SIR-The Board of Health of the Health Department of the City of New York respectfully submits the following report for the three months ending December 31, 1875, with the vital statistics of the city for the same period:

THE SANITARY BUREAU. The following is a summary of the operations of the Sanitary Bureau, which is charged with the

duty of inspecting and reporting, in proper form, all nuisances or causes of danger to the public health, with the exception of the orders of the Board, and with the care of contagious diseases:

The number of complaints received from citizens during the three months ending December 31, 1875, was 637, all of which were referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report. The Sanitary Superintendent, during the same period, granted, under instructions and authority of the Board, 629 permits to vessels to discharge cargoes upon proper vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port; 859 permits to scavengers to empty privies, their work being inspected by officers of this Board detailed for that purpose; 97 permits to remove and transport manure; 61 permits to land rags (in bulk) under bonds; and 19 miscellaneous permits were granted under the Sanitary Code. The number of cases of contagious diseases reported during the three months ending December 31, 1875, was: typhus fever, 14; typhoid fever, 231; scarlet fever, 419; cerebro-spinal meningitis, 31; measles, 250; diphtheria, 1,300; and small-pox, 407.

The amount of meat and fish condemned by the officers of the Sanitary Company of Police during the quarter ending December 31, 1875, was as follows: calves (bob), 101 carcasses; calves (case), 15 carcasses; beef, 788 pounds; veal, 758 pounds; poultry, 1,835 pounds; fish, 23,680 pounds; sheep, 40 carcasses; lambs, 9 carcasses; corned beef, 12 pounds; scollops, 34 gallons; cattle, 3 carcasses; bear meat, 75 pounds; and sausage, 200 pounds.

During the three months ending December 31, 1875, six thousand five hundred and twenty (6,520) permits were granted for burials. During the same period three hundred and eighteen (318) applications for transit permits were received and permits granted; five hundred and seventy-five (575) permits were granted for the burial of still-born children; six hundred and eighty (680) Coroners' certificates were received and recorded; two hundred and ninety-six (296) searches for the records of births, marriages, and deaths were made; and two hundred and thirty-nine (239) transcripts of the records of deaths, twenty-six (26) of marriages, and thirty-nine (39) of births from said records were issued. There were three thousand nine hundred and eighty (3,980) persons registered as married during the quarter, and five thousand nine hundred and eighty-nine (5,989) children were born during the same period. ORDERS OF THE BOARD—SECRETARY'S OFFICE.

The orders of this Board for the abatement of nuisances are issued upon the facts and evidence contained in the written reports of the Sanitary Inspectors, the result of personal inspection of the premises complained of. During the three months ending December 131, 1875, the number of orders issued by the Board was 3,486. Of this number 1,340 were issued under the first subdivision of section 14, chapter 74, Laws of 1866, by the terms of which the party served is allowed three days in which to demand a hearing by the Board of the testimony which may be presented to show that the order should be modified or revoked. In cases where no hearing has been asked for, and the orders have not been complied with, final orders, in the original or amended form, to the number of 373, have been issued, and the Board has directed the Attorney to commence action for penalties for non-compliance with such orders. All other written orders, in number 2,146, have been issued under the second subdivision of section 14, chapter 74, Laws of 1866, and are of a peremptory character, requiring that the nuisance be abated within five days, and if not complied with, directing the Sanitary Superintendent to enforce the same without further notice, unless the Board shall elect to commence a suit

for penalty in lieu of the execution of the order by its officers or agents.
