

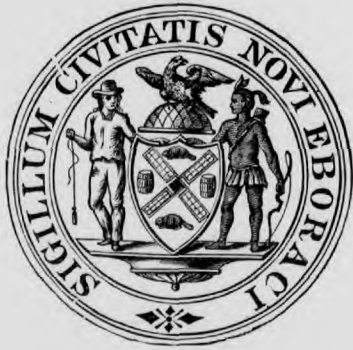

APPROVED PAPERS.

Ordinances and Resolutions passed by the Common Council during the week ending Nov. 28, 1885.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to the Managers of the Children's Aid Society to construct a vault under the sidewalk in Eighth street, near the northeast corner of Avenue B, without payment of the usual fee, according to diagram annexed, the work to be done at their own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

The sad intelligence of the death of the Honorable Thomas A. Hendricks, the honored Vice-President of the United States, awakens general sorrow among the people of the whole country; and it is eminently proper that the Common Council of the City of New York should by its official voice express the sympathy of its citizens at the loss of one of the most illustrious of the Nation's representatives.

He embodied the best attributes of manhood, and the purity of his domestic life was reflected in his conscientious discharge of public duties. Kindly and gentle in nature, he was unyielding in his fidelity to principle and loyal to his party convictions. However his opponents may have differed with him in political expediency, none ever questioned his honesty of purpose nor the sincerity of his motives.

He has made a distinguished record in the history of our nation, and he honored every station to which he had been exalted by the voice and the choice of the people.

Be it, therefore,
Resolved, That, as an expression of our respect for the memory of Vice-President Thomas A. Hendricks, the flags on the City Hall and other public buildings be displayed at half-staff from sunrise to sunset until after the day set apart for solemnizing the funeral rites, and that the City Hall be appropriately draped.

Resolved, That the heartfelt sympathy of the Common Council be and the same is hereby tendered to the sorrow-stricken widow of the honored and lamented deceased.

Resolved, That the foregoing preamble and resolutions be spread upon the minutes of this Board and that a copy thereof, suitably engrossed, be forwarded to the bereaved widow.

Which was unanimously adopted, by a rising vote, every member present voting in the affirmative.

The actual mortality for the week ending November 14, 1885, was 558, which is 42.4 below the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 20.51 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,414,918.

REASONS FOR THE PROVISIONAL ESTIMATE FOR THE YEAR 1886.

Resolved, That the Provisional Estimate made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on the 31st day of October, 1885, of the amount required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business in the City and County of New York, in each department and branch thereof, and the Board of Education, for the ensuing fiscal year, to wit: for the year eighteen hundred and eighty-six (1886), be submitted to the Board of Aldermen, with the reasons for it in detail, as required by section 189 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, as follows:

THE MAYORALTY.

The Departmental Estimate is \$30,000, and the appropriation is \$30,000, for the reason that this amount is deemed to be required and sufficient for the objects and purposes of the Mayoralty, including the salary of the Mayor fixed by law.

THE COMMON COUNCIL.

The Departmental Estimate is \$84,750, and the appropriation is \$77,700, for the reason that this amount is deemed to be required and sufficient for the objects and purposes of the Common Council, including the salaries of the Aldermen fixed by law.

THE FINANCE DEPARTMENT.

The Departmental Estimate is \$266,500, and the appropriation is \$266,500, for the reason that this amount is deemed to be required and sufficient for the objects and purposes of the Finance Department, including the salary of the Comptroller, as fixed by law.

THE STATE TAXES.

The sum of \$4,199,606.15 is appropriated for State Taxes, as the quota required to be paid by the County of New York, as provided by law.

INTEREST ON CITY DEBT.

The sum of \$7,401,300.80 is appropriated for the payment of interest on the Bond Debt of the Corporation of the City of New York becoming due and payable in the year 1886, including interest on the debt of the annexed territory, and on revenue bonds for the year 1886.

REDEMPTION OF THE PRINCIPAL OF THE CITY DEBT.

The sum of \$779,583.76 is appropriated for the payment of that portion of the principal of the Bond Debt of the City of New York payable from taxation, as provided by law.

ARMORIES AND DRILL-ROOMS—RENTS.

The sum of \$82,250 is appropriated for rents of armories and drill-rooms, as provided by law.

RENTS.

The sum of \$119,850 is appropriated for the payment of rent of property leased to the City for public offices, etc., as provided by law.

JUDGMENTS.

The sum of \$250,000 is appropriated, for the reason that it is required and deemed to be sufficient for this object and purpose.

THE LAW DEPARTMENT.

The Departmental Estimate is \$168,808, and the appropriation is \$166,550, for the reason that this amount is deemed to be required and sufficient for the objects and purposes thereof, including the salary of the Counsel to the Corporation, and of other officers of the Law Department, fixed by law.

THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS.

The Departmental Estimate is \$4,498,000, and the amount appropriated is \$2,725,090, for the reason that this amount is deemed to be required and sufficient for the objects and purposes thereof, including the salary of the Commissioner of Public Works, as fixed by law.

THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS.

The Departmental Estimate is \$1,236,052.50 and the appropriation is \$1,100,750, for the reason that this amount is deemed to be required and sufficient for the objects and purposes thereof, including the salary of the President of the Department, as fixed by law.

THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC CHARITIES AND CORRECTION.

The Departmental Estimate is \$1,947,607.50 and the appropriation is \$1,560,313.50, for the reason that this amount is deemed to be required and sufficient for the objects and purposes thereof, including the salaries of the Commissioners and the Poor Adult Blind in the City of New York, as fixed by law.

THE HEALTH DEPARTMENT.

The Departmental Estimate is \$487,516 and the appropriation is \$318,300, for the reason that this amount is deemed to be required and sufficient for the objects and purposes thereof, including the salaries of the Commissioners and other officers, as provided by law.

THE POLICE DEPARTMENT.

The Departmental Estimate is \$3,943,019.55 and the appropriation is \$3,859,672.10, for the reason that this amount is deemed to be required and sufficient for the objects and purposes thereof, including the amount required for compensation of the Commissioners and the officers and uniformed force, as fixed by law.

THE DEPARTMENT OF STREET CLEANING.

The Departmental Estimate is \$1,202,220.71, and the appropriation is \$1,100,000, for the reason that this amount is deemed to be required and sufficient for the objects and purposes thereof, including the salary of the Commissioner, as fixed by law.

THE FIRE DEPARTMENT.

The Departmental Estimate is \$1,904,156.10, and the appropriation is \$1,841,979, for the reason that this amount is deemed to be required and sufficient for the objects and purposes thereof, including compensation of the Commissioners and officers and firemen, as fixed by law.

THE DEPARTMENT OF TAXES AND ASSESSMENTS.

The Departmental Estimate is \$109,200, and the appropriation is \$109,200, for the reason that this amount is deemed to be required and sufficient for the objects and purposes thereof, including the salaries of the Commissioners, as provided by law.

THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

The Departmental Estimate is \$5,313,600, and the appropriation is \$4,869,800, for the reason that this amount is deemed to be required and sufficient for the objects and purposes thereof.

THE COLLEGE OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

The limit fixed by law is \$150,000, and the appropriation is \$129,000, for the reason that this amount is deemed to be required and sufficient for the objects and purposes thereof.

ADVERTISING, PRINTING, STATIONERY AND BLANK BOOKS.

The appropriation is \$213,400, for the reason that it is deemed to be required and sufficient for the objects and purposes thereof, including the publication of the CITY RECORD.

SALARIES—CITY COURTS.

The Departmental Estimates amount to \$352,800, and the appropriation is \$352,800, for the reason that this amount is deemed to be required and sufficient for the objects and purposes thereof, including salaries of the Justices, as provided by law.

SALARIES—JUDICIARY.

The Departmental Estimates amount to \$1,027,300, and the total appropriation is \$1,010,510, for the reason that this amount is deemed to be required and sufficient for the objects and purposes thereof, including the salaries of Justices, clerks and other persons, as provided by law.

CORONERS' SALARIES AND EXPENSES.

The Departmental Estimate is \$50,000, and the appropriation is \$50,000, for the reason that this amount is deemed to be required and sufficient for the objects and purposes thereof, including the salaries of the Coroners and physicians, as required by law.

SHERIFF'S FEES.

The Departmental Estimate is \$60,000, and the appropriation is \$30,000, for the reason that this amount is deemed to be required and sufficient for the objects and purposes thereof.

ELECTION EXPENSES.

The Departmental Estimate is \$218,200 and the appropriation is \$218,200, for the reason that this amount is deemed to be required and sufficient for the objects and purposes thereof.

PRESERVATION OF PUBLIC RECORDS.

The Departmental Estimate is \$87,435 and the appropriation is \$60,085, for the reason that this amount is deemed to be required and sufficient for the objects and purposes thereof.

The appropriation is \$1,094,002.90, as provided by law.

MUNICIPAL SERVICE EXAMINING BOARDS.

The appropriation is \$20,050, for the reason that this amount is deemed to be required and sufficient for the objects and purposes thereof.

ASSESSMENT COMMISSION, EXPENSES OF.

The appropriation is \$48,700, for the reason that this amount is deemed to be required and sufficient for the objects and purposes thereof.

HARLEM RIVER BRIDGE COMMISSION.

The appropriation is \$1,000,000, for the reason that it is required by law.

FUNDS FOR LOCAL IMPROVEMENTS AND FOR STREET AND PARK OPENINGS.

The Departmental Estimates of the Department of Public Works and the Department of Public Parks are \$2,841,700, and the appropriation is \$600,000, for the reason that this amount is deemed to be required and sufficient for the objects and purposes thereof, together with the amount to be provided from the funds therefor created by chapters 173 and 174 of the Laws of 1885, for the execution of new works.

THE DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

The Departmental Estimate is \$1,050,723, but no appropriation is made for this Department for the reason that there is no authority of law to make any appropriation payable from taxes.

THE TWENTY-SECOND REGIMENT NEW ARMORY.

The estimate of the Armory Board is \$300,000, and the appropriation is \$200,000, for the reason that this amount is deemed to be required and sufficient for the objects and purposes thereof.

BOARD OF REVISION AND CORRECTION OF ASSESSMENTS.

A meeting of the Board of Revision and Correction of Assessments, pursuant to adjournment, was held at the Comptroller's office on Friday, November 20, 1885, at 1.25 o'clock P. M.

Present—Edward V. Loew, Comptroller; E. Henry Lacombe, Counsel to the Corporation; Frederick Smyth, Recorder.

The minutes of the meeting held November 12, 1885, were read and approved.

The Comptroller presented the following assessment lists received from the Board of Assessors under date of November 14, 1885, viz.:

1. St. Nicholas Place—Regulating and grading the sidewalks, from the south curb of One Hundred and Fifth street to the intersection with St. Nicholas avenue, and setting curb-stones and flagging sidewalks five feet wide therein.
2. One Hundred and Thirty-fourth Street—Regulating and grading, setting curb and gutter-stones and flagging, from Third to Alexander avenue.
3. One Hundred and Fifty-third Street—Regulating, grading, setting curb and gutter-stones and flagging, from Third to Fourth avenue.
4. One Hundred and Forty-second Street—Regulating, grading, setting curb and gutter-stones and flagging, from Willis to Brook avenue.

The foregoing assessment lists being in proper form, and no objections having been filed, on motion, they were severally confirmed, all the members of the Board voting in the affirmative.

The assessment lists for regulating, grading, setting curb and gutter stones and flagging on Lexington avenue, from One Hundred and Second street to Harlem river; regulating and paving, with granite-block pavement, Lexington avenue, from One Hundred and Fourth to One Hundred and Thirty-first street, and for regulating and grading Madison avenue, from Ninety-ninth to One Hundred and Fifth street, and objections filed thereto, referred to the Comptroller and the Counsel to the Corporation at the last meeting, for examination and consideration with reference to the rule or principle adopted by the Board of Assessors in apportioning the assessments, were presented, and, on motion, taken up.

The Corporation Counsel stated that he "had examined the lists, and that it was possible that the discrepancies in the amount of assessments laid on the adjoining lots were caused by the belief on the part of the Board of Assessors that they were constrained to follow some particular rule. Under the statute, however, they had abundant authority to assess each particular house and lot for such proportionate part of the total assessment as in their sound judgment fairly represented the proportionate amount of benefit derived by such house and lot from the improvement." On motion, the lists were ordered to be returned to the Board of Assessors, with a request that they look into the subject and see if application of the rule indicated by the Counsel to the Corporation would require any change in their assessment.

The assessment list for sewer in the Boulevard, between One Hundred and Fifty-fifth and One Hundred and Fifty-seventh streets, and in One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, between the Boulevard and Tenth avenue, and objections of Lavinia S. Hawley, Charles H. Kerner and others, filed by James A. Deering, attorney; John C. Graff, filed by Thomas B. Smith, attorney; John C. Graff and others, filed by John C. Shaw, attorney; John C. Graff, filed by T. H. Baldwin, attorney, were presented by the Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of September 22, 1885.

Mr. Deering was heard, and asked that the Board consider on the merits the objections made to the said assessment, and to subpoena and examine witnesses in relation to the fair cost of the work in question.

After consideration, on motion, the said assessment list was laid over.

The Comptroller presented the assessment list for sewer in Avenue St. Nicholas, between One Hundred and Twenty-fourth and One Hundred and Thirty-second streets, with objections of estate of Andrew Boardman and others, filed by T. H. Baldwin, attorney; of George W. Carleton and others, filed by John C. Shaw, attorney; of Wm. H. Moore and others, filed by James A. Resolved, That consent be and hereby is given to the substitution of William M. Gibson, as surety in the place of H. H. Sommer to the estimate of Moody & Bracken for gas fitting for building on Pier A, North river.

A communication from the Department of Street Cleaning, in reference to, and stating that increased dumping facilities on both the North and East rivers, have become an imperative necessity and requesting the Board to set apart for the uses and purposes of the said Department, one suitable

and convenient pier on the East river, located between Sixtieth and Sixty-second streets and on the North river in the vicinity of Carmansville and at a location easy of approach for the Department carts. Referred to the Dock Superintendent for examination and report.

A communication from George W. Wanmaker, in reference to the use of the new-made ground between Piers, new 20 and 21, North river, for the sale of Christmas trees during the month of December, was referred to Commissioner Stark.

A communication from Thomas E. Bishop, requesting permission to use, for the purpose of receiving and discharging coal, that portion of the Pier, foot of West Fifty-first street, North river, formerly used by Andrew Dettinger for receiving and discharging ice, and also requesting permission to maintain the ice-bridge now remaining on said pier during the pleasure of the Board, was received, read, and

On motion, laid on the table for further consideration.

The following communications were received, read and ordered to be placed on file, action being taken where necessary, as stated, to wit:

From Eugene McCarthy, Dock Master:

1st. Reporting that the bulkhead west of Corlears street, East river, has several large and dangerous holes thereat.

2d. Reporting that there are several holes in the sheathing on south side of Pier 57, East river. The Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to examine and report.

3d. Reporting that the Pier at Fifth street, East river, is in need of cleaning. The President to request the Department of Street Cleaning to clean the said pier.

From Abraham Duryee, Dock Master—In reference to wharffages, etc., at bulkhead, foot of Fifty-eighth street, North river, and also stating that dredging is required at One Hundred and Thirtieth street, North river. Referred to the Engineer-in-Chief for examination and report.

From Engineer-in-Chief:

1st. Report on Secretary's Order No. 4856, as to the dredging required at foot of Seventy-ninth street, East river, and stating that, to obtain a depth of 12 feet at mean low water, dredging to the extent of about 1,000 cubic yards will be required, and also that the sewer thereat should be repaired. The Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to make requisition for dredging thereat and repair the said sewer in accordance with his report.

2d. Report on Secretary's Order No. 4855, as to the dredging required at the bulkhead, between Sixty-first and Sixty-second streets, East river. The Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to make requisition for dredging thereat to a depth of ten or twelve feet at mean low water.

3d. Reporting that on November 18th instant, he had suspended Watchman Michael McCready for fifteen days for being absent from his post while on duty on the night of Tuesday the 17th instant, and recommending that his action be approved. The action of the Engineer-in-Chief approved.
