

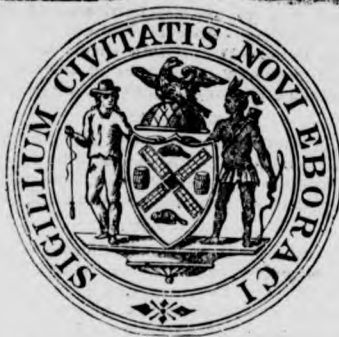

#### MESSAGE FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR.

The President laid before the Board the following message from his Honor the Mayor, announcing the death of Hon. Henry Smith:

MAYOR'S OFFICE,  
NEW YORK, February 24, 1874.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

GENTLEMEN—It is with profound regret that I have to announce to your honorable body the decease, last evening at half-past ten o'clock, at the Metropolitan Hotel, of Hon. Henry Smith, President of the Police Department of this city. For many years Mr. Smith has been identified with the public administration of our government, both city and county. During this period, our local affairs have passed through many phases, and the administrative ability and executive powers of the deceased, associated as they were with a kind heart, attracted towards him a large circle of friends, of all shades of politics, by whom he was held in high esteem, and who will feel their bereavement a public loss.

I make this announcement to your honorable body, leaving it for you to take such action in reference to the event as will mark your appreciation of his services and character.

He was for many years a member of the local legislature of this city and county, as a councilman, alderman, and

supervisor. He performed the multifarious and diverse duties incident to every such legislative office, in such a manner as to reflect credit upon himself and honor upon his constituency; while, as an executive officer, particularly as President of the Police Department, he displayed those rare qualities of head and heart that distinguished him among his fellow-men and secured for him the friendship and good-will of all with whom he became acquainted. Emphatically a self-made man, he rose by the innate force of his character, his integrity of purpose, and clear perceptions of his duties and obligations as a good citizen, from obscurity and indigence, in the humblest walk in life, to affluence, the highest place in the affections of his numerous friends, and to responsible and conspicuous places in the gift of his fellow-citizens; and

Whereas, The death of such a man imposes the imperative, yet sad duty upon this Common Council of adopting such measures as will best manifest the universal sorrow; of sympathizing and condoling with his bereaved family and afflicted friends; of placing upon record, among the archives of the city government evidence of their appreciation of his public virtues, and of making the necessary arrangements for paying a public tribute of respect to his memory; be it therefore

Resolved, That the members of the Common Council do sincerely deplore the death of the Hon. Henry Smith, President of the Police Department, and do hereby extend to his bereaved family and sorrowing friends our heartfelt sympathy and condolence; and be it further

Resolved, That out of respect for the memory of our departed friend, this Common Council will attend his funeral in a body, with their staves of office draped in mourning; that the Governor's room in the City Hall be appropriately draped in mourning, and tendered for the reception of the remains, there to be laid in state until Thursday next, the 26th inst., that being the day for solemnizing the funeral rites and ceremonies; that the flags on the City Hall and all the other public buildings be displayed at half staff, from sunrise until sunset each day the body shall remain in the City Hall; the public offices be closed on Thursday next, the 26th inst., after 12 o'clock M., and that a special Committee of five members of each branch of the Common Council be appointed to perfect the above, and make such other arrangements as to them may appear to be better calculated to manifest sorrow for the death, and respect for the memory of the deceased.

Alderman Billings, in seconding the adoption of the resolutions, paid a tribute of respect to the character of the deceased, and pronounced a fitting eulogy upon his public services and private virtues.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said preamble and resolution.

Which was unanimously decided in the affirmative.

And the same was directed to be sent immediately to the Board of Assistant Aldermen for concurrence.

#### POLICE DEPARTMENT.

The Board of Police met on the 24th day of February, 1874. Commissioners Charlick, Gardner, Duryee and Russell, present.

Commissioner Duryee was called to the chair.

#### SECOND MEETING.

The Board of Police met on the 24th day of February, 1874. Present—Messrs. Charlick, Gardner, Duryee and Russell, Commissioners.

On motion Commissioner Duryee was called to the Chair.

The following preamble and resolutions were unanimously adopted.

Whereas, Henry Smith, Commissioner of the Police Department of the City of New York, and President of the Board of Police, died at his rooms at the Metropolitan Hotel, in this city, at half-past ten o'clock P. M., on the 23d day of February, 1874.

Resolved, That the Board of Police unite with the public in an expression of feelings of regret at the untimely death of Mr. Smith, who has been called in the prime of life from the performance of important official duties, and from the cherished companionship of a wide circle of devoted and earnest friends.

Resolved, That the Board of Police desire, in the most emphatic manner, to publicly express their appreciation of and sincere regard for the deceased, as a genial and competent official associate—always considerate and just—as a presiding officer, judicious and prompt—and as a man, distinguished by generous impulses and far-reaching, wide-spread works of benevolence, humanity and charity.

Resolved, That the surviving members of the Board, by official and personal association with the deceased, have been deeply impressed, not only with the evidence of his great experience and conceded ability as a public officer, but his amiable and excellent qualities as a citizen, companion and friend; and improve the occasion to place on record their high appreciation of his merits, and their deep regrets at their own personal loss in his death.

Resolved, That the Board of Police, though conscious that words of condolence have little effect in mitigating the force of supreme affliction, nevertheless tender an earnest expression of their sympathy to the grief-stricken wife, and the afflicted kindred of the deceased, in their great sorrow.

Resolved, That as a well merited tribute of respect to the memory of the deceased President of the Police Department, the officers of the police force wear on the left arm the usual badge of mourning for the term of thirty days.

Resolved, That these resolutions be entered in the minutes of the Board, and that the chief clerk cause an engrossed copy to be furnished to the family of the deceased.

Resolved, That the Superintendent select and detail a suitable number of captains and an inspector, to accompany the remains of the deceased to Amsterdam.
