### COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at a Meeting Held in Room 16, City Hall, at 11 o'clock a. m., on Thursday, September 13, 1906.

Present-George B. McClellan, Mayor; Herman A. Metz, Comptroller; John H. Campbell, Deputy Chamberlain; Patrick F. McGowan, President, Board of Aldermen, and John R. Davies, Chairman, Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the meeting held July 31, 1906, were approved as printed.

The Comptroller presented a report of the Chief Engineer of the Department of Finance relative to a lease by the Commissioner of Docks of Pier 3 at Wallabout Basin, Borough of Brooklyn, with the half bulkheads northerly and southerly thereof, to the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company.

On motion of the Chairman, Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen, the matter was laid over.

The following communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks, recommending the establishment of a ferry from and to Barren Island, and from and to various points on Rockaway Beach, Jamaica Bay, Borough of Queens, and the leasing of same by private agreement to the Riparian Land and Improvement Company:

New York, July 13, 1906.

Sir—In accordance with the provisions of section 818 of the Greater New York Charter I respectfully request the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to the establishment of a ferry between the following points:

From and to Barren Island and from and to various points on Rockaway Beach. The landings at all points at which the ferry touches are owned by private parties.

In the event of the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund being granted to the establishment of a ferry between the points named, I am of the opinion that the interests of the City would not be best promoted by leasing the franchise of this ferry by public auction and in the manner first directed by section 826 of the Greater New York Charter, and therefore beg to recommend the adoption by unanimous vote of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of a resolution authorizing the leasing of said franchise by private agreement to the Riparian Land and Improvement Company for a term of five years from August 1, 1906. The rental for said franchise to be 5 per cent. of the gross receipts, but to be not less than \$100 per annum.

The lease to contain the following covenants and conditions:

Payments quarter yearly in advance; that when 5 per cent. of the gross receipts shall exceed the sum paid for rent for that year such excess shall be added to the sum due for rent on the next quarter.

Statements of receipts duly verified to be made to the Commissioner of Docks on the first day of April in each year.

The lessee to be responsible for all damage to any person or persons or property.

To comply with all laws and ordinances now or hereafter to be made. Not to assign or sublet without the consent of the Commissioner of Docks. The lease not to interfere with any previous lease granted, or the right to grant

Boats to be fully equipped with life preservers and all other appliances required the United States Government, and all other rules and regulations of the Dock epartment to be enforced for the safe conduct of the ferry.

The lessee to employ competent crews.

Boats to run all the year, and as often as business permits. In July and August of each year the trips will be made from ten to twenty minutes at the short distances and from twenty to thirty minutes at the long distances, or oftener if business admits, unless the traffic in the opinion of the Commissioner of Docks does not

warrant such headway.

The fare not to exceed that fixed by law or ordinance, and in any event not to exceed three cents for the shorter distances and five cents for the longer ones. Teams and vehicles to be charged proportionate rate, which rate shall be subject to modification by the Commissioner of Docks.

The remaining terms and covenants of the lease to be similar to those now in use by this Department, copy of which may be seen and examined at the office of the Secretary, Pier "A," Battery place.

Sir-The Hon. J. A. Ben'sel, Commissioner of Docks, in a communication dated July 13, 1906, in accordance with the provisions of section 818 of the Greater New York Charter, requests the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to the establishment of a ferry from and to Barren Island and various points on Rockaway Beach.

In reference thereto I would report:

At a meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, October 10, 1905, the Commissioners approved the establishment by the Commissioner of Docks of four ferries in the neighborhood of Canarsie, Rockaway Point, Rockaway Beach, Bergen Beach and Barren Island. One of the four specified Barren Island as a landing

At a meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, January 25, 1906, the Commissioners approved of and authorized the lease of three of the franchises (one having been withdrawn), including the one touching at Barren Island, to the parties making application for the same.

The ferry contemplated by the Commissioner of Docks in his communication of July 13, may very possibly interfere with some of those established earlier, but as the establishment of a ferry and the sale of a lease in this locality has heretofore carried no obligation by the City of protection or special rights, I can see no reason why the suggestions of the Commissioner of Docks in this case should not be allowed.

I have no objections to make to the terms of the lease as noted by the Commissioner of Docks.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 818 of the Amended Greater New York Charter, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of the establishment, by the Commissioner of Docks, of a ferry from and to Barren Island, and from and to various points on Rockaway Beach, Jamaica Bay, Borough of Queens.

Whereas, Section 826 of the Greater New York Charter provides that the Commissioner of Docks shall have power and is authorized to lease in the name of and for the benefit of The City of New York, in the manner provided by law, the franchise of any ferry or ferries belonging to said City for the highest marketable price or rental at public auction or by sealed bids, and always after public advertisement and appraisal, under the direction of said Commissioner, but not for a term longer than ten years; and

Whereas, It is further provided in said section that whenever it may be determined by the unanimous vote of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, upon the recommendation of the Commissioner of Docks, that the interests of the City will not be best promoted by leasing the franchise of a ferry in the manner in said section thereinbefore directed, it shall be lawful for said Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, by resolution adopted by such unanimous vote, upon the recommendation of the Commissioner of Docks, to lease such franchises by private agreement for terms not exceeding twenty-five years, and under such conditions as, in their judgment, will best protect and further the interests of the City and the traveling public; and

Whereas, Under date of July 13, 1906, the Commissioner of Docks has recommended that the interests of the City will not be best promoted by leasing the franchise of the ferry from and to Barren Island, and from and to various points on Rockaway Beach, at public auction, or by sealed bids, and after public advertisement and appraisal under the direction of the Commissioner of Docks; now therefore be it

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 826 of the Greater New York Charter, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, by unanimous vote, determine that the interests of The City of New York will not be best promoted by leasing the franchise of the hereinbefore mentioned ferry at public auction, as provided in section 826 of the Greater New York Charter; and be it further

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 826 of the Greater New York Charter, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, by unanimous vote, hereby a franchise to operate a ferry from and to Barren Island, and from and to various points on Rockaway Beach, Jamaica Bay, Borough of Queens, upon the following terms and conditions:

The lease to be for a term of five years from August 1, 1906; the rental for the ferry franchise to be 5 per cent. of the gross receipts, but to be not less than one hundred dollars (\$100) per annum.

Boats to be fully equipped with life preservers and all other appliances required by the United States Government, and all other rules and regulations of the Dock Department to be enforced for the safe conduct of the ferry.

The lessee to employ competent crews.

In July and August of each year the trips will be made from ten to twenty minutes at the short distances, and from twenty to thirty minutes at the long distances, or oftener if business admits, unless the traffic in the opinion of the Commissioner of Docks does not warrant such

Owners, A. Rakovchick and S. Rakowtzik, No. 124 Suffolk street, Manhattan."

The Bureau of Buildings and the Department of Health have certified that the condition of the premises is suitable for school purposes. The rental asked by the owner, of \$450 per annum, is an increase of \$90 per annum over the present existing lease.

I have had an examination made of the premises, and find that the rental now asked is not excessive, and would therefore respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorize a renewal of the lease of the store floor of the premises on the southwesterly corner of Rockaway avenue and Sumpter street, Borough of Brooklyn, for a period of one year from October 3, 1906, with the privilege of renewal for an additional year, on the same terms and conditions, at an annual rental of \$450, payable quarterly, otherwise upon the same terms and conditions as contained in the existing lease. for that Borough, who reported that the only available property in the vicinity of this school building is the Grinnell Mansion, on Grinnell avenue, about 280 feet north of Jackson avenue, Corona, L. I., which will furnish school accommodations for about 200 children; that the owner will lease this building (except the basement) and sixteen lots, for an annual rental of \$1,580; that he will furnish heat and janitor service and keep the exterior of the building in repair; and that the said rental is reasonable; and that the premises are suitable for school purposes.

Sir—The Board of Education, at a meeting held July 9, 1906, adopted a resolution requesting the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to approve of the hiring of a building to be used as an annex to Public School 15, in the Borough of Queens, and submit for their approval the only available property in the vicinity, being the property known as the Grinnell Mansion, on Grinnell avenue, about 280 feet north of Jackson avenue, Corona, Long Island, which will furnish school accommodations for about two hundred children; that the owner will lease the building (except the basement) and sixteen lots for an annual rental of \$1,580; that he will furnish janitor service and keep the exterior of the building in repair; that the said rental is reasonable and that the premises are suitable for school purposes; the Board of Education to furnish fuel and make other necessary changes at its own cost.

The Bureau of Buildings has furnished a certificate that if the Board of Education uses the first and second floors only for school purposes the matter of the erection of a fire escape will be waived, as the plan submitted shows sufficient egress in case of fire from the two floors above mentioned.

The Health Department states that the building is in good sanitary condition.

The Health Department states that the building is in good sanitary condition. The rooms to be used are well ventilated and contain sufficient air space, and they see no objections to the use of the building for school purposes.

I have had an examination made of the building and find that it is a new building 52 by 22 feet, and that the available floor space required by the Borough President is about 900 square feet.

In a communication under date of July 26, 1906, the Property Clerk under the jurisdiction of the Borough President states that the present quarters at Avenue C and Thirteenth street, Unionport, occupied by the field parties operating in that vicinity are entirely inadequate and unsatisfactory, and will be more so in the immediate

vicinity are entirely inadequate and unsatisfactory, and will be more so in the immediate future as the work in that vicinity increases.

The owner of the property, after consulting with this office, has agreed to lease the property for a period of one year at a rental of \$30 per month and give a privilege of two renewals at the same rate, instead of \$35 per month, as is named by the President of the Borough of The Bronx.

I would therefore respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve of the request of the President of the Borough of The Bronx and authorize a lease of the first floor of a building erected on the southwest corner of Castlehill avenue and Ellis avenue, in the Borough of The Bronx, as a Branch Engineer's office, Bureau of Sewers, for a period of one year at a rental of \$30 per month, with the privilege of two renewals at the same rate per month, the City to furnish light and heat; the owner to furnish the water used on the premises. The said lease to date from the time of occupation, and not August 1, 1906, as stated in the President's communication, for the reason that the building is not completed. The appropriation to pay for the same is chargeable to Rents (general account). Lessor, George E. Herold, Second avenue and One Hundred and Eleventh street, Manhattan.

The petition shows that the petitioner has recently had his title to the premises examined by the United States Title Guaranty and Indemnity Company, and that he has been advised by said company that the deed executed to Alice Neill by George W. The question submitted for my consideration is whether that view is correct, because if it is there can be no doubt that the petitioner is entitled to a confirmatory deed, as Alice Neill, from whom he derives title, paid full consideration to the then City of Brooklyn for the premises in question.

I have been unable to find any statute or any ordinance of the former City of Brooklyn giving the Comptroller authority to sign a conveyance of real estate belonging to the City of Brooklyn under the circumstances disclosed in the papers submitted to me, and I am of the opinion that in the absence of such express authority the Comptroller would not have that power.

It follows therefore that a confirmatory deed of these premises should be given

It follows, therefore, that a confirmatory deed of these premises should be given to the petitioner, as the City has no beneficial interest of any kind in the premises, and would undoubtedly on petition to the Supreme Court be required by mandamus to execute and deliver such instrument. 



"Block 6, Lots Nos. 24, 26, 28, 30 and 32, amount \$105.72."

Under date of July 23, 1906, the Corporation Counsel transmitted his certificate, pursuant to the provisions of section 205 of the Charter, as amended, which certifies that the interest of the City in the property in question is a mere cloud upon the title of the owner of said lots, and concludes said opinion:

"While the amount to be paid by the petitioner must be fixed by the Commissioners, in response to your request for my advice as to the amount the City should charge for such release. I would suggest that the petitioner be required to reimburse the City the amount paid by it to the State Comptroller, together with 6 per cent. per annum thereon."

It is my opinion that should the City receive the sum paid out by it to the State

It is my opinion that should the City receive the sum paid out by it to the State of New York, with interest thereon at the rate of 6 per cent. per annum, together with the expense for drawing the release, the interest of The City of New York will be fully protected without hardship upon the owner of the property.

I would therefore respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorize a release or quit-claim to William T. Holt of all the right, title and interest acquired by The City of New York from or through the sale for taxes made by the Comptroller of the State of New York in the year 1900, under and by virtue of the Comptroller's deed of conveyance bearing the date of February 10, 1904, recorded in the office of the Clerk of the County of Richmond, in Liber 304 of Deeds, page 313, on the 22d day of October, 1904, in and to the premises described as follows:



SIR—Matthew Smith and Matthew Smith, Jr., in a verified petition addressed to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, under date of June 13, 1906, which is hereto annexed and forms part of this report, request a release of the City's interest in and to the property formerly in the bed of East Broadway, fronting on the southerly side of East Broadway and being the property between East Broadway (now Church avenue) as previously laid out and Church avenue as presently laid out, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

The petitioners state that they are the owners in fee of the premises situated.

The petitioners state that they are the owners in fee of the premises situated on the southerly side of the old road, formerly known as the road leading from Flatbush to New Lots, and later as East Broadway, lying on the easterly side of East Thirty-second street, in Block 4886, Section 15, on the land map of the County of Kings; that the said premises were conveyed to them by Elizabeth Brettel by deed dated June 11, 1906, and recorded in the Register's office of the County of Kings on June 12, 1906, in Section 15, Block 4886, and further that the premises owned by the petitioners are known on the Assessor's tax map, Borough of Brooklyn, as Ward 29, Block 414, Lots Nos. 25 to 29, inclusive, and the westerly part of Lot No. 64, and further that The City of New York has recently completed condemnation proceedings for the opening of Church avenue from Flatbush avenue easterly to Brooklyn avenue, according to the new lines of Church avenue, as laid down on the Town Survey Commission map of Kings County, which is the official map of The City of New York in that section. That pursuant thereto the title to Church avenue became vested in The City of New York on April 28, 1903; and further, that The City of New York by the opening of Church avenue, which has practically absorbed the old road and has been substituted therefor, has abandoned as a road so much of the old road as is not included in the new avenue.

therefor, has abandoned as a road so much of the old road as is not included in the new avenue.

The Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York, on the 15th day of March, 1889, instituted proceedings for the opening and extending of Church avenue, between Flatbush and Brooklyn avenues, in the Borough of Brooklyn, and at that meeting directed that the entire cost and expense of such proceedings be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby. At a meeting held on December 19, 1902, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment directed that 55 per cent. of the cost and expense of such proceedings be borne and paid for by the City, and under an order of the Supreme Court, Commissioners were appointed. On April 28, 1903, an order was entered confirming the report of the Commissioners.

The opening of Church avenue, from Flatbush avenue to Brooklyn avenue, leaves a part of old East Broadway extending from a point 87.14 feet east of Flatbush avenue to a point midway between Bedford avenue and Rogers avenue, north of the present line of Church avenue. In other words, for this distance the property fronting on what was the northerly line of old East Broadway would have only a right of easement across to what is now Church avenue, and from Rogers avenue east to Brooklyn avenue, the owners of the property fronting on the south side of old East Broadway would have only the right of easement across to the northerly side of what is now Church avenue. Each and every one of the property owners fronting along the property herein described, in order to have a perfect title, will request the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for a release of the City's interest in and to the old East Broadway from Rogers avenue to Brooklyn avenue, and a release of the City's interest to old East Broadway from a point 87.14 feet east of Flatbush avenue to midway between Bedford and Rogers avenues.

The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a meeting held November 30, 1904 (see Minutes, Sinking Fund, 1904, page 892), in the matter of the petition of the Flatbush Volunteer Firemen's Association for a release of a portion of the old road, formerly known as East Broadway, in the Borough of Brooklyn, authorized a release of the interests of The City of New York in the old East Broadway between the present Church avenue and the old line of East Broadway for a consideration of \$5 per lot (or 25 cents a running foot front, irrespective of depth), each lot to be 20 feet in width, and the additional \$100 for the cost and expense for the preparation of the papers. I am of the opinion that the sum charged should be made for a release of the property in question.

of the property in question.

The Corporation Counsel in an opinion under date of October 8, 1904, in regard to the petition hereinbefore referred to of the Volunteer Firemen's Association, refers to section 205 of the Amended Greater New York Charter, as revised, which reads in part as follows:

"That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund shall have power to sell and con-

"That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund shall have power to sell and convey the right, title and interest of the City in and to lands lying within any street, avenue, road, highway, alley, lane or public place or square that has been discontinued and closed, in whole or in part, by lawful authority, to the owner of lands fronting on such street, avenue, road, highway, alley, lane or public place or square so discontinued and closed, on such terms and conditions, and for such consideration as in the judgment of the said Commissioners of the Sinking Fund shall seem proper, provided the said Commissioners of the Sinking Fund shall first determine that said lands, or part thereof, so sold and conveyed, are not needed for any public use,"—and concludes his opinion by stating that "no certificate of the Corporation Counsel is necessary in such a case, the matter resting entirely in the discretion of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund after the passage of a resolution by that body, determining that the lands to be sold or conveyed are not needed for any public use. In the present case such resolution may apply on general terms to all the land in the former old road vacated by the opening of Church avenue, between the points indicated, or it may refer simply to that portion of said lands intended to be sold or conveyed."

Taylor Phillips, Acting Comptroller, transmitting for my consideration an application made to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund by Matthew Smith and Matthew Smith, Jr., for a release of the premises forming part of the street formerly laid out and known as East Broadway, in the Borough of Brooklyn, together with a report made to the Comptroller on the subject by the Bureau of Real Estate of the Department of Finance, and my advice is asked as to whether the interest of The City of New York in this piece of property is material or nominal and a mere cloud upon the title of a private owner.

This application is precisely similar to that of the Flatbush Volunteer Firemen's Association, concerning which an opinion was rendered by the Corporation Counsel on October 8, 1904. In that opinion reference was made to the following language of section 205 of the amended Greater New York Charter:

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the consent, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, draw to the order of th

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Roard or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, to specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be dead.
