REPORT FOR THE WEEK ENDING SEPTEMBER 20, 1913.

#### THE PRESENT LOCALIZED EPIDEMIC OF TYPHOID FEVER.

A Preliminary Report.

As is well known by almost every one at the present time, typhoid fever is contracted in but one way, namely, by swallowing the bacillus that is the cause of the disease. This takes place through the medium of infected milk, infected food, or infected water, or by direct contact with other cases. Infection by means of polluted water usually takes place in country districts during the summer, and the disease is thus contracted by persons who are on their annual vacation and who frequently exhibit their first symptoms upon their return to the city. An equally fertile source of the disease is contaminated milk. For a number of years, at no time as energetically as at the present, the department has endeavored to render the milk supply of the city innocuous, and during the year 1912 and the first half of 1913 typhoid fever showed a marked decrease in the number of its cases, accompanying which was a decrease also in the percentage of deaths. It would seem probable that this decrease has been very largely due to the rigid inspection by the department of the out-of-town dairies and creameries from which milk is shipped, to the inspection in the city of the premises upon which it is sold, and to the enforcement of pasteurization of most of the milk supply. Certain milk, conforming to a high standard and produced under special conditions, is not at present submitted to the pasteurizing process. On September 3, several unreported cases of typhoid fever in E. 21st st. were discovered by the department. Other foci of the disease developed in the middle Manhattan, eastern section, below 40th st., and also in the lower East Side. Up to and including September 19 the total number of cases in the affected district amounted to 185. Many were in public hospitals and had not been reported to the Department of Health by those institutions. The milk supply as the source of infection was instantly suspected. Cases contracted in the country would not occur as a localized epidemic, contact cases are relatively few in number, and as a source of infection the Croton water supply is a negligible quantity. Upon investigation it was found that most of the families in which these cases occurred had been supplied by one milk company in this city. The milk company was notified immediately that the suspected milk would either have to be properly pasteurized or it would be excluded from the city, and since September 4 milk derived from this source has been pasteurized. Investigation revealed the history of a number of cases of typhoid fever at a particular dairy farm and in the vicinity during the past three years, and an inspector is at present obtaining specimens of blood and feces from all possible sources of infection. Since the pasteurization of the suspected milk supply, no cases have occurred which were not presumably infected prior to that date, and the department feels that the outlook is promising and that it has the situation well in hand. The following table shows the occurrence of typhoid fever during 1912 and 1913 in the affected districts arranged by wards, and also the normal average for the past five years:

As showing the localized character of the present epidemic, it may be remarked that the number of cases of typhoid fever occurring in the Borough of Brooklyn has been markedly below the average. The subjoined table gives the number of cases in that borough during 1912 and 1913, by weeks, from August 2 to September 13, inclusive, and also the average number of cases for the corresponding weeks for the past five years:

#### PEDICULOSIS CAPITIS (HEAD LICE) AMONG SCHOOL CHILDREN.

Attention is called to the fact that the eradication of pediculosis from among school children in New York City is rendered extremely difficult because of the migratory character of our population, and because of the constant influx of immigration, which cause the process of education and of eradication to be ever continuous. While for the past four years the number of cases of pediculosis capitis among public school children has remained practically the same, there has been a general decline in the number of cases excluded from school for this cause, exclusion now taking place only when living pediculi are found, when the case is an aggravated one, or when persistent neglect of treatment exists. Particular attention is called to the improvement in the character of our cases, due to the disappearance of those with pronounced dermatitis, glandular enlargements, suppuration and scalp abscesses. It is also the case that while the number and percentage of several communicable diseases of the scalp, skin and eyes have declined very noticeably during the years 1909-1912, the number and percentage of cases of pediculosis have remained



practically stationary. Various reasons are given for this fact, among them the difficulty with which the tenement population is aroused to the importance and consequence of this condition, and to the many prejudices and superstitions which these people hold in regard to the condition. The consequences and unsightliness of the other communicable diseases of the skin, scalp, and eyes—trachoma, conjunctivitis, scabies, ringworm, impetigo, favus, etc., appeal to them more directly and they make greater effort to prevent contact of one person with another and to procure the necessary treatment. It has been shown that while the problem of the destruction of living pediculi is comparatively easy, the great obstacle encountered is in the eradication of the nits. No amount and no kind of treatment at the school will yield definite results, because pediculosis capitis is a problem of the home, a problem of the child's brothers and sisters, often of the parents and grandparents and, frequently, of the bedding, clothing, towels, combs, brush, and other household utensils.

A very interesting phase of the subject was demonstrated recently by a table showing the relative freedom of the colored school children from this condition. In sixteen public schools, with an attendance of 28,791 children, there were 2,579 colored children and 26,212 whites, and of this number 13 cases of pediculosis capitis were found in colored children, a percentage of 0.5, and 4,340 cases in the white, a percentage of 16.5. Various reasons are given for this infrequency, the main argument advanced being that among the colored parents and children there is a great desire to get rid of the "kinks" in the hair and that they are forever using the comb. It was also noticed that pediculosis capitis among the colored children occurred more frequently in those with the softer varieties of hair, or straight hair, than in those whose hair was "kinky," and in those who had white mothers or mothers nearly white. It has also been shown by tables that pediculosis capitis is more frequent among girls than among boys.

#### ACTION OF MEDICAL CONGRESS IN REGARD TO SYPHILIS.

At the Joint Session of the Section of Forensic Medicine of the Seventeenth International Congress of Medicine, held in London, August 16, 1913, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

That, sensible of the ravages wrought by syphilis in the health of the community, and deploring the inadequacy of existing facilities for the checking of its dissemination, the International Medical Congress calls upon the Government of all the countries here represented: (1) to institute a system of confidential notification of the disease to a sanitary authority, where such notification does not already obtain, and (2) to make systematic provision for the diagnosis and treatment of all cases of syphilis not otherwise provided for.

#### DEATH RATE FOR THE WEEK.

During the past week there were 1,359 deaths as compared with 1,162 deaths in the corresponding week of last year, the respective rates being 13.20 and 11.72.

This great increase was due undoubtedly to the inclement weather of last week, as is borne out by the increased number of deaths from influenza, bronchitis and pneumonia. Pulmonary tuberculosis also showed a large increase, which, however, in itself was not important, as it simply means that a certain number of sufferers in the last stages of this disease were hurried to their end by the sudden change in the state of the weather.

The following diseases also showed an increase, viz.: heart disease, Bright's disease and nephritis. The increase in the two former is but a reflection of the steady increase of deaths from these diseases throughout the large cities of the world, and for which our present mode of living is responsible. Amongst other causes, cancer showed the greatest increase. The following diseases showed decreases: measles, scarlet fever, diphtheria, whooping cough, typhoid fever and diarrheal diseases.

Deaths under one year and under five years show a decrease; deaths sixty-five years and over show an increase.

The death rate for the first thirty-eight weeks of 1913 is lower than that for the corresponding period of 1912, the rates being respectively 14.20 and 14.43.

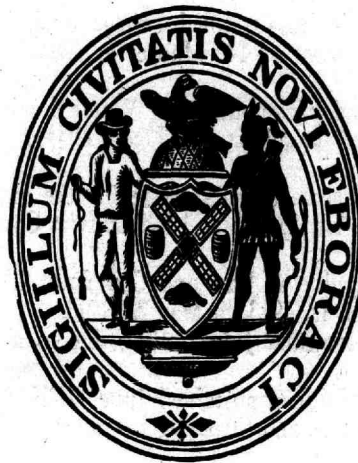

PART OF THE SEVENTH AVENUE-LEXINGTON AVENUE RAPID TRANSIT RAILROAD.

THE PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION FOR the First District (hereinafter called "the Commission") invites proposals to construct Section No. 2 of Routes 4 and 38, a part of the Seventh Avenue-Lexington Avenue Rapid Transit Railroad.

The points within The City of New York between which the said part is to run and the route or routes to be followed are briefly as follows:

Section No. 2. Beginning at a point under Greenwich st., in the Borough of Manhattan, near the intersection of West Broadway, about seventy (70) feet south of the southerly building line of Vesey st., and extending thence northerly under Greenwich st., West Broadway and Varick st. to a point about one hundred (100) feet south of the southerly building line of Beach st.

Also a branch to this line, beginning at a point under Park place, in the Borough of Manhattan, about one hundred and seventeen (117) feet east of the easterly line of West Broadway, and curving thence northwesterly under Park place, private property and West Broadway to a connection with the main line.

The general plan of construction calls for a subsurface railroad having two and four tracks. The details of the construction of the railroad and appurtenances are more particularly indicated on the contract drawings.

Bidders will not be required to provide or lay tracks, ties or ballast, nor to do station finish work.

The work of construction under the contract will include the construction of all necessary sewers and connections, along or off the route of the railroad; also the necessary support, maintenance, readjustment and reconstruction of vaults adjacent to buildings, pipes, tubes, conduits, subways or other subsurface structures; the support and care, including underpinning or the maintaining, protecting and securing, where necessary, of all buildings, monuments, surface and elevated railroads and other surface, subsurface and overhead structures of any kind, etc., affected by or interfered with during the construction of the work; also the restoration of the sidewalks and roadways.

The method of construction will be by trench excavation under cover, unless otherwise permitted by the Commission, as set forth in the form of contract.

Bidders must examine the form of contract and the specifications, maps and plans; must visit the location of the work and inform themselves of the present conditions along the line thereof, and make their own estimates of the facilities and difficulties attending the execution of the proposed work.

A fuller description of the work to be done is set forth and other requirements, provisions, details and specifications are stated in the printed form of contract and in the contract drawings therein referred to. Printed copies of the form of contract, bond and contractor's proposal may be had on application at the office of the Commission, No. 154 Nassau st., Borough of Manhattan, City of New York. The contract drawings may be inspected at the same office, and copies thereof may be purchased by prospective bidders on payment of five dollars (\$5). The printed form of contract and the contract drawings are to be deemed a part of this invitation.

The City and the Interborough Rapid Transit Company will both be parties to the contract; the Interborough Rapid Transit Company being a party for the purpose of disbursing part of its contribution toward the cost of construction, as provided in the contract dated March 19, 1913, between The City of New York, acting by the Commission, and Interborough Rapid Transit Company, for the equipment, maintenance and operation of additional rapid transit railroads.

The liability of Interborough Rapid Transit Company under the contract for which bids are now invited will be limited to an amount equal to ninety-five (95) per cent. of the aggregate sum arrived at by multiplying the estimated approximate quantities by the unit prices as contained in the schedule of unit prices in the contractor's proposal. The contractor is to accept the obligation of the Interborough Rapid Transit Company to make payments to the amount and in the manner provided in the contract and is to agree not to look to the City except to the extent that the amounts earned under the contract may exceed the amount for which the Interborough Rapid Transit Company is liable.

The Commission is informed by the Department of Docks and Ferries that docks and bulkheads along the East River or along the North River may be available for dumping purposes. Information in regard thereto may be obtained by any intending bidder upon inquiry at the office of the Department of Docks and Ferries, with whom all arrangements must be made with respect to utilizing such docks and bulkheads as may be available.

Partial payments to the contractor will be made monthly as the work proceeds, as provided in the form of contract.

The contractor will be required to complete the work as soon as practicable, and within a period of thirty-six (36) months from the date of the delivery of the contract.

Sealed bids or proposals will be received at the office of the Commission at No. 154 Nassau street, Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, until the 1st day of October, 1913, at twelve fifteen (12.15) o'clock p. m. at which time, or at a later date to be fixed by the Commission, the proposals will be publicly opened.

Proposals must be in the form prescribed by the Commission, copies of which may be obtained at the office of the Commission.

A statement based upon estimate of the Engineer, of the quantities of the various classes of the work and of the nature and extent, as near as practicable, of the work required is to be found in the schedule forming a part of the form of contractor's proposal. The quantities given in such schedule are approximate only, being given as a basis for the uniform comparison of bids, and no claim is to be made against the City on account of any excess or deficiency, absolute or

relative, in the same, except as provided in the specifications and form of contract.

All proposals must, when submitted, be enclosed in a sealed envelope endorsed "Proposal for Constructing Part of Rapid Transit Railroad—Routes Nos. 4 and 38, Section No. 2," and must be delivered to the Commission or its Secretary; and in the presence of the person submitting the proposal, it will be deposited in a sealed box in which all proposals will be deposited. No proposal will be received or deposited unless accompanied by a separate certified check drawn upon a national or state bank or trust company having its principal office in The City of New York, satisfactory to the Commission and payable to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, for the sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000). Such check must not be enclosed in the envelope containing the proposal.

The unit prices must not be improperly balanced, and any bid which the Commission considers detrimental to the City's interests may be rejected.

No proposal, after it shall have been deposited with the Commission, will be allowed to be withdrawn for any reason whatever.

The award of the contract will be made by the Commission as soon as practicable after the opening of the proposals.

Bidders whose proposals are otherwise satisfactory, in case the sureties or securities named by them are not approved by the Commission, may substitute in their proposals the names of other sureties or securities approved by the Commission, but such substitution must be made within five (5) days after notice of disapproval, unless such period is extended by the Commission.

A bidder whose proposal shall be accepted shall, in person or by duly authorized representative, attend at the said office of the Commission within ten days after the delivery of a notice by the Commission that his proposal is accepted and that the contract is consented to by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and such bidder shall then deliver a contract in the form referred to, duly executed and with its execution duly proved.

At the time of the delivery of the contract the contractor will be required to furnish security to the City by giving a bond for Seventy-five Thousand Dollars (\$75,000). At the option of the successful bidder, cash or approved securities may be deposited instead of giving a bond. If securities are deposited in place of a bond under this contract, they must be of the character of securities in which savings banks may invest their funds, and must be approved by the Commission.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any service, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement, to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures. Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
