Resolved, That the Board of Police Commissioners be and they are hereby authorized and empowered to designate and set apart for the accommodation of members of the Police force, for the temporary detention of persons arrested and for the transaction of the business of the Police Department, the following places, viz.: In the new precinct, known as the Thirty-eighth Precinct, within the limits of the Towns of Westchester, Eastchester and Pelham, Westchester Town Hall as principal station and the Wake-field engine-house and City Island Town Hall as sub-stations. Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, September 30, 1895. Approved by the Mayor, October 9, 1805.
