Sir—In compliance with the provisions of section 49 of chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, and chapter 545 of the Laws of 1890, the Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards hereby submits the following statement of the transactions of this office during the three months ending June 30, 1891:

During the said three months a large amount of public business has been carried on in the said wards, the nature and description of which will be found detailed in this report.

In the quarter ending June 30, 1891, there were thirty-six contracts in progress, two of which were executed by private individuals under the supervision of this Department. Eleven contracts have been completed and seven new contracts have been made.

Twelve plans for new sewers have been completed, to cover a total length of 20,304 linear feet or 3 84-100 miles. Seventeen preliminary surveys for new sewers have been made of the length of 26,417 linear feet or five (5) miles. Preliminary surveys have been made for regulating, grading and paving, making a total length of 21,000 linear feet or four (4) miles.

Besides these the Topographical Bureau has made 242 maps of all descriptions during the said three months.

During the said quarter of the year 8,437 84-100 linear feet of sewers have been constructed, 952 spurs have been laid, and 95 manholes and 23 receiving-basins have been built; 19,765 1-10 square yards of pavement have been laid; 28,476 3-10 linear feet of new curb have been set; 94,257 7-10 square feet of new flagging have been laid; 3,945 square feet of bridge-stone have been laid; 11,320 4-10 cubic yards of rock and 8,488 7-10 cubic yards of earth have been excavated; 90,992 4-10 cubic yards of filling have been done.

Under the Maintenance Bureau during the said quarter 91 different earth roads wholly or in part have been repaired and improved, comprising 118,702 square yards; 9,564 7-10 square yards of material were used in constructing new and in repairing old macadam roads; 1,435 2-100 square yards of pavement have been taken up and relaid; 5,858 square feet of new and old crosswalks have been laid; 1,387 linear feet of old curb-stones have been taken up and reset; over 49 miles of gutters have been opened and cleaned; 1,185 lineal feet of new gutters have been paved; 1,935 linear feet of new and old stone drains have been built and repaired; 200 linear feet of wooden box drains have been cleaned and repaired; 517 linear feet of sewers have been constructed and laid; 245 receiving-basins have been cleaned; 2,023 linear feet of sewers have been cleaned; 334 trees have been pruned and 47 have been cut down; 13 bridges over the Bronx river, Cromwell's and other creeks have been repaired.

Whereas, It appears that the West Shore and Ontario Terminal Company are the owners in fee simple with all its hereditaments of the above-described premises, including the riparian and wharfage rights ;
