wit: Beginning at a point on the westerly line or side of Second avenue, 375 feet northerly from the centre line of Thirty-ninth street, as said street is laid down on the map of the Commissioners appointed by the Legislature of the State of New York to lay out streets, avenues and squares in The City of New York, running thence westerly on a line parallel with and distant 375 feet from said centre line of Thirty-ninth street and a line drawn in continuation thereof 094.52 feet; thence northerly 350.89 feet to a point 717 feet northerly from the continuation of the centre line of Thirty-ninth street; thence easterly, parallel with said centre line of Thirty-ninth street, 916.02 feet, to the westerly line or side of Second avenue; thence southerly along the westerly side of Second avenue 342 feet to the point or place of beginning, be the said several dimensions more or less.

Sec. 6. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

## (SUBSTITUTE ORDINANCE.)

AN ORDINANCE authorizing and providing for the acquisition, construction and establishment of a public wholesale market in the Eighth Ward of the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, and authorizing the issue of bonds to pay for the same.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Provision is hereby made for the acquisition and establishment of a public wholesale market in the Eighth Ward of the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, upon the lands and lands under water hereinabove described, which are hereby selected for a public wholesale market in said Borough of Brooklyn, and surveys and maps thereof are hereby directed to be made and filed as provided by law. Said lands or lands under water shall be acquired for said purposes by purchase or by condemnation proceedings, as required by law, provided, however, that this matter be submitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and that no further proceedings be taken until the acquisition of said lands or lands under water is approved and authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, as required by law.

Sec. 2. The lands and lands under water so selected shall be set apart for use as a public wholesale market, provided, however, that said lands or lands under water or any part thereof, whenever they shall no longer be required for the purpose of a market, may be assigned by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for use for any other public purpose, or may be sold by said Commissioners in the manner provided by law.

Sec. 3. For the purpose of paying for the acquisition of said lands or lands under water, whether such lands or lands under water be acquired by purchase or by condemnation proceedings, and for the purpose of paying for the construction of said market, the Comptroller, subject to the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in the manner provided by law, is authorized to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York. Such Corporate Stock shall be issued from time to time upon the requisition of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to the amount of such requisition or requisitions, and the proceeds thereof shall be paid into the City Treasury and shall constitute a fund for the purpose aforesaid.

Sec. 4. The lands or lands under water hereinbefore mentioned and referred to are described as follows:

All that certain plot, piece or parcel of land and land under water, situate, lying and being in the Eighth Ward, Borough of Brooklyn, County of Kings, City and State of New York, bounded and described as follows: Beginning at a point on the westerly line or side of Second avenue, 375 feet northerly from the centre line of Thirty-ninth street, as said street and avenue are laid down on the map of the Commissioners appointed by the Legislature of the State of New York, to lay out streets, avenues and squares in the former City of Brooklyn; running thence westerly on a line parallel with and distant 375 feet from said centre line of Thirty-ninth street to the pierhead line as established by chapter 491 of the Laws of 1884, and approved by the Secretary of War on March 4, 1890; thence northeasterly along said pierhead line to a point on the westerly prolongation of the southerly line of Thirty-sixth street, as laid down on said map; thence easterly along the westerly prolongation of the southerly line of Thirty-sixth street to the westerly line or side of Second avenue; and thence southerly along the westerly line or side of Second avenue, 376 feet, more or less, to the point or place of beginning.

The petition of the Harlem Transfer Company respectfully shows that your petitioner is engaged in business as a receiver and forwarder of freight cars and freight for various transportation companies, and that its principal place of business is situated in the Borough of The Bronx, on the Harlem river, between the Mott Haven canal and Railroad avenue, shown on annexed diagram, and colored blue.

II.

That your petitioner is the lessee of the bulkhead at the foot of Railroad avenue, adjoining the principal place of business of your petitioner, which bulkhead is shown on the diagram, and colored red, and that said lease expires June 1, 1912.

III.

That the west side of Railroad avenue, south of One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, lies along and fronts the Harlem river.

IV.

That the said Railroad avenue, south of One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, is wholly unused except by your petitioner, which is a domestic corporation duly incorporated under the laws of the State of New York.

V.

That your petitioner desires permission to lay spur tracks from said bulkhead (colored red) along the unused part of Railroad avenue south of One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, to connect with tracks in petitioner's yard (colored blue), with the right to handle and move all kinds of freight and freight cars thereon by horse or other power for a period of time coterminous with petitioner's present lease of said bulkhead,



and will pay The City of New York as a rental for such privilege the sum of fifty (50) cents per running foot per annum for each double line of steel rails, otherwise known as each railroad track, or such other rate as may be fixed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Wherefore, your petitioner prays that a resolution be passed by your Honorable Body permitting and authorizing your petitioner to construct such spur tracks from said bulkhead along said avenue.

This consent and the permission granted by this ordinance shall continue only during the pleasure of the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, and the said Harlem Transfer Company shall pay to The City of New York such compensation therefor as shall be ascertained, fixed and determined by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. By the Vice-Chairman—

Whereas, The Board of Regents of the University of the State of New York provides moneys for the especial use of high schools, which moneys are known as the "Books and Apparatus Fund," and the "Regents' Bonus Fund," and which moneys are deposited with the Comptroller of The City of New York; and

Whereas, These moneys are expended for scientific apparatus, library books and the peculiar supplies incident to high school work, which supplies are in many respects peculiar to the needs of the various high schools; and

Whereas, The tabulation and preparation of bid books for these supplies causes great delay and inconvenience to the said high schools, and the cause of education is imperilled thereby; now be it

Resolved, That the Board of Education be and hereby is permitted to procure such supplies, chargeable to the "Special High School Fund," as may be needful for the use of the high schools in The City of New York, at an expense not to exceed forty thousand dollars during any one calendar year, without entering into advertised contract therefor.

In connection with the above resolution the following brief was submitted:

Brief to accompany resolution of the Board of Aldermen authorizing the Board of Education to expend moneys in the "Books and Apparatus Fund" and the "Regents' Bonus Fund" for apparatus and supplies for high schools, without entering into advertised contract therefor.

The Regents of the University of the State of New York appropriate to the secondary schools of the State from the revenue of the United States Deposit Fund moneys for the encouragement of secondary education, that may be expended for library books, apparatus, and supplies peculiar to the needs of high school instruction. These moneys appropriated to the high schools of Greater New York are deposited with the Comptroller, who becomes simply the custodian of such funds and carries them in a separate account, known as the "Special High School Fund."

Heretofore the moneys in the two funds known as "Books and Apparatus Fund" and "Regents' Bonus Fund" have been expended without contract. Section 419 of the Revised Charter says: "Whenever any work is necessary to be done to complete or perfect a particular job or any supply is needful for any particular purpose, which work and job is to be undertaken or supply furnished for The City of New York, and the several parts of the said work or supply shall, in the aggregate, involve the expenditure of more than one thousand dollars, the same shall be by contract \* \* \* unless otherwise ordered by a vote of three-fourths of the members elected to the Board of Aldermen." The interpretation of this section has been deemed to make necessary the tabulation of apparatus, supplies and library books, which tabulation not only requires a vast amount of labor and time, but produces a volume, encyclopedic in proportion, at an expenditure of more than five thousand dollars, for the purchase of goods amounting to less than forty thousand dollars. But the greatest evil resulting is the delay in the purchase of necessary supplies caused by this tabulation and advertising.

A majority of all the articles purchased are in single units, and the articles themselves are often patented articles, so that no competition results from the advertisement. In fact, most of the biological supplies can be purchased in the open market cheaper than any contractor can afford to furnish them when he is compelled to deliver them to schools as far apart as Long Island City and Staten Island.

As illustrations of the delay to the several high schools caused by the necessity for such advertising: The High School of Commerce moved into its new building in September, 1903, and has not yet received the equipment of scientific apparatus and supplies asked for in the previous June; the same is true of the Morris High School; the Commercial High School, on the 14th day of April, 1903, placed an order for four hundred dollars' worth of chemical and philosophical apparatus and supplies, which order the Supply Department has not yet been able to fill, although every reasonable effort that can be made to furnish the supplies to the above-named high schools has been made by the Supply Department, and the entire delay has been caused by the necessity for tabulation, specification and advertisement. The same conditions may be found in practically all of the other high schools.

The pressing needs of the high schools, the serious harm that has already resulted and the effective working of these schools in the future, make urgent the speedy adoption of the resolution.
