The 814 deaths represent a death-rate of 27.66, as against 34.07 for the previous week, and 32.47 for the corresponding week of 1887.

The decrease of 188 deaths was mainly due to a decrease of 8 in diphtheria, 6 in measles, 63 in diarrhoeal diseases, 15 in diseases of the nervous system, 4 in croup, 10 in pneumonia, 33 in diseases of the digestive system, 9 in Bright's disease, 8 in old age, and 11 in deaths by violence, with an increase of 9 in bronchitis.

The decrease of diphtheria was most marked in the Twentieth Ward ; of diarrhoeal diseases, in the Seventeenth and Nineteenth Wards ; of pneumonia, in the Seventeenth Ward.

AQUEDUCT COMMISSION

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their Office, No. 209 Stewart Building, on Wednesday, August 22, 1888, at 2 o'clock P. M.

Present—The Mayor, and Commissioners Duane, Tucker and Scott.
The minutes of the stated meeting of August 8, 1888, were read and approved.
The Committee of Finance and Audit submitted the following report:

NEW YORK, August 15, 1888.

To the Aqueduct Commissioners:

GENTLEMEN—The Committee of Finance and Audit, to whom was referred the communication of the Secretary, presenting forms of contract to be executed by the Aqueduct Commissioners

and George W. Whitman, for inspecting iron pipe and pipe-castings, report: That they have examined the said forms of contract and find them correct in every particular, and recommend that the same be executed by the Commissioners.

On motion of the Mayor, the report was accepted and ordered filed.

The Committee also presented the following report:

The Committee of Finance and Audit, to whom was referred a communication from the Chief Engineer, dated July 31, 1888, submitting final estimate in favor of O'Brien & Clark for filling the low ground at Shaft Site No. 12, report:

That the work called for in the contract entered into with the said firm of O'Brien & Clark, and dated the 5th day of October, 1887, provides for furnishing all the appliances and doing all the labor necessary for borrowing material from the dumps of Shafts Nos. 12A and 12B, and distributing the same over the low ground near the middle of the shaft site; and that whenever, in the opinion of the Engineer, the said firm of O'Brien & Clark have completely performed their contract, the Engineer shall so certify in writing to the Aqueduct Commissioners that said work has been so furnished and delivered and completed in accordance with said contract, and accepted by the Chief Engineer; that the work called for in said contract, has been furnished, delivered and performed in the manner provided for in said contract, and accepted by the Chief Engineer; and inasmuch as said firm of O'Brien & Clark have furnished satisfactory evidence that the claims of all persons who have done work or furnished materials under said agreement have been paid or satisfactorily secured, we recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Aqueduct Commissioners do accept the work done by the firm of O'Brien & Clark under their agreement made with the Aqueduct Commissioners on the 5th day of October, 1887, for furnishing all the appliances and doing all the labor necessary for borrowing material from the dumps of Shafts Nos. 12A and 12B, and distributing the same over the low ground near the middle of the shaft site; and that a proper voucher for the final payment of the work so done and materials furnished under said agreement be approved by the Commissioners, and certified to the Comptroller for payment.

On motion of the Mayor, the report was accepted and ordered spread in full on the minutes.

Commissioner Scott then moved the adoption of the resolution referred to in said report, and the same was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor and Commissioners Duane, Tucker and Scott—4.

The Committee also submitted the following report:

That the Counsel to the Corporation appeared before this Committee and stated verbally that he had come to the conclusion and would so advise the Mayor, that in his opinion it would be inexpedient to withhold the estimates upon Section 12, solely upon the ground that it may appear that the contractors had sublet their contract, and that from all the facts he had been able to gather, it was at least doubtful whether there had been any subletting of said contract within the meaning of their contract with the City.

On motion of the Mayor, the report was accepted and ordered spread in full on the minutes and filed.

The Committee also reported their examination and audit of bills contained in Vouchers Nos. 3810 to 3822, inclusive, amounting to \$993.74, and also bills contained in Vouchers Nos. 3823 to 3834, inclusive, amounting to \$662.32, and also bills contained in Vouchers Nos. 3835 to 3841, being estimates for contract work amounting to \$101,951.85, and, on motion of the Mayor, the same were approved, and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment.

The Committee on Real Estate submitted the following report:

NEW YORK, August 15, 1888.

To the Aqueduct Commissioners:

GENTLEMEN—Among other various matters of unfinished business to which the attention of this Committee has been given, the following subjects appear to us to require your consideration and action:

1st. Map of the lands required for the construction of the proposed Quaker Bridge Dam and that portion of the proposed reservoir between the present Croton Dam and the Quaker Bridge, were submitted to the Aqueduct Commissioners by the Commissioner of Public Works on the 18th day of August, 1885.

This Committee is informed that subsequent surveys will, in some respects, modify these maps, and that some additional parcels of land will be added thereto. Therefore, for the proper information of the Commissioners, when considering this subject, these maps should now be amended; and we recommend your adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the maps (Exhibit DD) of lands between the present Croton Dam and the proposed Quaker Bridge Dam, which were submitted to the Aqueduct Commissioners by the Commissioner of Public Works on the 18th day of August, 1885, be and the same are hereby directed to be returned to said Commissioner, with the request that the same be so amended as to show thereon any changes that may have resulted from surveys subsequently made, and any additional parcels of land which may now appear to be required for the construction of the proposed dam and reservoir, or for highways and bridges to be constructed in connection therewith; and that when so amended, the said maps be returned to this Commission.

2d. This Committee is informed that additional lands are required for the construction of a blow-off tunnel culvert from Shaft 11B, at Gould's Swamp, westwardly to the Hudson river; but that no proceedings have as yet been taken to acquire such lands. Therefore, for the full information of the Commissioners, and to enable them to take early action on the matter, we recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Chief Engineer is hereby requested to report to the Commissioners at as early a day as possible what maps, plans, estimates and details are now in hand; and what further (if any) surveys, or other work, is necessary to be done to prepare for the prompt construction of the blow-off tunnel culvert from Shaft 11B, in the Town of Greenburg, Westchester County, westwardly to the Hudson river.

On motion of the Mayor, the report was accepted and ordered filed.

Commissioner Scott then moved the adoption of the first resolution referred to in said report, and the same was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, and Commissioners Duane, Tucker, and Scott—4.

The Mayor then moved the adoption of the second resolution, referred to in said report, and the same was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, and Commissioners Duane, Tucker, and Scott—4.

A communication was received from his Honor the Mayor, transmitting a copy of a letter addressed by the contractors, Rodgers, Shanly & Company, to the Secretary of the Aqueduct Commission, in regard to the manner in which their employees are being paid.

On motion of Commissioner Scott, the Secretary was directed to call the attention to the District Attorney to said matter, and to furnish him with a copy of the communications received from his Honor the Mayor and Rodgers, Shanly & Company.

A communication was received from the Chief Engineer, stating that the contractors for the Pipe Line, Section 16 of the New Aqueduct, are prepared to commence laying pipe at once, and for the proper supervision of the work, two Pipe Inspectors are needed and recommending that two Pipe Inspectors be appointed subject to the required Civil Service examination.

On motion of the Mayor, the request was granted, and the Secretary directed to make a proper requisition on the Civil Service Commission, for the names of persons eligible to be appointed to said position.

A communication was received from the Chief Engineer, recommending the discharge of Inspector John J. Dolan.

On motion of Commissioner Scott, said Inspector was ordered discharged.

A communication was received from the Chief Engineer, recommending the discharge of George Sherwood, employed as night watchman in the stables at Tarrytown, and asking that a suitable man be appointed in his place.

On motion of the Mayor, the discharge of said Sherwood was ordered, and the Chief Engineer authorized to employ a suitable person to fill said vacancy, and report to the Commissioners the name of the person so employed at its next meeting.

A communication was received from the Chief Engineer, presenting a petition, signed by the Inspectors of Masonry employed on the Second Division, calling attention to the fact that they were compelled to work on the Sabbath Day, and asking for relief from the Commissioners.

On motion of Commissioner Scott, the same was referred to the Committee on Construction.

A communication was received from the Chief Engineer, recommending that J. B. White be appointed as Superintending Inspector of Pipe Laying, at a salary of \$150 per month.

On motion of the Mayor, the same was referred to the Committee on Construction, with power.

A communication was also received from the Chief Engineer, stating that the Secretary had a list of thirteen Inspectors of Masonry, returned as eligible by the Civil Service Commission, and recommending that they be appointed, subject to the usual examination by an Engineer of the Aqueduct Commissioners.

The list received from the Civil Service Commissioners, dated August 21, giving the names of the persons who were eligible for said position, was then read; and, on motion of the Mayor, the subject matter of the appointment of said Inspectors, was referred to the Committee on Construction, with power.

A communication was received from the Chief Engineer, stating that John Kelly, recently employed as Superintending Inspector of Masonry, and suspended on August 19, for the reason

that his services were no longer required in such position, and further stating, that he had reinstated him as an Inspector of Masonry at the regular salary of \$120 per month.

On motion of the Mayor, the action of the Chief Engineer was approved.

A communication was also received from the Chief Engineer, transmitting the resignation of Leon G. Ghatti, Draughtsman, to take effect from August 17.

On motion of the Mayor, the resignation was accepted.

The Comptroller, under date of August 18, 1888, gave notice of the issue of warrants for the payment of vouchers not certified to by the Aqueduct Commissioners, for Manhattan Island Section \$65,985.30.

Which were ordered entered upon the books of the Commission and filed.

The Commissioners then adjourned.

REGULATIONS ESTABLISHING A SCALE OF WATER RENTS AND RULES GOVERNING THE USE OF WATER, FOR THE CITY OF NEW YORK, BY ORDER OF JOHN NEWTON, COMMISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS.

UNDER CHAPTER 420, LAWS 1882, SECTIONS 359, 357, 358, AND 353, and as amended by chapter 559, Laws 1887, as follows:

"The commissioner of public works shall, from time to time, establish scales of rents for the supplying of water, which rents shall be collected in the manner now provided by law, and which shall be apportioned to different classes of buildings in said city in reference to their dimensions, values, exposure to fire, ordinary uses for dwellings, stores, shops, private stables and other common purposes, number of families or occupants, or consumption of water, as near as may be practicable, and modify, alter, amend and increase such scale from time to time, and extend it to other descriptions of buildings and establishments. *All extra charges for water shall be deemed to be included in the regular rents, and shall become a charge and lien upon the buildings upon which they are respectively imposed, and, if not paid, shall be returned as arrears to the clerk of arrears. Such regular rents, including the extra charges above mentioned, shall be collected from the owners or occupants of all such buildings respectively, which shall be situated upon lots adjoining any street or avenue in said city in which the distributing water-pipes are or may be laid, and from which they can be supplied with water. Said rents, including the extra charges aforesaid, shall become a charge and lien upon such houses and lots, respectively, as herein provided, but no charge shall ever shall be made against any building in which a water-meter may have been, or shall be placed as provided in this act. In all such cases the charge for water shall be determined only by the quantity of water actually used as shown by said meters.*"

"***** The said commissioner of public works is hereby authorized to prescribe a penalty not exceeding the sum of five dollars for each offense, for permitting water to be wasted, and for any violation of such reasonable rules as he may, from time to time, prescribe for the prevention of the waste of water; such fines shall be added to the regular water rents."

"The rents for water shall be collected by the Department of Public Works shall be as follows, to wit: Croton Water Rates for Buildings from 16 to 50 feet, all others not specified subject to Special Rates.

The rent of all tenements which shall exceed in width fifty feet shall be the subject of special contract with the Commissioner of Public Works.

The apportionment of the regular rents upon dwelling-houses are on the basis that but one family is to occupy the same, and for each additional family, one dollar per year shall be charged.

Meters will be placed in houses where waste of water is found, and they will be charged at rates fixed by the Department for all the water passing through them.

The extra and miscellaneous rates shall be as follows to wit:

BAKERSIES—For the average daily use of flour, for each barrel, three dollars per annum.

BARNER SHOPS shall be charged from five to twenty dollars per annum, at the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works; an additional charge

five dollars per annum shall be made for each bath-tub therein.

BATHING TUBS in private houses, beyond one, shall be charged at three dollars per annum each, and five dollars per annum each in public houses, boarding houses, and bathing establishments. Combination stationary wash-tubs, having a movable division in the centre and capable of use for bathing, shall be charged the same as bathing tubs.

BUILDING PURPOSES—For each one thousand bricks laid, or for stone-work to be measured as bricks—ten cents per yard. For plastering, forty cents per hundred yards.

COWS—For each and every cow, one dollar per annum.

DINING SALOONS shall be charged an annual rate of from five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

FISH TANKS (retail) shall be charged five dollars per annum each.

For all stables not metered, the rates shall be as follows:

HORSES, PRIVATE—For two horses there shall be charged six dollars per annum; and for each additional horse, two dollars.

HORSES, LIVELY—For each horse up to and not exceeding thirty in number, one dollar and fifty cents each per annum; and for each additional horse, one dollar.

HORSES, OMNIBUS AND CART—For each horse, one dollar per annum.

HORSE TROUGHS—For each trough, and for each half bath or tub, or on private street, twenty dollars per annum; and each trough is to be fitted with a proper ball-cock to prevent waste.

HOTELS AND BOARDING HOUSES shall, in addition to the regular rate for private families, be charged for each additional water-closet, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

LAUNDRIES shall be charged from eight to twenty dollars per annum, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

LIQUOR AND LAGER BEER SALOONS shall be charged an annual rate of ten dollars each. An additional charge of five dollars per annum shall be made for each tap or other fixture.

PHOTOGRAPH GALLERIES shall be charged an annual rate of from five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

PRINTING OFFICES, when not metered, shall be charged at such rates as may be determined by the Commissioner of Public Works.

SODA, MINERAL WATER AND ROOT BEER FOUNTAINS shall be charged five dollars per annum each.

STABLES, when not metered, shall be charged by the horse-power, as follows: For each horse-power up to and not exceeding ten, the sum of ten dollars per annum; for each exceeding ten, and not over fifteen, the sum of seven dollars and fifty cents each; and for each horse-power over fifteen, the sum of five dollars.

WATER-CLOSETS AND URINALS—To each building on a lot one water-closet having sewer connection is allowed without charge; each additional water-closet or urinal will be charged as hereinafter stated. All closets connected in any manner with sewer shall be charged two dollars for each seat per annum, whether in a building on any other portion of the premises.

Urinals shall be charged two dollars per annum each. Water-closets shall be charged two dollars per annum each, or any valve or cock of any description attached to the closet, each, per year, twenty dollars.

For any pan closet, or any of the forms of valve, plunger, or other water-closet not herein mentioned, supplied with water as above described, per year, ten dollars.

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from an ordinary style of cistern filled with ball-cock, and overflow pipe which communicates with the pipe to the water-closet, so that overflow will run into the hopper or water-closet, when ball-cock is defective, or from which an unlimited amount of water can be drawn by holding up the handle, per year, each, five dollars.

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from any of the forms of waste-preventing cisterns, that are approved by the Engineer of the Croton Aqueduct, which are so constructed that not more than three gallons of water can be drawn at each lift of the handle, or depression of the seat, if such cisterns are provided with an overflow pipe, such overflow pipe must connect with the water-seal, but be carried like a safe-waste, as provided by the Board of Health regulations, per year, two dollars.

Cistern answering this description can be seen at this Department.

METERS.

Under the provisions of section 352, Consolidated Act 1882, water-meters, of approved pattern, shall be hereafter placed on the pipes supplying all stores, workshops, hotels, manufactories, public buildings, houses, stables, and in all places where water is furnished for business consumption, except private dwellings.

It is provided by section 352, Laws of 1882, that "all expenses of meters, their connections and setting, water rates, and other lawful charges for the supply of Croton water, shall be a lien upon the premises where such water is supplied, as now provided by law."

All manufacturing and other business requiring a large supply of water will be fitted with a meter.

Water measured by meter, ten cents per one hundred cubic feet.

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HYDRANTS, HOSE, TROUGHS, FOUNTAINS, ETC., ETC.

No owner or tenant will be allowed to supply water to another person or persons.

All persons taking water from the City must keep their own service-pipes, street tap, and all fixtures connected therewith, in good repair, protected from frost, at their own risk and expense, and shall prevent all waste of water.

The use of hose to wash coaches, omnibuses, wagons, railway cars or other vehicles or horses, cannot be permitted.

No horse-troughs or horse-watering fixtures will be permitted in the street or on the sidewalk, except upon a license or permit taken out for that purpose. All licenses or permits must be annually renewed on the first of May. Such fixtures must be kept in good order and the water not allowed to drip or waste by overrunning the sidewalk or street, or to become dangerous in winter by freezing in and about such troughs or fixtures.

No hydrant will be permitted on the sidewalk or in the front area, and any hydrant standing in a yard or alley, attached to any dwelling or building, must not be left running when not in actual use, and if the drip or waste from such hydrant freezes or becomes dangerous in winter, the supply will be shut off in addition to the penalty of five dollars imposed.

Taps at wash-baths, water-closets, baths and urinals must not be left running, under the penalty of five dollars for each offense, which will be strictly enforced.

Fountains or jets in hotels, porter-houses, eating-saloons, confectioneries or other buildings are strictly prohibited.

The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas, house-fronts, yards, courts, yards, gardens, and about stables, is prohibited. Where premises are provided with wells, special permits will be issued for the use of hose, in order that the police or inspectors of this department may understand that the permission is not for the use of Croton water.

Opening fire-hydrants to fill hand sprinklers or other vessels will not be allowed, under the penalty of five dollars.

The penalty for a violation of any of the preceding rules and regulations will be five dollars for each offense, and if not paid when imposed will become a lien on the premises in like manner as all other charges for unpaid water rates.

PUBLIC NOTICE AS TO WATER RATES.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT in compliance with the provisions of chapter 559, Laws of 1887, amending sections 350 and 351 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, passed June 9, 1887, the following changes are made in charging and collecting water rents:

1st. All extra charges for water incurred from and after June 9, 1887, shall be treated, collected and returned in the same manner as regular rents have heretofore been treated.

2d. In every building where a water meter or meters are now, or shall hereafter be in use, the charge for water by meter measurement shall be the only charge against such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through meter.

3d. The returns of arrears of water rents, including the year 1887, shall be made as heretofore on the confirmation of the tax levy of the City of New York, and shall include all charges and penalties of every nature.

4th. A penalty of five dollars (\$5) is hereby established, and will be imposed in each and every case where the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the use of water through hose, or in any other wasteful manner, are violated, and such penalties will be entered on the books of the Bureau against the respective buildings or property, and, if not collected, be returned in arrears in like manner as other charges for water.

5th. Charges for so-called extra water rents of every nature, imposed or incurred prior to June 9, 1887, will be canceled of record on the books of the Department.
